The Federal Bureau of Investigation, United States Department of Justice, is charged with the duty of investigating violations of the laws of the United States and collecting evidence in cases in which the United States is or may be a party in interest.

The following list indicates some of the major violations over which the Bureau has investigative jurisdiction:-

National Motor Vehicle Theft Act

Interstate transportation of stolen property valued at \$5,000 or more National Bankruptcy Act

Interstate flight to avoid prosecution or testifying in certain cases White Slave Traffic Act

Impersonation of Government Officials

Larceny of Goods in Interstate Commerce

Killing or Assaulting Federal Officer

Cases involving transportation in interstate or foreign commerce of any persons who have been kidnaped

Extortion cases in which interstate commerce or interstate communication is an element

Theft, Embezzlement or Illegal Possession of Government Property Antitrust Laws

Robbery of National Banks and Member Banks of Federal Reserve System National Bank and Federal Reserve Act Violations, such as embezzlement, abstraction or misapplication of funds

Crimes on any kind of Government reservation, including Indian Reservations or in any Government building or other Government property Neutrality violations, including the shipment of arms to friendly nations Frauds against the Government

Crimes in connection with the Federal Penal and Correctional Institutions Perjury, embezzlement, or bribery in connection with Federal Statutes or officials

Crimes on the high seas

Federal Anti-Racketeering Statute

The location of persons who are fugitives from justice by reason of violations of the Federal Laws over which the Bureau has jurisdiction, of escaped Federal prisoners, and parole and probation violators.

The Bureau does not have investigative jurisdiction over the violations of Counterfeiting, Narcotic, Customs, Immigration, or Postal Laws.

Law enforcement officials possessing information concerning violations over which the Bureau has investigative jurisdiction are requested to promptly forward the same to the Special Agent in Charge of the nearest field division of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, United States Department of Justice. The address of each field division of this Bureau appears on the inside back cover of this bulletin. Government Rate Collect telegrams or telephone calls will be accepted if information indicates that immediate action is necessary.

We of the FBI welcome every opportunity to encourage a comprehensive and enthusiastic cooperation among those engaged in combating crime.

#### FINGERPRINTING OF FIRST OFFENDERS OR LOCAL CHARACTERS

The value of the fingerprint identification system and the various purposes served thereby are so well known to many law enforcement agencies that another important purpose which is effected by the fingerprint collection of the Federal Bureau of Investigation sometimes is overlooked. It is conceded that the fingerprint records are of great value to the arresting officials in that they disclose full information as to the identity of the person arrested and whether he is a fugitive; to the prosecutor in that they frequently afford him information of value in connection with the prosecution of his case in court; to the court itself in that through an examination of the existing criminal record the Judge is frequently enabled to pass more intelligently upon the criminal potentiality of the person to be sentenced, thus through the study of the criminal record affording him the opportunity to distinguish between the first offender and the recidivist and to sentence each in the light of his past activities, and to the parole or similar boards in connection with the consideration of any clemency which should be extended to the prisoner.

It is felt, however, that in many instances individual law enforcement agencies which are instrumental in securing the arrest of a person whose record is already known to those agencies or who is known to them as a person who has been a local character all of his life do not understand fully that such a record should be registered in the Bureau's Identification Division. Records which mark the beginning of a criminal career frequently are of great value in connection with the subsequent treatment of the person arrested. Similarly, records of activities in one city oftentimes are of material assistance in the determination of the proper method of handling the case of a person arrested at another point. It has been stated with propriety that the day of the local criminal is past. The need for a national reservoir of information has developed because of this fact. However, the records being forwarded to the Bureau's fingerprint collection can be made more fully available to all law enforcement agencies if the individual agencies in each instance where the law permits and where fingerprinting is considered to be necessary or desirable will realize that in transmitting a copy of the fingerprint card to Washington they are merely registering for the benefit of over 10,000 other agencies information of great potential value to all other interested police authorities. This is the essence of the cooperative work followed in the development of the identification activities of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. If all law enforcement officials will understand fully that their contributions to the fingerprint collection are but a portion of the nationally concerted purpose in order to make these records more complete, even more effective results can be obtained in the future.

