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The Federal Bureau of Investigation, U.S. Department of Justice, is charged with the duty of investigating violations of the laws of the United States and collecting evidence in cases in which the United States is or may be a party in interest.

The following list indicates some of the major violations over which the Bureau has investigative jurisdiction:-

National Motor Vehicle Theft Act

Interstate transportation of stolen property valued at \$5,000 or more National Bankruptcy Act

Interstate flight to avoid prosecution or testifying in certain cases White Slave Traffic Act

Impersonation of Government Officials

Larceny of Goods in Interstate Commerce

Killing or Assaulting Federal Officer

Cases involving transportation in interstate or foreign commerce of any persons who have been kidnaped

Crimes in connection with Federal Penal and Correctional Institutions
Perjury, embezzlement. or bribery in connection with Federal Statutes or
officials

Crimes on the high seas

Federal Anti-Racketeering Statute

The location of persons who are fugitives from justice by reason of violations of the Federal Laws over which the Bureau has jurisdiction, of escaped Federal prisoners, and parole and probation violators.

The Bureau does not have investigative jurisdiction over the violations of Counterfeiting, Narcotic, Customs, Immigration, or Postal Laws.

Law enforcement officials possessing information concerning violations over which the Bureau has investigative jurisdiction are requested to promptly forward the same to the Special Agent in Charge of the nearest field office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, U. S. Department of Justice. The address of each field office of this Bureau appears on the inside back cover of this bulletin. Government Rate Collect telegrams or telephone calls will be accepted if information indicates that immediate action is necessary.

ANNOUNCEMENT -- 43RD ANNUAL CONVENTION INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF CHIEFS OF POLICE

Dear Mr. Hoover:

Recently the Committee on Arrangements for the 43rd Annual Convention of the International Association of Chiefs of Police met at Kansas City and approved a program which I hope will be one of the finest in the Association's history, from a constructive and instructive viewpoint. Furthermore, the Committee arranged some splendid entertainment for the delegates and their wives.

I wanted to write you at this time to make inquiry whether it would not be possible for you to reproduce this letter in an early issue of the FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin to bring to the attention of law enforcement officers the meeting which we have planned for Kansas City from September 21 to September 24, 1936, inclusive. I feel that the circularization of this information in the Bulletin will enable it to come to the attention of many officers who are not members of the Association but who, nevertheless, I would like to have present at the Kansas City convention.

In addition to the regular program of addresses to be presented by the outstanding authorities in the United States, Canada, Mexico and Cuba, it is my intention to have available a question box in which any visiting Chief may deposit an inquiry with reference to any problem effecting law enforcement work. I plan to appoint well informed members of the Association to answer these inquiries at an open forum or round table discussion which will be provided on the regular program. Furthermore, I plan to invite to the convention the President or other representative of all sectional and state associations of Chiefs of Police and to present for their consideration a plan to provide for the more concerted coordination of all police bodies throughout the country.

Your assistance in the publication of this communication which in reality is an "open letter invitation" to all Chiefs of Police throughout the United States to attend the convention at Kansas City, will be indeed greatly appreciated.

CRIME AND THE CITIZEN

The awakened interest of the law abiding citizenry in the problem of law enforcement has been noteworthy and Director John Edgar Hoover, speaking before the Annual Convention of the Kiwanis International, at Washington, D. C., on June 24, 1936, appealed to civic organizations to further aid the forces of law and order in their constant efforts toward the eradication of organized crime.

Because of the interest of peace officers in his subject, the address is being set out herein.

"I regard this opportunity to speak on the subject of crime and the citizen as an exceptionally fortunate one. For some time, I have believed it expedient that someone should point out to the various localities and communities of our country the particular problems which face them in law-enforcement. If I understand the Kiwanis International correctly, you are essentially dedicated to the welfare of the communities in which you reside; therefore, I feel I can pass along to these communities, through you, information and suggestions which are of the utmost importance in the life of every man, woman, and child in this nation.

"It may shock you to know that even during the short time required for the few words which I have spoken in this introduction, at least two major crimes have been committed in the United States. If this is amazing, I shall further state that before this speech is over, there will have been 90 robberies, cases of arson, hold-ups, aggravated larcenies, assaults, rapes, manslaughters and even murders within the limits of the United States. I must augment this by revealing that somewhere as I speak, a human being is undergoing the pangs of death at the hands of a murderer and that his life will have been severed before I cease speaking. These are not exaggerations. I am merely giving you a graphic analysis of coldblooded statistics, which tell us that a man or a woman is murdered somewhere in the United States every 45 minutes and that every 20 seconds, hour after hour, and day after day, into the weeks and the months and the years, there is committed within our boundaries some form of major crime, which annually reaches into one of every 16 homes in this country and which amounts to a total of 1,500,000 desperate offenses against the law each year.

"These crimes do not occur in some far distant country. They are not like the plagues in China, or the droughts of Australia, or the famines of India. These are catastrophies which occur in your own cities, your own towns, your own neighborhoods, and your own homes. I repeat that of the heads of the families here assembled, one out of 16 every year must suffer the tragedy of loss of property or of life by crime. Beyond this, every person here assembled is paying a hidden tax which amounts to a minimum of \$10 a month, collected relentlessly by the underworld. When I use the word 'minimum,' I do so in the most aggravated sense because the crime tax of America, the cost of maintaining this filthy over-burden of plunder which has fastened itself upon us, amounts to \$120 a year for every man, woman, and child within the boundaries of this country and you may

compute for yourself the exact amount with which you yourself are burdened.

"I suggest to you that the best insurance for a prosperous community is that of a crime-free community. I also suggest that the greatest work which any international organization can embark upon at the present time is to commit itself to the furtherance of law-enforcement, and I should be more than happy to know that at some time in the near future, such bodies as the Kiwanis International and kindred organizations will make it a part of their program to have in every community an active and persistent committee on law and order. There are many reasons why this should be done.

"The memories of all of us, I am sure, are long enough to recall the stirring days of 1917 when America was plunged into the necessity ned call the stirring days of 1917 when America was plunged into the necessity

In other words, the taking of human life in America has become so cheapened that even if a person is convicted -- and convictions are not by any means the rule -- the average penalty for having robbed a human being of his right to live is little more than that supposed to be inflicted for aggravated robbery or the theft of a motor car. Largely because of this inadequate punishment, before the sun sets tonight, 35 persons who began this day with their usual hopes and dreams and plans of the average human being, will have been wiped out by the hand of the murderer, thus bringing a wake of tragedy to family after family and a loss in economic ties and those of affections which cannot be replaced. In this country of ours, are 200,000 persons who will commit murder before they die, and 300,000 persons now living will die by the bullet or the knife, or the club, or the poison of this army of murderers.

