

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The Federal Bureau of Investigation, U. S. Department of Justice, is charged with the duty of investigating violations of the laws of the United States and collecting evidence in cases in which the United States is or may be a party in interest.

The following list indicates some of the major violations over which the Bureau has investigative jurisdiction:-

National Motor Vehicle Theft Act

Interstate transportation of stolen property valued at \$5,000 or more National Bankruptcy Act

Interstate flight to avoid prosecution or testifying in certain cases White Slave Traffic Act

Impersonation of Government Officials

Larceny of Goods in Interstate Commerce

Killing or Assaulting Federal Officer

Cases involving transportation in interstate or foreign commerce of any persons who have been kidnaped

Extortion cases in which interstate commerce or interstate communication is an element

Theft, Embezzlement or Illegal Possession of Government Property Antitrust Laws

Robbery of National Banks and Member Banks of Federal Reserve System National Bank and Federal Reserve Act Violations, such as embezzlement, abstraction or misapplication of funds

Crimes on any kind of Government reservation, including Indian Reserva-

tions or in any Government building or other Government property Neutrality violations, including the shipment of arms to friendly nations Frauds against the Government

Crimes in connection with Federal Penal and Correctional Institutions

Perjury, embezzlement. or bribery in connection with Federal Statutes or officials

Crimes on the high seas

Federal Anti-Racketeering Statute

The location of persons who are fugitives from justice by reason of violations of the Federal Laws over which the Bureau has jurisdiction, of escaped Federal prisoners, and parole and probation violators.

The Bureau does not have investigative jurisdiction over the violations of Counterfeiting, Narcotic, Customs, Immigration, or Postal Laws.

Law enforcement officials possessing information concerning violations over which the Bureau has investigative jurisdiction are requested to promptly forward the same to the Special Agent in Charge of the nearest field office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, U. S. Department of Justice. The address of each field office of this Bureau appears on the inside back cover of this bulletin. Government Rate Collect telegrams or telephone calls will be accepted if information indicates that immediate action is necessary.

#### METHOD OF PHOTOGRAPHING WATERMARKS

Quite frequently in connection with cases in which documentary evidence is involved, it becomes desirable to record in photographic form a watermark or other characteristic formation appearing in the material of which the document is made. While the usual photographic process is generally satisfactory for recording such watermarks, it requires lighting and photographic equipment which is not always available to many of the smaller law enforcement agencies. This is particularly true if the watermark in question is relatively large, thereby requiring a large photographic plate for a natural size negative.

The Technical Laboratory of the Federal Bureau of Investigation often utilizes a method of making photographic reproductions of watermarks without the use of a camera or complicated lighting set-ups. By this method the paper bearing the watermark is used directly as an ordinary photographic negative, and contact prints are made therefrom by means of a standard mechanical printing table. That is, the paper bearing the watermark is first placed upon the ground glass of the printer and then covered with a photographic paper; the printing light is then flashed for an appropriate exposure and the resulting contact print developed in the usual manner. The exact printing time will, of course, be dependent upon the printer used and the grade of paper in which the watermark appears. Very little experimenting is needed to produce excellent results.

This method records not only any watermark which may be in the paper, but also the "grain" or "weave" as well, and inasmuch as the copy is a contact print, the reproduction will be natural size with a degree of accuracy sufficient for most practical purposes. Moreover, the size of the print which may be obtained is dependent only upon the size of printing paper available and the dimensions of the printing table.

Obviously, the contact print so obtained will be a "negative"; i. e., the more transparent watermark in the paper will appear on the print as a dark figure against a lighter background. However, if this type of print should prove undesirable for some particular case, it is possible to substitute a photographic film above the watermarked paper on the printing table, thereby making a photographic "negative" from which any number of "positive" contact prints may be made.

Both of the above procedures have been found in actual practice to give results equally satisfactory, and in some instances superior, to those obtained by the usual photographic process.

#### THREE UNIDENTIFIED DEAD THEIR POSSIBLE IDENTIFICATION THROUGH DENTAL WORK

Information concerning the following case which is published for the information of all law enforcement officers with a view to soliciting their assistance in the identification of the three deceased persons whose skulls, punctured by bullet holes, were found partially buried at Middlebury, Vermont, in May of 1935, has been referred to the Bureau by Captain James T. Sheehan of the Bureau of Records of the Boston Folice Department, by State's Attorney John J. Conley, of Middlebury, Vermont, and by Mr. Almo B. Franzoni, State Investigator, of the Attorney General's office at Montpelier, Vermont.

It is thought that this case possesses such unusual interest that intensive efforts should be made, particularly by members of the dental profession and by reference to dental societies, to endeavor to identify these persons. It is suggested that any information obtained be referred not only to this Bureau but to Captain James T. Sheehan of the Bureau of Records, Police Department, 154 Berkeley Street, Boston, Massachusetts. The cooperation of all law enforcement agencies in this endeavor is solicited and will be greatly appreciated.

Early in May, 1935, a traveller, passing through a secluded wooded section of Middlebury, Vermont, saw protruding from the surface of the earth, a white, bony substance which excited his attention. He proceeded to excavate, and before long, had unearthed, the skeletons of three human beings. An examination of the skulls disclosed that a bullet had entered one side of the cranium and left through the other in each of the skulls.