# "THE VALUE OF A COMPLETE AND AN EXACT POST-MORTEM EXAMINATION IN THE SOLUTION OF CRIME"

The mandate of society to you as law enforcement officers is to enforce its established regulations for the protection of the lives, property rights and the pursuit of the happiness of its members. In a great democracy such as curs there arises the paradoxical situation of a contest between the forces of law and order, so set up, and the efforts of those whose energies are directed accidentally or purposely to circumvent, evade or violate the will of the majority of the citizens. While it is true that society in its zeal and eagerness to protect itself has, through its legislative bodies, set up so many laws that a great many of them are broken by a great number of people, still on the whole such violations are minor and inconsequential. In this trial and error policy, like the biological law of the "survival of the fittest," good laws continue and bad ones are repealed, while a watchful and competent judiciary constantly guides their interpretation and tempers them with the justice that is intended in the enactment. Serious crime has its birth in the attempt of a mentally competent or incompetent individual to stealthily, furtively, maliciously and wrongfully to acquire the necessities and luxuries of life legitimately produced, acquired and owned by another, whose impelling motive, like that of his enemy, is to live and procreate his type. There is to the professional criminal, no law except his own, no property rights except possession, and no right to live except by cunning, deceit, daring and brutal force. To gain his ends he may find it necessary to destroy life, which he does with no more hesitancy and feeling than is experienced by the average citizen who treads upon and crushes an earthworm crawling in his garden. As has been pointed out before, the right to live is God-given and society protects that right from the cradle to the grave, and in addition safeguards the tenets of religious liberty to secure it in the life to come. Society therefore seeks not only to control the external influences in nature about us, in this battle of survival, but also aims to regulate those devastating elements within its own ranks through study and measures pertaining to health during life, and the evaluation of cause or causes of death by the examination of the bodies after death. It is concerning the latter in general, and its relationship to the solution of crime in particular that I wish to briefly speak to you this morning.

I recently heard over the radio some distinguished savant, whose name I did not get, say of the medical profession "that it works from the morgue backward instead of from the cradle forward." This is a tricky, inaccurate statement, contrary to fact, and apparently a futile attempt to originate and convey a thought. The constantly decreasing rates of maternal and infant mortality speak for themselves. Likewise the decrease in deaths from diphtheria, scarlet fever, tuberculosis and many other diseases, the control of which has lead to the prolongation of life and the relief of human suffering, attest to the continued efforts of scientists, physicians and legally established agencies that are operative in an effort to lengthen

the span between the cradle and the grave. To be sure postmortems are necessary as a final inventory of the abnormalities of structure resulting from injury or disease as evidence of the failures in the struggle for existence. It is precisely these first-hand, accurate analyses of the human body after death that have resulted in a better understanding of the nature of ravaging diseases and have made possible the recognition, prevention and cure of many of them during life. Such examinations of dead bodies have resulted in accurate, vital statistics often not possible on the basis of conclusions formed during life because of the complexity of human structure and variations in its behaviour to its environment. In recognition of this, legislative bodies have from time to time promulgated laws and provided for the execution thereof, for the purpose of precisely determining the cause of death resulting from natural, unnatural, or violent means, particularly in instances of homicide, infanticide, suicide, criminal abortions and the like. In this country such authorities and duties are vesting in the constitutional office of the county coroner, with its various modifications in the several states, and also the medical examiner system in certain other states and counties. Whatever the system is, it is imperative (1) that the custody of such bodies requiring examination remain with the coroner or medical examiner until the examination is completed; (2) that there be no unnecessary manipulation, modification, distortion or injection of the body as a whole or any of its parts without the advice and consent of a competent medical examiner; (3) that the examination be promptly made; (4) that the examination be made by a competent pathologist, especially trained in the art of postmortem technic; (5) that the examination be complete and exact; (6) that an accurate record be compiled; (7) that an accurate conclusion be arrived at; (8) that proper material and other evidence be preserved for continuation of the examination, for toxicological investigations, and for the use of the courts in the administration of justice. These several provisions are important in the performance of an autopsy as an aid in the solution of crime.

- 1. THE CUSTODY OF THE BODY: -- The remarks I have to make here pertain particularly to instances of death referred to above, namely those that have occurred suddenly by unknown natural, or known or unknown unnatural means, or as the result of violence. It is my conviction that the law enforcing officer who is first to arrive on the scene of crime should immediately place a guard about such a body if it be dead, and that the coroner or medical examiner should be immediately notified and should then upon his arrival take charge of the situation. In a number of cities a so-called "homicide squad," consisting usually of a medical examiner or physician, a photographer, police officers and others trained in the art of preserving the evidence at the scene of the crime, is the first to be called. If alive, the individual is sent immediately to the hospital, if dead he is transferred to the morgue. It is true that there are often difficulties in determining the exact status. It is better to assume that life may still exist. At any rate the coroner or medical examiner should maintain contact with that body until the status is determined. It should under no condition be handled by private parties or relatives.
  - 2. PRESERVATION OF THE BODY: -- From the standpoint of the medi-

