The Federal Bureau of Investigation, U.S. Department of Justice, is charged with the duty of investigating violations of the laws of the United States and collecting evidence in cases in which the United States is or may be a party in interest.

The following list indicates some of the major violations over which the Bureau has investigative jurisdiction:-

National Motor Vehicle Theft Act

Interstate transportation of stolen property valued at \$5,000 or more National Bankruptcy Act

Interstate flight to avoid prosecution or testifying in certain cases White Slave Traffic Act

Impersonation of Government Officials

Larceny of Goods in Interstate Commerce

Killing or Assaulting Federal Officer

Cases involving transportation in interstate or foreign commerce of any persons who have been kidnaped

Extortion cases in which interstate commerce or interstate communication is an element

Theft, Embezzlement or Illegal Possession of Government Property Antitrust Laws

Robbery of National Banks and Member Banks of Federal Reserve System National Bank and Federal Reserve Act Violations, such as embezzlement, abstraction or misapplication of funds

Crimes on any kind of Government reservation, including Indian Reservations or in any Government building or other Government property

Neutrality violations, including the shipment of arms to friendly nations

Frauds against the Government

Crimes in connection with Federal Penal and Correctional Institutions
Perjury, embezzlement, or bribery in connection with Federal Statutes or
officials

Crimes on the high seas

Federal Anti-Racketeering Statute

The location of persons who are fugitives from justice by reason of violations of the Federal Laws over which the Bureau has jurisdiction, of escaped Federal prisoners, and parole and probation violators.

The Bureau does not have investigative jurisdiction over the violations of Counterfeiting, Narcotic, Customs, Immigration, or Postal Laws.

Law enforcement officials possessing information concerning violations over which the Bureau has investigative jurisdiction are requested to promptly forward the same to the Special Agent in Charge of the nearest field office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, U. S. Department of Justice. The address of each field office of this Bureau appears on the inside back cover of this bulletin. Government Rate Collect telegrams or telephone calls will be accepted if information indicates that immediate action is necessary.

If we are to continue to progress in effective law enforcement, too much emphasis cannot be laid upon certain features of police organization.

Trained, experienced executives are of great importance. I believe that there should be a responsible, well trained head of the police force, one not encumbered by political dictates. It should be recognized, and I feel this to be extremely vital, that the leadership of a police organization is a task requiring training and experience with a good man continuing in office so long as he produces the proper results, regardless of changes in administrations. We might take a lesson from European police organizations, in this respect, where the head of the police is a position of prominence and dignity, unaffected by political change, a career attracting the best talents of the universities or government services.

The public is demanding efficiency in its law enforcement agencies. This can be effected by raising the level of law enforcement work above the encroachments of political influence. It has been done with our educational systems, it can be done with our nation's police forces.

Results will be attained if men are attracted to law enforcement work as a career. Give them remuneration commensurate with the duties they perform, select them for ability, train them, assure them of permanence in their positions, so long as their duties are performed in a proper manner, without responsibility to political powers. If these principles are emphasized, law enforcement may be assured of a progressive future.

# ANNOUNCEMENT CONCERNING ADDITIONAL INFORMATION TO BE INCLUDED IN ANNUAL REPORT OF PERSONS CHARGED (RETURN C)

#### UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING

For the information of law enforcement agencies, there is reproduced herewith a form letter which has recently been transmitted to all agencies participating in the compilation of national police statistics:

"Last month the attention of law enforcement agencies participating in the collection of national police statistics was invited to certain deficiencies which had been observed in some of the annual reports for 1935 dealing with persons arrested (return C). The report form originally designed by the Committee on Uniform Crime Records of the International Association of Chiefs of Police for use in reporting data concerning persons arrested, included provision for showing the number of persons found guilty of the offense charged and the number found guilty of some lesser offense. During the past few years, no attempt has been made to obtain that type of information from participating law enforcement agencies. Pursuant to the recommendation of the Crime Records Committee of the Chiefs of Police Association, the annual return C form distributed to participating agencies for 1936 will include two additional columns, one to show the number of persons found guilty of the offense charged, and the other the number of persons found guilty of a lesser offense. This means that whereas the return C form used heretofore had a total of five columns, the report form to be used for 1936 will have seven columns.

"The inclusion of the type of information referred to above will not complicate the form appreciably, since it merely provides for showing the disposition of the charges placed against the persons who were made available for prosecution. The necessary information is doubtless already in the files of most police agencies, and many police departments already compile such data for inclusion in their printed annual reports prepared for local distribution.

"The pamphlet entitled 'A Guide for Preparing Annual Police Reports,' which was recently distributed to police agencies throughout the country, recommends a tabulation of the type referred to above. It will be readily apparent that such data will be of great value to police executives and to the public generally.

"Any inquiries concerning the nature of the information which will be desired, in accordance with the foregoing explanation, should be directed to the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and they will be given prompt attention."

#### PATRIOTISM AND THE WAR AGAINST CRIME

Due to the number of requests received for copies of the address delivered by Director J. Edgar Hoover, before the annual convention of The Daughters of the American Revolution, Constitution Hall, at Washington, D. C., on April 23, 1936, that address is being reproduced herein for interested law enforcement officials.

"The Daughters of the American Revolution as an organization holds great significance. It is more than an institution - it is a symbol of living testimony to the traditions upon which this great nation was founded and by which it may live and prosper. Because of this and because an over-powering danger faces America, I feel that the subject upon which I speak should be of the utmost importance to you and all other organizations born of patriotism. I refer to the menace of crime.