The State's Attorney of the District brought the skulls to Boston for assistance in the investigation, particularly with reference to the dental work in the skulls. As will be noted from the photographs, the skulls contain teeth upon which very scientific and skillful orthodontic work had been performed. They were examined by one of the leading dentists in Boston who prepared a detailed description of the work performed. A copy of that description is set out herein for assistance in the solution of the problem. The enlarged photographs of the teeth, with all orthodontic appliances intact, were published in dentistry journals, were exhibited before conventions of dentists, given close inspection by hundreds of dentists who specialize in that type of work throughout the country but none of the dental experts could identify the very distinctive work as their products.

There were no other clues to work on except a portion of awning which proved of no value because it was so common it might have been sold to practically anyone.

The dentists and doctors who examined the teeth and skulls expressed an opinion that the skulls and skeletons might be of persons of the following descriptions:

1. An adult lady, 40 to 43 years, 5 feet 4 inches, 125 pounds, medium complexion, had protruding teeth, of neurotic type.

2. Boy: 13 years, 5 feet, 90 pounds, thin, light complexion, had bands in his teeth about five years, of neurotic type.

3. Girl: 11 years, 4 feet 7 inches, 75 pounds, light complexion, also of neurotic type.

The opinions of the experts varied as to how long the skulls had lain there, but two maggots were found in the cranium of one skull.

The older child, the one with orthodontic appliances in place is between twelve and fourteen years of age--probably around thirteen. Condition of teeth found to be excellent. They are of exceptionally good quality showing no evidence of caries. The maxillary arch form corresponds very nearly to the Hawley Chart 36. The six anterior teeth falling exactly on the line while the bicuspids and molars are about two millimeters to the lingual. Therefore, the maxillary arch might be considered about normal for this type of child who was probably of slender stature. The second molars were on the point of erupting, but the left second molar shows evidence of some delay. Wisdom teeth were in the process of development. Maxillary central incisors measure 36/100 inch in diameter. Child was being treated for bilateral distoclusion with a slight narrowing of the mandibular arch. Mandibular incisors were somewhat protruded. The mandibular right second molar had erupted to the point where the mesial cusps had just penetrated the overlying tissue. The mandibular left second molar had erupted somewhat further than the right.


The mandibular bicuspids and molars were not in need of rotation, as is very frequently found in.young children of that age. They have well developed cusps with deep sulci.

The incisal edge of the maxillary left central incisor has a slight chip broken off involving the lingual plate. The orthodontist who adjusted the appliances to this child was a man who used careful technic.

The appliance which is adjusted to the maxillary arch is known as the Angle Ribbon Arch and is manufactured by the S. S. White Dental Manufacturing Company. It is attached to molar bands cemented on the first molars to which are soldered curved linear tubes. The nuts anterior to these tubes are sheath variety. The four bands which are cemented to the four maxillary incisors are fitted around the middle third of the incisors. The orthodontist who adjusted these bands had placed a solder reinforcement on the lingual surface of the right lateral and central bands. The left central and lateral bands were not quite so well adjusted on the lingual aspect. The molar bands were made of gold band material probably of the platinum alloy with soldered seams on the lingual surfaces. They have the appearance of having been made by what is known as the indirect method. There are a few marks which would indicate that the bands were brought to place by the use of small band drivers. The photographs set out on the following pages demonstrate the careful technic of this operator from the fact that the intermaxillary elastic hooks which are placed opposite the mesial third of the maxillary canine have been carefully balled on the ends. Also this operator has the habit when pinning his appliance in place of

turning the ends of the pins toward the median line--that is the pins on the right central and lateral incisors turn to the left while the pins on the left lateral and central incisors turn to the right. There are no lingual extensions soldered either anterior or posterior to the maxillary molar bands.

On the mandibular or lower arch is a lingual wire made of 19 gauge gold wire. The lingual wire is attached to gold bands cemented to the mandibular first molars. On the lingual surfaces of the mandibular first molars are soldered between the mesial lingual cusp and the distal lingual cusp half round tubes. The lingual wire is held in place by a half round shaft soldered to the lingual wire which fits exactly the half round tubes. The lingual wire has no loops anterior to the first molars.



Front view of Boy's Skull showing Gold Bands on teeth, (uppers). Also shows portion of inner-band on lowers.


Three Human skulls found early in May, 1935, partially buried in Middlebury, Vermont, each punctured by bullet holes.

This fact narrows down the investigation by excluding all those who use the lingual wire loop in their technic. The spring locks which are designed to hold this lingual wire in place are soldered to the distal end of the lingual wire about one millimeter and one half posterior to the tube and are of a smaller gauge (.028). There are intermaxillary hooks soldered to the buccal surfaces of the mandibular molar bands. The one on the right soldered nearer to the occlusal surface than the one on the left. These hooks are also balled on the distal end. The bands had probably been in place for some time as they show wear. They were cemented in place by brown oxyphosphate cement. There are several manufacturers who make this cement. Ames cement is quite generally used.

This child probably experienced difficulty in wearing his intermaxillary elastics because of the fact that when the teeth are in occlusion the maxillary molar particularly the right impinged so closely upon the right mandibular intermaxillary hook that it must have broken the elastic frequently.

The salient points which should help in identification are:

First the method used by this operator in bending the maxillary arch wire pins toward the median line. This man being meticulous in his technic probably always followed this method when using this type of appliance.

The slight chip which is broken from the maxillary left central incisor would probably show in any plaster model that had been taken prior to his orthodontic work.

This operator was in the habit of using a small amount of solder in making the attachment of the curved linear tubes to the buccal surfaces of the upper first molars. He used brown cement in setting his bands. He used gold lingual wire without loops anterior to the first molars. At one time during the treatment it appears that he may have used small spurs just anterior to the mandibular first premolars.