"Again, I must remind you that these murderers and their victims, these robbers and thieves and hold-up men, are not persons who live in some far away country, but who exist in your own community, thereby presenting a problem which can and must be solved by the law-abiding citizens of that community. There has been too much of a lackadaisical attitude on the part of the average citizen, who believes that crime can be solved by some magic formula. The only solution must be that of the active interest and insistent vigilance on the part of the person, who is in constant danger of becoming a victim of this marauding army of criminals. Those potential victims are yourselves, and you are the ones who must be directly concerned with protecting your own lives, your own property, and the happiness and welfare of your own family by a militant attitude against any set of conditions which can aid or assist this invading army.

"It has not been my purpose merely to shock you or frighten you with the news of an appalling set of conditions. Rather, I have laid these facts before you so that you may truly understand the situation, and that I properly may approach what suggestions I have for a re-building of our communities into safer places in which to live.

"First, may I return to a previous statement that the formation of a committee on law and order by every club of the Kiwanis International type would be an enormous factor in the growth of proper law-enforcement. What, for instance, do you know about law-enforcement in your own town? What has happened to the big cases which engaged your attention a short time ago and what is going to happen to the ones which now are in the limelight? Were those cases vigorously prosecuted? Or were the participants allowed to beat the law by delay after delay during which witnesses disappeared, memories became faulty, evidence was lost or scattered and public interest allowed to die away, until the court room session, in which this man supposedly was to be tried for a crime, became a mere matter of formality? Or did the criminal, through the various tricks of legal chicanery, delay his case until it was possible for him to bargain for a lesser penalty, thus receiving a far lighter punishment than he deserved? Again, may I refer to figures and tell you that the majority of the prisoners who are in the penitentiaries of this country are not even there for the crimes they committed. In other words, men who have committed robberies have served time only for petty thefts; men who have burned down

dwellings have gone to prison for less than the charge of arson; men who have murdered, have served time only for manslaughter.

"Thus, the necessity for investigation and vigilance in your community continues if such things have happened in the past. Are you going to allow them to happen in the future? Or could a fearless committee on law and order demanding ceaselessly that arrested men be properly, quickly, and efficiently tried for their real crimes, bring about more respect for the law in your city than previously has existed? I submit to you that the protection of your community is not one which requires more laws or different laws or new laws, it demands only unceasing vigilance and pertinacious and continuous inquiry by men and women directly concerned with making their community one that is free from crime.

"Let us go farther into your city. Are there slot machines in every drug store and cigar store in your town? Does the numbers racket thrive? Or gambling? Or white slavery? Are there bookmaker joints and little dives and the hundred and one forms of law evasion which can come about only through one affiliation -- that of crooked politics and the criminal element? Racketeers cannot enter your community and prey upon it to any extent without the assistance of powerful local interests which place a restraining hand upon the efforts of your law-enforcement officials. These officials, after all, through our American system, are only hired men. They are not persons with unlimited power; they must obey the influences which put them into office. Now, if the influences which control your law-enforcement officials are of the wrong type, then you may be sure that you will be plundered by the racketeer, that you will be unable to obtain proper redress in case of robbery, assault, or other crimes.

"You also may be sure that the only way to combat vicious influences in the control of law-enforcement officials is by an unceasing activity of such committees as I have suggested, which will bring about continuous and critical publicity for the forces which are stultifying the protection of your city. Further than this, let me suggest that the qualifications of candidates for public office in your city be a matter of constant and critical inquiry for two excellent reasons: One, that the dishonest man be shown plainly to the citizens for what he is and, secondly, that the honest self-sacrificing career-seeking men of politics be given every possible assistance. In this battle, there is no such thing as party lines. There should be more of a place for a gentleman and an honest man in politics than in any other field of endeavor for, after all, he is a trustee of the public welfare and it is the duty of the honest citizen everywhere to aid in every possible way the man who would give of his time and his efforts to make his city a better place in which to live. Likewise, it should be the duty of any civic organization to aid such men against the mudslinging and character-smearing tactics of the average crooked politician and of a few pigsty newspapers, which, affiliated with the lower form of politics, - adopt such tactics in their efforts to defeat a worthwhile candidate for office.

"In this connection, I respectfully urge that a prideful duty for the better citizens of America is to take up the thought of political

life, not for what it may give them personally, but for what it may accomplish for the good of the community. More and more, America needs career men in politics, men who are willing and sufficiently courageous to face the necessary mud-slinging which can only be eradicated by a constantly increasing number of the better type of men in office, men who regard their community above their own pocketbooks, men who wish to see their neighbor's home a place of happiness and security. To such men in all walks of life, I sincerely hope that organizations of the type of the Kiwanis International can give their most sincere aid and assistance.

"In your local communities, what do you know about law-enforcement; the proper methods of apprehension and detection; the tricks and wiles of crooked attorneys; the political appointment of unfit men as deputies or wardens of penitentiaries, or directors of reformatories, or of guards of penal institutions? If you ever have had a prison escape or jail break in your community, have you accepted the story that this jail break was arranged by super-criminal brains, able to accomplish the seemingly impossible in rending steel bars apart or climbing high stone walls? Or have you investigated, inquired, dug deeply into the causes behind that jail break and found it to be what it must be, the result of non-feasance or malfeasance in office? Have you looked into the coddling of prisoners, the pleasant rooms which so often are assigned men of political power, who for self-protection or through some minor misfortune, have been forced to spend a few months away from their fellowmen behind bars? Do you take it for granted that every prison should be a country club with a radio in every room or that the function of a prison is not only to rehabilitate but also to exact the prisoner's debt to society?

"As honest citizens who stand constantly in danger of being robbed, of being assaulted, of losing your automobiles by theft, or your personal home possessions by the act of burglary, or who go about your business today not knowing that you may be murdered tomorrow, what have you done toward the building of scientifically perfected and mentally efficient police departments?

"Have you, as civic organizations, insisted that present-day law-enforcement should have changed as much from that of older days as automobiles have changed since the days of the two-cylinder engine? Or do you believe that it is still proper to have an archaic police force; that a law-enforcement agent should merely be fat in body, fat in mind, and flat of foot? There is no possible human reason why the law-enforcement agencies of so many American communities should be so outdated, so outmoded, and so bearded with archaic and ancient specifications as exist for a number of our police departments. If these outmoded conditions persist in your city, I submit that it is not the fault of the police department itself, for it can be no better than the foundations upon which it is built. If such a force fails properly to combat crime, the fault lies directly at the door of the citizen himself, who is so lackadaisical that he entrusts his life, liberty, and happiness to an outdated system. time has passed when 1880 methods of detection and apprehension can combat the 1936 methods of the criminal. In many of our cities, a spoils system persists from days which date back to our grandfathers. Officers are

appointed through political manipulation; there are few schools of modern criminal detection and apprehension; there are so few criminal laboratories that even in our larger cities it has been necessary until recently to depend upon private experts or so-called experts to assist in the solution of major crimes. Further than this, the police departments often have no permanent head or directing agency for the simple reason that they cannot exist beyond the change of city administration or the whim of the controlling power.