"It is our duty to be alert and alive to any threat against our national welfare whether it comes from without our borders or from within. Today, we attempt to live in peace with the world. We seek to command the respect of the nations among which we must live and work, and to protect ourselves against what might be called the "criminals" of the community of these nations. We try to maintain an adequate army and navy. We all know that such a force is an insurance for peace. But we can never make peace with the underworld. It constantly threatens an invasion of our homes, our happiness, and our civil and public rights with a concentration of armed forces greater than that of our army and navy combined. These are not my words but they are those of the man to whom I owe much gratitude for his hearty support in the efforts of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the Honorable Homer S. Cummings, the Attorney General of the United States. Were crime to marshal its forces in a marching body of men, they would tramp ceaselessly past this hall, hour upon hour, in daylight and in darkness and back to daylight and darkness again, even though they were ten and twenty abreast, for the files of the Federal Bureau of Investigation show that there are actually three million convicted criminals. Beyond this there are enough more with police records to demonstrate that an average of one out of every 25 persons in the United States of America has at least had his brush with law enforcement agencies and is inclined toward criminality. This army of crime is larger than any unified force in history. If this tremendous body of evil-doers could be welded into a unit of conquest, America would fall before it not in a month, not in a day, but in a few hours. Therefore, with the seriousness of this condition truly before us, I believe it not at all sensational to assert that while we speak of peace, we are really at war; that while we believe ourselves secure, we are actually besieged; that while we look with fear upon any belligerent news from foreign shores, we are turning our backs upon and our thoughts from the most serious and most devastating war which this country ever has known; that of the insidious attack of the armed forces of criminality.

"Not to alarm you, but for your information, there are today in America 150,000 murderers roaming at large. Statistics show that during the lifetime of those who form our population, 200,000 - nearly a quarter of a

million persons will commit murder before they die and more than 300,000 persons, the population of an entire metropolis, will be murdered. Consider that! Think of the scareheads which ran in the newspapers concerning the tempestuous floods which ravaged our eastern states only a month ago. We saw the news pictures depicting scenes of suffering. We were horrified at the plight of thousands who were homeless; our hearts sank as we read the mounting list of the dead and injured. Yet, if this entire condition of death, desolation and ruin were magnified to double proportions, it would not then even approach the horrible picture of miles upon miles of stiffened corpses representing the 300,000 citizens of America who today are walking the streets in the belief of security, who are making their plans, dreaming their dreams of the future and not realizing that they are doomed to die by the foul hand of the murderer. If we are not at war with crime, then never was there such a thing as war! If this war does not demand the straining of our every tendon of patriotism in a determined campaign of eradication, then this country never has known an emergency! And so, I tell the stark truth to you women, who are known for your devotion to the country for which your forefathers gave their blood, and ask, in the name of those sacrifices, that you do your utmost to reinstill a spirit of determination and of self-sacrificing alertness that the loyalty to America, the fidelity to ideals, and the unfaltering courage which gave us Bunker Hill and Valley Forge may be re-established. Let America be called to arms and arise against this marauding army of crime that we may again battle to finality; that we may fight the good fight to victory over a most despicable foe.

"Above all, we must not be lured into a feeling of false security by figures emanating from time to time tending to show that crime is somewhat on the decrease. True, there has been a cessation of gang kidnapings and other heinous crimes due to the highly organized activities of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, but I warn you that should vigilance relax in the slightest those outrages would be renewed in greater viciousness than ever. There can be no weeding out of noxious growths until the roots which feed these growths are torn from the filthy muck which fosters them. Throughout our country law enforcement has been hampered, hamstrung, and strangled by the blood-caked hand of crime-affiliated politics.

"I know the statement I have just made sounds sensational. It smacks of headlines. But I challenge you to find out for yourselves how really true it is. Political grafters stir uneasily when honorable citizens like yourselves begin to ask questions about the close connection between violent crime and crooked politics. They do not like honest law enforcement and they do not like the truth, which is that they are the brains behind the Dillingers of this land.

"This political alliance with crime exists in state after state, municipality after municipality. It halts the policeman; it halts the law enforcement officer, even as he reaches for his gun, and holds him there, a target for the bullets of the coward he has been attempting to arrest. It stalks into our courts, brushing aside indictments, trials, and even convictions with a wave of a hand. It enters our penitentiaries, swinging wide the heavy prison gates for men who otherwise would have paid their debt to society in punishment for their crime. It condones nonfeasance

in office and provides actual malfeasance. It supports bribery, perjury, and gangdom, and it has been known to place more than one ex-convict upon the force of a police department. It is firmly entrenched, deeply rooted, and can be torn from its foundations only by the concerted unswerving selfsacrificing efforts of such patriotic organizations as the Daughters of the American Revolution. Remember this always: The only thing which concerns the crooked politician is the fact that every time you catch a criminal, he loses votes. You are going to find that a great hue and cry will arise concerning the gratifying advance against crime which has been manifest within the past two years. You will learn that the sob-sisters will soon come forth from hiding with cries of persecution against these dear, good boys whom unfeeling law enforcement agencies insist upon sending to prison. You will discover that crackpot politicians, racketeers of a new and different type, will scuttle out from the shadows to add crime upon crime by evoking new and impossible schemes for the alleged eradication of the law-breaker. You will see private quack fingerprint bureaus springing up here and there, willing, at the drop of the hat, to protect our citizens upon the payment of a price when those very citizens can be protected at no cost whatever by the local law enforcement agency or the Federal Bureau of Investigation. You will be surrounded by theorists, pseudo-criminologists, hyper-sentimentalists, criminal coddlers, convict lovers, and fiddlefaced reformers all surging forward with great ideas for the commonwealth but mostly for their own pocketbooks. Therefore, I warn you to stay unswerving to your task - that of standing by the men on the firing line - the practical, hard-headed, experienced, honest policemen who have shown by their efforts that they, and they alone, know the answer to the crime problem. That answer can be summed up in one sentence - adequate detection, swift apprehension, and certain, unrelenting punishment. That is what the criminal fears. That is what he understands, and nothing else, and that fear is the only thing which will force him into the ranks of the lawabiding.

"There is no royal road to law enforcement. If we wait upon the medical quacks, the parole panderers, and the misguided sympathizers with habitual criminals to protect our lives and property from the criminal horde, then we must also resign ourselves to increasing violence, robbery and sudden death.