His lingual wire lock is of the square type, not rounded on the posterior end. The fact that he uses a smaller gauge wire for the spring in the lock would indicate that his technic in adjusting the appliance after its removal for treatment was not to use this lock as a spring lock but to force it into place by pressure with an instrument. This observation is only a possibility.

The tragedy may not have happened as long ago as is supposed since maggots still appeared in the cranium of one skull.

Undoubtedly the identification of these bodies will depend largely upon the ability to identify the dental work performed on the body of the thirteen-year-old boy. Orthodontists who may be eliminated from studying their lists are those who make use of removable appliances in the treatment of this type of case and those who employ loops anterior to the first molars in their lingual arches.

#### FINGERPRINT IDENTIFICATION SCHOOLS OF INSTRUCTION

Pursuant to the expressed requests of many local and state law enforcement agencies that their personnel be given an opportunity to acquire a knowledge of taking and classifying fingerprints, as well as the latent fingerprint technique, the Federal Bureau of Investigation recently has given consideration to conducting identification schools throughout the country, and on January 14, 15, and 16, 1936, such a school of instruction was conducted by the Bureau at its Dallas, Texas office in collaboration with officials of the Dallas Police Department.

In addition to the instructions and practical work in the taking and classifying of fingerprints, the recording of data concerning latent finger impressions found at the scene of a crime and the developing, lifting and photographing of latent impressions there were brought to the attention of the officers present those activities by which the Bureau gives cooperative assistance to law enforcement agencies through the medium of its Identification Division, the Technical Laboratory, the FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin, and the Crime Statistics project.

Fifty-three sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, chiefs of police, police officers, identification officers, highway patrolmen, constables, city marshals, and county attorneys from that portion of Texas in the Dallas office district, attended. The only expense incurred by these officers in attending consisted of their travel and subsistence cost. A photograph of those attending the school faces this page.

The response to this first school of instruction has been so favorable that the Bureau plans to inaugurate additional schools to be conducted in its various field offices throughout the country, each possibly for a five-day period. It is believed that this program will be of great help in acquainting local law enforcement officials with the Bureau's methods, how to establish and maintain local fingerprint files and how to obtain and preserve latent evidence found at the scene of a crime.

It is felt that through the adoption of the training school program indicated above there will be made possible an extension of the benefits derived by fingerprint contributors, to those who heretofore have been unable to participate because of the lack of facilities and training.

#### NOTICE

It has been suggested to the Bureau that the practice of answering fingerprints received from law enforcement agencies for filing in the Civil Identification Section be discontinued. Therefore, since it appears that such letters are of no value to law enforcement agencies, the personal identification fingerprint cards received in the Bureau will not be acknowledged in the future unless specifically requested by the contributor.

#### NATIONAL FIREARMS ACT

Among the comparatively recent Federal crime bills is included an Act cited as the "National Firearms Act." In his annual report to Congress dated January 4, 1936, Honorable Homer S. Cummings, Attorney General of the United States, made the following pertinent statement:

> "One of the pressing problems in connection with the enforcement of the criminal law arises out of the traffic in and possession of firearms by members of the criminal groups. In 1934 the Congress, through the exercise of its taxing power, placed machine guns, sawed-off shotguns, sawed-off rifles, and silencers under Federal registration and control. I strongly urge that this law be extended to include revolvers and pistols. The honest and law-abiding citizen is caused no greater hardship or burden by such a regulation than by the requirement that he register his automobile, while the system of registering pistols and revolvers will place a potent weapon against crime in the hands of law enforcement officers."

Although the Federal Bureau of Investigation does not have primary investigative jurisdiction over this Act, the numerous questions which have arisen among law enforcement officials as to its provisions make it advisable to acquaint them with the Act through the medium of the FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin.

The National Firearms Act, passed by the Seventy-Third Congress, and approved by the President on June 26, 1934, provides for the taxation of manufacturers, importers, and dealers in certain firearms and machine guns, and for the restriction of the importation and transportation of such weapons in interstate commerce. Since the measure is based upon the power of taxation the investigative jurisdiction over its violation rests with the U. S. Treasury Department, and accordingly complaints relative to violations of this Act should be referred to the Bureau of Internal Revenue of that Department.

As indicated by the Attorney General's statement, under the provisions of the Act the term "firearm" means a shotgun or rifle having a barrel of less than eighteen inches in length, a machine gun, or any other type of gun, except a pistol or a revolver, if it can be concealed on the person. The term also includes a muffler or silencer for any type of firearm whatsoever. Under the Act, a machine gun includes any weapon designed to shoot automatically or semi-automatically, more than one shot, without manual reloading, by a single function of the trigger.

The Act provides that upon first engaging in the business, and thereafter cn or before July 1 of each year, every importer, manufacturer and dealer in firearms shall register, with the Collector of Internal Revenue for each district in which such business is to be carried on, his name or style of doing business, principal place of business, and places of business in such district, and pay a special tax at the following rates: importers or manufacturers, \$500.00 a year; dealers, other than pawnbrokers, \$200.00 a year; pawnbrokers, \$300.00 a year.

In addition to any import duty imposed the Act further provides that a \$200.00 tax must be paid by the transferor on each firearm transferred in the continental United States. This tax must be represented by tax stamps provided by the Commissioner of Internal Revenue which must be affixed to the order for the firearm. The same section of the Act provides that this tax does not have to be paid on a transfer of a firearm constituting an exportation from the United States.

