The Federal Bureau of Investigation, United States Department of Justice, is charged with the duty of investigating violations of the laws of the United States and collecting evidence in cases in which the United States is or may be a party in interest.

The following list indicates some of the major violations over which the Bureau has investigative jurisdiction:-

National Motor Vehicle Theft Act

Interstate transportation of stolen property valued at \$5,000 or more National Bankruptcy Act

Interstate flight to avoid prosecution or testifying in certain cases White Slave Traffic Act

Impersonation of Government Officials

Larceny of Goods in Interstate Commerce

Killing or Assaulting Federal Officer

Cases involving transportation in interstate or foreign commerce of any persons who have been kidnaped

Extortion cases in which interstate commerce or interstate communication is an element

Theft, Embezzlement or Illegal Possession of Government Property Antitrust Laws

Robbery of National Banks and Member Banks of Federal Reserve System National Bank and Federal Reserve Act Violations, such as embezzlement, abstraction or misapplication of funds

Crimes on any kind of Government reservation, including Indian Reservations or in any Government building or other Government property
Neutrality violations, including the shipment of arms to friendly nations
Frauds against the Government

Crimes in connection with the Federal Penal and Correctional Institutions Perjury, embezzlement, or bribery in connection with Federal Statutes or officials

Crimes on the high seas

Federal Anti-Racketeering Statute

The location of persons who are fugitives from justice by reason of violations of the Federal Laws over which the Bureau has jurisdiction, of escaped Federal prisoners, and parole and probation violators.

The Bureau does not have investigative jurisdiction over the violations of Counterfeiting, Narcotic, Customs, Immigration, or Postal Laws.

Law enforcement officials possessing information concerning violations over which the Bureau has investigative jurisdiction are requested to promptly forward the same to the Special Agent in Charge of the nearest field division of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, United States Department of Justice. The address of each field division of this Bureau appears on the inside back cover of this bulletin. Government Rate Collect telegrams or telephone calls will be accepted if information indicates that immediate action is necessary.

The campaign against crime continues and progresses with a better cooperation and coordination of law enforcement agencies. There will never be an end to crime; it will last as long as the passions and basic instincts of human nature, but it is possible to further reduce criminal depredations to a great degree.

The problems of every community are necessarily different from those of others, but they all have a common problem, that of bringing closer together the officialdom and citizenry in a united front to suppress crime.

An enlightened public is beginning to realize more than ever before that honesty, integrity, ability, education, and courage are requisites of the successful peace officer, that these attributes are needed if he is to enforce the law with a wholesome conception of the citizens' rights. Yet many fail to recognize that police administration is a technical and professional calling requiring training in the various branches of police service, demanding a permanent tenure of office without replacements at every change of political power.

It, therefore, is not only important that we further organize our law enforcement agencies to combat crime, but that we apprize the law-abiding citizenry of the problems confronting police administrators.

The public must be educated in the technical complications of police work and a bond of understanding so necessary to effective law enforcement must be established and maintained if we are to reduce crime to a minimum.

NATIONAL STOLEN PROPERTY FILE

An interesting identification recently effected through the National Stolen Property File indicates clearly one of the many advantages that this file possesses to law enforcement agencies.

On September 16, 1934, six pistols were stolen from the National Guard Armory at Clinton, Tennessee, and as far as it could be determined all but two of these had been recovered. One of the two, a .45 calibre Coltautomatic pistol, Serial number 502216, had not as yet been found.

With the inauguration of the National Stolen Property File by this Bureau on April 1, 1936, a systematic check was made of all pending investigations being conducted by this Bureau and all unrecovered property sufficiently well described to enable indexing was searched against the records of the National Stolen Property File. As a result, a record of the above described gun was identified as the one having been used by John Daugherty, with aliases, during the robbery of the Fluvanna County Bank, Fort Union, Virginia, on September 23, 1935, this gun having been previously identified as the weapon which killed State Trooper W.R. Thompson of the Virginia State Police. Incidentally, Daugherty was convicted on a plea of guilty in the State Court at Palmyra, Virginia, and on November 20, 1935, sentenced to death with additional sentences of thirty and forty years.