"I must make it plain that I am not condemning the police departments of America. Quite the contrary, I compliment them for their efforts to proceed against crime in the face of almost insurmountable objects in the form of political control, easy and unjust criticism, and public apathy which all too often deprives them of the modern and necessary tools with which to work. If you have a good police department in your city, it is your most solemn duty to back it to the utmost, to work for its betterment, to insist that it be given modern equipment, scientific apparatus, and the properly trained men to operate it, sufficient appropriations by which to move abreast of the times, and freedom from interference by those who would hamper its efforts. If your city is clean, it is because your police department and the men behind it are clean. If your city is dirty, your civic organizations should start a housecleaning where it will do the most good.

"I have said that numerous cities have been forced until recently to depend upon the services of private individuals in major crimes. This, to a degree, has been corrected within the last two years by the growth of the crime laboratory of the Federal Bureau of Investigation in Washington, where Government experts, without bias and with no thought save that of freeing the innocent and convicting the guilty, are at the service of America in its major mysteries. More and more police departments are learning to depend upon the efforts of this laboratory which now is the largest and most efficient of its kind in the entire world. For instance, a murder mystery recently was solved in Alaska through laboratory examinations conducted in Washington. Again, of several suspects in a burglary case, the proper man was found through the use of the spectrograph, and the discovery of certain metal fragments on the blade of a knife which had cut a screen and which labeled the owner as a participant in the burglary. Such cases go on endlessly just as they do in the Identification Division, where, each month, over 500 fugitives from justice are apprehended through the cooperation of police departments and the Federal Bureau of Investigation and where, time after time throughout the year, bodies of the dead are identified through lingerprints, persons suffering from amnesia are restored to their homes, and where now rest over six million sets of fingerprints contributed by 10,000 police agencies throughout the world.

"However, while we of the Federal Bureau of Investigation are most willing and eager to render assistance of this type to any community throughout America, it is primarily necessary that the community itself avail itself of every possible means of building up an efficient law-enforcement organization. There is no excuse today, when the colleges are pouring out

thousands of young men eager for careers, for any police department to be composed of ignorant, lazy, inefficient personnel. The time is coming, and coming rapidly in America when law-enforcement shall be looked upon for what it really is -- a career, a profession of honor and achievement and the greatest step toward that end must be a change in the public viewpoint, which sadly enough today, seems to be that any person who pursues a criminal is perforce a "copper" and that to be a "copper" one must be dull of intellect, over-fed of body, and politically affiliated with a ward heeler. When the public attitude changes and when the public demands keen-brained, alert, well-educated, scientifically-trained officers, headed by men who have given their lives to a practical study looking toward the eradication of criminality, then indeed shall we have efficiency in lawenforcement. This will not be brought about by any miracle. It will, however, come quickly as the result of activities by well-organized and persistent committees of such civic organizations as the Kiwanis International.

"Further, it lies within the province of such organizations as the Kiwanis International to embark upon what to me seems one of the greatest of duties in civic service -- that of the attempt to rescue from the tangled jungles of criminality the vast numbers of youths who daily are being recruited into the ever-increasing, and busy army of crime. It is an appalling fact that one-fifth of our law infractions today are committed by persons of less than voting age; young men and women, who, in a different generation, still would have been under the strict discipline of the home. There needs to be rebuilt a regenerated reverence for the principles of law and order. It is necessary also that parents be reawakened to their duties as mothers and fathers of children, who either will grow up to be good citizens, or the inmates of penitentiaries. Again, I remind you that this is a problem of your own community, and your own county, and your own home city. Further, it is a striking problem of your own immediate neighborhood. Your law and order committees can do no finer work than that of bringing before the youth of your community the unvarnished fact that crime is unromantie; that the so-called heroic headline figures, such as Dillinger, "Pretty Boy" Floyd, "Baby Face" Nelson and others of their vermin-like rank, were nothing more than thugs, cheap hoodlums, super-inflated rats, who existed not because of personal bravery, but through purchased or bargained political and criminal protection. No youth really likes to emulate a venal figure. Therefore, I suggest to you a program of education; that the young women and young men of your city be made to know that crime is ugly; crime is cheap; crime is filthy, and the criminal is a vermin-infested rat.

"If the Federal Bureau of Investigation, under the fearless and inspiring leadership of Attorney General Homer S. Cummings, has done any one outstanding thing in its efforts to combat Federal crime, it has been that of showing how education, science, study and highly organized training plus men of impeccable character, can accomplish great results in the warfare against the criminal. To this I must add, a freedom from political suasion, and from the pressure of sometimes well-meaning but sentimental or otherwise motivated persons in an effort to defeat justice. Members of the Federal Bureau of Investigation are college men -- 83% of

them. Their backgrounds have been investigated since boyhood; their training in all branches of investigative technique has been meticulous. They have been taught how to arrest bandits in a speeding motor car, or under other conditions of flight; they have been taken upon the rifle and the pistol ranges for instruction until every single man of the 600 who form the personnel of the 37 wide-flung field offices of this organization, is an expert marksman or better in the use of the pistol, the shotgun, the machine gun, and the high-powered rifle. This, I assure you, is not for purposes of offense, but that of defense. The Federal Bureau of Investigation lives true to the code that the criminal must be allowed to reach for his gun first, and all we can possible do is to teach our men that once they are threatened, they must be quicker on the draw and keener of aim than the man who attempts to murder them.

"These are not super-human accomplishments. They are nothing that cannot be emulated and equalled in any city of the United States, providing that there is the proper impelling force behind the building of such law-enforcement agencies. You get exactly the kind of Government, and exactly the kind of law-enforcement which you demand. If you want an inefficient police department, stultified by politics, you may rest assured that you will have it. If, however, you work through the activities of law and order committees of civic groups, through the drive of publicity, aided by newspapers, which, in a great majority are deeply concerned with the welfare of their communities, you will find that conditions will change miraculously, and you soon will be able to point to your city as one of efficient law-enforcement, with an extremely low crime rate. The criminal does not linger where the police department is alert, up-to-date, honest and unhampered.