cal examiner whose study is concerned with an accurate determination of the effects of injury and disease, both grossly and microscopically, it is highly important, in the interest of final evaluation and interpretation, that the clothing be preserved (the body should not be undressed if possible), that wounds be not probed or enlarged, and that the body be not washed, injected or embalmed. The latter in particular may modify the evidence so as to lead to erroneous conclusions by the examiner, and also those who may later be consulted as experts. With this confusion the real facts may never be completely determined, there may result prolonged and repeated trials, and the eventual miscarriage of justice. This is especially true in instances of multiple, penetrating wounds, such as stab wounds or gunshot wounds, or also in cases of poisoning. The significance of this provision will be illustrated in the citation of particular instances that will be mentioned later.

- 3. PROMPTNESS OF THE POSTMORTEM EXAMINATION: -- The postmortem examination should be promptly made because changes in the physical conditions due to environment may progress so rapidly that the true nature of the injury or disease may be determined only with great difficulty and subject to inaccuracies. The character of wounds may change, stains and tell-tale bits of debris may become less evident and may be overlooked, or organs and tissue may so degenerate that disease processes that are contributory may be so obscured that conclusions cannot be made.
- 4. EXAMINATION BY COMPETENT PATHOLOGIST: -- The examination should be made by a competent pathologist, especially trained in the art of postmortem technic. A pathologist, for your information, is a physician who is especially qualified in his knowledge of anatomy, the gross and microscopic evidence of disease, and the importance of such disease processes in altering the health or producing the death of the individual. While all physicians have some training in these particular branches of science, they do not possess the qualifications to perform an accurate postmortem examination any more than does the pathologist have the ability to perform a delicate and careful operation during life. The science of medicine has grown to the extent that competency in any one field is dependent upon specific limited application, so that it is not to the discredit of the average physician to say that he is not especially trained to make such examinations. Not all pathologists have had detailed training in the art of careful examination of dead bodies from the medical, technical and medicolegal points of view. Such training is necessary, and the services of such a medical examiner should be made available to all law enforcement officers.
- 5. COMPLETE AND EXACT POSTMORTEM EXAMINATION: --It is of perhaps greatest importance that such an examination be made complete and exact. Just as no physician, who is careful in his practice and who is considerate of his patient, ever stops short of a complete and detailed examination from the top of the head to the soles of the feet, so also the medical examiner should be authorized and required to make a complete examination, especially in instances of death of the type referred to above. This latter concession is made with some hesitancy since it would be better to say that in all instances requiring a postmortem examination it should be complete. It is

true that under the present plan of conduct great objection is embarrassingly offered at times to the making of such a detailed examination, and elected officials are sometimes forced to concede to a lesser examination or to no examination at all. In either event there are certain to arise situations that may prove even more embarrassing and which may lead to faulty conclusions, false accusations, prolonged trials in the courts, and not infrequently, as has been pointed out to false prosecution, failures to convict, and miscarriages of justice.

First, let me cite a number of instances of homicide in which charges of first degree murder were filed against certain individuals and in which the performance of incomplete and inadequate autopsies resulted in embarrassing situations to physicians, prosecutors and the courts. (1) An instance in which two men in adult life, after an evening of celebration in a neighboring city, returned to the small ranch home of one of them, where they continued to carouse, with the result that one of them was shot at close range with three bullet wounds of entrance on the back of the body and one on the front of the body. After the authorities were called, and a careful survey of the entire scene of the killing was made and protected, the body was removed to an undertaking establishment where it was promptly embalmed and where later local physicians were called to examine it. The courses of the bullets were not accurately traced, their directions were not accurately determined, the vital organs they penetrated were not accurately studied. The volume of blood about the lungs and in the chest cavity, that occurred as a result of bleeding from these wounds, was not and could not be accurately determined because there was no way of separating it from the embalming fluid that escaped from the blcod vessels. The quantity of blood about the perforated acrta, from the wound in front, was not and could not be accurately determined also because of the embalming fluid and a failure to realize its importance. So the question as to whether or not the three wounds made in the back of the body were made in a certain position and first, could not be determined because of the above irregularities. Had the body not been embalmed, and had the courses of the bullets, their angle of fire, and the blood vessels of the lungs and other tissues that had been penetrated, been accurately determined, and had the volume of blood been carefully measured and weighed in both the chest cavities and in the abdomen, the sequence of such inflicted wounds could have been determined. Knowing the rate of flow of blood and the pressure under which it exists in the lungs as well as in the aorta, would have made it possible to evaluate them in their order and relationship to the cause of death. The failure, then, to adequately protect the body and to make a complete and detailed examination in this case masked the determination of the sequence of the wounds and introduced an element of doubt as to the manner of the commission of the crime, with the result that there was a failure of conviction in spite of the fact that all of the other phases of the case were carefully and expertly worked out by the prosecuting attorney and police officers.