It is apparent that many similar identifications can be anticipated by law enforcement agencies taking recourse to the facilities of this file wherein a record of ANY STOLEN ITEM CAPABLE OF DESCRIPTION WILL BE INDEXED. As indicated in the special announcement in the FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin dated April 1, 1936, particular care should be used to furnish serial numbers whenever possible or any other positive means by which the article can be later identified. Reports as to stolen property and requests for searches in this file may be submitted in the manner usually employed by the reporting agency.

As a matter of suggestion, the following information is considered essential in requesting a search and indexing firearms:

The type of firearm (revolver, pistol, rifle, shotgun, et cetera); serial numbers; make (name of manufacturer); calibre (gauge); monograms, initials, inscriptions, or other descriptive data; name of the complainant and his address; type of offense; date of offense; the police department (or reporting agency) report number; the name of the contributor (police department, sheriff's office, et cetera), city, state; remarks of any unusual circumstances which are believed material for recording.

THE POLICE IDEAL OF SERVICE By August Vollmer

The ideal of service implies serving mankind to the best of the donor's ability, in the consideration of which, thought must be given to the spirit inspiring this ideal. The spirit of service has been a motivating influence for the betterment of mankind. The development of the uses of electricity, the airplane, and scientific contributions too numerous to recount have been made possible because of this creative spirit of service. In the years that have gone, Galileo, Copernicus, Darwin, and other great idealists blazed new trails. Each contributed something to the total knowledge of the world of their period, and at the same time laid the solid foundation for modern and future science. This foundation ennobled living and made it richer. The possessor of an ideal is never content with inaction, but is impelled by an irresistible urge to act in accordance with that ideal.

Attendant to the ideal of service is courage---not physical courage, for never in the history of police departments have policemen ever been charged with exhibiting physical cowardice. Moral courage makes it possible for policemen to depart from old traditions in the face of professional ridicule and public scepticism to experiment with new ideas and inventions. The use of the Hollerith Tabulator, the lie detector, fingerprinting and similar scientific instruments or methods are evidence of moral fortitude on the part of some police official of the past. Policemen exhibit moral courage by standing for the right, even unto death if that is necessary.

An integral part of service is the spirit of tolerance. No country, institution, or person, has a monopoly on Truth, and recognition of this should command intelligent police officers to respect the other man's point of view. The policeman who, in his own opinion, is always correct, is proverbially the man who is most always wrong by actual observation. Policemen are particularly required to have sympathy for, and interest in, the other policeman's point of view, attitude, and opinion. Such a man has gained an estimation of the meagreness of knowledge even in its totality.

Each year new discoveries are made, wider fields of thought explored. The greatest scientific men of this age have tolerance for the other man's view, because they know that knowledge is infinite. Their attitude thus assures the betterment of world conditions. Again, tolerance for the other man's religious belief is a personal obligation inasmuch as each man's own belief is his road to Heaven. The policeman must be imbued with these ideals of service because Man and the fate of mankind become his chief interest in life, upon his induction into police work. The service ideal aspires to the personal attainment of knowledge,---the guiding principle being joy and pleasure in learning. This motivates the policeman to delve profoundly into the theory and practice of dealing with human beings, as individuals and as groups. His search into natural, biological and social sciences is an eternal quest for that clue which, if found, will aid the policeman in dealing more intelligently with his fellow men. With this spirit of scientific understanding, he accords to the lowly "bum," drink-sodden and

covered with vermin, that degree of sympathy and consideration to which that unwilling weakling is entitled as the victim of the immutable laws of his inheritance or of environment. Why do some human beings kill, others steal, and still others commit the many varieties of sex offenses?---These answers can only be known by the policeman who seeks knowledge in all fields related intimately or remotely to the task at hand, penetrating that realm wherein may be found the means to live a more abundant life. Offenders, complainants, witnesses, prosecutor and judge are all human beings. Accordingly, the policeman must intimately know the factors underlying human behavior if he hopes to succeed in his chosen profession.