"However, in your efforts to bring about a better condition of law-enforcement in your community, I desire most emphatically to warn you against the onslaught of an ever-increasing horde of theorists, addlepated experimenters, unreliable, self-styled reformers, who may hold before you beautiful pictures of untried and unpracticed theory but who can offer you nothing practical in the way of crime eradication. It is the penalty of every widely-known movement that such crowds of hangers-on attach themselves with their patent medicine nostrums guaranteed to cure every and all ills with a wave of the hand. The only men who can combat crime are men who actually know crime -- men who have spent long years of practical effort in a self-educating battle against this many sided menace. Select of these men those who are honest and those who are opposed to political control, and you will need no impractical magicians of theory to show you the way out of the troubles which confront you.

"Let me give you an example of what can be done by consistent and persistent effort backed by the proper sort of personnel and freedom from venal political influence. Some months ago, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, through an Act of Congress, was given the task of making bank robbery unprofitable and unpopular in America. At that time, there were well-organized, roving gangs of bank robbers, headed by such men as Eddie Doll, Eddie Bentz, Charles Fitzgerald, Alvin Karpis, Harry Campbell, 'Pretty Boy' Floyd, William Dainard, the kidnaper, and others, who made

bank robbery as much of a business as that of automobile selling or the vending of groceries. Happily, all these persons now are either dead, or in custody. The Federal Bureau of Investigation began a systematic warfare against this type of plunder, and I am proud to state that not only have bank robberies decreased from an average of 16 a month to one-fourth that number, but that the insurance companies have just announced a reduction of bank insurance amounting to 20% in thirty-five states because, as they stated, 'of the activities of the Federal Bureau of Investigation which have made bank robberies an increasingly undesirable business.' Again, this was nothing super-human, this was not a miracle, this was nothing that cannot be duplicated in your own community in any type of criminal activity -- providing the proper conditions prevail.

"In the same light, you may work against the abuses of the penal system, and of the highly necessary and laudable parole system. Parole and probation undoubtedly have their uses and they also just as clearly have their abuses. If in your community the first offender, who has seen his error, is given his chance to reform; if there is a nonpolitical pardon and parole board, whose duty is confined wholly to the rehabilitation of men; if this is backed by a competent corps of parole supervisors who devote honest efforts toward the assurance that the paroled man is given a job; if his home influence is guarded; if his efforts toward rebuilding himself are aided and assisted; if these things apply in your community, then it is your duty as civic organizations to give every possible assistance to the theory, the practice and the system of parole as it applies in that portion of the country in which you live. But if such men as William Dainard, the kidnaper of George Weyerhaeuser, who was paroled after being convicted of grand larceny and who was laterpardoned after being sentenced to serve twenty years for robbery; if such men as Rufe Persful, who committed four murders and was paroled four times, are being freed in your community; if such men as Marcus Powell, who after committing two murders and receiving clemency for both crimes, committed a double murder; if such persons as 'Baby Face' Nelson, who was freed time after time by clemency and who later killed three Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation; if second, third, and fourth offenders are being freed on pardon and parole, then it is your sacred duty to yourselves in the protection of your property and your lives to work for a change in the administration of the parole system in your community.

"And now, as I near the end of my speech, I find that I have not been making a speech, but have been conducting an enlistment program. I hope that some of the things I have said may lead to the formation of such committees as I have suggested. I hope that it may spread, that it may not be an exclusive affair merely with the Kiwanis International, but that this may some day include all civic organizations. After all, the person mainly responsible for your protection and for your happiness is yourself. Remember again that before the sun sets tonight, 35 people will have been murdered; that every 20 seconds a major crime is being committed; that ceaselessly hour after hour and day after day, and month after month, 1,500,000 major crimes a year are being rolled up into a horrible total of plunder and pillage. With these striking facts before

you, I hope that you will go home to your communities and do something to remedy this ghastly situation, for we have the highest Authority for the truth that 'righteousness exalteth a nation: but sin is a reproach

SPECIAL ANNOUNCEMENT

Identification Schools conducted by the Federal Bureau of Investigation

The Federal Bureau of Investigation at this time is pleased to report considerable progress in connection with the identification schools which it has conducted in certain of its field office headquarters for the benefit of state and local law enforcement officers. It will be recalled that the initial school of this type was conducted at Dallas, Texas, in January of this year. Subsequent schools have been conducted in April at Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, in May at Buffalo, New York, and in the latter part of June at Portland, Oregon. The schools at Buffalo and Pittsburgh averaged approximately 40 in attendance and at Portland 50 students were enrolled.

The curriculum for these schools covers approximately five days of intensive study in the taking, classifying and filing of fingerprints and in the study also of latent fingerprint identification activities, as well as other related matters. It will be recalled that these schools were adopted as an extension upon the Bureau's main training course for police officers held at Washington, D. C.

The suggestion is made that any Chiefs of Police who desire to assign individual members of their departments to attend later schools communicate with the Director of the Bureau in order that their requests may be given appropriate consideration. Due to limitations of space, it is not possible usually for the Bureau to accept more than one officer from each department. There is, of course, no cost for the attendance at the school or for the instruction given. However, the officers attending must bear their transportation and subsistence costs.

The Bureau will indicate the points at which subsequent schools are to be conducted and further will report upon the progress of other schools currently in this Bulletin. It is noted that these schools are being conducted with the approval of the President of the International Association for Identification who has expressed the belief that they will serve a long felt need in the identification field. It is hoped that they will afford to officers who have not had the opportunity to receive such instruction in the past the occasion to acquire practical information concerning identification problems of current and mutual interest.

THE ROMANCE OF FINGERPRINTS

Mr. B. C. Bridges, Superintendent of the Bureau of Identification, Alameda, California, speaking before the Twentieth Annual Convention of the California State Division of the International Association for Identification, held in Stockton, California, June 27, through June 29, 1935, delivered the following talk. It is believed that law enforcement officers will find it of unusual interest and it is, therefore, being reproduced herein with Mr. Bridges' permission.

"In speaking to you this afternoon, I find myself confronted by a problem-the problem of offering something new. I realize that the science of fingerprints has been quite well covered, at least from a modern standpoint, and I appreciate the fact that the persons to whom I am speaking are experts in the field. But notwithstanding these circumstances, I hope you will feel my contribution has some flavor of novelty.

"The word 'dactyloscopy' is said to have been invented by Juan Whether he did or did not invent the word, I am not prepared to say. At any rate, I think that the science might be better described by some generic term with a more extended definition; one that would include not only finger impressions, but also the imprints of the palms, as well as the soles of the feet. And at this time I shall take the liberty of assuming that inclusion. The conventional conception of dactyloscopy envisions inked impressions of the fingerprints placed upon a piece of paper eight inches square and customarily identified with some infraction of the law, but the word means much more than that. When we are not fortunate enough to have large amounts of money, and are compelled to work for a living--which includes myself -- we sometimes fall into the easy-going habit of accepting that conventional viewpoint, and looking upon our profession as nothing more than a source of bread and butter. However, I choose to believe that in all vocations, however mechanical and prosaic, if we know where to look for it, and take the time to look, we may always find a little golden thread of romance running through all the more quietly colored fabric of our work-a-day pursuits. This afternoon I propose to follow that thread of romance, and I want to take all of you with me, and perhaps we may dwell for a little space in the glamour and in the mystery of a distant past.