"The time has come when it is the solemn duty of such organizations as the Daughters of the American Revolution to insist that there can be no compromise with crime. For too many years, the citizen has viewed this problem as something with which he has no personal concern. Yet all this time he has been paying a personal tax of \$120 a year for the privilege of living in a country which each year sees 12,000 murders; 46,981 cases of felonious assaults; 283,685 burglaries; 779,956 larcenies; and 247,346 automobile thefts. To use a plain Americanism, there has been too much passing of the buck; too much eagerness to hand over all criminal problems to strictly law enforcement agencies. A policeman is only the agent of a citizen. He is only the servant of an employer - the public - and if that employer gives no attention to the business in hand, then indeed it is too much to expect that the servant will think, plan, and execute for the public that hires him. We all know that in practically every big case,

there is witness after witness who dodges his duty in the courtroom. We know that juries allow themselves to be swayed by personal expediency, cheap sentimentalities, politics, and sometimes by money. It is common knowledge that in every large American city, there is attorney after attorney who makes his living by counseling men whom he knows to be guilty, not only after they have been arrested, but often plans with them, plots with them and conceives with them in the preparation of dastardly crime. We know that all about us are various figures and filaments of criminal life - the fixers, the hide-out owners, the money passers, the bond buyers, the fences, the bribers and all the rest of the slatternly camp-followers of infamy whose presence is necessary in the commission of a major infraction. All these things are of such common knowledge that children often play games in which these characters are simulated. But what does the average citizen do about it? Absolutely nothing!

"It is your duty to safe and orderly society to see that a new viewpoint is brought about. To watch the criminal cases as they arise in your city; to make it your business to find out why the politically protected murderer is not captured; to guard the courtrooms against continuance after continuance and the disappearance of witnesses by which some infamous law-breaker may be freed. Why, only yesterday, I was reading the statement of a criminal implicated in a notorious kidnaping. He had kept the hide-out where a man had been hidden away from his family until these notorious racketeers had been able to extort the savings of a lifetime before they freed their victim. Yet, in perfect nonchalance, he excused himself by saying that he did not know he was keeping a hide-out for a kidnaped victim. He only thought it was a witness in a murder trial whom a criminal friend desired to keep from testifying.

"You, as guardians of patriotism, should watch appropriations and view with keen suspicion the various so-called economy moves by which venal politicians disrupt police departments, lower their morale, reduce the personnel, decrease guards at jails and prisons, bring about the possession of faulty equipment, and make their city a haven for the criminals who have promised to deliver heavy blocks of votes in return for political protection. It is your duty to see that shop-keepers, business men, and others who have become the victims of racketeers, do their duty before the grand juries investigating these parasitical growths upon our body politic. Time after time, earnest and honest prosecutors have endeavored to get at the bottom of the racketeering which is sapping steadily at the health and prosperity of this country. Time after time, they have sought to solve the bombings, the murders, the assaults by which this bulk of racketeering exists, only to find that the same victims whom they are attempting to rescue constantly are stricken dumb when they appear before an inquisitorial body. In other words, these business men who should, as substantial citizens, be the first to display courage for the cleanliness of their city, become rank cowards before the threat of gangsterism, and I insist, that there is no place in America for cowardice. I suggest also that if these men are cowards, that if they insist upon burdening their communities through their lack of fortitude, then it becomes the duty of the community to frown upon them as it would upon the racketeer who feeds upon us all. Neither I nor any member of the Federal

Bureau of Investigation will knowingly have business relationships with a person whom we know to be deliberately fostering crime by refusing to aid law enforcement. If it becomes known that such patriotic organizations as the Daughters of the American Revolution place such persons beyond the pale of reputable association, then perhaps tongues will be loosened before grand juries, the shackles will be taken from the wrists of the policeman and placed where they deserve to be; the sneering vermin of gangdom will be sent scurrying into the cells where they belong and America once more will be an unshackled nation, free of the enforced levies of tribute by politically protected privateers.

"Above all, it is your duty to inquire diligently into the record and achievements, good or bad, of every candidate who comes before you at election time. It is inconceivable that a country should be run so loosely that even ex-convicts, still maintaining their allegiance with the under world, can be elected to office. I have said before, and I say again, that if every incumbent of public office in the United States were fingerprinted and the records of the law violators spread before the nation in a single summary, the results would amount to a scandal which would rock this country. It is not at all unusual to find in the files of the Federal Bureau of Investigation that some local patronage official who handles the public's funds and appoints the so-called guardians of public safety, is discovered to possess a criminal record. The only remedy for this condition can come about through concerted efforts of organizations which are not afraid or too mentally lazy to make the life of every public official the open and clean book which this country deserves to possess in its Library of public service.

"Long since the time has passed when criminals hid in dark alleys or skulked in dank basements. The day of the mask and the dark lantern is over. Crime lives next door to you. Crime often plays bridge with you. Crime dances with your sons and daughters. It is ever present. But this veneer of social grace that our criminals have adopted in no way makes them less foul. They still rob and murder. They victimize America. And, so, for those of us who would preserve the patriotic ideals that were born in the suffering and agony of the revolutionary days, it becomes incumbent to give again of our time, of our sinews and our strength that a most despicable enemy be repelled from our midst. These persons of the under-filth are not simply poor boys or moral invalids as the super-sentimentalists would have us believe. They are marauders, who murder for a headline, rats crawling from their hide-outs to gnaw at the vitals of our civilization. True, they are dressed as we are dressed. They live as we live and often upon a better scale owing to the rich rewards of their so-called profession but their standards of life are those of pigs in a wallow, their outlook that of vultures regurgitating their filth. As such you must regard them - without sentiment, without the influence of pandering politics or of fantastic schemers, but as definite scourges to be viewed with safety only when they have been placed behind prison bars and forced to remain there until they have expiated their debts to a thoroughly outraged and sinned-against society.

