The Federal Bureau of Investigation, United States Department of Justice, is charged with the duty of investigating violations of the laws of the United States and collecting evidence in cases in which the United States is or may be a party in interest.

The following list indicates some of the major violations over which the Bureau has investigative jurisdiction:

National Motor Vehicle Theft Act

Interstate transportation of stolen property valued at \$5,000 or more National Bankruptcy Act

Interstate flight to avoid prosecution or testifying in certain cases

White Slave Traffic Act

Impersonation of Government Officials

Larceny of Goods in Interstate Commerce

Killing or Assaulting Federal Officer

Cases involving transportation in interstate or foreign commerce of any persons who have been kidnaped

Extortion cases in which interstate commerce or interstate communication is an element

Theft, Embezzlement or Illegal Possession of Government Property Antitrust Laws

Robbery of National Banks, insured banks of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation and Member Banks of Federal Reserve System

National Bank and Federal Reserve Act Violations, such as embezzlement, abstraction or misapplication of funds

Crimes on any kind of Government reservation, including Indian Reservations or in any Government building or other Government property Neutrality violations, including the shipment of arms to friendly nations Frauds against the Government

Crimes in connection with the Federal Penal and Correctional Institutions Perjury, embezzlement, or bribery in connection with Federal Statutes or officials

Crimes on the high seas

Federal Anti-Racketeering Statute

The location of persons who are fugitives from justice by reason of violations of the Federal Laws over which the Bureau has jurisdiction, of escaped Federal prisoners, and parole and probation violators.

The Bureau does not have investigative jurisdiction over the violations of Counterfeiting, Narcotic, Customs, Immigration, or Postal Laws.

Law enforcement officials possessing information concerning violations over which the Bureau has investigative jurisdiction are requested to promptly forward the same to the Special Agent in Charge of the nearest field division of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, United States Department of Justice. The address of each field division of this Bureau appears on the inside back cover of this bulletin. Government Rate Collect telegrams or telephone calls will be accepted if information indicates that immediate action is necessary.



For a law enforcement organization to operate successfully, it must have the support of the people for whose benefit it is organized. The members of the police department may be selected because of their ability; they may be trained in the newest and best methods of scientific crime detection; they may be furnished the best equipment obtainable; the spirit of the men may be at a peak; they may work endlessly, pursuing every lead in each case to its end, and upon completion have a well prepared case, fully investigated, with all necessary evidence ready for presentation to the court. Yet, if the one element of public support is lacking, all efforts of the officers for crime prevention and detection will come to naught.

It may not be entirely the fault of the mass of citizens when apathy toward good law enforcement overtakes them. They may not know the benefits of an efficient police department, well manned and systematically administered. They should be advised that a law enforcement organization properly equipped, manned by an intelligent personnel, properly trained in scientific crime detection methods, free to operate without interference from corrupt political pressure, gives the best return for the taxpayers' investment. If this is true, a duty evolves upon the police personnel to inform the citizens of their obligation, not only toward the law enforcement officials who serve them, but also toward the entire community.

One of the best ways of securing public cooperation with the police department is through the dissemination of information relative to the accomplishments of the organization. The achievements of a police department can be measured through the number of complaints received, the number of investigations made, and the number of convictions secured.

Through integrity, efficiency, intelligence, and satisfactory results will a police department be judged by the public it serves. Perform these duties well! Secure the support of the citizens in the community.! Insure the prevention and eradication of crime!

CRIME AND NARCOTICS

That crime and narcotics are interwoven is illustrated by the fact that narcotic drug violators head the list of all criminals in the United States having previous fingerprint records, which include crimes ranging from vagrancy to robbery, forgery, counterfeiting, burglary and other serious offenses. Of this class, 64 per cent have previous records; next in line is vagrancy with 53.4 per cent having criminal records; and robbery with 49.1 per cent having criminal records.

A study of the criminal history of (1,268) narcotic violators sentenced during the first six months of 1936 shows that 40 per cent were recidivists having records of from 1 to 13 narcotic violations to their credit, and 38 per cent had previous records of other crimes ranging from murder to vagrancy. In this 38 per cent a total of 2,064 charges of various, crimes, exclusive of prior narcotic violations, were made against the 478 defendants; or an average of 4.3 per defendant. Crimes such as larceny, burglary and robbery accounted for 42 per cent of the charges. There are more arrests of second and third offenders against the narcotic drug acts than any other law.

The Senate Interim Narcotic Committee of California, in its 1935 report, stated that petty larceny is the usual type of crime which a drug addict commits in order to secure money with which to buy his daily dosage and that the high larceny record in San Francisco is related to the high vagrancy-addict arrests for the same year; namely 658 arrests, or 74 per cent of all the vagrant-addict arrests in the State.

where a manufacture in weather During 1934, 1935 and 1936, two doctors in a certain Virginia city had the reputation of supplying addicts with morphine. The news of the ease with which prescriptions could be purchased and filled there spread to cities and states nearby, and about 500 addicts flocked there from North Carolina, the District of Columbia, Tennessee and cities in Virginia, South Carolina, Georgia and Maryland. These addicts were known not to have a medical need for narcotic drugs and the majority of them had previous criminal records. In Baltimore, police raiding a house of prostitution found boxes containing morphine bearing pharmacy labels from that particular city. with the second of the second of


We were unsuccessful twice in bringing these doctors to trial. Meanwhile, their business thrived. Before we finally closed the cases and galvanized local authorities to action, crime increased in that city from 1933 to 1936, due to the presence of those addicts, as shown by the following figures:

Arrests	Increased from
Burglary	11 to 38
Drug Addicts	58 to 155
Highway robbery	78 to 97
Petty larceny	785 to 1,025

These figures do not include arrests for shoplifting and other small thieveries.

The average non-medical addict requires from three to six grains of narcotics per day, at approximately \$1 a grain. Very few of them are gainfully employed. The consequence is that from \$3 to \$6 per day per addict is taken from the citizens by stealth.

In the following chart showing the relationship between crime and narcotics, as reflected by an examination of the criminal records of approximately 5,000 narcotic violators, it is interesting to note that the average number of crimes per violator was 3.3; that each violator had about two narcotic convictions; and that one in every four violators had been convicted of grand larceny.



NARCOTICS AND CRIME IN FORMOSA

The Health Commission of the Japanese colony of Formosa, after classifying 57,000 crimes committed during seven years by natives of Formosa, based on the relative proportion of opium smokers to non-smokers, reported that it found 70.83 per cent criminality among opium smokers as against 29.17 per cent criminality among non-smokers. Dr. Somei To of the Formosa Health Commission concluded that drug addiction causes a relentless destruction of character and releases criminal tendencies, and that hospitalization to have any appreciable measure of success must come early in the addiction of the victim.