Associated with the ideal of service is the spirit of optimism. No group of men have a finer opportunity to spread the gospel of good cheer than the policemen of today. They come in contact with every phase of human suffering, and if they add to the gloom that surrounds them, they are unfitted for the duties they are expected to perform. Policemen must ever look forward with confidence and certainty to the day when man shall realize his spiritual potentialities, and here, spiritual is used in its broadest sense. Policemen may look forward with certainty to the period when service will conquer selfishness; when joy, peace, good will, rule the heart and mind. The personality beams in that individual who possesses an undiluted spirit of optimism.

The spirit of creativeness is always present in the ideal of service. With this spirit the policeman may not let things remain as they are. He is forced by an impulse over which there is no control, to do his share in making the world a better place to live in. Policemen in the service today are like a connecting link between those who follow, and those who have gone before. Whatever has been worthily and constructively done, must be carried on in this spirit of creativeness, and in addition thereto, policemen will add to that which has been accomplished so that those who follow should be better able to serve, passing on to them the best of today, so that they may improve the future. Since all humans differ, one from the other, this creative and constructive force will manifest itself in every aspect of police service.

Inseparable from the ideal of service is the spirit of sacrifice, which in the last analysis must always remain a spiritual offering. Men who enter the police department should be informed in advance that there is no material wealth possible in their chosen profession. Men who expect to become wealthy should be advised to enter another field. Policemen cannot be concerned with material possessions if they have the true spirit of sacrifice. They cannot pursue their calling for wealth or fame for these are not to be found in this branch of government. They must be willing to forego many of the pleasures of social life because of their connection with the police force. If they have the true spirit of sacrifice, their pleasures will be derived from their labors. There are today thousands of men who are not getting the salary that they should receive; but they are just as devoted to their task, and to the people they serve, as any human being could be devoted to any worthy cause.

Allied with the ideal of service is the spirit of humility. The right type of policeman is ever mindful of the dignity of police service, and is fully aware at all times of the responsibility and privilege of service and all of its implications. Merely serving the people, cashing the pay check at the end of the month and doing a good turn daily, is not enough. Policemen must give constant thought to the various unwritten duties and always be eager to fulfill their obligations.—Not those obligations that can be commanded by rules and regulations, but that free will offering that can never be commanded, but is soul giving.

Humility has been defined as being humble in spirit, free from arrogance and egotism. No policeman can be arrogant, and no policeman can be an egotist, and surely every policeman must be humble in spirit, for the work that he does must always be done in gentle modesty and self-effacement, and without hope of reward save the consciousness of a duty well done.

In mentioning the ideal of service, the mind instantly reverts to the spirit of perseverance, because in police service, "holding-on" in the face of defeat and against overwhelming odds, requires a perseverance that admits of no defeat. Even though failure seems inevitable the spirit of perseverance will drive the policeman on. Suffice for him that the objective be attained. Regardless of obstacles, hardship, suffering, ridicule, and pain he will unflinchingly carry-on with a tenacity that assures success and will ultimately dominate the situation regardless of its difficulties.

The ideal of service also includes the spirit of integrity. Without that quality of moral soundness, police departments or police officials do not command the respect of the community. The policeman who takes peanuts from the stand of a peanut peddler is no less criminal than is the grafter, gangster or racketeer who steals millions. He who is dishonest or unreliable in any particular has no place in any branch of police service. With integrity everything is possible, without this priceless attribute of character the policeman is doomed to failure in his chosen profession. The spirit of integrity comprehends, also, the obligation of the policeman to deal fairly with superiors and subordinates alike; there will be no deception of either by the possessor of this virtue. The violation of a single promise made by a policeman reflects upon the integrity of the entire organization. Every agreement entered into with another, regardless of the station of the individual, is inviolate and must be kept as faithfully as a contract protected by a bond. One need not be fearful that a policeman will resort to sharp practices or deceit if he has integrity. Especially does this apply to the members of the criminal fraternity. They know, when they are prosecuted by dependable policemen, that these officials will introduce not only that evidence which is likely to convict them but will present to the court all of the information gathered, irrespective of whether it is for or against the defendant. Truthfulness in all its implications is an inseparable part of integrity, and this spirit should dominate and direct the thoughts, feelings, and actions of every member of a police organization.

ship.--The type of friendship that radiates happiness, kindly humor, friendliness, and confidence in each other. Wherever policemen possess this spirit of friendship, there is less discord, less gloominess, less mental depression and misunderstanding in police departments than is to be found in any other walk of life. The policeman who has this spirit of friendship will find, as he passes on his way that he will impart this spirit to all with whom he may come in contact; the poor, the down-and-outer, the lowly and the rich, the good and the bad. Of him it can be truly said, as by a little Japanese in referring to Patrolman Riley of the Los Angeles Police Department, "He is like the sun; he shines all the time with his smiles and friendliness."