Under this Act it is unlawful for any person to transfer a firearm except in pursuance of a written order from the person seeking the weapon, which order must be filled out in duplicate on an application blank furnished by the Commissioner of Internal Revenue. This order blank is so designed as to make it possible to subsequently identify the one obtaining the firearm. If an individual person rather than a business firm is involved in the deal the identification must include fingerprints and a photograph of the individual. The person transferring the firearm must set forth in each copy of the written order the manufacturer's number or other mark identifying the firearm. He must also forward the duplicate copy of the order to the Commissioner of Internal Revenue, while the original, with the stamps representing the \$200.00 transfer tax attached, is returned to the person obtaining the firearm.

In addition to the registration required of the manufacturers, importers and dealers, the Act contains a provision requiring that within three months after its enactment every person possessing a firearm must have registered, with the Collector of Internal Revenue in the district of his residence, the number or other identifying mark of such firearm, together with his name, address, place where such firearm is usually kept, and place of business or employment. If the owner of a firearm is a corporation, the name and home address of an executive officer of the corporation must also have been registered.

It is unlawful by the terms of the Act for any person to receive or possess any firearm which has been transferred in violation of the Act at any time. Any firearm so transferred is subject to seizure and forfeiture under existing Internal Revenue Laws.

To facilitate the enforcement of its other sections the Act requires that each manufacturer and importer of a firearm shall identify it with a number or other mark stamped or otherwise placed thereon in a manner approved by the Commissioner of Internal Revenue. It is made unlawful for anyone to obliterate, remove, change or alter this identifying number or mark. Possession of a firearm altered in such a manner is made prima-facie evidence of guilt and is sufficient for a conviction unless properly explained, upon trial, to the jury.

Importation of firearms is prohibited unless the purpose thereof is shown to be lawful and such firearms are unique or of a type not obtainable within the United States. It is made unlawful to fraudulently or knowingly import a firearm into the United States in violation of this Act; or to knowingly assist in so doing; or to receive, conceal, buy or sell, or in any way aid in the transportation, concealment, or sale of any such firearm knowing it to have been imported contrary to law. In this instance possession of such a firearm is again made prima-facie evidence of guilt.

It is also made unlawful by the terms of the statute for any person to ship, carry or deliver any firearm in interstate commerce who has not complied with the other requirements of this Act.

The National Firearms Act specifically exempts from its provisions the transfer of firearms to the United States Government, any State, territory, or possession of the United States, or to any political subdivision thereof, or to the District of Columbia; or to any peace officer or Federal officer designated by regulations of the Commissioner of Internal Revenue. It also exempts the transfer of any firearm which is unserviceable and which is transferred as a curiosity or ornament.

Any person who violates or fails to comply with the requirements of the Act is subject to a fine of not more than \$2,000.00 or imprisonment for not more than five years, or both.

As pointed out above, in view of the fact that the Federal Bureau of Investigation does not have investigative jurisdiction of the National Firearms Act, violations thereof should be promptly reported by law enforcement officers to the Bureau of Internal Revenue office covering their respective localities.

#### SPECIAL ANNOUNCEMENT REGARDING MUTILATED FINGERPRINTS

Advice has been received in the FBI during the last several months to the effect that certain individuals have endeavored to mutilate their fingerprints or to have them so mutilated that they could defeat identification. None of the individuals engaged in this effort has been successful.

Merely as a safeguard in connection with the future handling of these cases, the FBI would like to suggest that whenever an individual is arrested and fingerprinted, and it is noted that apparently his fingers have been mutilated, his fingerprints be dispatched to the Bureau immediately by air mail or special delivery or both, if necessary, so prompt attention be given to checking the Bureau's files before the said individual is released.

It is felt that the average person who endeavors to mutilate his fingerprints has rather urgent reasons to do so. Since during the mutilating process he brands himself further as a criminal and may be wanted for the commission of a crime elsewhere, it is felt that the special method of handling these records along the lines suggested should be employed by all law enforcement agencies.

#### REPORT BY B. M. A. COMMITTEE

The following article dealing with the problem of the relation of alcohol to road accidents has been taken from the report of the British Medical Association as it appeared in the British Medical Journal of July 27, 1935, and is published here to accuaint those interested upon the subject of alcohol and its relation to intoxication and road accidents. The Federal Bureau of Investigation wishes to express its appreciation to the British Medical Journal in granting permission to reprint this article.

1. "The Minister of Transport, Mr. Hore-Belisha, stated in the House of Commons on January 30th, 1935, that he intended to invite the Association to say whether it could usefully make any observations on the place of alcohol in the causes of road accidents. The following letter was subsequently received by the British Medical Association from the Ministry of Transport:

'I am directed by the Minister of Transport to draw the attention of your Association to a question recently asked in the House of Commons and to his reply.

'Mr. Hore-Belisha would be grateful for any observations the British Medical Association may be able to make on the subject in the light of the existing knowledge and experience of the medical profession. The Minister has in mind, however, that if new investigations should at any stage be thought to be desirable by the Government, that would naturally be a matter for the Medical Research Council, and he is accordingly inviting the views of the Council on that aspect of the question.'

The Council of the Association approved the formation of a Special Committee to consider this matter.

2. The Committee has confined itself to an examination of the scientific evidence on the effect of the consumption of alcoholic liquor on the functioning of the human body. It has concentrated on the effects of amounts of alcohol insufficient to produce the state commonly recognized as drunkenness and smaller than those likely to lead to a person being certified as 'incapable of proper control of a vehicle.' This has been done, not because the Committee does not recognize the significant part played by alcohol in considerable amounts in the causation of road accidents, but because it believes it to be highly desirable in the public interest to draw attention to the effect of amounts of alcohol, commonly regarded as without deleterious effect, on the driving capacity of persons in charge of motor vehicles.