NARCOTIC POLICE WORK

Narcotic police work differs from nearly all other police work in that there is no complainant involved in the transaction. The seller is satisfied and so is the purchaser. In cases of robbery, assault, counterfeiting, larceny and other crimes, a complaint is made, whereas in narcotic cases it is necessary for the officers to work into a ring undercover in order to obtain evidence of the commission of a felony and ordinarily to arrest at the time the crime is committed. In the investigation of other crimes the police are usually able to develop important clues in the reconstruction of a case but in narcotic work it is necessary to work up to the actual commission of the crime.

Nearly all law enforcement agencies have a corpus delicti of the case which can be proved by the lay witness. The contrary is true of narcotic enforcement where the witness must be an expert undercover operative. Stolen jewelry filling a suitcase is identified by its owner, but no such owner comes forward where a purveyor surreptitiously transports a suitcase filled with narcotics from one city or state to another.

Sometimes a drug dealer's modus operandi is such that it is impossible to make a "selling" case against him, even though an agent or member of the force, working undercover, is available to give evidence. In such cases every effort should be put forward to establish a charge of "possession," bearing in mind that a dealer in narcotics, no matter how large a wholesaler he may be, invariably keeps his supply of drugs in his own possession, or at least under his personal control, as in the drug traffic no man trusts too fully even his closest associates. Usually, the careful shadowing of an informant while he is making a purchase, or the observation of known addicts, peddlers, or their runners, will eventually lead to the source of supply. Then it is merely a matter of patient watching and waiting until the dealer visits his cache or commits some overt act which provides a favorable opportunity to effect his arrest on a "possession" charge.

The reason that a "selling" charge is considered better than one of "possession" is that the former indicates to the court that the case has a trafficking angle and that it is not one involving merely the possession of a drug by an unfortunate addict. This is most important as the courts are naturally inclined to impose lighter sentences on addicts than on peddlers,

and, if the illicit drug traffic is to be effectively curbed, it is of the utmost importance that heavy sentences be meted out to traffickers.

Fortunately, the courts of this country now generally recognize that it is essential in the interest of effective enforcement of the narcotic laws for the police to utilize the services of underworld addicts and to pay them for their work. Consequently, most courts which ordinarily are disposed to frown upon the use of informers, look upon them as a necessary evil in narcotic cases, providing, and this is most important, that their evidence is corroborated in all its essential details by reputable peace officers. When a court is satisfied that every possible precaution has been taken by the police to cover the movements of an informant, there is usually no hesitation in handing down a verdict of "guilty" should the evidence warrant it.

COURTS

In some districts of the United States, sentences imposed upon violators of the State and Federal narcotic laws are wholly inadequate to serve as deterrents. Under the Harrison Narcotic Law, which forms the principal basis for Federal prosecution of narcotic offenses, the maximum penalty which may be imposed is a term of 5 years' imprisonment or a fine of \$2,000, or both. But the average term of imprisonment imposed by the courts upon Federal narcotic law violators has been $1\frac{1}{2}$ years. This is too low; and its consequences are reflected in the fact that many violators are "repeaters."

Congress enacted legislation during the last session expressing its wish that second narcotic offenders be sentenced to ten years' imprisonment and third offenders to twenty years. This should have the effect of curtailing the traffic, as a large percentage of violators have been convicted the second time. It is hoped that the courts will carry out this policy.

PROBATION AND PAROLE

The number of persons convicted of violations of the Federal narcotic laws and placed on probation by the several district courts throughout the United States during a recent two-year period was 456. More than 50 per cent had probation revoked on account of subsequent violations of narcotic or of other laws. This proportion of relapses is entirely too large and shows the necessity for greater care on the part of the courts in ascertaining the past history of each applicant for probation.

The case of Harold Normandale of New Orleans is an example showing how not to deal with a criminal. He has over 90 arrests to his credit, ranging from misdemeanor to murder. He has had two recent narcotic convictions and will soon be tried on a third charge. He is regarded as the worst criminal in New Orleans yet his sentences are inadequate and consistently low. To look at his record is to shudder. He appears to be on a criminal merry go round which passes through the penitentiary on every revolution. Parole Boards have been too lenient with him.

MEDICO-SOCIAL

The establishment under the Public Health Service of the Treasury Department of narcotic farms at Lexington, Kentucky, and Fort Worth, Texas, for the cure and rehabilitation of convicted narcotic drug addicts, is commendable and serves a much needed want in our country.

The states might well designate wards in already established county hospitals or infirmaries where the volunteer non-criminal addict and the convicted addict could be given scientific treatment. These institutions should be bulwarked by statutes requiring the addict to remain under medical supervision until pronounced cured. If the Federal and State institutions did no more than take these unfortunates out of social circulation and place them where they would be free from the drug and unable to recruit others to their ranks, this would materially reduce the demand on the peddler and be of no small help in driving him out of his vicious trade.

The isolation and segregation of drug addicts with a view to treatment is desirable and necessary. Their presence and contact in our communities is a potential danger and a causative factor in increasing addiction; therefore, penal measures against the peddler must be augmented by medico-social work on addicts.

The illicit drug traffic yields lucrative spoils and thrives on pandering to a seemingly irresistible craving. Separate the addict from the peddler and his mercenaries, and you thereby lessen crime.

MARIHUANA

I am surprised to learn that certain police officers have been inclined to minimize the effects of the use of Marihuana. These officers should review some of the cases that are reported to the Bureau. They would, I am sure, be convinced that the drug is adhering to its old world traditions of murder, assault, rape, physical demoralization and mental breakdown. A study of the effects of Marihuana shows clearly that it is a dangerous drug, and Bureau records prove that its use is associated with insanity and crime. Therefore, from the standpoint of police work, it is a more dangerous drug than heroin or cocaine.

Here is a drug which according to Dr. Moreau, who is the outstanding authority on its effects, causes seven phenomena and three illusions:

- 1. Feeling of unaccountable hilarity.
- 2. Excitation and a disassociation of ideas; the weakening of power to direct thoughts.
- 3. Errors in time and space.
- 4. Intensification of auditory sensibilities, causing profound dejection or mad gayety.
- 5. Fixed ideas; delirious conviction. This is a type of intellectual injury so frequent in mental alienation. The user imagines the most unbelievable things, giving way to monstrous extravagances.

- 6. Emotional disturbance during which the user is powerless to direct his thoughts, loses the power to resist emotions and may commit violence which knows no bounds when disorders of the intellect have reached a point of incoherence. During this dangerous phenomenon evil instincts are brought to the surface and cause a fury to rage within the user.
- 7. Irresistible impulses which may result in suicide.

The illusions are those of sight, hearing and sense. The mind loses all idea of space and extent, and tends to exaggeration in all things; the slightest impulse or suggestion carries it away.