In another instance of multiple, fatal gunshot wounds which were received by one member of a distinguished profession at the hands of another member, following an altercation, the question of the sequence and importance of the several wounds arose. One of these was made through the arm. It was

said by the examining physician to have resulted in perforation of the large artery found here, with the result that only a half ounce of blood was found. The other bullet was found to have passed directly through the heart, penetrating both of its main chambers or ventricles so that bleeding occurred about the heart and in the chest cavity where approximately one quart of blood was said to have been found. The order of these two wounds became important since it was contended by the prosecution that the revolver found in the left hand of the victim, who was right handed, was a plant, being placed there by the defendant, while it was contended by the defense that the victim also fired shots and when he was disabled by the bullet wound of his right arm he transferred the gun to the left hand to continue firing, which ceased with the bullet wound through the heart. If the results of the examination of the physician were accurate, there could be no doubt as to the sequence of the bullet wounds. Since the artery in the arm is the one commonly used for the measuring of blood pressure and a wound penetrating it would result in a spurting flow of blood of much larger volume than was found about the wound in the arm; it was evident that the blood pressure here had fallen. The heart was no longer pumping, due to the large amount of blood in the chest cavity resulting from the penetration of both chambers of the heart, which chambers are vital in maintaining blood pressure. The element of doubt was thrown about this situation because of inadequate and unconvincing data concerning these two wounds and the failure to determine the total quantity of blood in the body. At a later date the accused, who was declared not guilty by the jury, told me that my conclusions were wrong. My reply was that they could not be unless some of the basic facts in the hypothetical question were wrong. For example, the artery in the arm may not have been penetrated in this case. If so, my conclusions, as an expert, were wrong. These two cases of multiple gunshot wounds, to which I could add many others, illustrate rather convincingly the value of a complete and exact post mortem examination in such cases. It may be therefore stated, without contradiction, that supportive testimony by experts, based upon hypothetical questions, that are predicated upon established facts, is entirely dependent upon the accuracy of such established facts. If the observations of the examining physician are inaccurate and wrong, then the hypothesis of the question is wrong and the conclusion of the expert may be wrong.

It is also true of stab wounds that it is important to determine the number, position, size, location, direction, organ or organs penetrated and the character of the incision, in arriving at a conclusion as to the manner in which they were made, the instrument which produced them, and the position and direction of the force employed, in order to accurately determine the relationship of these to the cause of death. The external evidence of such wounds does not by itself disclose their true nature and their significance in the cause of death. As an illustration of the value of a complete examination in a stab wound, let me cite the instance that occurred a number of years ago, when upon a Danish vessel that was coursing through the tropics, there occurred a fight between a sailor and the cook, with the result that knives were drawn and the cook was stabbed with a pocket knife directly over the heart, at which time he promptly died. Although the death occurred in the tropics, and the engineer aboard ship could provide only a crude coffin made of tin cans soldered together, and although some time

elapsed before the ship arrived at Portland from the tropics even though the front half of the body was found floating in the rear because of disintegration, it was still possible to determine by a complete examination of the contents that the stab wound over the heart had penetrated only through the cartilage of the rib over the heart but did not penetrate it. It was found that in one of the vessels of the heart itself there was hardening and plugging from natural causes. Accordingly it was concluded that the stab wound had not actually killed the individual but had contributed to the excitement which brought about death from natural causes.

In another instance of a stab wound, made under circumstances in which the "eternal triangle" existed, the question arose as to whether or not a murder had been committed or whether death was due to suicide. A detailed and complete examination of the body of the type referred to above resulted in the determination that the single wound found above the arm was made by the individual herself with a plunge, upward draw, and cut that could not be made by the husband or his paramour. The innocence of the accused was thereby established in the minds of the jury.