3. It is necessary to emphasize that this aspect of the problem has not received from scientific investigators the attention it merits, although such evidence as is available appears to the Committee to lead inevitably to certain conclusions. Nevertheless, in putting forward its conclusions, the Committee desires to point out that they are based on such evidence as is available and that the complete solution of an admittedly difficult problem must await a fuller and more extensive investigation of certain aspects of it.

4. The effect of the consumption of alcohol, either on the part of drivers of motor vehicles or on pedestrians, upon the liability to road accidents cannot be legitimately made the subject of direct experiment upon the public roads. In attempting to assess the relation of alcohol consumption to motor accidents, reliance must therefore be placed upon two types of indirect evidence: (a) statistics, especially from police courts, of accidents in which the question has been raised as to whether the driver involved has been 'under the influence of drink'; and (b) experiments made in other connexions to determine the effects of alcohol upon the nervous and neuro-muscular systems, in which the action of alcohol upon judgment, memory, reaction time, co-ordination of muscles, and other factors which may be involved in motor driving have been measured.

5. The report of the Ministry of Transport for 1933 indicates that, of the 3,297 'causes of fatal road accidents' attributed to drivers twenty-nine are included under the heading 'under the influence of drink or drugs,' whilst of the 3,607 'causes of road accidents' attributed to pedestrians forty-six were included under this heading--that is, 'drink or drugs' was the causative factor in about one in 100 cases. This takes no cognizance of those persons who may have been under the influence of alcohol to an extent insufficient to attract notice.

6. These figures, which are derived from police reports, are based upon personal impressions. More exact investigations, based upon determination of the alcohol content of the blood and/or urine of each person involved in a series of accidents, were recently conducted in America, and these figures showed that in an analysis of 119 consecutive accidents seventy-four of the persons examined exhibited an alcohol content of more than 0.02 per cent. There are, however, no records showing the alcohol content of the blood of corresponding numbers of drivers not involved in road accidents.

7. In 1933 there were in Great Britain 1,595 convictions for driving under the influence of drink, and the driving licence was suspended in 1,046 cases. In 1934 2,016 drivers of motor vehicles were certified by an examining doctor to be under the influence of drink. It is beyond dispute that such cases are a potential source of accidents, and the number of actual convictions suggests that there are large numbers of people driving cars when more or less under the influence of alcohol.

8. Available statistics, therefore, though of a very limited nature, show that alcoholic intoxication of a degree that renders a person 'incapable of proper control of a vehicle' does play at least a significant part in the causation of motor accidents. Where opinions may differ is in regard to the effect of amounts of alcohol smaller than those which would lead to a person being certified as 'incapable of proper control of the vehicle.' If the consumption of such smaller amounts of alcohol may render a person a less careful and skilful driver, when the percentage of fatalities attributable to alcohol would be higher (and perhaps much higher) than is indicated in these statistics. Public opinion and legal enactments agree in recognizing and condemning intoxication in connexion with motor driving, and we do not consider it necessary further to emphasize this aspect. We wish to submit evidence in regard to the effect of subintoxicant amounts of alcohol--that is, amounts less than that customarily regarded as rendering a person 'under the influence of drink to such an extent as to be incapable of having proper control of the vehicle.'

#### EFFECT OF ALCOHOL ON MENTAL PROCESSES

9. It is almost universally agreed among all those who have studied the subject that the first effect of alcohol, and the effect of the smallest doses, is upon the higher functions of the brain. We know of no better guide than the Alcohol Committee of the Medical Research Council, which came to the conclusion that 'the direct effect of alcohol upon the nervous system is, in all stages and upon all parts of the system, to depress or suspend its functions: that it is, in short, from first to last a narcotic drug.' The earliest suspension of functions leads to an impairment of the faculties of judgment, concentration, self-criticism, and the power of estimating risk. This is often accompanied by a sense of well-being and of self-satisfaction. The early action of alcohol can hardly be measured by the crude tests which determine whether a driver is 'under the influence of drink to such an extent as to be incapable of having proper control of the vehicle.' Nevertheless the effect of alcohol leads many persons to take risks and to make rapid decisions less judiciously than they would otherwise do. To what extent this action of small amounts of alcohol may in the aggregate be responsible for motor accidents there is no means of estimating. It is, however, a serious objection to the consumption of alcohol, even in small amounts, by anyone who is to drive a car.

10. Some of the effects mentioned have been demonstrated by various psychological tests. For instance, six men were tested for their ability to learn a code and write it rapidly, and it was found that two hours after drinking alcohol equivalent to  $3\frac{1}{2}$  ounces of whisky their capacity to learn was reduced by 10 per cent on an average.(1)

11. The effect of alcohol on powers of concentration is suggested by the tests made with an instrument in which the needle of an indicator in an electric circuit was kept almost continuously in motion by means of a disturber element.(2) The subject was asked to watch the indicator and keep it adjusted as nearly as possible to zero by means of a simple rheostat control. Eight men were tested at intervals of  $\frac{1}{2}$ , 1,  $1\frac{1}{2}$ , and 2 hours after taking a dose of alcohol corresponding to 3 ounces of whisky, and it was found that on an average their skill was diminished 8, 15, 20, and 15 per cent at the respective time intervals mentioned. Seven of the subjects showed a definite decrement in their promptness of attention and control, but the remaining subject, an occasional heavy drinker, showed an improvement of 6 per cent.