Narcotic effects are good or bad. Marihuana effects run in one direction only, and that is bad. Marihuana weakens the will. Baudelaire said of the hashish user that he wanted to be an angel but he became a very powerful beast for the moment. This observation is borne out by the crimes of violence that have followed its use in the United States.

Pronounced suggestibility is produced by Marihuana. Dr. Briere de Boismont notes that anyone who has taken Indian Hemp "submits to the influence of the person who speaks to him." The astonishing development of suggestibility and autosuggestibility of individuals taking hashish is stressed by Meunier. Dr. Moreau of Tours noted that the hashish user is no longer master of himself; it impels the individual to excesses and he gives free sway to his passions because of the violence which it conveys to the feelings. "We know," says Guimbail, "that it was under the influence of delirium engendered by hashish that the Old Man of the Mountain breathed the suggestion to murder."

Dhunsiboy, in 1930, showed that the prolonged use of Indian Hemp usually leads to insanity. In 1933 Gueche once more called attention to the dangers of cannabism from the point of view of mental health. Brotteaux approved restrictive measures, as cannabis, after a period of euphoria, generally leads those who abuse its use to insanity and death. Dr. Gueche stressed the dangers to the mental health of the Arabs in the use of hashish. He notes that chronic intoxication leads at length to insanity, monomaniac form, with hallucinations. Meunier has dedicated an entire chapter in his study of hashish to "hashish insanity." Dr. Henri Bouquet in his thesis, "The Insane of Tunis," points out the important role played by intoxication due to Indian Hemp as a factor "in the greater part of mental disorders" observed in the Mussulmen of the Regency.

The Indian Hemp Drugs Commission (1894) found that excessive use of this drug causes injury, tends to weaken the constitution and to render the consumer more susceptible to disease. In specially marked neurotic cases, even the moderate use may produce mental injury. Excessive use indicates and intensifies mental instability and may certainly be accepted as very injurious. It tends to weaken the mind. It may even lead to insanity. It appears that the excessive use of hemp drugs may, especially in cases where

there is any weakness or hereditary predisposition, induce insanity. Excessive consumption, on the other hand, indicates and intensifies moral weakness or depravity. Manifest excess leads directly to loss of self-respect, and thus to moral degradation.

All of the forty-eight states have legislation controlling Marihuana. Since October 1, 1937, when the Marihuana Tax Act of 1937 came into effect, the Federal Government, in cooperation with local and state enforcement officers, has arrested a number of traffickers and seized large quantities of the drug.

Judge J. Foster Symes, Denver, Colorado, sentenced Sam Caldwell to four years in the penitentiary on October 8, 1937, for violation of the Marihuana Act. This was the first conviction in the United States under the new Federal Marihuana legislation. In sentencing Caldwell, the Judge said

"I consider Marihuana the worst of all narcotics -- far worse than the use of morphine or cocaine. Under its influence men become beasts just as was the case with Baca." (Baca, who was sentenced to eighteen months for possession of Marihuana, had been using the weed for six years. Under its influence he said he became a wild beast and two weeks previously tried to murder his wife, the mother of three children.) - "Marihuana destroys life itself. I have no sympathy with those who sell this weed. In future I will impose the heaviest penalties. The Government is going to enforce this new law to the letter."

We are receiving a large number of requests from police departments for a test to identify Marihuana. After considerable research we have evolved a test which is shown at the end of this article and which, we hope, will be of use. If any difficulty is encountered by the police department chemists in identifying Marihuana we shall, upon receipt of a telegram, be pleased to send a chemist to cooperate.

COOPERATION

The essence of success in police work lies not only in expert investigation but also in cooperation. Hardly a day passes that we do not receive information from the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Department of Justice, and make use of its identification service and also of its excellent scientific work. I am glad to have this opportunity to express to its Director the appreciation of the Bureau of Narcotics for this valuable cooperation.

MODIFIED BEAM TEST FOR MARIHUANA

- 1. Place sufficient crushed sample, suspected of containing Marihuna, in a 5" test tube and add ten cc. of pure ethyl acetate. The amount of suspected Marihuana employed should be approximately equivalent to the filling of two cigarettes. Shake the tube vigorously to extract the resin.
 - 2. Filter, collecting the filtrate in a second test tube.
- 3. To the filtrate add 0.5 to 1.0 gram of powdered "Norite" or "Darco" (activated carbon). Shake and bring to boiling on a steam bath.
- 4. Filter through paper sufficiently dense to retain all the carbon. The filtrate should be colorless, or nearly so. If it is yellow or green refilter through same carbon. If this is not sufficient to decolorize add an additional 0.25 gram of carbon. Shake, bring to boiling again and filter.
- 5. Divide this filtrate into two portions and evaporate separately in white dishes.
- 6. To one add two drops of a 2% solution of potassium hydroxide in 95% alcohol. A purple color, which may develop slowly, indicates the presence of Marihuana.
- 7. To the second residue add a few drops of a saturated solution of hydrogen chloride in absolute alcohol. A red color confirms the presence of Marihuana.
 - 8. Blanks should be run on reagents and on known control sample.

Frank O. Osmond had been fingerprinted four times while he lived. He had never committed a serious felony, according to the existing record in the files of the Identification Division of the FBI, having been taken into custody on four occasions on charges of investigation. As recently as January 21, 1937, he had been fingerprinted by the Police Department at Dodge City, Kansas, for investigation and released. At that time he stated that his residence was Eagleville, Missouri, and his nearest relative was a brother, Charles L. Osmond, who resided in Eagleville, Missouri. In addition to this occasion, the Bureau's files reflect that he was fingerprinted by the Sheriff's Office at David City, Nebraska; the Police Department at Morrill, Kansas; and the Sheriff's Office at Lincoln, Nebraska.

During November, 1937, an unknown deceased individual was found by the side of Highway #71. The Sheriff's Office at Kansas City, Missouri, made a futile attempt to effect an identification of this individual in the vicinity where he met his death. No information could be obtained and his finger impressions were transmitted to the Federal Bureau of Investigation. On November 24, 1937, this unknown deceased individual was identified as Frank O. Osmond, and all available data were transmitted to the Sheriff's Office at Kansas City, Missouri, in an effort to assist that agency in this hitherto perplexing case.

"FIGHTING CRIME IN CANADA"

Major General Sir James H. MacBrien, K.C.B., C.M.G., D.S.O., Royal Canadian Mounted Police

The organization presently existing in Canada for the purpose of maintaining law and order will be briefly described.

FEDERAL

Ministry of Justice. The Minister of Justice is also Attorney General of Canada and Minister in control of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. He is responsible for the enforcement of all Federal Statutes throughout Canada, with the exception of the Yukon and Northwest Territories where he is responsible only for the enforcement of the Criminal Code of Canada. He is not responsible for the Criminal Code in the Provinces, but he is responsible for all amendments thereto.