"In all probability, the initial inception of dactyloscopy as a utilitarian application was far back in the early morning of time when the primordial savage learned to note the tracks and trails of animals; first, in avoiding them for his own protection, and later when he traced those same animals for food. If this had not been true, there is a strong possibility that the human race may not have survived, and so I feel that we, as individuals of the 20th century, owe our very existence, at least in some part, to the study of fingerprints.

"When civilization was emerging from the darkness of savagery, the world was rife with innumerable cults and creeds. Many strange beliefs were popular. It was thought that inanimate objects--rocks, trees, and what not--possessed a spiritual quality; and it was considered advisable to insure

the favor and co-operation of these spirits of nature. This was usually attempted by approaching the object, laying thereon the hands, and repeating some mystic cantrap or invocation calculated to appease or mollify that particular spirit. Of course, we would scarcely expect to find finger-prints left upon the surface of a rock or the bark of an oak tree, but when this practice was extended, and the touch fell upon more resilient surfaces, fingerprints resulted as a natural consequence, and it was not long until the palm and finger impressions came to hold the same religious significance as the laying on of hands.

"I feel unusually privileged today in being able to show you what in my opinion are undoubtedly the oldest recorded fingerprints in the world. Their age is conservatively estimated as being not less than 30,000 years. There are two methods or schools for placing periods in the study of anthropology. We have the Java man, the Piltdown man, the Cro-Magnon man, and the Neanderthal man; each representing a particular period. Some authorities place the Neanderthal man as having lived about 40,000 years ago, while others with equally conclusive proof, contend that he existed 100,000 years in the past. If the calculations of the last group are correct, these relics instead of being 30,000 are probably nearer 90,000 years of age. They were discovered in 1832 on a small island called Gavrini, off the northern coast of France. The original find uncovered some megalithic monuments hidden beneath earth mounds, while further excavations revealed subterranean passages, spacious galleries, and chambers paved with flagstones and braced with stone supports. Many of these rocks surfaces were inscribed with strange markings that greatly intrigued the archeologists. They at first seemed quite incomprehensible.

"For many years after their discovery opinions differed as to just what they represented. Some thought they were alphabetical symbols; others saw in them a fancied resemblance to the relics of the Druids; while some tried to identify them with traces left by the dwellers of prehistoric Ireland. However, none of these theories seemed to fit the case. In 1885 Dr. Alexander Bertrand published a paper in which he stated that he thought the carvings looked like fingerprints, but nothing further came of it at that time, and it was left to our contemporary, Dr. Eugene Stockis of the University of Liege, to prove in 1920 that the carvings represented fingerprints. Dr. Stockis went to considerable pains to bear out his contention. He chose fingerprint patterns from his own collection and enlarged them to a comparative size. When these enlargements were placed beside the Gavrini specimens, there seemed to be little doubt that the carvings represented fingerprints.

"I shall make no attempt to amplify the findings of Dr. Stockis as he has covered the ground quite thoroughly. I feel certain that when you have examined these photographs, which are on display among the other exhibits, you will agree that the tracings represent nothing else but fingerprints. In looking over these pictures, I find certain peculiarities. In a number of places are reproduced the likeness of some wedge-shaped objects. They look to me like chisels, and that is what I think they are. It seems reasonable that the child-like mind of the savage would be impelled to show a replica of the tools he used to make his drawings. I

think these carvings are distinctly remarkable, in view of the fact that they were made during the Neolithic age, when all tools were of stone, and I am inclined to believe that modern artisans would find it quite a task to duplicate these traceries even with metal implements.

"We find in one place that the Neolithic sculptors have drilled into the rock and made very definite finger-holes. Just what object was in the mind of the workman is a matter of conjecture. He may have had some vague idea of making a ball for his private bowling alley, or perhaps he was fixing a place to chin himself.

"Though very likely the oldest, these are not the only rock carvings of fingerprints. The prehistoric cave men of Nova Scotia also copied the patterns of their fingers upon the cave walls, and these drawings, though crudely executed, represent all the types as we know them today. And there is a well-known relic of a hand carved on a rock in Nova Scotia near a lake with the almost unpronounceable Indian name of Kejemkoojic. This example shows unmistakable indication of palm and finger patterns.

"In the state of Wyoming the cave dwellers have left some very interesting traces. In several places they have covered the walls of their caves with palm prints, having first dipped their hands in some sort of coloring matter, perhaps a vegetable dye, or iron oxide, and now we find row upon row of palm marks, large and small. It would seem that the entire tribe must have had a 'hand' in the decorating business. The approximate age of these ornamentations may be determined, since we know that the tribes in that section migrated elsewhere at about 1200 A. D. when a severe drought killed their crops and made the grazing land no longer useful.

"The caves of the Spanish Pyrenees are noted for the frescoes made by men of the Neolithic period, and these paintings are full of representations of the human hand and foot. I have a number of photos on exhibition here that show interesting examples of this, as well as some pictures of similar paintings made by the prehistoric inhabitants of Australia. A decorative impulse may have suggested many of these paintings; however, I feel that the one thing common to all peoples in all times, influencing their arts and practices, is some form of faith. And in view of the innumerable archeological specimens that feature digital tracery, found in such widely separated places and various ages, it might seem justifiable to assume the pre-existence of a mystical, universal religion with finger prints as one of its salient symbols.

"In 1925 the British Museum sent an expedition into ancient Chaldea and, among other strange things, they discovered a wall of clay brick. Many of the bricks in this wall were marked with the finger impressions of the artisans in such a way as to leave little doubt that the prints were intentional. At the time of this discovery, and article was published stating that these impressions were the oldest known voluntarily recorded fingerprints made for identification. This seems rather a presumptuous statement, but since the building of that wall dates approximately 2800 B. C., there may be some grounds for the contention.

"We are all familiar with debtors' prisons as described in the novels of Charles Dickens, and it would seem that imprisonment for debt was not limited to England. I have here a copy of a most unusual document, the original of which is on file in the British Museum; and if you should ever go to the British Museum and would like to check on this, the catalogue number is 84-2, 11, 172. It is written in Sanscrit and reads as follows:

'Nabu-etir, my brother, gave me this order: five and one-half minae silver to Nargal-iddin, creditor of Bel-lumur; wherefore you will capture Bel-lumur and his son. Furnish a document about the seizure of his house, and secure thereon a fingerprint of Bel-lumur; because I give five and one-half minae silver out of my purse to Nargal-iddin, Bel-lumur, his wife, and their son, Ea-lumur, into the treasure house of Daddias.'