The ideal of service is not the simple type of service ordinarily thought of by unthinking persons, but is of itself a great sun, around which revolve many planets, all being important in perfecting the constellation. Therefore, the policeman who has the ideal of service as here conceived, is certain to raise the level of the organization to which he is attached and improve the character of the community that he serves.

SPECIAL ANNOUNCEMENT - APPLICANTS

The purpose of the articles published in the FBI Law Enforcement Bulletins of November and December, 1936, and January, 1937, in regard to the use of the word "APPLICANT" was to insure search of applicant prints taken on the Bureau's personal identification fingerprint form and has no bearing whatever on criminal prints which are all searched against the criminal files.

In some instances prints on the Bureau's criminal fingerprint form have been received in its Identification Division reflecting a current criminal charge as well as the notation "APPLICANT."

Contributors are urged to make a distinction between fingerprint cards submitted in the cases of applicants and those forwarded for the purpose of furnishing criminal records. It is suggested that to avoid confusion in this respect contributors use the personal identification fingerprint form with the word "APPLICANT" indicated thereon by stamp or in some distinctive manner. Upon request, the Bureau will furnish appropriate supplies of personal identification fingerprint forms to be used in submitting finger impressions of applicants.

The Scientific, Technical Laboratory, Fingerprint Identificastatistical, Investigative and Training School facilities and equipthe Federal Bureau of Investigation will be available and utilized out the course.

The enthusiastic reception of this course of training by law ennt officers of both state and local jurisdictions and the large numapplications and inquiries which have been received by the Federal of Investigation concerning the course indicate quite clearly a proe attitude on the part of those engaged in the profession of law ennt. The FBI, for a number of years, has afforded instruction to its ppointed Special Agents before they enter upon their duties as invess. This training has been found both necessary and economical, althe Special Agent is, in most instances, either a law school graduate spert accountant. It has likewise been found economical and conducive gher standard of efficiency for the Special Agents to be returned to ton at periodic intervals for courses of retraining in order that by be kept up to date, not only as to new laws which they are called enforce but as to new and scientific methods and techniques which en developed in the art and science of law enforcement.

EXPLANATION OF FBI NUMBERS

It has been called to the attention of the Federal Bureau of gation that there exists a question in the minds of some of the utors of fingerprints as to why no FBI number appears on an abstract rd sheet advising that no record appears in the Identification Difiles of the Bureau.

When a current fingerprint card is received in the Bureau, it practice to assign an FBI number only when the Identification Diviles contain some previous record of the subject, such as additional rint cards or criminal data.

CIRCUMSTANTIAL EVIDENCE

As we have progressed in the detection of crime and the successful prosecution of criminals, the law enforcement officer's familiarity with the rules of evidence has begun to be considered one of his valued qualifications.

There are times when the investigating officer finds some uncertainty in his mind as to the acceptability of certain kinds of evidence in the courts. Particularly does this occur when the officer weighs in his mind the admissibility and effectiveness of circumstantial evidence.

There is probably nothing more misunderstood than circumstantial evidence. There has been much controversy, which undoubtedly is traceable to sentimentality, about convicting a person upon circumstantial evidence. Unless the investigator understands the rules concerning evidence he will find himself confused and with doubts in his own mind as to the value of circumstantial evidence. This can result only in lack of directness in his investigation and the failure to preserve and develop the very evidence that may be needed to properly prosecute a case.