12. The effect of alcohol on reasoning powers is shown by the tests made on the intelligence quotient of a group of fifty persons.

(3). It appeared that a dose of alcohol equivalent to  $2\frac{1}{4}$  ounces of whisky lowered the quotient and diminished the power of recalling past experience. In tests made by another investigator (1) a list of fifty adjectives was read out, one at a time, and the subject was required to give another adjective with the opposite meaning. A dose of alcohol equivalent to  $3\frac{1}{2}$  ounces of whisky caused a decrease of 15 per cent in efficiency.

13. A number of investigators have noted that though their subjects performed the various tests less efficiently than usual after taking alcohol, they were convinced that they had been doing them better, and were surprised when they found that their records proved the contrary.

#### THE EFFECTS OF ALCOHOL ON NEURO-MUSCULAR CO-ORDINATION

14. The driving of a motor car involves a succession of highly skilled muscular movements, which are dependent on rapid and accurate coordination between the eyes, hands, and feet. The eyes are constantly mo ing in response tc changing visual impressions, and it is found that the speed with which the gaze is directed to fresh objects is measurably impaired by the drinking of alcohol (4). Two American investigators made a number of tests on six men, and they found that an hour and a half after they had taken diluted alcohol equivalent to 4 ounces of whisky they showed an average delay of 15 per cent in their speed of movement. Another investigator found that the equivalent of  $2\frac{1}{2}$  ounces of whisky decreased the speed 13 per cent, and that some adverse effect persisted for three and a quarter hours after the alcohol was taken. A third investigator tested the ability of the eyes to follow clearly an object brought nearer and nearer to the persons observing it, and he found that a dose corresponding to 31 oun as of whisky very distinctly weakened and slowed the movements of the eyes, though half this dose had no effect. At no stage in any of the tests were the eyeball movements strengthened or rendered quicker.

15. The effect of alcohol on the speed and accuracy of hand movements has been investigated in a number of ways. For instance eight men and five women were tested for their skill at typewriting, (5) and it was found that moderate quantities of alcoholic liquor--corresponding to 2 to 3 ounces of whisky--produced some effect in all the individuals, the magnitude of the effect depending a good deal on whether the alcohol was taken with food or on an empty stomach--that is, three hours or more after food. The average effect in the latter instance was about twice as great as in the former, and typing mistakes were usually doubled or trebled in number, whilst typing speed was diminished. Tests made by another investigator (2) on five male typists showed that after a dose of alcohol corresponding to  $2\frac{1}{4}$ ounces of whisky their errors were increased 40 per cent for the next two hours, and after twice this quantity of alcohol they were increased 70 per cent.

16. Typing tests involve a certain amount of co-ordination between hand and eye, but a better instance of such co-ordination is afforded by shooting tests. For instance, tests were made in Bavaria, (6) for a period of sixteen days on twenty marksmen who fired at a target 220 yards away, and it was found that the drinking of alcohol corresponding to 4- ounces of whisky caused a diminution of 2.8 per cent in the average score of the tests made in the morning.

17. The effect of alcohol on the co-ordination of leg movements is illustrated by tests on walking and climbing. An investigator (7) took a regular walk up a slight incline followed by a steep ascent to the summit on a pass. The walk took fifty minutes on an average, whilst the subsequent climb tock 160 minutes. After a dose of alcohol corresponding to 2 2/3 ounces of whisky, which was taken with a cup of tea and a scrap of bread, the walk on an average took sixty minutes and the climb 185 minutes. Moreover, 9 per cent more bodily energy was expended over the work, and the investigator attributed this result to the diminished skill with which he directed his movements.

#### ALCOHOL IN THE BLOOD

18. When an alcoholic liquid is drunk there is a fairly rapid absorption of alcohol from the alimentary canal, and in consequence the concentration of alcohol in the blood increases gradually to a maximum, followed by a slower fall. In a series of tests made on nine subjects (2) the experimental dose administered contained the equivalent of 3 ounces of whisky, which was taken either as a 33 per cent solution or was diluted to  $l\frac{3}{4}$  pints. Analyses of blood samples taken at regular intervals gave the following approximate results:

19. It will be seen that in both series the concentration of the alcohol took seventy minutes to reach a maximum, though it was always substantially less for dilute alcohol than for concentrated alcohol. It follows that the elimination of alcohol from the body, which is effected chiefly by its oxidation, is a slow one, and it is most important that this fact should be thoroughly appreciated. In normal persons the body oxidizes alcohol at the rate of about 10 to 12 c.cm. per hour, or the equivalent of one ounce of whisky, and this rate is not increased when the concentration of alcohol in the blood is raised by the drinking of larger quantities of alcoholic liquor. Hence persons who have consumed what are usually considered to be quite moderate quantities of alcoholic drinks have substantial amounts of alcohol in their blood for several hours after, and it is only when this alcohol has fallen to a low percentage that the previously described effects on mental processes and on neuro-muscular co-ordination entirely disappear.

#### SUMMARY AND CONCLUSIONS

20. Alcohol in an amount less than is customarily regarded as sufficient to render a person 'under the influence of alcohol to such an extent as to be incapable of having proper control of the vehicle' has definite effects on the human body.

21. The effect of alcohol in a quantity corresponding to three ounces of whisky has been shown by psychological tests to diminish attention and control, to reduce capacity to learn, and to affect reasoning powers adversely. The subjects of such tests frequently believe--quite erroneously - that they have performed their tests more efficiently as a result of taking these amounts of alcohol.