In another case, which not infrequently arises, a forest ranger was found dead in an isolated place in a forest, with a gunshot wound in his head. His 45 Luger revolver was lying in such a position as to make it somewhat distant from the body. The body was removed and the wound alone was examined by a local physician, with the result that it was concluded that the bullet which killed him was fired at some distance, there being no powder marks, and had penetrated his head from left to right. The evidence therefore obtained from the scene of the crime and the examination indicated that a murder had probably been committed, and it was so claimed by the relatives. At the request of the prosecuting attorney and the sheriff, the body was re-examined with some difficulty because the previous examination had changed the character and relationship of certain parts. However, it seemed to us at the time the previous examiner was probably correct, because the bullet wound on the left side of the head was small, with the tissues only slightly disturbed, while the bullet wound on the right side of the head was large, irregular and jagged, being turned upward. On the basis that the bullet wound of exit is an escaping wound, with the tissues turned outward, the conclusion of the previous examiner seemed warranted. However, when the skull was examined it was found that opposite the supposed bullet wound of entrance on the left side there was a so-called "key-hole" opening. We recalled that this is not uncommon in instances in which the bullets of high velocity begin to wobble in their courses. We therefore turned our attention to the explosive wound on the right side. There was no evidence of brand or flare or powder marking here. However, detailed microscopic examination of the gaping wound disclosed the presence within the tissues of powder and other debris including hair. This, together with the determination by measurement of the right-handedness of the individual in question, resulted in a reversal of the former conclusion, namely that the bullet wound of entrance was on the right side and the bullet wound of exit on the left side, the position and course being that of a self-inflicted wound. The sheriff was called upon to bring in the particular gun in question, and at our suggestion a cadaver was obtained from the dissecting room, and the muzzle of the

same gun was pressed tightly against the right temple and fired, with the result that an exact duplication of the wound and conditions of the head of the forest ranger were reproduced. The theory of a homicide having been committed was therefore dispelled.

In another instance, in the examination of the body of a dead merchant by my associate, Dr. Hunter, it was possible to determine that the body, which was found in a pool back of his home, had not accidentally fallen into this water but was alive when it had entered the pool, and that death resulted from the injury found on the head (prior to death), as well as from drowning, with the result that a conviction was secured. Such conclusions were only possible on the basis of a complete, detailed, competently-made examination, which disclosed in the lungs of the deceased green algae and other plant forms found in the pool, in such parts of the lungs where they could be carried only by active breathing.

Another example of the result of a complete and exact examination is that of an old lady who was found partially burned, with a gag of clothing and sticks shoved into her mouth and throat. It was concluded by friends and relatives that the woman was murdered. At the request of the local coroner and the sheriff we were able to determine, on the basis of a complete examination not only of the body of the individual but also of the scene of the crime, that death was due to suicidal burning with kerosene obtained on the stairway down to the basement from such a position that a stranger could not readily find it, and that because of certain financial matters this old, extremely religiously inclined individual, in a fit of mental imbalance, had offered herself as a sacrifice, and in her agony and mental confusion had pushed the materials into her own mouth and throat.

Other instances of the value of a complete and detailed postmortem examination in the solution of the supposed or actual commission of a crime may occur when there is indication of poisoning. As an illustration I wish to cite the instance of the death of an old lady in a rather remote settlement in the northeastern part of the state, without medical attendants and under conditions in which strained family relationships existed, and under conditions in which access was so difficult that the funeral and burial was conducted by friends and neighbors. There occurred, after several months of burial without embalming, a constantly growing suspicion of the cause of death of this individual by neighbors and friends, with the final filing of a petition requesting the district attorney to have an examination of the body to determine the accuracy of the suspicions. cordingly the sheriff, the district attorney, the coroner and I went to this isolated region under great difficulties, the dead of winter, with the body located in a cemetery high up in the mountains, which cemetery was covered with about six feet of snow. The body was disinterred, and from a complete and detailed examination of all of it, it was still possible to determine that death occurred from natural causes.