For the purpose of aiding in clearing up the misunderstandings of circumstantial evidence, we can divide evidence into two types, direct and circumstantial. As stated in U. S. v. Greene, 146 Fed. 803 "Direct and circumstantial evidence differ merely in their logical relation to the fact in issue. Evidence as to the existence of the facts is direct. Circumstantial evidence is composed of facts which raise a logical inference as to the existence of the fact in issue." Or let us present it this way: Direct evidence of a crime is evidence or testimony given by an eyewitness, his own knowledge of the fact about which he is testifying. (The criminal law includes in this category confessions, admissions of the accused and dying declarations.) Circumstantial evidence consists of proven facts from which a jury may infer by process of reasoning, or deduction according to the common experience of mankind that the accused committed a certain crime.

The necessity of frequent resort to circumstantial evidence to prove guilt in a criminal proceeding is apparent in the very nature of things. A criminal will endeavor to perform his acts in secrecy. His movements are so planned as to avoid an eyewitness ever observing him or any of his acts in the commission of a crime. Naturally he chooses a time and occasion which favor his concealment, sedulously scheming to render detection impossible. In such cases there can be no direct evidence as there will in all probability be no eyewitnesses. If circumstantial evidence were to be excluded in such cases, the majority of criminals would certainly go unpunished.

Chief Justice Gibson in Commonwealth v. Harman, 4 Pa. 269, 271, dealing with the suggestion that since the evidence against the accused was only circumstantial and consequently entitled to inferior credit, if any at all, very ably answers the contention bringing out the value and recognition of circumstantial evidence, stating: "Circumstantial evidence is, in the abstract, nearly, though perhaps not altogether, as strong as positive

evidence; in the concrete, it may be infinitely stronger. A fact positively sworn to by a single eyewitness of blemished character is not satisfactorily proved as is a fact which is the necessary consequence of a chain of other facts sworn to by many witnesses of undoubted credibility. All evidence is more or less circumstantial, the difference being only in the degree; and it is sufficient for the purpose when it excludes disbelief. Certain cases of circumstantial proofs to be found in the books, in which innocent persons were convicted, have been pressed on your attention. These, however, are few in number and they occurred in a period of some hundreds of years. They are constantly referred to in capital trials to frighten juries into a belief that there should be no conviction on merely circumstantial evidence. But the law exacts a conviction wherever there is legal evidence to show the prisoner's guilt beyond a reasonable doubt; and circumstantial evidence is legal evidence."

That circumstantial evidence is legal evidence is accepted law and cannot be denied. The hue and cry that is raised condemning circumstantial evidence is an effort to make the jury believe that the use of circumstantial evidence takes advantage of the accused and does not safeguard his rights.

So that the investigator may have no uncertainties in his own mind as to whether the accused's rights are adequately protected when the prosecution is depending upon circumstantial evidence it might be well to discuss briefly the relative safeguards against error as offered by direct evidence and circumstantial evidence.

In Commonwealth v. Webster, 59 Mass. (5 Cush.) 295, a leading Massachusetts case the relative advantages or safeguards of direct and circumstantial evidence are pointed out by Chief Justice Shaw: "The advantage of positive evidence is that it is the direct testimony of a witness to the fact to be proved. Who, if he speaks the truth, saw it done; and the only question is whether he is entitled to belief. The disadvantage is that the witness may be false and corrupt and that the case may not afford the means of detecting his falsehood." In discussing circumstantial evidence the judge stated: "The advantages are, that, as the evidence commonly comes from several witnesses and different sources, a chain of circumstances is less likely to be falsely prepared and arranged, and falsehood and perjury are more likely to be detected and fail in their purpose." The advantages and protection afforded the accused in the use of circumstantial evidence is well expressed by Jones, in Vol. 1 Sec. 10 of his commentaries on Evidence: "Indeed, it has been many times observed that strong circumstantial evidence of crimes committed in secret, as happens in the majority of offenses, is the most satisfactory of any to point to the guilt of the accused, for men may be seduced to perjury by many base motives, to which the secret nature of the offense may sometimes afford a temptation; but it can scarcely happen that many circumstances, especially if they be such over which the accuser could have no control, forming together the links of a transaction, should all unfortunately concur to fix the presumption of guilt on an individual, and yet such a conclusion be erroneous."