The Royal Canadian Mounted Police Force is the National Police Force of Canada and is charged, under the Minister of Justice, with the enforcement of practically all Federal Statutes, except the Criminal Code in the Provinces. Therefore, its jurisdiction extends throughout Canada. The R.C.M. Police Act also gives authority for the Mounted Police to enforce the Criminal Code, Provincial Statutes and Municipal By-laws in the Provinces, when agreements have been reached between the Dominion and Provincial Governments.

The organization existing in each Province for Maintaining law and order consists of:-

- (a) The Attorney General, which Minister is responsible for the enforcement of the Criminal Code of Canada in his Province, as well as all Provincial Statutes.
- (b) Provincial and Municipal Police Forces. In six of the nine Provinces the Royal Canadian Mounted Police does the Provincial Police work and enforces the Criminal Code and Provincial Statutes in accordance with the instructions received from the various Attorneys General and in accordance with agreements made between the Dominion and Provincial Governments. The other three Provinces have their own Provincial Police Forces. Cities and Municipalities have their own Police Forces.

THE PROCEDURE AND MACHINERY PROVIDED
FOR TRIAL OF PERSONS CHARGED WITH OFFENSES

Broadly speaking, offenses are classified into indictable and non-indictable groups.

An indictable offense, which is usually a serious crime, is tried by a Judge of the Surpreme Court, with or without a jury of twelve or, in some instances, six persons. In order to speed up the wheels of justice, persons charged with the majority of such offenses have the option of being tried before a County Court Judge sitting without a jury in what is known as "speedy trials of indictable offenses." To further accelerate the course of justice, a large number of indictable offenses are tried, with the consent of the person charged, summarily before a Magistrate, thereby saving both time and expense. All cases must pass through a Lower Court for preliminary review before they are dealt with by a Higher Court. This method, which closely follows the system in Great Britain, is very satisfactory and would be difficult to improve upon.

Supreme Courts do not sit permanently in Canada, but at stated intervals; and it will be readily seen that if the above described methods were not in vogue, the dockets of the Supreme Court would quickly become cluttered up and long delays would occur in finally disposing of cases.

Non-indictable offenses, which are less serious cases against our laws, are disposed of before Lower Courts composed of either one or two Justices of the Peace, or a Magistrate, as the particular Section under which the offense falls, sets forth.

The Royal Canadian Mounted Police Force is made up of a carefully selected and trained personnel. Recruits are trained in the main Training Depot at Regina and given a sound education in the ground work of police investigation by means of courses, lectures and practical instruction. Later, they are distributed to different Divisions and eventually placed on detachments, in the first instance, with more experienced members of the Force to instruct them. All have been taught to bear in mind that the primary duty of a Police Officer is the prevention, rather than the detection of crime.

The standard of discipline is high, as is also the standard of education. Owing to the very large number of applicants each year, we are able to pick and choose the best available material.

The Royal Canadian Mounted Police has endeavoured to keep abreast with improved scientific methods of criminal investigation as a corollary to patient and efficient performance of work by every policeman on Detachment. The great majority of criminal investigations are completed as a result of careful and painstaking and common sense investigation, which does not necessitate utilizing the services of experts in particular lines. When the services of experts are found necessary, the Mounted Police uses its scientific bureaus at Regina and Ottawa and, if necessary, calls upon the services of civilian experts in various parts of Canada, in order to bring such cases to a successful conclusion. The bureaus at Regina and Ottawa are being completely equipped with scientific apparati of the latest pattern. These scientific bureaus are used for instructional, as well as practical work.

The Mounted Police operates the Canadian Criminal Identification Bureau at Ottawa. This Bureau receives fingerprints from all Police Forces of Canada, as well as all criminal records, and consequently is able to quickly disseminate information regarding criminals.

For Mounted Police purposes, the country is divided into four-teen Divisions corresponding, for the most part, with the provincial boundaries. The Divisions are divided into Sub-Divisions, and Sub-Divisions into Detachment areas, thereby ensuring that every part of the district is thoroughly policed. Close contact is kept at all times between Detachment, Sub-Divisions and Divisions by means of reports, telephone, telegraph and wireless. This system cannot be improved upon, especially for sparsely settled countries such as Canada, and was originally founded upon the system used by the Royal Irish Constabulary.

The Force operates a patrol system by motor car, motorcycle, by water and air transport, and by dog team in the Northern areas. The system of patrolling enables members stationed in all parts of the country to keep in close contact even with comparatively isolated settlers, and it is the considered opinion, as a result of experience, that this patrol system has a very great preventive value.

A system of inspection is constantly carried on to ensure that the personnel are always alert, and that their multifarious duties are promptly performed. These inspections are carried out by Patrol Sergeants, Sub-Division and Divisional Officers.

All promotions in the Force are made as the result of experience, instruction and examination, thereby ensuring the constant flow of well trained personnel available for promotion. All promotions to commissions are from the ranks.

The Force is not an exclusively mounted one, as there are only about two hundred and twenty-five horses in the Mounted Division, which are used as a reserve and for mounted patrols in districts where they are still useful. We have about four hundred and fifty sleigh dogs, which are used chiefly for transportation purposes in the remote parts of Northern Canada. We also possess a number of trained police dogs, which are giving increased valuable service in connection with the detection of crime and in finding lost persons. The total strength of the Force is now approximately 3,000, which includes an authorized Reserve of three hundred men, and civilians employed by the Force. Within these numbers there are two hundred and thirty-five sailors who operate the vessels belonging to the Marine Section.

The question of transportation is an important one for the Mounted Police, due to the wide area to be policed and traversed. To solve this important problem we are using all the improved methods of transportation and communication. The Force possesses a large number of modern vessels, varying in size from canoes and speedy motor boats up to those with oceangoing qualities. In order to keep our various units in touch with each other, aircraft and wireless are used. These are especially valuable with the land, sea and air units, in the prevention of smuggling. The Royal Canadian Mounted Police owns and operates a fleet of modern twin-engined aeroplanes, which perform valuable services in connection with the spotting and identification of smugglers and rum runners. Motor transportation by road is, of course, used to an enormous extent. Practically every Detachment, except those in the Far North, has at least one automobile. The motor patrols cover between three and four million miles each year. Sleigh dogs do an average of fifty thousand miles each year on Northern patrols. The Marine Section, which is engaged primarily in the prevention of smuggling, also performs a Coast Guard service, giving assistance to an average of seventy-five vessels a year.

The prevention of smuggling constitutes, perhaps, the most interesting work, and in this service the sea, land and air units are employed in cooperation to defeat traffickers in opium and smugglers of alcohol.

An incessant warfare is kept up against the illicit traffic of narcotic drugs and against the smugglers of liquor. Coupled with this is our effort to stamp out the illicit distillation of spirits.