flood through America. Homes have been wrecked by the threat of death, often in a manner beyond the scope of such agencies as the Federal Bureau of Investigation. In scores of instances, we have seen these men arrested, watch them brought into court and seen them freed on probation. Yet, in all these instances, I have yet to find a case where the women's clubs of a city arose in condemnation of such an outrage. I have yet to see a case where concerted effort was made to express public opinion through the pressure of the vote. I submit to you that only through this method, only through the voicing of the most urgent of protests, only through the threat of retaliation at the polls, regardless of party, can the power of the people be expressed in its attitude toward crime and its proper punishment imposed. There is too much probation and too little probationary supervision. There is too much parole and practically no follow-up system in many states by which the filthy out-flow of countless prisoners is held in control. Every two hours and a half, prison doors swing wide in freedom for a token of human life. A very few have served their sentences, a few more have been freed by death. The remaining thousands step forth enfolded in the sentimental mantles of parole or other forms of clemency. It is a national disgrace, in a country enriched with the traditions upon which this nation was founded, that the average murderer serves only four years. There was a time in America when if a man committed a crime, he paid for that crime. In those days, the total of crime was surprisingly small. With the increase of the sentimentalists, we find that prison terms have gone steadily downward and that crime has climbed steadily upward - higher and still higher - and so it will continue to climb so long as public apathy allows it to do so. It was apathy which permitted the sentimentalists to make their creeping approach, to build beautiful stories about the sweet, dear convicts, who so loved freedom that they raised canary birds in cages, or placed the picture of some dear old mother upon the walls of their cells. These convict-lovers built beautiful romances about this foul offspring of our national filth. They brought about the beautiful system of traveling bands for convicts, football games for convicts, tennis courts for convicts, radios in the prison blocks and newspapers in every cell. They did all this while the citizen was busy with his own pursuits, selfishly engrossed upon what he thought was his own life. Thus today, the citizen who forgot his vigilance, must pay for his apathy and continue to pay for it so long as no concerted effort is made to eradicate the condition which exists.

"Often we find that the most dangerous convicts are made trusties to go and come as they please. We find scandal after scandal, counterfeiting outfits discovered in prisons, sex killings such as that recently unearthed in a mid-west state, the free passage of narcotics and liquor, the selling of concessions within prison walls and buying of easy tasks, the malfeasance or nonfeasance in office necessary to wholesale escapes. All these things a citizen looks upon as appalling and never once realizes that it is his own fault, his own problem, and his own responsibility. I place before you, therefore, the task of enlightening the thoughtless American upon the necessity for a re-birth of vigilance and the casting out of the lethargy which has brought this nation to a maximum of 1,500,000 serious crimes per year. I do not mean misdemeanors. I mean crimes murder, robbery, arson, aggravated assault and aggravated thefts, until one out of every 16 families is annually a victim of some major violation

of the law. I, therefore, request that you, as the leaders in patriotic America, look upon this as one of your most vital tasks - to insist upon the wider use of fingerprinting, especially of those entrusted with the public welfare; to act as sentinels upon your merchants and see that they do their duty with regard to racketeering; to pound ceaselessly at your newspapers that no infraction of apprehension or criminal procedure go unnoticed and to act as never-ceasing monitors upon your voters in the cleansing of the dirty body of politics. Remember this; wherever there is scandal; wherever there are faulty vice conditions; wherever there is poor enforcement of law; wherever the criminals find an open gateway to freedom through the courtroom - in such places you will find the necessity for the most urgent and most ardent of your activities.

"Lest I be viewed as an alarmist, I suggest that you study it with a view to your own municipality; that you look about you in your home surroundings and the conditions as you find them. What has become of the powerful criminals who committed the most violent of infractions in your communit? How long was required to convict them? What was the sentence and what has become of them, if they were sent to prison? Are they still there, as you were led to believe by the sentence of the court, or are they again free prowling your streets, robbing your homes, and assaulting your citizens?

"In a brief way, I have previously referred to the subject of parole, but not completely. Certainly, there are two sides to the parole question. One is the undeniable fact that properly administered, parole is necessary and beneficial. It is only just and proper that a first offender, through some quirk of his mentality or of fate thrown into the clutches of the law, should be given every possible opportunity to again take his place as an honest citizen. However, it is an outrage that hardened criminals should be paroled time and time again until the total in instances has amounted to as many as 5 or 10 applications of salve-like solicitude which allows these men to walk sneeringly through prison doors, again seize their instruments of depredation, and once more proceed to assault the peace and dignity of America. These include gangsters, robbers, highwaymen, professional housebreakers, ravishers of young children, patricides, matricides and multiple murderers who have done no more to gain freedom other than to merely ask for it. In hundreds upon hundreds of cases we find that new depredations have been committed and new sentences imposed, new imprisonments brought about, and new paroles wafted upon the shoulders of these men, even while the arresting officers in the primary case still believed the subjects were in prison for their original offenses. This is not parole! This is not humanitarian treatment of unfortunates! It is an outright perversion and defeat of our laws. It is a deliberate action of sentimentalists and others more directly and monetarily concerned in breaking down the barriers of law enforcement, in decreasing respect for law, and in making possible a constantly mounting problem for the thin line of last defense upon which depends the safety of the American people. Thousands of men are listed in the fingerprint files of the Federal Bureau of Investigation as violators of parole. Time after time these men are discovered to be under arrest in some distant state. Time after time notification is sent to the parole boards of the

states which list them as violators and time after time these parole boards have refused to return these desperate habitual criminals for their violations. It is a well-known fact in the underworld that such states are listed as desirable ones in which to commit crime. In such places, parole is a slander upon the sanctity of the home. It is absolute freedom without supervision, without pursuit once a state line has been crossed, and without more necessity than the mere writing of an occasional letter. This is an open challenge to the people of America; a sneering grimace at respect for law, a recruiting office for constantly growing armies of criminal conquest which would thrust aside decency, deride honesty, and disarm law enforcement.

"In many areas, this known attitude of clemency continues downward until it is even known to childhood violators of law. In this connection, I wish to remind you that 20% of our crime is committed by youths of less than voting age. Of this 20%, it is a rare thing when a youth is found who has not, to a certain degree, considered the results of his crime before he committed it, who has not reasoned that even though he is caught, he is still, to a degree, safe because of the mercies of probation or parole. We need some good old-fashioned American housecleaning of the kind that will rip off the dirty hangings and let in the light, that will beat out the floor coverings and sweep away the filth which has accumulated through the years of lethargy. Beyond that, we need the old-fashioned influence of the old-fashioned home.