In another instance there occurred in a neighboring city the death of a young child, who was supposed to have eaten food left by a so-called "dog poisoner." The child died promptly after eating some suspicious

food. Editorials were written, condemning the action of such a despicable character, and rightly so if true. Portions of the vital organs of the child were sent to a certain laboratory for examination for poisons. A false positive was obtained for the presence of strychnine. The report of this increased the intensity of the feeling of the public. Because of the seriousness of the situation, the law enforcement officers requested a further investigation. Together with the first doctors who made the examination, it was determined by another post-mortem analysis that the child died of a pneumonia, which gave symptoms similar to strychnine poisoning. In each instance of supposed or actual poisoning it is important that the body be not embalmed and that the examination be made as soon as possible, and that every portion of the body be examined. Certain organs and tissues, where such poisons concentrate or are eliminated must be preserved at the earliest opportunity since many poisons disintegrate after death and leave no trace of their presence with the passing of an interval of time.

In instances of criminal abortion the value of such a complete and exact post-mortem is often illustrated. As an example of this I wish to cite the occurrence in a neighboring state of the death of a young woman, following an alleged criminal abortion. After the performance of a partial autopsy, at which time the genital organs were removed, it was found that the woman had died of a peritonitis, probably secondary to an infection in the uterus. The genital organs were subsequently sent to a pathologist who examined them and found no evidence of pregnancy. After this they were sent to our laboratory, where my associate and I continued the examination, and agreed with the former pathologist that there was no evidence of pregnancy present but we did find on the neck of the womb an injury with recent infection similar to that found in the peritoneal cavity. At the request of the prosecuting attorney the body of this woman was again examined completely, with the result that all evidence of injury and disease were found to be confined to the genital organs and the abdominal cavity, and that the infection had no other possible source except that from the genital organs. The examination of the edges of the organs previously removed and the continuity re-established by placing the genital organs in their natural position, showed conclusively that there had been an injury with an infection that had traveled upward, producing the peritonitis. There was sufficient supportive evidence to enable the securing of a conviction.

Time will not allow me the citation of many illustrations which would support my contention that in the determination of the causes of death and their relation to the possible commission of crime, and the establishment of the corpus delicti, a complete and exact post-mortem examination is necessary.

The instructive article above has been printed in the FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin through the courtesy of Dr. Frank R. Menne, who delivered an address on this subject before the 1936 Meeting of the Northwest Association of Sheriffs and Police held in Portland, Oregon.



### A OUESTIONABLE PATTERN

In order that interested law enforcement officials may become better acquainted with the definitions of "plain arches" and "tented arches" as interpreted in the Identification Division of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, a series of questionable plain arch, tented arch and loop patterns will be published in this and succeeding issues of the Bulletin.

The first group of the series will concern questionable plain arch tented arch impressions. An example of this type is reproduced below.



It will be noted that the general formation of this pattern is that of a plain arch. However, the angle formed by the ridge which strikes upward into the arching ridge at point "A" brings this impression into the tented arch classification. Under the rule, as applied in the Federal Bureau of Investigation, arch type patterns in which the ridges, either in changing their direction from upward to downward, or in striking into an arching ridge, form an angle, are classified as tented arches rather than as plain arches.

In all cases where a variation in inking or rolling might have made an apparent difference in the characteristics, appropriate reference searches are conducted in the plain arch classifications.

#### ANNOUNCEMENT - CANCELLATION OF FUGITIVE NOTATION

A suggestion has been received in the Bureau recently regarding those instances where a currently published fugitive notation is being cancelled.

In the past it has been the practice to cancel such cases by indicating the word "Cancelled" diagonally across the pertinent descriptive data. In future issues of the FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin the cancellation notice will appear between the descriptive data and the finger impression.

This new procedure is being adopted since it appears that a number of contributors place such cancelled notices in their files.

Illustration "A" is an example of the old method. Illustration "B" indicates the method to be used in the next and succeeding issues of the FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin.

#### SPECIAL ANNOUNCEMENT

The attention of contributors of applicant fingerprints who desire to have these impressions searched against the criminal files of the Identification Division of the Bureau is again called to the fact that while these impressions may be submitted on personal identification fingerprint forms, nevertheless, the word "applicant" must appear prominently on the fingerprint card submitted. It was suggested that a rubber stamp might satisfactorily be used for this purpose.

The word "applicant" prominently appearing on the fingerprint card will assure its being searched against the criminal files of the Identification Division and assure that the contributor is advised of the results of this search. The card will then be filed in the criminal files of the Bureau unless the contributor specifically requests the return of it.

The failure of the contributor to thus designate an applicant fingerprint card as the impressions of an "applicant" will cause it to be routed to the Civil Identification Section of the Identification Division for filing without search against the criminal files of the Identification Division of the Bureau.