"I talked about this document with Dr. McGowan and Dr. Schwartz of the Pacific School of Religion, and these gentlemen, who read Sanscrit fluently, assured me that the word 'anguli mudra,' which is the word in the original writing referring to the fingerprint, can have no other possible meaning. Since the reference in the order is so casual, it would appear that taking fingerprints was a common practice well understood by the person who issued the order as well as the agent who received it, and the writer of this document insisted upon a fingerprint being secured from the defendant in order to later verify the fact that his agent had not arrested the wrong man.

"Sir Henry Layard discovered in the ancient ruins of Nineveh what is said to be the oldest library in the world, containing some twentyodd thousand clay tablets, and many of these tablets bore the name of the writer together with his seal. The individual seal, as a means of establishing personal identification, has been employed throughout the world for many years and quite extensively in the Orient where it is still used. There is an old Japanese saying, 'seal lost, head lost,' meaning that, without his seal one might get into very serious trouble. Many of the tablets found by the Layard expedition bore a substitute for the conventional signature in the form of fingerprints, explained by an inscription in cuneiform hieroglyphics, 'Supur Kima, Abnu-Kunuk-Kishu,' meaning the nail impression or fingerprint of the writer instead of his seal. Also, some of the tablets ended with one or another of the following inscriptions: 'Three minae bronze for his supur,' or 'One shekel silver for his supur,' or else 'Ten minae bronze for their supurs,' when several impressions appeared. A minae was an arbitrary weight or sum of money, varying in amount with the times and places, but usually representing something over one pound troy weight. Common sense tells us that such fees would never have been paid for minor formalities and we must, therefore, conclude that the money was given for legal verification and protection just as we now pay to have a paper notarized. This assumption would seem probable in view of the fact that similar tablets found among the ruins of ancient Egypt proved to be receipts for taxes paid, and bore two fingerprints on the opposite lower corners. these prints were made by different persons, in all probabilities they were the impressions of the landowner who paid the taxes and the clerk who received the money.

"According to history, the people of Bible times must have had quite belligerent tendencies since one of the favorite national pastimes would seem to have been destroying cities. And I might say that when they destroyed a city they did a very thorough job. They usually killed every living thing within the walls, and then pulled all the houses down. In some cases, they even plowed up the soil and scattered it with salt so that nothing could grow. However, these cities were built in places strategically located and favorably placed near to land suitable for grazing and agriculture, and frequently after destruction, another city would be reared upon the ruins of the first. This city also might be later demolished and, perhaps, yet another again replace it. So that now, by digging in the earth in some places, we find layers of the ruins of cities, one above the other.

"Dr. William Frederick Bade of Berkeley has lately made some interesting discoveries at a spot about eight miles north of Jerusalem. He dug down through three distinct layers of cities and studied them all in turn. In the lower layer he found numerous pieces of pottery, including many jars. Some of these jars bore the fingerprints of the potter pressed into the once soft clay. These impressions were obviously intentional and, no doubt, represented the workman's individual trademark. He also found similarly marked jars in the other levels above. He took these specimens to Professor August Vollmer of the University of California who examined the prints and found that they had all been made by the same person, proving that the jars fashioned by the potter in the earliest city had passed through all the invasions and had been used over and over again by the people who followed.

"There is an alleged occult power of divination that assumes the existence of an atmosphere or personality surrounding inanimate objects that takes on the color or nature of their experiences. If such were really the case, what wonderful stories one of those old jars could tell us. Who can say how many dark-eyed Ruths and Rebeccas may have carried it to the community well perched on a white shoulder or balanced on a shapely head. How many lovers' meetings it must have witnessed. To what strange uses it may have been put, perhaps in the den of some old alchemist or sorcerer. It may even have been used by Gideon's army in the battle of the jars and lamps. At any rate, the evidence of the finger impression gives the fingerprint expert a decided advantage over the archeologist. The archeologist might say this jar was probably made at such and such a period, and these other jars were made, quite probably, at about the same time--they even may have been made by the same person. The fingerprint expert doesn't have to guess--he knows. He looks at the prints on the jars and knows they were all fashioned by the same man.

"We all, at some time or another have signed legal documents and noted the lines of printing at the bottom, '...and hereunto I affix my hand and seal...' I believe this phrase had its origin in the Bible. The Scripture is rich in allusion to hand and finger impressions. I think it is in a chapter of Revelations that the passage occurs, '...and by the mark set within their hand ye shall know them...' No doubt many different interpretations have been given to this verse, but, in my opinion, it refers to the proof of identity by fingerprint and palm impressions.

"In the Second Epistle of Paul to the Tessalonians, 3:17, the text is as follows: 'The salutation of Paul, with my own hand, which is the token in every epistle; so I write.' The ancient language permits of a freer translation: 'The salutation is of my own hand, Paul; it is the sign in every letter: I write thus.' I was under the impression that Paul could not write and dictated his letters to someone else. The fact that he dictated is quite definitely stated in Romans, 16:22 and Corinthians, 16:21. However, I talked with various authorities on religious writings, and they assure me that Paul could write though he did dictate to a secretary. I have no doubt that they are correct about this, but whether he could or could not write, I think makes little difference in this connection. It is my firm conviction that he used his fingerprints to prove the true authorship of his letters. This is my opinion, although others may differ with me: In dealing with these vestiges plucked from the shadows, I know there are times when we cannot be absolutely positive.

"However, there are some things of which we may be quite certain: We know that fingerprints have touched and molded the affairs of mankind from the earliest dim dawn of civilization up to the present day.... We know that they have been pressed upon the marriage bonds of peasants.... And we know that they have sealed the international treaties of kings and emperors... 'The moving finger writes, and having writ, moves on...' And now the 20th century sees the touch of romance transformed into a very practical modern utility.... But I elect to believe that the touch of romance still survives in all these ancient relics as a rich source of wonder and speculation."

FINGERPRINTING CRIMINALLY INSANE PERSONS

The attention of law enforcement agencies is invited to the fact that the Federal Bureau of Investigation will be very glad to receive for filing in its Identification Division, the fingerprints of criminally insane persons. It is believed to be desirable to take the fingerprints of individuals falling within this class. Often-times their identity is not known and a search of the Bureau's fingerprint files would disclose information as to their past history. However, in the event the identity of these persons is known, the submission of their fingerprints and the retention thereof would insure that the said impressions would be available for future reference in the event the said persons escape thereafter.