"I am sick of the maunderings of fanatics and tuffet-heads, who believe that the way to educate the new youth is to allow the new youth to do anything it pleases. The days of the revolution brought forth strong men, good men, honest men. Those men were reared in homespun surroundings, upon homespun philosophies. They were reared with a reverence for the American flag and there is need today for a concerted campaign that the reverence for this flag be renewed. It will be a sad day for America when any man must apologize for patriotism. It will be an equally sad day when any person who calls himself an American must apologize to his conscience for the fact that through super-indulgence, through ignorance, through mental laziness, he reared his boy or girl to be a criminal. We need new altitudes of respect, both for the parent and for law. We need a rebuilding of the foundations which made this nation the greatest in all history, bulwarks formed of more staple materials than those of apathy, selfishness or indulgence. America grew and prospered by unswerving loyalty to high ideals, by unfaltering respect and reverence for the law and by the kindly but unfailing vigilance of the home. Until that vigilance is restored, we cannot hope for a lessening of the terrible toll of crime upon the youth of America. Until ideals are restored, we still must see the young armies marching, not toward the advancement of their country, but toward the monotony of the cellblock and the grayness of prison walls. Until we realize that patriotism begins at home; that vigilance is the price of safety; that law-abidance is paramount in all respects; until we understand and know and follow these definite fundamentals, we must continue to face the yellow-fanged force of criminality and realize that it is our master. We must dedicate our services to America in a new war - a combat to save our lives, our homes, our children. Today's teachings become tomorrow's

traditions - may you concern yourselves that they be worthy of the history and heritages upon which your organization is founded and has prospered as it should.

"I would not have you conclude that this picture is painted in arresting colors by a victim of a superheated imagination. On the contrary, it is sketched against a background of stark statistics, and the dismal truths are obvious, no matter from what angle we may view the national crime problem. I wish that I might draw your attention to a portrayal in softer shades, but if I did so, I would only lead your thoughts away from a condition that defies delineation in poulticed phrase.

"It is a sad fact that in our present-day America, more attention is given to the breeding of horse flesh upon the race tracks, to the breeding of dogs upon the hunting field, to the breeding of hogs and cows and chickens than is given to some of our humans. Our boys and our girls are the seedlings of America, to grow as their parents and their surroundings direct. The war of the American Revolution, with its agonies and its privations was not endured for the contemporary generation, but for the happiness, the welfare and the progress of posterity. The same conditions apply today as they applied then - we must look to tomorrow, we must clean away the filth so that those who are young and fresh and clean may not be contaminated. We must struggle against the strangling influences which surround us that we may not be ashamed of the heritage we leave to those who follow. To you, the Daughters of the American Revolution, I entrust this solemn duty. I feel certain I give this task into hands fully worthy of their obligation. Thank you."

#### RESTORATION OF MUTILATED FINGERPRINTS

The recent case of Lloyd Alasataianasala Dale, fugitive from the Sheriff's Office, Stockton, California, who was wanted there for the murder of a railroad policeman, and who was apprehended by the Sheriff at Warren, Ohio, illustrates how efforts will be made by badly wanted fugitives to so mutilate their fingers that identification would be rendered difficult. In this case, the subject admitted to the authorities at Stockton, California, after his apprehension that he had conceived the idea of burning his fingers while warming his hands near a stove, and that he spent one week slowly cooking and burning his finger tips, and that when cooking his meals in the "jungles" in various towns he burned his fingers at every opportunity. The treatment which was given this injured tissue by the Sheriff's Office at Stockton was as follows:

The subject's fingers were placed in a warm solution of water and soft soap by one of the identification officers. About one week later, the subject's fingers were again treated in the same manner, following which his fingerprints were taken. By this time, the dry and dead tissue of the subject's finger was practically removed and the ridges were so restored that a marked improvement was shown on the fingerprint card. This information is being set forth for the aid of identification officers who may encounter this particular situation when fingerprinting a subject.

# FLORENCE MARTIN VICTIM OF A BRUTAL MURDER IDENTIFIED BY FINGERPRINTS OF RIGHT HAND

The Bureau of Criminal Identification of the Cleveland, Ohio, Police Department recently effected an identification from its files in an unusually interesting case. A torso, consisting of the pelvis and thighs, and right arm of a woman, who had apparently been the victim of a brutal murder, was recovered from a basket and a gunny sack found lying in an alley in the rear of the 2300 block of East Twentieth Street, Cleveland, Ohio, on January 26, 1936. The discovery of these gruesome portions of a human body was first reported to the Police Department by an unknown woman who stated that she had been attracted to the scene by a dog that had barked throughout the morning. The head had been hacked from the body in a crude manner, as had been both legs and the left arm. Very little remained by which the unknown deceased person could be identified. Why the victim had been hacked to death and by whom have not as yet been ascertained.

The identity of the victim, however, has been established by the fingerprint experts of the Bureau of Criminal Identification of the Cleveland, Ohio, Police Department, who carefully searched the files of that Bureau, consisting of approximately 100,000 fingerprint cards. The dead woman was identified as Florence Martin, who had been arrested in Cleveland, Ohio, on June 14, 1931, in an apartment which she was suspected of maintaining for immoral purposes. She had also been arrested under the name of Clara Dunn in Washington, D. C., on May 2, 1934, charged with street soliciting and she later returned to Cleveland where she was again arrested on October 3, 1934, charged with selling liquor. After identifying the deceased by means of the fingerprints of the right hand, her Bertillon photograph was identified by the proprietress of the rooming house where she had been living since May, 1935. From an examination of the personal effects in her trunk additional information as to her past was obtained. The remains were turned over to relatives on January 30, 1936, and taken to North Gerard, Pennsylvania, for burial.

The officials of the Cleveland, Ohio, Police Department, in reporting the above identification to the Federal Bureau of Investigation pointed out that every law abiding citizen should also have the same advantages which fingerprints afford criminals. The communication stated that when criminals are accidentally or otherwise killed or injured, they are usually identified by their fingerprints and their families notified. Honest persons, on the other hand, may be put to rest unidentified in some potter's field because they have neglected to avail themselves of the opportunity to place their fingerprints on file for purposes of identification.