# UNIDENTIFIED DECEASED IDENTIFIED THROUGH FINGERPRINTS PUBLISHED IN FBI LAW ENFORCEMENT BULLETIN

On June 29, 1936, the Federal Bureau of Investigation received, from the Sheriff at Los Angeles, photographic copies of fingerprints of an unidentified deceased man found at Eaton Canyon, Altadena district, California, on June 4, 1936. The body and hands were in a badly decomposed condition. The person apparently had been dead for a considerable period of time.

While it was not possible to identify these fingerprints when checked against the Bureau's fingerprint files, the fingerprints, together with illustrations of the rejuvenating work done, were published by the FBI in the October, 1936, issue of the FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin, in an effort to effect an identification.

Advice has now been received in the Federal Bureau of Investigation to the effect that these fingerprints were searched against the identification records of the Police Department at San Diego, California, and that this deceased person was found to be identical with one John McAvoy who had been fingerprinted by the San Diego Police Department on April 12, 1935, and concerning whom certain identifying information was available in the San Diego files.

When it is recalled that the deceased's body was badly decomposed and that the fingers had to be treated before prints could be obtained, the identification effected in this case exemplifies the importance of making every effort to obtain the fingerprints of unknown dead, despite the possible difficult task of rejuvenating the fingertips. It further emphasizes the need for submitting all fingerprint records to the Identification Division of the FBI so that the information they contain may be readily available to law enforcement agencies everywhere.

# UNKNOWN DECEASED IDENTIFIED BY FINGERPRINTS AS R. A. BRIDGES, WANTED FOR ESCAPE FROM SPEIGNER PRISON, ALABAMA.

On May 29, 1934, a fingerprint card was received in the Bureau from the State Convict Department at Montgomery, Alabama, containing the finger impressions of R. A. Bridges, who was sentenced on May 11, 1934, to serve twenty years for second degree murder. On October 2, 1936, a wanted notice was received in the Bureau from the State Convict Department at Montgomery, Alabama, containing the finger impressions of Bridges and information to the effect that Bridges escaped from Speigner Prison on September 27, 1936. Upon receipt of the wanted notice from the State Convict Department a wanted notice was placed in the fingerprint file of Bridges in the Identification Division of the Bureau with a notation that the State Convict Department at Montgomery, Alabama, should be advised of any information received in the Bureau relative to Bridges.

On December 12, 1936, a fingerprint card was received in the Bureau from the Police Department at West Point, Georgia, containing the finger impressions of an unknown deceased man. A notation appeared on the fingerprint card that this man was murdered and left by the roadside and that the Police Department at West Point did not know his name. When the fingerprints of the unknown deceased man were searched through the files of the Identification Division they were found to be identical with the fingerprints of R. A. Bridges, who escaped from Speigner Prison on September 27, 1936. When the identification by fingerprints was made in the Bureau a telegram was immediately forwarded to the Chief of Police at West Point, Georgia, advising him of the identity of the unknown deceased man and also giving pertinent information which appears in the files of the Identification Division as to the name and address of Bridges' wife and mother so that they might be notified of his death. The State Convict Department at Montgomery, Alabama, was also advised that the R. A. Bridges wanted by them for escape had been identified by fingerprints as the unknown man who was found murdered at West Point, Georgia.

JOHNNIE WADE, ARRESTED FOR TRAIN RIDING BY OFFICERS OF THE PENNSYLVANIA RAILROAD POLICE, DENNISON, OHIO, IDENTIFIED BY FINGERPRINTS AS GEORGE HENRY DILLARD, WANTED FOR ESCAPE FROM THE LOUISIANA STATE PENITENTIARY

George Henry Dillard was received in the State Penitentiary, Baton Rouge, Louisiana, on January 26, 1936, to serve a sentence of from four to twelve years for robbery. On May 30, 1936, he escaped from the penitentiary while serving that sentence. The State Police at Baton Rouge, Louisiana, requested the Bureau to place a wanted notice in the fingerprint file of Dillard so that organization might be notified in the event fingerprints of Dillard or information concerning him was received in the Bureau. On August 22, 1936, an appropriate wanted notice was placed in the fingerprint record of Dillard on file in the Identification Division. Dillard was published as a fugitive in the FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin issued by the Federal Bureau of Investigation for the month of October 1936.