In the event any law enforcement officials contact the Superintendents of institutions for the criminally insane, the suggestion is made that this service be offered to them. When fingerprints of this group of individuals are forwarded to the Bureau's Identification Division, it should be indicated whether they are transmitted solely for the civil identification files or whether it is desired that a search be conducted of the criminal files. It is, of course, not contemplated that any action would be taken in connection with this situation which is not consonant with the existing statutory practice or custom.

SUBJECT IDENTIFIED THROUGH INTERNATIONAL EXCHANGE OF FINGERPRINTS AS HAVING BEEN ARRESTED IN GLASGOW, SCOTLAND

The Federal Bureau of Investigation, on behalf of local police departments and Federal agencies, frequently submits to foreign countries fingerprints of those persons suspected of having criminal records in those countries participating in the international exchange of fingerprints. The United States Immigration and Naturalization Service requested that the fingerprints of William Fitzsimmons, who had been arrested by that Department on February 21, 1936, at Detroit, Michigan, on a charge of violating the Immigration Laws, be forwarded to certain foreign countries for the purpose of ascertaining whether this individual possessed a foreign criminal record.

The fingerprints of Fitzsimmons were forwarded to the Police Department at Glasgow, Scotland. The Chief Constable at Dundee, Scotland, through the Police Department at Glasgow, Scotland, reported that William Fitzsimmons was probably identical with an individual of the same name who appeared before the Court in that town on December 3, 1909, on a charge of playing football, for which he was admonished by the Court. On March 13, 1914, he was taken to the Police Court on a charge of breach of peace and was fined two shillings, six pence, or twelve hours' imprisonment.

The regular exchange of fingerprints with identification bureaus of foreign countries has created widespread interest and contributes materially to more effective law enforcement throughout the world.

All law enforcement agencies throughout the United States are reminded of this service and are encouraged to make use of it. They should indicate to the Bureau the cases wherein they desire a foreign exchange arranged. In these cases duplicate copies of the fingerprints, to be relayed to the foreign countries, should be furnished the Bureau.

Law enforcement officials will be interested to know that Ecuador, British Honduras, and Venezuela are now cooperating in the International Exchange of fingerprints, these three countries being additional to those listed as cooperating in the January, 1936, issue of the FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin.

FINGERPRINT CARDS ON FILE

On July 1, 1936, there was a total of 6,094,916 fingerprint cards on file in the Identification Division of the FBI. The number of fingerprint contributors on this date totaled 9,904.

THIRD SESSION NATIONAL POLICE ACADEMY OF THE FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

The third session of the FBI National Police Academy was called by the Director of the FBI and began on July 20, 1936. The course of instruction will extend for a period of twelve weeks. Representatives of thirty-four municipal, county and state law enforcement organizations will be in attendance.

The first session of the FBI National Police Academy was initiated on July 29, 1935. The program of training for this school was likewise for a period of twelve weeks and every member of the class, who entered on duty on the opening day, continued his studies throughout the session and was awarded a diploma certifying that he satisfactorily completed the course. These graduates returned to their respective departments, and information has been received that almost every member has received promotion within their own organizations.

The second session of the FBI National Police Academy opened on January 6, 1936, and concluded on March 28, 1936. In the short interim since the closing of the second school information has already been received that several members have received promotions and have been placed in charge of local police training.

Practically the entire membership of these two classes has been assigned to administrative and executive duties in the departments and organizations which they represented in order that they may be of assistance in instructing the other members of their departments along the lines of the training they had received in the FBI National Police Academy. An alumni association has been organized which will have a further advantage of continuing the friendly relationships that were established during these courses of training. This organization will undoubtedly serve the purpose of establishing a more harmonious relationship and a greater degree of cooperation between the police departments.

The beneficial results of the first and second sessions of the FBI National Police Academy have fully justified the continuation of such training schools for law enforcement officials. The invitations to attend the school are extended not to individual officers but to law enforcement organizations which are requested to select representatives who have broad, general qualifications and experience in police work and who will be able to receive the training and then organize a training school in their own departments or assist in instruction work if such a school has already been established.

The entire staff of the training schools operated for Special Agents of the FBI will be available and will actively participate in the instruction given during the sessions of the National Police Academy. In addition to the lecturers and instruction afforded by the experts of this Bureau, the training is supplemented by instruction from leading authorities

in law enforcement problems who are connected with universities, as well as by instruction and practical training given by outstanding police officials. The course will stress not only the administrative features of police work but will afford an opportunity for practical training in the performance of enforcement and regulatory duties, together with the discussion and consideration of every-day police work and problems. The scope of the training will include the following general types of instruction: Scientific and Technical Usages; Statistics, Records and Report Writing; Firearms Training and First Aid; Investigations, Enforcement and Regulatory Procedure; Tests and Practical Experience; and Administration and Organization. A special course of instruction will be provided in the organization of training schools and the methods of instructing law enforcement officials.

There is no cost to the officers attending this school for the instruction, the equipment or the facilities used in connection with this training. It is necessary, of course, for the officers attending this school to pay their own transportation as well as their living expenses while in Washington. However, it is believed that in most instances these expenses will be paid by the organizations represented.

The Scientific, Technical Laboratory, Fingerprint Identification, Statistical, Investigative and Training School facilities and equipment of the Federal Bureau of Investigation will be available and utilized throughout the course.

Based upon applications which have been filed with the FBI during the past several months, representatives of the following law enforcement organizations will constitute the membership of the third session of the FBI National Police Academy:

In the issue of this bulletin for June 1, 1936, there appeared an announcement calling attention to the fact that in the form for reporting the number of persons held for prosecution (return C) during the calendar year, 1936, prevision will be made for showing, in addition, the number of persons found guilty of the offense charged and the number found guilty of a lesser offense. In order to illustrate the nature of the data which will be desired at the end of the year, a specimen report is published on the succeeding page.

It will be noted that in column 3 of the report there should be listed the total number of persons held for prosecution for offenses committed in the jurisdiction of the reporting agency during the calendar year, 1936. In columns 6 and 7 there should be listed the number of persons found guilty of offenses committed within the jurisdiction of the reporting agency. The data for columns 6 and 7 should include all persons found guilty during the calendar year, 1936, even though some of the charges may have been preferred in previous years.

Complete instructions concerning the compilation of data for columns 2 to 5 of the report may be found in "A Handbook Containing Suggestions for the Preparation of Uniform Reports." Individuals desiring additional information concerning the compilation of the type of information illustrated on the succeeding page may obtain the same by addressing a communication to John Edgar Hoover, Director, Federal Bureau of Investigation, U. S. Department of Justice, Washington, D. C.