No capable investigating officer would be satisfied with the mere statement of one individual that he had seen the accused fire upon and kill the victim. He would not rest his case there. This, however, would be direct evidence. But if we were to depend on direct evidence of this type we could not help but question the veracity of the witness. Did he have a reason for pinning the guilt upon the accused or did he possibly, honestly believe his accusation although he has been mentally tricked by some misperception. To insure justice to the accused it would be incumbent upon the officer to search for the fingerprints of the accused upon the weapon used in the killing; the fatal bullet would be examined to determine its similarity to a test shot fired from the weapon, to prove scientifically by firearms identification that the fatal shot had been fired by the weapon on which the accused's fingerprints were found. None would say that evidence of this type was prejudiced or intended to deny accused of any of his rights. Yet this is clearly in the field of circumstantial evidence. True this example is extremely simple but the same process follows in complex cases. This type of evidence is being favored more and more. It is also for this reason that scientific processes are coming into prominence in investigating crime. The clever criminal plans his crime to avoid the possibilities of developing direct evidence in so far as is possible, however, circumstantial evidence unwittingly left at the crime scene, impersonally, without the possibilities of human error and prejudice speaks of his acts scientifically. The latent fingerprint, a strand of rope, a blood stain, all circumstantial and yet the success that has so far been achieved by those working along these lines should inspire law enforcement officers to make full use of the facilities which the crime laboratory is placing at their disposal.

It has not been the purpose of this short comment to go completely into the realm of the extensive law pertaining to direct and circumstantial evidence in all of its ramifications, but it is hoped that the investigator may have had cleared in his mind some of those points which may have disturbed him when thinking of evidence in relation to its acceptance by court and jury.

It may well be stated that circumstantial evidence is often better and more convincing than other evidence. It is equally true that where circumstantial evidence is pre-eminent that the officer should be most careful. A set of circumstances can too easily be made to fit an accepted theory. The investigator should constantly guard against the danger of forming a preconceived theory and make every effort to preserve an open mind to assure of a proper investigation of the case on hand.

SPECIAL ANNOUNCEMENT - CRIMINAL HISTORY RECORDS

As has been stated previously, it is the desire of the Federal Bureau of Investigation to receive in its Identification Division, at the time any current fingerprint record is submitted by a law enforcement agency, specific information as to any known criminal record, and particularly, specific advice as to a known existing FBI file number.

In the examination of current fingerprint cards being received in the Bureau's Identification Division, the Bureau employees have noted that frequently the "additional criminal history column" appearing on the back thereof is not executed where apparently the contributor of the print has knowledge of a previous criminal history. It is noted also that in some instances this column is filled with a large amount of additional criminal data which have been reported to the Bureau previously and which have been reported to the contributor.

It is desired to point out that the mere indication in the "additional criminal history column" of the FBI file number would provide the Bureau with information concerning the previous record concerning a known previous criminal record and, at the same time, the entry of this information in the criminal history column on the back of a fingerprint card would enable any contributor to dispense with the need of quoting a lengthy record. The Bureau is offering this suggestion in the interest of making certain that the FBI file number is furnished wherever available and further to dispense with the need of unnecessary entries which some contributors have submitted in the past.

It is desired to point out in connection with the foregoing that when the FBI file does not include all criminal history known to the contributor, the contributing official should specify the additional criminal record.

SPECIAL ANNOUNCEMENT - QUESTIONABLE PATTERNS

Since it is the belief of the Federal Bureau of Investigation that a more uniform interpretation of questionable fingerprint patterns by identification officers is highly desirable, beginning with the April, 1936, issue of the FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin there was started a series of discussions of questionable patterns in which there was set forth the interpretation accorded such patterns in the Identification Division of the Bureau.

Wherever possible, the Federal Bureau of Investigation will utilize a questionable or referenceable finger impression in connection with the fugitive notations appearing in the FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin to illustrate further the Bureau's interpretation of questionable patterns. Beginning with the March, 1957, issue of the Bulletin such patterns will be reproduced as the single finger impressions appearing in connection with these notations. The preferential classifications, reflecting the interpretations accorded them in the Bureau's Identification Division, will be indicated. Interpretations which might be given these patterns by some identification officers will be shown by the reference classifications.