On November 3, 1936, a fingerprint card was received in the Bureau from the Pennsylvania Railroad Police, Dennison, Ohio, containing the finger impressions of Johnnie Wade, who was arrested on October 29, 1936, at Dennison, Ohio, on a charge of train riding. The fingerprints of Wade proved to be identical with the fingerprints of George Henry Dillard when searched through the fingerprint files of the Identification Division and when the identification was made a wire was immediately sent to the head-quarters of the Pennsylvania Railroad Police at Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, advising that Johnnie Wade arrested at Dennison, Ohio, was identical with George Henry Dillard wanted for escape from the State Penitentiary at Baton Rouge, Louisiana. The State Police at Baton Rouge, Louisiana, were notified of the arrest of Dillard at Dennison, Ohio.

On November 30, 1936, a copy of the Louisiana State Police Bulletin of November 18, 1936, was received in the Bureau, and a notation appeared in that bulletin that Dillard, who was arrested at Dennison, Ohio, was returned to the State Penitentiary at Baton Rouge, Louisiana, on November 14, 1936.

# FIFTEEN YEAR OLD GIRL MISSING FROM HOME LOCATED BY MISSING PERSON NOTICE PLACED IN THE FILES OF THE FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION

In recent months the fingerprint files of the Identification Division of the Bureau have been of material assistance in locating missing persons, on whom missing person notices had been placed in the files of the Identification Division. On February 28, 1935, information was received in the Bureau to the effect that Edith Stubbs, fifteen years old, of Paterson, New Jersey, had been missing from her home since January 15, 1935. When this information was received in the Bureau a missing person notice was placed in the files of the Identification Division, together with as much descriptive data as was available regarding the missing girl. A photograph of Edith Stubbs had been forwarded to the Bureau and was placed in the files of the Identification Division.

On November 27, 1936, a fingerprint card was received in the Bureau from the Police Department at Cincinnati, Ohio, containing the finger impressions of one Edith Stubbs, alias Edythe Stubbs, who was arrested in Cincinnati, Ohio, on November 20, 1936, on a charge of defrauding inn-keeper. A photograph of Edith Stubbs arrested by the Cincinnati police was forwarded to the Bureau at the same time that the fingerprint card was forwarded.

When the photograph and fingerprint card were received in the Bureau the finger impressions appearing on the card were searched through the fingerprint files in the Identification Division, but no prior record was found. However, in the name files, or Card Index Section of the Identification Division, a missing person notice was found and the information appearing on that notice when compared with the information on the back of the fingerprint card received from the Police Department at Cincinnati, Ohio, was very similar with the exception of age. The age appearing on the missing person notice was given as fifteen, while on the fingerprint card received from Cincinnati the age was shown as twenty-three. The photograph in the files of the Identification Division on the missing girl was compared with the photograph submitted to the Bureau by the Cincinnati, Ohio, Police Department and a remarkable similarity was noted. As a result a letter was addressed to Mrs. Adeline F. Stubbs, 308 Van Houten Street, Paterson, New Jersey, the mother of the missing girl, advising her that the Edith Stubbs arrested by the Cincinnati Police Department was probably her daughter, and suggesting that she may wish to communicate with the Chief of Police at Cincinnati for further information.

The Chief of Police at Cincinnati, Ohio was also advised of the missing person notice appearing in the files of the Bureau on Edith Stubbs. Under date of December 4, 1936, a letter was addressed to the Bureau by the Chief of Police of Cincinnati, Ohio, advising that the Edith Stubbs arrested by his department on November 20, 1936, was identical with Edith Stubbs, subject of the missing person notice appearing in the files of the Identification Division of the Bureau. The Chief of Police at Cincinnati further advised in his letter that he had communicated with Mrs. Adeline F. Stubbs, the mother of the missing girl.

## OFFENSES KNOWN TO THE POLICE, JANUARY 1 - NOVEMBER 30, 1935-1936.

Based on reports received from the police departments of 320 cities, there is presented in the following table information concerning the amount of crime committed during the first eleven months of 1935 and 1936. The comparison shows fewer crimes during the first eleven months of 1936 than in 1935 of all types except rape and aggravated assault. The decreases during 1936 were rather substantial for robbery, burglary, larceny and auto theft, but were quite small for murder and manslaughter.

Comparing November, 1936, with November, 1935, reveals increases in the number of offenses against the person (murder, manslaughter, rape and aggravated assault), and shows decreases in property crimes. However, the reduction in property crimes (robbery, burglary, larceny and auto theft) was considerably smaller than during the entire eleven-month period.


During the first eleven months of 1936 the 320 police departments reported 30,600 serious offenses against the person and 505,435 crimes against property, a total of 536,035 serious crimes.