A QUESTIONABLE PATTERN

There is reproduced in this month's FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin a questionable pattern of the same general type as the pattern reproduced in last month's issue. Here again the question involved is merely the extent or the distance that should be traced to determine whether the pattern is an inner, meeting or outer whorl. The same rule is followed as in the case discussed last month. The rule is again repeated:

"The ridge emanating from the lower side or point of the left delta is traced toward the right delta until the point opposite or nearest the right delta is reached. The number of ridges between this point and the right delta is then counted."



In following the above rule, the ridge in question has been traced from the point represented by the letters "LD", indicating the left delta, to the point represented by the letters "RD", indicating the right delta. It is observed that the situation which was encountered in the pattern reproduced last month does not appear in the pattern reproduced herein. It was stated that the ridge should be traced upon the upward thrust, which is usually present, until a point on this ridge proceeding upward is attained, which point is opposite or nearest to the right delta. However, the upward thrust does not appear in this month's pattern which is a rare type of pattern. The absence of the upward thrust, no doubt, may be attributed to the fact that the left delta formation is of an unusual character represented by a series of bifurcations extending toward the core. Ordinarily, the upward thrust is present in the twinned loop formations. In this particular pattern the tracing is continued through to the right delta resulting in the attainment of a meeting whorl. The suggestion is made, however, that prints of this same general structure ordinarily should be referenced because sometimes the upward thrust may appear to be present because the impression on the card may be slightly off a horizontal plane.

SPECIAL ANNOUNCEMENT -- FUGITIVES

The attention of all contributors of fingerprints to the Identification Division of the Federal Bureau of Investigation is again invited to the desirability of transmitting immediately to the Bureau, information concerning the fugitive status of any person whose apprehension is desired by a local authority for any type of offense, for escape or for a violation of any form of clemency such as parole, probation or the terms of a suspended sentence.

It is the feeling of the Federal Bureau of Investigation that the identification of fugitives through the medium of wanted notices placed in the fingerprint files represents one of its most effectual services. However, instances have been noted wherein fugitives have been released because of the fact that law enforcement agencies have not notified the Bureau of their fugitive status. It is suggested that liberal use be made of this facility. It is noted in this connection, that the Bureau furnishes wanted notice forms upon request to agencies desiring to place these notices in the Bureau's fingerprint files. These forms contain the necessary information to insure the identification of the record upon which the fugitive information is to be entered. It is hoped that through the more liberal utilization of this service the Bureau will be in a position to afford more effective results to law enforcement organizations generally.

JOE C. NUNN ARRESTED ON DRUNK CHARGE IDENTIFIED AS A FUGITIVE

A number of instances are brought to the attention of the Federal Bureau of Investigation where felons wanted for serious offenses become intoxicated, are arrested, and are identified as wanted persons when their fingerprints are searched through the files of the Identification Division of the Bureau.

Joe C. Nunn, negro, was received by the State Convict Department, Montgomery, Alabama, on April 5, 1912, to serve a sentence of 35 years for the crime of second egree murder. The Federal Bureau of Investigation received a wanted circular on May 12, 1934, from the State Convict Department, Montgomery, Alabama, setting forth information that Nunn, in addition to the foregoing sentence, was sentenced on September 25, 1930, from Bibb County, to serve a term of from 4 to $4\frac{1}{2}$ years for the crime of grand larceny but had escaped from outside of Kilby Prison walls on April 2, 1934. The usual wanted notation was posted on the fingerprint card of Nunn.

Among the fingerprints received from the State Prison, Raleigh, North Carolina, on April 27, 1936, were those of one Ed Johnson who had been registered at Prison Camp #314, Darling, North Carolina, to serve a sentence of one month on a charge of drunkenness. The fingerprints of Johnson, when searched through the files of the Identification Division, were found to be identical with those of Nunn and the Superintendent of the State Convict Department at Montgomery, Alabama, was immediately notified by telegram on April 29, 1936, of Nunn's incarceration at Darling, North Carolina.

ANNOUNCEMENT -- APPREHENSION ORDERS

The FBI has under consideration at the present time a suggested revision in the form to be utilized in the submission of Apprehension Orders, in cancellation of Identification Orders issued by the FBI. The suggested form contemplates the inclusion upon a single 8 x 8 card of two or more cancellation notices, each one pertaining, of course, to some previous FBI Identification Order. The adoption of this form is being withheld to permit police departments to advise the Bureau whether the use of such a cancellation system will in any manner be less satisfactory than the present form, in which each Identification Order is cancelled by a separate Apprehension Order prepared upon an 8 x 8 card. If the contemplated new form of Apprehension Order would in any manner be disadvantageous to your police department, it is requested that you notify the Director of the FBI immediately, in order that due consideration may be given to any problems arising from the use of the new form.

JAMES WATSON, A SAFE BLOWER, IDENTIFIED BY FINGERPRINTS

On June 19, 1936, the fingerprints of John Foi, or Foy, were received in the Identification Division of the Bureau from the Indiana State Police, Ligonier, Indiana. It was noted that the right index finger impression was missing from his fingerprint card. Accompanying these fingerprints was a letter explaining the circumstances surrounding the arrest of this subject, which circumstances are as follows:


At about 7:00 A. M. on June 17, 1936, members of the Kendall-ville Lumber and Supply Company, Kendallville, Indiana, discovered that there had been an attempt to blow their office safe by the use of nitroglycerin and there was blood on the office floor indicating that some member of the gang had been injured during the attempt. About 7:30 A.M. Foy was found lying nearby, adjacent to a railroad, in a serious condition due to a broken and shattered right leg. When questioned in regard to his injury he stated that the accident and injury had resulted while riding a freight train. During the course of medical treatment two pieces of steel were removed from the wound.

The attending surgeon being interested as to the exact cause of the injury, delivered the portions of steel removed from the subject's leg to the investigating officers who in turn matched these portions of steel up with other parts of the safe combination which had been blown from the safe during the attempted burglary.

The letter further indicated that this subject's index finger was shattered during the explosion and it was, consequently, impossible to obtain the finger impression of same. Despite the fact that the fingerprints of this subject were incomplete they were searched through the files of the Identification Division and found to be identical with those of one James Watson, with aliases, who had a criminal record dating back to 1917.

He was first received at the State Farm, Greencastle, Indiana, on March 27, 1917, as James Watson, to serve a term of 140 days for the offense of intoxication. He was next arrested as George Morgan on September 7, 1927, by the Police Department at Bay City, Michigan, on a charge of possessing burglar's tools, and on October 28, 1927, he was received at the State Penitentiary, Jackson, Michigan, to serve a sentence of from 5 to 10 years for this offense. Again on November 18, 1933, he was arrested as George Morgan, by the Police Department at Delphos, Ohio, for investigation. The foregoing criminal record was transmitted to the Indiana State Police at Ligonier, Indiana, by air mail.