In fighting crime, we in Canada have certain points in our favour as compared with the United States. We have only one Criminal Code for the whole of Canada, whereas in the United States each State has its own Code. This makes our task much simpler as far as criminal work is concerned. The Royal Canadian Mounted Police has a Canadian-wide jurisdiction and is not hampered or confined by provincial boundaries. And furthermore there is no such thing as extradition between Province and Province as exists between State and State in the United States. In Canada, Judges of both the Supreme Court and County Courts, as also Magistrates and Justices of the Peace, are not elective, as is the practice in the United States. Judges are appointed for life, and so become independent of politics. It will be readily seen that this system is of great advantage to all law enforcement bodies in Canada. The degree of success attained in the past, and which we hope to continue to attain in the future, is largely attributable to the Canadian system of appointing Judges and Magistrates.

In considering the time taken to bring criminals to justice, this system would appear to lend itself to much speedier administration.

The system of fighting crime in Canada, of maintaining law and order, is an effective one. Doubtless it can be improved upon, but few countries in the world enjoy better enforcement of their laws. In few countries do the citizens enjoy a greater personal safety than in Canada. Few countries enjoy as much internal peace as do the citizens of Canada.

An important feature in police work in Canada is the cordial cooperation existing between such Police Forces. The problem of cooperation with us is much assisted by the fact that the Police Forces are few in number compared with other countries. It is an axiom that the fewer the Police Forces, the less likely there is to be friction, and the better the cooperation is likely to be. There is a ready and cordial interchange of information between the existing Forces in Canada.

Cooperation between the Police Forces is not alone sufficient to ensure the best results. Therefore, it is our policy to cooperate wholeheartedly with the Police Forces of the United States. Very close cooperation is maintained with the Federal Bureau of Investigation at Washington, with the United States Coast Guard Service, as well as with the State Police Forces contacted along the Frontier. This cooperation between the United States and Canada has been most cordial and effective, and has been of great assistance. Frequent interchange of visits enables us to plan the necessary cooperation, and also helps pick up good ideas for incorporation into our training and work. Nowadays, cooperation between adjacent countries is not alone sufficient. I must therefore refer to an organization known as the "International World Police" organized by Mr. Barron Collier of New York, which has been functioning since 1922. This organization has two main objectives, which you will agree are most important: First, the promotion of international friendship and understanding through the interchange of visits by the Police Chiefs of the world; secondly, improvement of international cooperation in fighting crime through studying police problems of an international character.

A conference of the International World Police was held recently, with meetings in Montreal, Washington and New York. Seven delegates came from Europe, the remainder from the United States and Canada. A considerable measure of success has been achieved by the International World Police already, and very great possibilities exist for further advances in international cooperation in such matters as the breaking up of the narcotic drug rings, white slave traffic and smuggling of all descriptions, as well as an exchange of information concerning the international criminals and deportees. Information concerning international criminals, such as photographs, fingerprints and modus operandi should be exchanged promptly between all countries concerned, by systems and codes arranged beforehand. At the recent Conference, it was pointed out by Chief W. J. Quinn of San Francisco that a large percentage of crimes are due to narcotics, their use and traffic, and he stated that "if the international drug rings can be broken, that alone would justify the International World Police." Chief Quinn also stated "narcotics and crime go hand in hand - if you can throttle the one, you will reduce the other." May all countries give the International World Police their support.

FBI NATIONAL POLICE ACADEMY Seventh Session

On January 10, 1938, thirty-six law enforcement agencies had representatives in attendance at the seventh session of the FBI National Police Academy, which opened on that date. With the opening of the seventh session there was inaugurated a new policy of accepting one representative from a foreign national police agency and, based upon an application filed for that purpose with the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the Royal Canadian Mounted Police has the distinction of being the first national police agency of a foreign government to be represented in the Academy. Applications have already been received from a number of other foreign countries, and these applications will receive consideration in the order in which they were filed with the FBI.

The law enforcement organizations represented in the seventh session of the FBI National Police Academy are as follows:

The selection of the above-named law enforcement organizations to be represented in this session of the Academy was based upon written communications sent to the FBI by the heads of the law enforcement agencies in question, advising that they desired to designate one of their representatives to take this course of training. They further stipulated that the officers selected as their representatives would, upon completion of the twelve weeks' course of training in Washington, return to their own departments and give the benefit of their training and experience to the other members of their respective organizations, thereby assuring the inauguration of thirty-six courses of training in these various police departments, with the officers selected being placed in charge of the training schools or at least given an opportunity to teach in schools which have already been organized in these departments.


Included in the course of training are numerous subjects which fall within the following general classifications of instruction: Scientific and technical usages; statistics, records, and report writing; firearms training and first aid; investigations, enforcement, and regulatory procedure; tests and practical experience; administration and organization of police agencies; and special instruction in the methods of organizing police training schools and instructing law enforcement officials.

There is no cost for the training or for the equipment used in connection with this course of study; the only expense, which is usually borne by the departments represented, is for transportation to Washington and return, and living expenses while in Washington. Three sessions of the FBI National Police Academy are held each year, usually beginning in January, what was a september, and the only requirement for a police agency to have a representative take this course of training is that the administrative head of such agency communicate with the Federal Bureau of Investigation, informing that he desires to send a representative. In the order in which such communications, which are treated as applications, are received they will be given consideration by the FBI, and invitations extended for the various departments to be represented in the Academy.

The assistance of the FBI was sought by officers of Basin, Wyoming in connection with their investigation of a forgery case. A check for \$484.50 was cashed by a person affixing the signature "J. A. Black." A photographic copy of the instrument, together with a letter known to have been written by a suspect, Sherwood Strauser, was submitted to the FBI laboratory for handwriting comparison. As a result of the examination the contributor was notified that the forged check and the known standards had both been written by the same person. Information has been received that the subject pled guilty and was sentenced to serve from five to seven years in the state penitentiary.

A OUESTIONABLE PATTERN

The finger impression reproduced below is another example of an arch type pattern which, under the definition employed by the Bureau's Identification Division, is classified as a tented arch.



Inspection of this print shows that while most of the ridges flow from one side of the impression to the other in an arch-like formation, nevertheless, ridge "A" tends to thrust upward and strikes into the arching ridge "B" in such a manner as to form an angle. For this reason it is classified as a tented arch. It is necessary, however, in cases of this type to conduct reference searches into the plain arch group.

For a complete discussion of the differentiation made between plain and tented arches, attention is invited to the relevant section on pages 11 to 17 of the pamphlet entitled "Classification of Fingerprints" which is issued by the Bureau to all law enforcement agencies upon request.