22. It has been shown by investigation that the consumption of amounts corresponding to two to three ounces of whisky usually affects adversely the power of making movements dependent on rapid and accurate coordination. The ability of the eyes to follow clearly an object brought nearer and nearer to them, the speed and accuracy of hand movements, the hand and eye co-operation involved in typewriting, and the co-ordination of leg movements in walking and climbing have been the subjects of investigation. In such cases it has been shown that small amounts of alcohol usually diminish the rapidity and accuracy of neuro-muscular co-ordination.

23. The elimination of alcohol from the body is a slow process; the body oxidizes alcohol at the rate of about 10 to 12 c.cm. per hour, or the equivalent of one ounce of whisky per hour, and this rate is not increased when the concentration of alcohol in the blood is raised by the drinking of larger quantities of alcoholic liquor.

24. As alcohol in no greater quantity than that contained in three ounces of whisky has been found to affect appreciably the mental processes and neuro-muscular co-ordination of individuals, it must frequently affect the driving capacity of the driver who takes alcoholic liquor, even in such small amounts. After taking alcohol he may believe himself to be driving better, but, in fact, his body works less efficiently. This adverse effect generally occurs even if alcohol is taken in moderate quantities some hours before driving, and especially if taken in the absence of food."

#### SCIENTIFIC AIDS TO NORMAL SENSES

Much of the progress made in scientific crime detection by the law enforcement officer is due to the aid rendered by scientific instruments. Instruments that enable one to see things of evidentiary importance that are not perceivable to the naked eye; instruments that further enable the presentation of that evidence in court, even though it may not be easily presentable as evidence without the valuable adjunct of photography.

An illustration of the important role played by scientific instruments is well shown in the case of State versus Thorp, 171 Atlantic 633, in which the defendant was indicted for murder in the first degree. A trial by jury resulted in a verdict of guilty with capital punishment.

The state's evidence tended to prove that the defendant, on Sunday evening, February 5, 1933, killed Joseph Trudeau by striking him over the head with a blackjack. Trudeau was working in Hersey's bakery at the corner of Daniel and Penhallow streets in Portsmouth. Blood stains on the linoleum which covered the floors of the bakery indicated that the body had been dragged from the front door through the wrapping room, so called, to the oven room, where it was found. The defendant's shoes had rubber heels on which was stamped a trade-mark consisting of a shield and the word "Regent." There were also distinctive marks on the soles of the shoes. The footprints on the blocd-stained linoleum matched the soles and heels of these shoes.

The alleged motive was robbery. Trudeau had had money that afternoon, but neither his money nor his pocketbook was found on his person after his death, and the pockets of his trousers were turned inside out. The defendant had no money at 6 o'clock that night and begged his supper from a stranger. The crime was committed shortly before 7 o'clock. A half hour later the defendant entered the office of a motorbus line and purchased a ticket to Boston.

He arrived in Lynn, Massachusetts, at 12:30 that night and hired a room in a lodging house where he had previously roomed, paying the rent in advance. He made numerous purchases the next day, and when he was arrested, three days later, he had about \$13 in his possession. A blackjack, which he admitted owning, was found in his room. His shoes had been recently polished, but a chemical analysis revealed blood on one of the shoe strings. There were also blood spots on the cuffs and legs of his trousers.

Exceptions were taken to various orders and rulings of the court, to the admission and exclusion of evidence. The court in affirming the decision of the lower court stated: "The evidence shows, without contradiction, that the murder was committed in the perpetration of a robbery. \* \* \* The only defense was that the defendant was not present and was not participating in the crime."

"Photographs of the footprints on the linoleum were taken. The witness described the photographs as follows: 'Those were made with a light which produces an ultra-violet ray and increases the contrast in the blood and in the print itself, and then a special plate used to bring cut all the detail; some of it not visible to the naked eye only with that light.' The defendant excepted to the introduction of the photographs on the ground that the linoleum itself, which was an exhibit in the case, was the 'best evidence.' The process employed by the photographer furnished 'abnormal aid to the senses.' The court impliedly found the process to be a trustworthy one, and the photographs thus taken were therefore admissible."

Ultra-violet has many useful applications in connection with the examination of forensic evidence, the particular advantage, which is clearly shown in this case, being that it does not destroy or alter the article examined.

Substantiating its opinion that this type of evidence was admissible the court refers to Volume 2, Section 795, Wigmore on Evidence, Second Edition, wherein Mr. Wigmore states in substance that, "It is obvious that in using certain mechanical instruments based upon the science of physics, we obtain a representation of things not perceivable by the ordinary senses; for example, looking through a magnifying lens, we are presented with details which are invisible to the naked eye. Our impression is not received by the unaided senses, but depends for its verity upon the correctness of the intermediate instrument or process. It would seem plain, however, that the situation is the same as if our senses had been abnormally enlarged in scope or capacity, and that we may here also claim to have knowledge, in the ordinary sense, provided only that the instrument is known to be a trustworthy one. That trustworthiness may be based upon general experience as to the class of instrument in question, together with a knowledge of the mechanism of the particular instrument as one constructed according to the trustworthy type.

What is needed, then, in order to justify testimony based on such instruments, is merely preliminary professional testimony to the trustworthiness of the process or instrument in general (when not otherwise settled by judicial notice), and to the correctness of the particular instrument; such testimony being usually available from one and the same person. Any process or instrument, furnishing abnormal aid to the senses, may thus be employed as a source of testimonial knowledge.