# AUTO THIEVES MODUS OPERANDI AND TOOLS UTILIZED

With the arrest and conviction of three men, all with long criminal records, and the seizure of elaborate equipment for manufacturing car keys, changing motor numbers, and preparing false bills of sale and ownership registration certificates, Pasadena Police officers, aided by Special Agents of the Department of Justice and the National Auto Theft Bureau, recently put to an end the activities of an auto theft ring that had been operating in several states over a period of several months.

An attempt to dispose of one of three stolen 1935 Ford V-8 automobiles that had been driven to California from Detroit, Michigan, led to the expose of the three and prevented them from carrying out their confessed intention of stealing fourteen 1935 Ford V-8 cars in Southern California. The subjects arrested, together with their aliases, are: Ernest Richard Erickson, alias George Collins and William Andrews; Walter Hank, alias Glenn Masters, alias Roy Hough; John McGrath, alias George Wallace.

On December 7, 1935, Pasadena detectives were detailed to a local Ford agency to investigate a man who had just sold a car to the dealer. There the officers found William Andrews (Erickson) with a Ford two-door sedan bearing motor #18-1905098, and California license #6-X-7652. Investigation indicated to the officers that while the numbers on the motor and frame appeared to be regular, close observation revealed a difference in the paint on the frame as a whole and the paint covering the portion where the frame number is located. On the strength of this irregularity, the officers placed Andrews under arrest.

The National Auto Theft Bureau was notified and an agent from that organization determined, through processing, that the original motor number had been altered. The true number - #18-1686627 - was rendered visible and was verified by inspection of the secret number on the car. A check of this number revealed that the car had been stolen in Detroit, Michigan, November 18, 1935. Further investigation showed that the car had been cleared into California under the changed motor number, in the name of William Andrews, 937 Atlantic Boulevard, Long Beach, California, on November 26, 1935, upon the surrender of a 1935 Tennessee Certificate of Registration, Tennessee license #330-906, in the name of Roy Hough (Hank). The reverse side of the certificate showed the sale of the car by Roy Hough to William Andrews.

Questioned at length, Andrews, or Erickson, first maintained that he was a professional photographer and produced business cards that bore the Long Beach address. Only after the officers had checked the address and found that Andrews never had lived there or worked there did he tell the following story.

He had become acquainted with Hank and McGrath in Detroit during the early part of 1935. McGrath and Hank, at that time, were engaged

in stealing cars in and around Detroit. Approximately six weeks before the time of his arrest in Pasadena, Erickson, together with Hank and Mc-Grath, made a trip to Tennessee where they visited several county seats and secured seventeen sets of new license plates which were registered under various fictitious names. These plates were shipped back to Detroit by mail.

Between November 16th and November 18th of last year, Hank and McGrath stole three Ford automobiles in Detroit, and Erickson assisted in changing the motor numbers on these vehicles to correspond with the numbers appearing on three of the fictitious Tennessee registration certificates. The corresponding Tennessee license numbers were placed on the cars, and the other fourteen plates shipped to California. Then, on November 18th, the trio left for California in the three stolen cars, having previously designated a Los Angeles hotel as their meeting-place.

Enroute to California, the car driven by McGrath was damaged when it sideswiped a truck, and upon arrival in Los Angeles it was placed in a garage for repairs.

Erickson, under the name of Andrews, rented a room in Long Beach to establish a California residence, and Hank, under the name of Glen Masters, rented a room in Hollywood for the same purpose. Neither occupied the rooms rented. The three then met, and Hank and McGrath "sold" to each other the cars they had driven from Detroit. They even took the precaution of having the "sales" notarized. This was done, of course, as a cover-up move to make them appear as the innocent purchasers of stolen cars should suspicion be aroused. Each then proceeded to clear his car into California and obtain California license plates and registration by surrendering the Tennessee registration certificate of the car in his possession. The next step was to sell the car and it was in his attempt to do this that Erickson was apprehended.

Erickson furnished the Pasadena officers with a description of his accomplices and told them that in his hotel room they would find a small box containing the other fourteen Tennessee license plates, registration certificates, and other equipment used by the gang in its operations.

The officers proceeded to the hotel where they interviewed the clerk, John Belden, who refused them admittance to Erickson's room. As the officers were talking to Belden, two men walked through the lobby and were recognized by the officers as fitting the descriptions of Hank and McGrath. They followed the men from the hotel and apprehended them in a small restaurant nearby.

The officers noticed a 1935 Ford sedan across the street, and upon investigation they discovered that this was the second car, the one registered to Glen Masters (Hank) which bore fictitious motor number #18-1452-500 and California license #6-W-9851. The true motor number later was developed by processing and determined to be #18-1803-567. In this car the officers found Hank's personal belongings. He had just checked out of another hotel nearby, they learned, and evidently was about to "blow."

From McGrath the officers learned the location of the third car which had been placed in a shop for repairs. This car still bore the Tennessee license plates and fictitious registration certificate. The fictitious motor number, #18-1906-561, was processed and the true number found to be #18-1844-147. Information received from Detroit established the theft records of these two cars also.

The next day the Pasadena officers, accompanied this time by Erickson, returned to the hotel for the box of evidence. To Erickson's surprise and the officers' disappointment, the box had been removed. Inasmuch as Hank and McGrath had been in the hotel just prior to their arrest, suspicion turned toward them. Both, however, stood pat on their denial of any knowledge of the disappearance of the box.

Believing the clerk, Belden, to have guilty knowledge regarding the removal of the box, the officers decided to lay a trap that would cause him to produce it if such were the case. Accordingly, on December 12th, Erickson, and an agent of the National Auto Theft Detail posing as his attorney, returned to the hotel when Belden was on duty. Erickson asked for the box. Without hesitation, Belden produced it from a hotel storeroom, remarking at the time that he had "slipped it over on those dumb clucks from Pasadena." Erickson and his "attorney" left, and the following day Belden was arrested and charged with conspiracy. Belden, who, it later was learned, had a record of previous conviction of burglary, alone refused to talk. He would admit no participation in the affair and even denied he had produced the box for Erickson.