A QUESTIONABLE PATTERN

In the preceding issue of the FBI Bulletin, there was published a pattern of the questionable plain arch - tented arch group, which due to the angular formation, was classified as a tented arch.

Reproduced below is a contrasting example which is given the preference of a plain arch for filing purposes.



It will be noted that in the center of this fingerprint, ridge "X" bifurcates at points A and B. The formation at these points is caused by the bifurcation of ridge "X" and not by the meeting of two separate ridges as was the case in the impression published in the January 1937 issue. For this reason the pattern is given the preference of a plain arch by the Identification Division of this Bureau.

BONES AIDING IN IDENTIFICATION OF UNKNOWN DEAD

W. K. Merrill, District Ranger, Wawona, California, has advised the FBI of an interesting identification of an unknown dead person by Rangers of Yosemite National Park and the Berkeley Police Department.

While on a reconnaissance in February, 1934, Assistant Chief Ranger Wegner and Park Forester Ernst found several pieces of what looked like human bones in the talus slope of Half Dome, elevation 8852 feet. The bones were taken to headquarters where they were at first thought to be the remains of Godfrey Wondrosek of Chicago, a man reported to have been lost in this region the year before.

It was a month later before snow had melted sufficiently for Rangers to make a thorough search of the section where the bones had been found. Investigation disclosed that parts of bones and clothing were scattered for a distance of a quarter of a mile perhaps by coyotes and bears. A belt with the initial "H" on the buckle was found along with a wallet that contained no identification. All identification marks had been removed from the clothing. However, back under a huge overhanging rock an overcoat was discovered with a timetable in one of the pockets. The time table was dated September 21, 1930, and had a pencil check mark indicating that the party had evidently taken the 11:30 p.m. train from the Ferry Building in San Francisco for Yosemite.

The Chief Ranger ordered that the jawbone be taken to the resident dentist, Dr. Davies, who determined that the bone belonged to a man between the age of twenty-three and twenty-five years. Police Departments in the Bay region were notified of the discovery and in less than twenty-four hours the Berkeley Police notified that their files showed that a young man by the name of Vincent V. Herkomer, age twenty-three, University of California student, had been missing from Berkeley since October, 1930.

The father of this boy was notified and he came to Yosemite where he identified the belt and clothing as having belonged to his son. Mr. Herkomer stated that his son had been suffering from severe head pains shortly before his disappearance and he believed that his son had committed suicide.

ANNOUNCEMENT

In the May, 1936, issue of the FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin there was published an article with an illustrating photograph, relating the identification of a skeleton through fingerprints.

W. K. Merrill, U. S. Park Ranger, who submitted this interesting case to the FBI has advised the Bureau that numerous police and identification officers have requested him to furnish them with prints of the skeleton. Reprints of this article and photograph of the skeleton have been prepared and may now be obtained by addressing the Director, John Edgar Hoover, Federal Bureau of Investigation, United States Department of Justice, Washington, D. C.

TELEPHOTO ENABLES IMMEDIATE IDENTIFICATION.

When the Los Angeles, California, Police Department arrested James Scott on suspicion of assault with a deadly weapon the victim of the assault was believed to be near death. The Los Angeles Police Department desired to have a report as soon as possible of any criminal record on file for Scott. It was believed that Scott might possibly be wanted in the eastern section of the country and that a notation of his being wanted might be included in the files of the Identification Division of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, together with any record of prior arrests.

The fastest mail between Los Angeles, California, and Washington, D. C., would have to travel over three thousand miles. It was decided, therefore, to effect instantaneous transmission of the finger impressions through the facilities of a coast to coast telephoto system hook-up. The telephoto record of Scott's fingerprints was received in the Identification Division of the Federal Bureau of Investigation in the late afternoon of November 20, 1936. The telephoto impressions were immediately searched through the fingerprint files of the Identification Division and found to be identical with the prints of James Scott.