It will be seen that, after all, the real question is one of the proper sources of a witness' knowledge and not of his mode of communicating it under the present principle; because if the source of knowledge be a proper one, the mode of communicating it is the usual one of words. \* \* \* The process or instrument of observation, then, being duly testified to as trustworthy, it follows that a photograph of its images would always be receivable like any other photograph.

On the principle above noted, any such process or instrument must be preliminarily found to be a trustworthy one, yet if the appropriate science or art has advanced to a certain degree of general recognition, this trustworthiness may be judicially noticed as too notorious to need evidence. The various processes that have been from time to time employed and sanctioned are chiefly processes aiding the sense of vision."

#### INDEX OF ARTICLES PUBLISHED IN THE BULLETIN

Several requests have been made that an index be published of the articles which have been published in preceding issues of the Fugitive Bulletin and FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin.

#### **ROBERT BENNEWITZ**

#### BANK ROBBER IDENTIFIED BY SINGLE FINGERPRINT PRINTED IN FBI LAW ENFORCEMENT BULLETIN

The value of the FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin in the apprehension of fugitives wanted by police departments and other law enforcement agencies is demonstrated by the case of one Robert Bennewitz. From information appearing in the American Bankers' Association Bulletin issue of December, 1934, a wanted notice was posted against the record of Bennewitz in the files of the Identification Division indicating that he was wanted for escaping jail at Greenville, Kentucky, following his conviction for bank robbery.

A wanted notice to the effect that Bennewitz was wanted by the authorities at Greenville, Kentucky, was carried in the FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin for February, 1935. On January 31, 1936, a letter was received by the Bureau from Inspector Charles C. Carmody, commanding the Identification Bureau of the Police Department at Detroit, Michigan, with which he inclosed a copy of an officer's report describing the manner whereby the identification of the fugitive Bennewitz was effected from a single fingerprint found in the FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin. The report indicated that a man giving the name of Robert Beck had been arrested on January 26, 1936, by officers of the Detroit Police Department. The fingerprints of the prisoner were immediately taken to the office of the Identification Bureau of that Department to be compared with the finger impressions contained in its files. A search indicated that Beck was identical with Robert Bennewitz, with aliases, the identification having been effected from the single fingerprint of this individual which had been published, together with the wanted notice concerning him, in the FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin.

When confronted with the fact that his identification had been established, Bennewitz admitted that he and two other individuals had held up the bank in Greenville, Kentucky. He further admitted that a farmer had been killed when he and his associates escaped from jail. The report of the officer indicated that Bennewitz was supposed to have been shot and killed and his body thrown into a river from which it had never been recovered.

The Bureau was informed by Inspector Carmody that several identifications of fugitives had been made by his Identification Bureau from the single fingerprints appearing in the FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin, and he states this proves "that this book is very valuable to Identification Bureaus."

#### ESCAPED CONVICT TRACED BY FINGERPRINTS

On July 23, 1932, information was received by the Federal Bureau of Investigation from the State Reformatory, Greencastle, Indiana, that one John Smith had escaped therefrom on July 21, 1932. In addition to the name John Smith the officials of that institution furnished other identifying data so that the employees of the Identification Division were able to identify his record as being that of one J. Crowley, with aliases, who was possessed of an extensive criminal record reflecting a total of seventeen arrests since 1920, on such charges as breaking and entering, grand 1. rceny, suspicion of house prowler, disorderly conduct, petty theft, disturbing the peace and cutting and wounding.

As Emmett Boland he had been received at the State Prison, Jackson, Michigan, in August, 1920, to serve a term of two and one-half to five years for breaking and entering. As the result of his arrest by the Sheriff at San Jose, California, under the name of John Ryan in October, 1929, he served a sentence of ninety days there. Then as John Smith, he was releived at the State Farm, Greencastle, Indiana, in May, 1932, to serve a term of thirty days on a charge of intoxication.

On October 18, 1935, a set of fingerprints was received from the Police Department at San Antonio, Texas, on one John Wharton, indicating that Wharton had been arrested by that Department on October 16, 1935, charged with theft under fifty dollars and had been transferred to the County. These fingerprints on John Wharton were found to be identical with those of J. Crowley, alias John Smith, whose apprehension was desired by the State Farm at Greencastle, Indiana. The information concerning this arrest was immediately transmitted to that institution, and on October 23, 1935, information was received from the authorities at Greencastle, Indiana, indicating that this subject would not be returned from Texas, but that he was wanted by them nevertheless and requested that they be notified in the event Crowley was again arrested.

Crowley succeeded in escaping from the police at San Antonio, Texas, on October 16, 1935, and information concerning this escape was received in the Bureau on November 1, 1935. A wanted notice was, of course, placed at once against his record in the files of the Identification Division. On January 27, 1936, a fingerprint card was received from the Police Department of New Orleans, Louisiana, which reflected the finger impres-Bions c? an individual who purported to be John Mullen. He had been arrested on January 24, 1936, on a charge of cutting and wounding. A search of these fingerprints through the files of the Identification Division revealed them to be identical with those of J. Crowley, with aliases, whose apprehension was desired by the State Farm at Greencastle, Indiana, as well as the Police Department of San Antonio, Texas. The police at San Antonio were immediately notified by wire that their fugitive had been arrested by the Police Department of New Orleans, Louisiana, under the name of John Mullen. The State Farm at Greencastle, Indiana, was also promptly notified concerning this arrest.