The box revealed what officers agreed was one of the most complete outfits for the perpetration of automobile thefts on a large scale that they had ever seen. Some of the outstanding items were: fourteen sets of Tennessee license plates (new) with ownership certificates; three pads of bill of sale blanks headed "Nashville Automobile Sales, 710 Main Street, Marshall, Tennessee" (these had been printed in Detroit); one rubber stamp (made in Los Angeles) reading, "Nashville Automobile Sales PAID" with a changeable date arrangement; one Notary Seal which Erickson declared had been given to him by one Percy Brown who in turn had stolen it in Nashville in May, 1935; one set Ford number dies; three dozen blank cylinder keys for Ford cars; one Clipper key machine; one list of Code numbers for keys; one "Digest of Motor Laws" containing information pertaining to the procedure followed in issuing ownership registrations and certificates of title of all forty-eight states; one electric buffer; one electric drop cord with cage; one small paint gun (for spraying enamel on location after number changes); two long slender screwdrivers; two small, flat, thin files; two heavy-duty jacks; one metal box with large assortment of mechanics' tools; one spring bar, eighteen inches long with one end turned up perpendicularly.

The method of operation was as follows: The last-mentioned item, the spring bar, was used for springing the bottom of the right door handle sufficiently to expose the screw holding the lock in the door. When this screw was removed with a long, slim screwdriver, the lock was pulled, and the number obtained therefrom. With this number reference

was made to the key code book and a key made immediately with the key clipper. The lock and screw were replaced, and, as the door key also fits the ignition, the car was driven off in less than three minutes from the start of the operations.

The next step was to buff the numbers from the motor and frame, stamp new numbers that would correspond with the numbers appearing on the fictitious registration certificates previously obtained, "sell" the cars to each other as previously explained, move to another state, obtain new registration certificates, and dispose of the cars.

Through fingerprints sent to the Federal Bureau of Investigation it was determined that all three had previous criminal records as automobile thieves. Erickson, at the time of his arrest, already had served terms in three penitentiaries, Leavenworth, McNeil's Island and Joliet on charges of conspiracy, using the mails to defraud, and auto theft respectively. His record also showed numerous arrests in Chicago for various crimes. McGrath, it was revealed, had served time at Atlanta and Leavenworth for violations of the National Motor Vehicle Theft Act. Among numerous other arrests was one in Plymouth, Michigan, for tampering with an auto. Hank was found to have served terms in the Colorado and Nebraska penitentiaries for auto theft.

The priseners furnished the investigating officers with information on eight more cars that had been stolen in Michigan, seven of which had been disposed of through a fence in New Jersey. Additional information unearthed during the investigation furnished Detroit authorities with valuable clues in their investigation of two robberies and a murder committed in that city several months ago.

On January 14th of this year, Erickson, Hank and McGrath appeared before Federal Judge Yankwitch in Los Angeles and pleaded guilty to charges of violation of the Dyer Act and Conspiracy. Hank and McGrath were sentenced to serve five years on the Dyer Act charge and two years on Conspiracy, the sentences to run concurrently. Erickson was sentenced to serve three years on the Dyer Act charge and two years on Conspiracy, the sentences also to run concurrently.

#### ANNOUNCEMENT - APPLICANT FINGERPRINTS

The Bureau wishes to announce a change in its policy concerning the submission of applicant fingerprints transmitted by law enforcement organizations for search against the identification records to ascertain whether a criminal record exists. Heretofore, law enforcement officials have been requested to submit applicant fingerprints on the criminal form and it is the request of the Bureau that in the future the personal identification form be utilized for this particular purpose in lieu of the criminal fingerprint card. When these applicant prints are received in the Bureau's Identification Division a notation will be stamped thereon to the effect that they are applicant prints and they will be inserted in the criminal files of the Bureau, unless a request is made by the law enforcement organization for the return thereof.

#### **LOTTERIES**

Numerous inquiries are received by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, concerning the authenticity of lottery tickets sold in the United States. Requests are made for information as to the dependability of the promoters of the respective lotteries, and many individuals request the Bureau's opinion as to whether they should invest their funds by participating in these lotteries, variously termed "sweepstakes", "trust funds", and "contests".

A lottery concerning which many inquiries are received both at the headquarters of the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the offices of the Provincial Police of the Province of Quebec, Canada, is that operated under the name "St. Paul Hospital Trust Fund", with headquarters supposedly at Ste. Anne de Beaupre, Quebec. The exact status of the St. Paul Hospital Trust Fund is most aptly disclosed in the following letter received from Lieutenant Colonel Leon Lambert, Chief of Provincial Police, Quebec, Quebec, Canada, who has consented to its publication:

"Provincial Police Parliament Buildings Quebec March the 12th, 1936.

"Mr. Edgar Hoover, Director, Federal Bureau of Investigation, Washington, D. C.

"Dear Sir:

- "1. A large number of American citizens and many police officers write me to inquire on the legality or genuineness of sweepstakes and presently and more specially about the St. Paul Hospital Trust Fund with headquarters at Ste. Anne de Beaupre.
- "2. Sweepstakes are absolutely illegal in this Country but although they are banned and being stopped, some organizations succeed in putting books of tickets for sale and this, more specially in the United States of America. Hundreds of thousands of lottery tickets and stubs have been seized down here and we are prosecuting those who contravene our Criminal Code and its anti-sweepstake clauses.
- "3. The Redemptorist Fathers, of Ste. Anne de Beaupre, have warned the public in general and the many thousands of Canadian and American pilgrims who annually visit the famous shrine, that the authorities at the shrine are not in any way connected with the organization which has been operating under the name of 'The St. Paul Hospital Trust Fund' and which, claiming to have headquarters at Ste. Anne de Beaupre, has been selling tickets in the name of the hospital fund mentioned.

"4. If we judge by the big number of inquiries received, there is no doubt that an immense number of books of tickets for this sweep-stake are being sold in the United States and I think that the public of America should be told that sweepstakes are absolutely illegal in this country, that the one I refer to has nothing to do with the Ste. Anne de Beaupre shrine, that its sponsors are unknown and that subscriptions or purchases of tickets of this character should be discouraged, for the subscribers are only throwing away their money without any hope of getting it back.