THE TECHNICAL LABORATORY of the FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION

The future in law enforcement lies in scientific crime detection. Aware of this fact, the Federal Bureau of Investigation established the Technical Laboratory in 1932 to further the advancement in this field of law enforcement.

From a small laboratory in the days of its beginning it has grown to include fifty experts who are daily engaged in solving crimes which often heretofore remained a mystery. The growth is further seen in the 250,841 examinations which were made in the laboratory during the last fiscal year.

The facilities of this laboratory are extended to all regularly constituted law enforcement organizations in the United States. Any evidence obtained in connection with a criminal investigation conducted by a duly authorized law enforcement agency having the proper investigative jurisdiction of the crime involved, will be received at the Bureau and examined in its Technical Laboratory when accompanied by a specific request for such examination from the police organization so submitting it. Information concerning the name of the case including the names of victims and suspects involved, must at all times accompany such requests for examinations and it is also desired that any basic facts describing the crime which may be pertinent to the laboratory examination be also forwarded. In the event the results of such examination have prosecutive value, the Bureau, upon request from the law enforcement agency concerned, will endeavor to provide the services of the examining expert to give testimony in the state courts, provided no other expert is being employed on the same subject matter by the prosecution. There is no expense to the state for the appearance of the witness in such instances. The examination of evidence is also made in the laboratory for other Federal agencies.

This laboratory is equipped to make examinations in the firearms identification branch of ballistics; miscellaneous chemical blood tests; reproductions in plaster or moulage; micro-analyses, including the examination and comparison of hairs, textile specimens, dust samples, and the like.

In addition to the above, the laboratory engages in research activities, and maintains collections of standards for comparison with specimens, the nature of which may be identified by this method. Examples of this are the large collection of tire tread designs, typewriting standards, handwriting specimens, the index of watermarks, and the standards of ammunition which have been assembled at Washington.

Beginning with this issue of the FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin, there is to be a series of articles on the Technical Laboratory giving suggestions as to the best methods to use in forwarding evidence to the Laboratory for examination. It is of vital importance to adequately prepare the material for forwarding, and as an aid to those law enforcement organizations who wish to submit evidence for examination, these articles are prepared.

FRAUDULENT AND FORGED CHECK EXAMINATIONS

The assistance of the Technical Laboratory of the Federal Bureau of Investigation is frequently sought by law enforcement agencies in connection with fraudulent and forged check cases. In view of the ever increasing number of such requests received, and in order to facilitate the handling of these requests through the submission of complete information concerning the examination desired and proper specimens for comparison, several suggestions are set forth to aid law enforcement agencies in submitting fraudulent and forged check cases to the Bureau.

Whenever possible the original fraudulent check should be transmitted to the laboratory for examination. If the check is a traced or simulated forgery it is desirable to examine the original document because the line quality, retouching, pen lifts, et cetera, usually cannot be determined from ordinary photographic and photostatic copies. These characteristics can best be determined by examining the original document with a binocular microscope and transmitted light, together with other facilities available in the Technical Laboratory. If the question of forgery is not involved, handwriting comparisons may be made from photographic or photostatic copies, however, the original document is desired so that if necessary special photographs can be made in the Laboratory. Photographic and photostatic copies of checks for comparative purposes should be the same size as the original document. In making photographic or photostatic copies a scale or rule should be placed on the side of the check so that when photographed, it becomes a part of the photograph. If it becomes necessary to prepare photographic enlargements, the degree of enlargement can be readily determined from the increase in size of the original scale.

From the standpoint of the laboratory examination, check cases are divided into two classes, (1) fraudulent or bogus checks and (2) forged checks. A fraudulent or bogus check is entirely spurious, the names used for the signature and endorsement are fictitious or the endorsement may be the name of the check passer. The check form may be counterfeit and the bank on which the check is drawn may not exist. Checks of this type require a comparison of known handwriting of the suspect with the handwriting on the checks in order to determine the identity of the writer.

A forged check is drawn against the account of a known individual and on a known bank. The known individual's name has been written on the check as a signature or endorsement by some other individual. The signature or endorsement may be a simulated copy or a traced copy of a genuine signature. In examinations of forged checks two comparisons are necessary, (1) a comparison of genuine signatures of the person whose name is suspected of being forged with the signature or endorsement on the check to determine whether these have been forged and (2) the comparison of known handwriting of the suspect with the signature of endorsement on the check to determine whether the suspect forged the check. It is noted that handwriting specimens of both the person on whom the check is forged and the suspect are required for an examination where the question of forgery is involved.

Many checks have been received in the laboratory with the request that it be determined if a certain suspect forged the checks. In reality the checks were fraudulent or fictitious and there was no question of forgery. In such cases it is necessary to request the contributor to submit known handwriting specimens of the payer if this person is not fictitious. Other checks have been received in which there was a question of forgery but only the handwriting of the suspects was submitted for comparison and it was necessary to procure handwriting specimens of the persons whose names were signed to the checks before an opinion could be given.

Known handwriting specimens for comparison with questioned checks are very important and occasionally fatal errors are made in securing such specimens. One of the most common errors is to show the check to the suspect and request him to make a copy from the original check. Handwriting specimens secured in this manner are of very little value for comparison because the suspect copies writing which may or may not be his and of course the copy will resemble the writing on the original document. Handwriting specimens made by copying the original document are of no value for trial purposes. The suspect should never be permitted to see a check which he is suspected of writing. This precaution is taken so that the request specimens will be made cut in the habitual manner used by the suspect and the writing characteristics will be his individual characteristics and not those of some other person.

For check comparisons, request specimens should be written on blank checks similar in size and form to the fraudulent check and should be written with the same medium as the questioned check, that is pen or pencil. The wording, signature and endorsement on the check in question should be dictated to the suspect and each specimen should be removed from his sight as soon as completed. A large number of specimen checks are preferred in order to eliminate disguise in the writing. It is possible for some suspects to write several checks with an assumed disguise but this disguise is gradually lost as additional specimens are prepared. A few signatures written on separate pieces of paper are far more valuable for comparison than several signatures written on one piece of paper because in most instances the writer disguises the first signature and makes the other signatures resemble the first signature written. By obtaining one signature on each piece of paper the writer soon forgets the disguise used in the initial signature and eventually writes normally. Request specimens for comparison with endorsements are more suitable for comparison when prepared on the backs of blank checks with one name on each blank. Extreme care must be exercised in taking the known handwriting specimens.

The letter requesting an examination should state clearly the examination desired particularly as to whether the signature, the endorsement or the handwriting on the entire check is to be compared with the known handwriting submitted. It is essential that a statement be included as to whether the check is purported to be that of a known individual, i.e., whether the question involved may be forgery (simulation by one person, the writing of another). It is advisable to state the manner in which the request handwriting specimens were secured. Care must be taken in properly labeling and

identifying the evidence submitted and it is preferable to have this evidence listed in the letter of transmittal.