The criminal record of this man indicated he was arrested at Chicago, Illinois, on February 25, 1936, for murder. His criminal career started when he was received at the United States Disciplinary Barracks, Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, on October 14, 1916, on a charge of malicious assault to serve a sentence of two years. On May 1, 1923, he was received at the State Penitentiary at Joliet, Illinois, on a charge of murder to serve a sentence of twenty years. A notation in the files of the Identification Division indicates, however, that he was discharged from Joliet, Illinois, on July 31, 1934. He was arrested on February 19, 1935, by the Police Department at Chicago, Illinois, on general principles; no disposition shown. On February 20, 1935, he was arrested by the Police Departument at Cicero, Illinois, for investigation and subsequently released. Further notations in the fingerprint files indicate other arrests on misdemeanor charges. Later advice from the Chicago, Illinois, Police Department indicated that Scott was released following a verdict of not guilty for attempted murder and the nol-prossing of an indictment of murder against him.

The criminal record of James Scott, as then contained in the files of the Identification Division, was telegraphed to the Los Angeles, California, Police Department through the Los Angeles Field Division of the Federal Bureau of Investigation within a short time following receipt of the telephoto finger impressions.

The near instantaneous transmission of fingerprints by telephoto as illustrated in this case has been possible, of course, only within the past few months, when the telephoto equipment has been perfected and installed in a great many of the offices of the larger newspapers of the country. Although the employment of this method will not be desirable in many cases, nevertheless, in a few instances it is contemplated its use will be of substantial value.



INTERNATIONAL EXCHANGE OF FINGERPRINTS BRINGS TO LIGHT EXTENSIVE CRIMINAL RECORD IN SEVERAL EUROPEAN COUNTRIES

On October 22, 1936, an inquiry received in the Identification Division of the Federal Bureau of Investigation from the Warden of the State Penitentiary at Walla Walla, Washington, requested that he be advised of any criminal record on file concerning Helen Thompson, who had been received to serve a maximum sentence of fifteen years for grand larceny. With the letter of inquiry was received a fingerprint card on which it was indicated that Mrs. Thompson had been born in Switzerland, and because of this item of information a copy of the fingerprints of Mrs. Thompson was forwarded in routine manner to the police authorities at Bern, Switzerland, with whom the Federal Bureau of Investigation conducts an international exchange of fingerprints and other criminal information.

The record previously on file in the Identification Division of the Bureau indicated a long criminal record for Mrs. Thompson, who was also known by various aliases. This record included arrests at London, England; Calgary, Alberta, Canada; Lausanne, Switzerland, and several places in the United States, for such crimes as fraud, embezzlement, theft by false pretenses, grand larceny, theft by worthless checks, and being a fugitive.

This already extensive criminal record was increased upon receipt of additional data from the police authorities at Bern, Switzerland, identified there upon receipt of the fingerprints forwarded by the Identification Division of the Bureau. The data indicated that Mrs. Thompson had been extradited from France to Switzerland and that she had been sentenced to serve four months in prison for false pretenses at Neuchatel on October 9, 1935. She had been expelled from Switzerland but returned in November, 1935, and was apprehended at Lausanne where she attempted to obtain money by false pretenses. As a result of this last arrest she was expelled from Switzerland. At the time she was arrested at Lausanne, Switzerland, she was known as Helen Fawcett and her birthplace was recorded as Salina, Kansas.

In further response to the forwarding of the fingerprint record in international exchange a letter was received from the State Criminal Police Department, Identification Bureau, Berlin, Germany, indicating that Mrs. Thompson, under the name of Genovefa Paddlefort, was arrested on May 26, 1931, at Carlsbad, Czechoslovakia, and also on April 7th and 10th, 1931, in Vienna, Austria, on charges of fraud. She was arrested again in Stuttgart, Germany, on July 20,1933, under the name of Paddlefort. Data concerning her personal history and various movements throughout Europe, as well as identities of associates were also supplied.

The information referred to above, supplied by police organizations in Europe receiving fingerprint records through international exchange with the Federal Bureau of Investigation, was forwarded to the Warden of the State Penitentiary at Walla Walla, Washington, so that the records of that institution might contain all available information relative to the inmate, Mrs. Helen Thompson.

Through the receipt of fingerprint records and exchange of criminal identification data with foreign police organizations, the files of the Identification Division of the Federal Bureau of Investigation constitute an ever increasing source of world-wide criminal information which is available to all duly constituted law enforcement agencies.