In a subsequent communication, Lieutenant Colonel Lambert advises that six of the promoters of the St. Paul Hospital Trust Fund have been apprehended and are being prosecuted before the Court.

### SPECIAL ANNOUNCEMENT CONCERNING THE REGISTRATION OF STOLEN PROPERTY

The Federal Bureau of Investigation desires to announce its pleasure at the gratifying number of reports of stolen property received from law enforcement and other sources, in order that these data may be properly recorded in the Bureau's National Stolen Property File, the inauguration of which was the basis for an announcement in the April 1, 1936, issue of the FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin.

The Bureau desires to emphasize to all of its correspondents and contributors the necessity for advising it promptly of the recovery by them of stolen property, with complete detailed descriptions of the property recovered and advice as to (1) whether said recovered stolen property has been definitely identified as to ownership, together with the name and address of the owner, or (2) whether said recovered stolen property remains unidentified as to ownership, in order that the full, detailed description received may form the basis for search in the Bureau's National Stolen Property File for the purpose of effecting an identification.

It will be borne in mind, of course, that the purpose of this file is that law enforcement and other organizations may be advised promptly of the identity of the owners of stolen property, through appropriate search of the records in the Bureau's National Stolen Property File.

# FINGERPRINTS OF UNKNOWN MURDER VICTIM FORWARDED BY WIRE PHOTO IDENTIFIED THROUGH FILES OF THE FBI

The science of crime detection and identification has been greatly accelerated within recent years by reason of the improved facilities in transporting fingerprints to the Federal Bureau of Investigation by air mail, where a search of the files of the Identification Division discloses whether or not the subject has a prior fingerprint record. In the past, when it was necessary to immediately ascertain whether a certain individual possessed a criminal record, the local law enforcement agencies have classified the prints when taken and set forth the classification and other identifying data in a telegram to the Bureau. An identification based upon such information, under the most favorable conditions, can only be considered as a possible identification because in dactyloscopy it is essential that the finger impressions, or an exact reproduction of those impressions, be compared with the fingerprint card contained in the files, before a positive identification can be effected. Recently, the facilities of wire photo were successfully employed in establishing a positive identification of an unknown murder victim through the files of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

On May 13, 1936, the Detroit News, Detroit, Michigan, sent to its Washington correspondent a wire photo of the fingerprints and photograph of a dead man, whose body was recovered on that date from the North Branch of the River Rouge on Gulley Road just west of the bridge. The body contained a number of bullets indicative of a gang killing. Preliminary efforts to identify the "ride" victim had been unsuccessful, the only mark of identification being a coat label bearing the address "Meadville, Pennsylvania." The wire photo was delivered to the Federal Bureau of Investigation and when searched through the fingerprint files of the Identification Division disclosed the identity of the deceased as one Charles William Poole, arrested by the Sheriff at Dodge City, Kansas, on December 17, 1926, on a charge of vagrancy - train riding. Upon effecting the identification, the Chief of Detectives of the Detroit, Michigan, Police Department was immediately notified by telephone on the same date.

the fingerprint card indicated that Harrison had resided in Abilene, Texas, for several years and very little was known concerning him. When arrested he became a raving maniac and would not permit his fingerprints to be taken in the orthodox manner so as to obtain a clear rolled impression of each finger.

The Police Department was successful, however, in obtaining flat impressions of all the fingers of each hand, taken simultaneously, which were forwarded to the Bureau. In spite of the incomplete patterns, the technical experts of the Identification Division of the Bureau were able to identify the fingerprints with those of J. L. King, who had escaped on November 18, 1920, from the State Prison, Deer Lodge, Montana, where he was serving a sentence of from three and one-half to seven years for the crime of rape. The authorities at Abilene, Texas, and Deer Lodge, Montana, were immediately notified by telegram of the identification. According to a notation contained in the Bureau's files, King had previously escaped from the same institution, but was later captured and returned. He had also been arrested by the Sheriff at Danville, Illinois, on August 9, 1933, charged with suspicion and released.

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# JAMES CARTER IDENTIFIED BY FINGERPRINTS TWENTY-FIVE YEARS AFTER HIS ESCAPE

The identification of wanted persons by means of fingerprints is one of the important functions of the Identification Division of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. The case of James Carter is of unusual interest in that Carter was identified as a fugitive twenty-five years after his escape on May 19, 1911, from the State Reformatory, Granite, Oklahoma. According to information appearing on the fingerprint card received in the Bureau on July 24, 1935, from the prison officials at Granite, Oklahoma, Carter entered the Oklahoma State Penitentiary, McAlester, Oklahoma, on July 17, 1909, to serve a sentence of three years for the crime of larceny, was transferred to the State Reformatory, Granite, Oklahoma, on March 18, 1911, and escaped two months later.

In the meantime, Carter committed the crime of grand larceny of which he was convicted and sentenced at Spirit Lake, Kansas, on September 9, 1918, to serve from one to five years in the State Penitentiary, Lansing, Kansas, where he was received on October 6, 1918, under the name of John H. Sanford. The Federal Bureau of Investigation received a fingerprint card from the Sheriff's Office, Marshall, Michigan, reflecting the arrest of one J. H. Sanford on a charge of disorderly and drunk, with trial set for April 22, 1936. When searched through the files of the Identification Division, the fingerprints of Sanford were found to be identical with those of Carter. The Superintendent of the State Reformatory at Granite, Oklahoma, was accordingly notified of the identification by telegram on April 20, 1936.

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





#### OFFENSES KNOWN TO THE POLICE, MARCH AND APRIL, 1936.

In order to make available current information regarding fluctuations in the amount of crime in the United States, there is presented in the following tabulation the number of major offenses reported by the police departments of 68 cities with more than 100,000 inhabitants for March and April, 1936. The figures are also presented in the form of daily averages. In view of the difference in the number of days in those two months, it is recommended that the daily averages be used in making comparisons in the amount of crime reported for those two months.

The compilation discloses decreases during April in the daily average number of offenses of murder, robbery, assault, burglary, larceny, and auto theft. The remaining offense classes show practically no change from March.