The facilities of the Technical Laboratory are available to all public law enforcement agencies and the FBI is desirous of cooperating with the law enforcement officials in the solution of their criminal cases. In many instances Bureau examiners have testified in State cases thus affording assistance to the local law enforcement agencies.

JACOB "GURRAH" SHAPIRO LOUIS "LEPKE" BUCHALTER

Jacob "Gurrah" Shapiro and Louis "Lepke" Buchalter, fugitives from justice wanted by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, United States Department of Justice, are two of the most notorious criminals in this country. For years they have operated in New York City and vicinity, and they have

criminal records dating back to 1915 and 1916. Starting as minor hoodlums they arose in prominence in the underworld until they were the boss racketeers of New York City, controlled their own organization of strong-arm men and gunmen, which was believed to number from two to five hundred, and collected millions of dollars from the legitimate businessmen of the city. They had a long list of acquaintances and a wide range of connections in the criminal underworld, and were spoken of as New York contacts for members of the Barker-Karpis gang, the kidnapers of Edward George Bremer, and for Verne Miller and his associates. Miller, who was killed in a gangland feud, together with Charles "Pretty Boy" Floyd and Adam Richetti, perpetrated the Kansas City Massacre. "Lepke" and "Gurrah" are also believed to have been interested in the operation of dog tracks and slot machines throughout the country. Their main sources of revenue, however, were the so-called rackets operated in New York City which, under their management, threatened to become a permanent parasite on industry.

Jacob Shapiro alias "Gurrah" was born in Russia about 1895. is married and has three children. He was first arrested on August 21, 1915, in New York City, on a charge of burglary, and was received at the Elmira Reformatory, Elmira, New York, on October 14, 1915, to serve a five-year sentence. He was paroled from that institution on August 19, 1917. He was next arrested on March 26, 1918, for the crime of grand larceny, and was received at Sing Sing Prison on April 5, 1918, to serve a sentence of one year and two months. Under the alias of Samuel Dishouse he was arrested on June 26, 1919, and on a charge of assault was given an indeterminate sentence. served this sentence in the New York County Penitentiary, being paroled March 5, 1920. From October 30, 1922, until October 3, 1923, Shapiro was incarcerated in Sing Sing Prison, serving a one year sentence for possession of a gun. Subsequent to this sentence and prior to his arrest on November 1, 1933, for violation of the Antitrust laws, he was arrested in New York City on thirteen occasions for offenses such as assault, grand larceny, robbery, extortion, and homicide, and was discharged on each occasion. Shapiro acquired the alias "Gurrah" while still a small-time criminal in Brooklyn. It is said to be the nearest phonetic equivalent of his pronunciation of the phrase "get out of here," which is his favorite expression.

Louis Buchalter alias "Lepke" was born in New York City on February 12, 1897. He is married and has one son, eighteen years old. He was first arrested in Bridgeport, Connecticut, on February 29, 1916, and, on a charge of theft, received an indeterminate sentence in the State Reformatory at Cheshire, Connecticut. He was released on parole from that institution on July 12, 1917, absconded on July 23, 1917, and a warrant which was issued was never executed. On September 28, 1917, on a charge of grand larceny, he received a sentence of a year and a half which he served in Sing Sing Prison, Auburn Prison, and Great Meadow Prison, being discharged from the latter on January 27, 1919. He returned to Sing Sing on June 21, 1920, to serve a two and a half year sentence for attempted burglary, and was released on parole on March 16, 1922. From that date until November 21, 1933, when he was arrested for violation of the Antitrust laws, Buchalter was arrested on eleven other occasions, for such offenses as assault, robbery, burglary, and nomicide, but each time the charges were dismissed. His alias "Lepke" is apparently a corruption of the Jewish equivalent of the name "Louis."

"Gurrah" and "Lepke" operated in the fur dressing, garment, flour. and trucking industries and specialized in strike breaking and labor union coercion. Although they collected tribute from numerous types of businesses in New York City, their modus operandi in the fur dressing industry is typical of the operation of all their rackets. The fur dyeing and dressing industries, which center around New York City and neighboring municipalities, do a business of approximately eighty-five million dollars annually. first step taken in the campaign to seize control of this industry was the organization of protective associations, namely, the Fur Dressers Factor Corporation and the Protective Fur Dressers Corporation. These associations were ostensibly controlled by leading businessmen in the industry, but the real power and control rested in the hands of a president and a group of officers who received their instructions from "Gurrah" and "Lepke." The various individuals, firms, and groups engaged in the industry were compelled to become members and pay unreasonable and excessive dues, initiation fees, assessments, and other charges, and were compelled to refrain from entering into and continuing to conduct business except on terms and conditions dictated by the protective associations. Memberships in the associations were limited to a certain number of establishments, and efforts were made to eliminate all others from the field. Individual members were not allowed to do their own billing. All bills and checks in payment were required to clear through the associations, and in all instances commissions were charged the members for this service. Memberships were first solicited by "peaceful methods" and, if these failed, then by violence. The "peaceful methods" consisted of a visit to the office of the firm being solicited, by one or more so-called gorillas in the employ of the associations. If the desired membership was not immediately forthcoming, the officers of the firm were informed that they would not be allowed to continue in business. Anonymous warnings by telephone were given the customers of the recalcitrant firm, and in many instances stench bombs and acid were used. Efforts were made to intimidate the firm's employees and, as a last resort, places of business and homes were dynamited. Officials of firms which refused to join the associations, and customers of such organizations, who continued to deal with them in spite of warnings, were assaulted by gangsters with lead pipes and blackjacks. During the reign of terror which existed in the fur industry after the formation of the Fur Dressers Factor Corporation and the Protective Fur Dressers Corporation, "Lepke" and "Gurrah' remained in the background. Their names did not appear on any of the books or records of the associations, but it was common knowledge throughout the industry that they furnished strong-arm men and received the "lion's share" of the spoils. Their reputation in New York City was such that the mere mention of their names generally produced the desired results.

As a result of an investigation conducted by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, United States Department of Justice, the Federal Grand Jury for the Southern District of New York, on November 6, 1933, returned three indictments against one hundred and fifty-eight defendants, including Shapiro and Buchalter. The indictments charged, generally, interference with interstate commerce. Shapiro was tried in Federal Court in the Southern District of New York on the indictment based on the activities of the Protective Fur Dressers Corporation. He was found guilty on November 8, 1936, and on November 12, 1936, was sentenced to a total of two years and fined \$10,000. This

conviction and sentence were appealed, and Shapiro was released on bond pending his appeal. On March 8, 1937, the conviction was affirmed, and on June 4, 1937, Shapiro failed to appear to start serving his sentence. A bench warrant was issued for his arrest. Buchalter was also convicted with Shapiro on November 8, 1936, but the conviction was reversed by the United States Circuit Court of Appeals.

Both Shapiro and Buchalter were to stand trial on July 6, 1937, on the indictment predicated on the activities of the Fur Dressers Factor Corporation. When they failed to appear, their bail in the amount of \$3,000 each was ordered forfeited.

On November 8, 1937, the Honorable Homer S. Cummings, Attorney General of the United States, authorized rewards of \$2,500 each for information furnished to the Federal Bureau of Investigation which would result in the apprehension of Jacob Shapiro and Louis Buchalter.

SPECIAL ANNOUNCEMENT

In order to simplify the handling and recording of dispositions received by the Federal Bureau of Investigation from its contributors the Bureau has adopted a new individual disposition sheet.

In the past, several dispositions usually were submitted by law enforcement officials and agencies to the Bureau on one sheet. The individual disposition sheet will be a departure from this practice. A sample of the new single disposition sheet appears hereafter, and the entries appearing thereon are self-explanatory. It will be noted that this form has been prepared so that the dispositions on individual subjects are to be recorded separately on each sheet submitted.

The FBI will be glad to furnish any of its contributors with an appropriate number of these new disposition sheets. In receiving dispositions the Bureau is particularly anxious to secure the FBI number in each case where the same is available, as the utilization of this number will expedite the recording of dispositions in its files.

The cooperation of law enforcement agencies in the utilization of this new individual disposition sheet when reporting dispositions to the FBI will be appreciated, inasmuch as it will permit the Identification Division to handle the current volume of work more expeditiously.

MURDERER WHO KILLED SLEEPING GIRL IDENTIFIED BY FINGERPRINTS

When Henry Choate, with aliases, a negro, was thirteen years of age he was sentenced to the Pikeville Reform School at Pikeville, Tennessee, to serve a sentence of one year for attempted manslaughter. The criminal career of this individual had its inception with this serious offense. July 24, 1935, the fingerprint card of this individual was forwarded to the FBI for search when he had been arrested by the Constable at Columbia, Tennessee, on gambling charges. Less than five months later, namely, on December 10, 1935, Choate was received at the State Penitentiary at Nashville, Tennessee, to serve a sentence of one year for petty larceny. After serving this latter sentence no further data were received concerning this individual until September 3, 1937, when a communication was received from the Constable at Columbia, Tennessee, advising the Federal Bureau of Investigation that he was desirous of securing the custody of Henry Choate, with aliases, for the crime of first degree murder. This negro now using the alias Henry Shoate, according to information received from Columbia, Tennessee, had murdered a young girl named Helen Thompson, while she slept.

Upon the receipt of this information in the Identification Division of the Bureau a wanted notice was posted in the files providing that upon receipt of any information concerning the whereabouts of this individual this law enforcement official be immediately notified. The fugitive status of this wanted murderer was published in the FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin for the month of November, 1937.

The Southern Railway Police Department on November 11, 1937, at Chattanooga, Tennessee, took into custody on larceny charges an individual who informed that his name was James Price. This individual, a negro, informed the arresting officials that his residence was 122 Wheeler Street, Louisville, Kentucky. He denied the existence of a prior criminal record. The fingerprint card of this individual, arrested by the Southern Railway Police Department, was received in the Federal Bureau of Investigation on November 15, 1937, and upon search in the technical files of the Identification Division it was ascertained that Price was none other than Henry Choate, with aliases, who was wanted in Columbia, Tennessee, for murder.

When this identification was effected at the FBI a wire was immediately transmitted to the Constable at Columbia, Tennessee, informing him of the present whereabouts of this negro wanted by him for murder. On November 19, 1937, information was received at the Federal Bureau of Investigation from the Constable at Columbia, Tennessee, informing that this murderer had been returned to his custody and had thereafter been sentenced to life imprisonment in the Tennessee State Penitentiary. On November 26, 1937, a finger-print card was received from the Tennessee State Penitentiary at Nashville, Tennessee, advising the Federal Bureau of Investigation that on November 22, 1937, Henry Choate had been received at that institution to serve a life sentence. Choate's utilization of the name of James Price was ineffective in defeating identification and when the identification was made the FBI was able to assist in causing this murderer to pay the debt he justly owed to society for his crime.





RECIDIVIST IDENTIFIED BY FINGERPRINTS AFTER NEW YORK CITY ARREST FOR "PAYROLL SNATCH"

Patsy Louis Romano, alias Pasquale Romano, alias "Pat," embarked upon a criminal career when he was but fifteen years of age. On May 19, 1925, Romano was first arrested at Schenectady, New York, as a juvenile delinquent. This arrest in Schenectady was followed by nine other arrests in this same city for various offenses such as disorderly conduct, creating a disturbance, vagrancy, petty larceny, and drunkenness. The last time that Romano was in the custody of the Police Department at Schenectady, New York, according to the records on file in the Bureau's Identification Division, was in January, 1937, when he was arrested by that department for the serious felony of first degree grand larceny.

On August 21, 1937, information was received in the FBI from the Police Department at Schenectady, New York, that Romano was wanted by that department for rape and second degree assault, which offenses were committed, on August 15, 1937. A wanted notice was immediately posted in the Bureau's files and in a further effort to assist in the apprehension of this fugitive, a notation of his fugitive status was published in the FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin for the month of October, 1937.

On September 24, 1937, in the vicinity of 541 Broadway, New York City, a "payroll snatch" occurred. The payroll which was stolen amounted to \$289.00. The New York City Police Department took into custody one Pasquale Delano, alias "Pat," for this larceny, and on October 11, 1937, there were received in the Identification Division of the FBI from the New York City Police Department the finger impressions of this individual.

When these fingerprints were searched in the files of the Identification Division, it was ascertained that Pasquale Delano, alias "Pat," was identical with Patsy Louis Romano, for whom a wanted notice had been posted in the files of the Identification Division. When it was ascertained that Delano was in reality Patsy Louis Romano a telegram was dispatched on the same day the fingerprint card was received from the New York City Police Department to the Chief of Police at Schenectady, informing that official of the present whereabouts of the individual wanted by him for rape and second degree assault.

After this telegram had been forwarded by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, a second fingerprint card was received in the Identification Division of the Bureau from the New York City Police Department on October 15, 1937, informing the FBI that Pasquale Delano, on the complaint of the Chief of Police at Schenectady, New York, was being held for the latter mentioned official on charges of rape. From the Police Department at Schenectady, New York, on October 18, 1937, was received the fingerprint card of Romano, informing the FBI that he was presently being held by the Sheriff of Schenectady, New York, to stand trial on charges of first degree rape. Because of this identification effected through fingerprints, Romano was returned to the Schenectady officials within two months of the time the FBI was informed that his apprehension was desired.
