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The Federal Bureau of Investigation, United States Department of Justice, is charged with the duty of investigating violations of the laws of the United States and collecting evidence in cases in which the United States is or may be a party in interest.

The following list indicates some of the major violations over which the Bureau has investigative jurisdiction:-

National Motor Vehicle Theft Act

Interstate transportation of stolen property valued at \$5,000 or more

National Bankruptcy Act

Interstate flight to avoid prosecution or testifying in certain cases

White Slave Traffic Act

Impersonation of Government Officials

Larceny of Goods in Interstate Commerce

Killing or Assaulting Federal Officer

Cases involving transportation in interstate or foreign commerce of any persons who have been kidnaped

Extortion cases in which interstate commerce or interstate communication is an element

Theft, Embezzlement or Illegal Possession of Government Property Antitrust Laws

Robbery of National Banks and Member Banks of Federal Reserve System National Bank and Federal Reserve Act Violations, such as embezzlement, abstraction or misapplication of funds

Crimes on any kind of Government reservation, including Indian Reservations or in any Government building or other Government property

Neutrality violations, including the shipment of arms to friendly nations

Frauds against the Government

Crimes in connection with the Federal Penal and Correctional Institutions Perjury, embezzlement, or bribery in connection with Federal Statutes or officials

Crimes on the high seas

Federal Anti-Racketeering Statute

The location of persons who are fugitives from justice by reason of violations of the Federal Laws over which the Bureau has jurisdiction, of escaped Federal prisoners, and parole and probation violators.

The Bureau does not have investigative jurisdiction over the violations of Counterfeiting, Narcotic, Customs, Immigration, or Postal Laws.

Law enforcement officials possessing information concerning violations over which the Bureau has investigative jurisdiction are requested to promptly forward the same to the Special Agent in Charge of the nearest field division of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, United States Department of Justice. The address of each field division of this Bureau appears on the inside back cover of this bulletin. Government Rate Collect telegrams or telephone calls will be accepted if information indicates that immediate action is necessary.

By this method may the work left unfinished by the untimely passing of associates be completed.

LAW ENFORCEMENT AND THE PUBLISHER

Remarks of John Edgar Hoover, Director, Federal Bureau of Investigation, United States Department of Justice, at the Annual Dinner of the American Newspaper Publishers Association at New York City, on April 22, 1937.

In appearing before the members of the American Newspaper Publishers Association, I feel highly honored, greatly indebted, and filled with the hope that I may say something of interest about a problem with which we are both concerned - that of our responsibility toward law-enforcement. If the officer is the guardian of the law, then the free press is the guardian of the officer and it is our dependence upon this trust of yours that I want to discuss tonight. For your freedom carries with it, as we all know, great responsibilities.

First, let me remind you that the criminal hates and loves publicity. Likewise, he hates and loves secrecy. Both serve his purpose in seeking to defeat the law and both can be the factors which will bring him his just punishment. Therefore, the newspaper has a great responsibility in the handling of news concerning crime, which, directly or indirectly, casts its menacing shadow over every home into which your newspaper goes.

I wonder if crime has ever been viewed in its proper magnitude as it affects the persons who make your newspapers possible? The subject of crime and crime news enters into every phase of the daily lives of your We must all admit that there is no more sinister force in the United States than that of the 4,300,000 persons who are engaged by day and by night in the commission of felonies which proceed at the rate of one every twenty-four seconds. Last year, it is estimated that 1,333,526 major crimes were committed in our country - a murder or manslaughter every forty minutes - a robbery every ten minutes - a burglary every two minutes - a case of larceny every forty-four seconds! And the annual crime bill of the nation is estimated at fifteen billions of dollars -- ten dollars per month for each man, woman and child! There is not a family in America which is not, in one form or another, paying this continuing taxation, levied by the assessors of the underworld. These families comprise the subscribers of the newspapers of America, and they turn to the newspapers for information, for aid, and for guidance.

I am afraid that America would be chaotic indeed were it not for the fearlessness of those editors who are brave enough to point out evidences of municipal corruption, or of criminal affiliations as they see them. That the press speaks all too often to an apathetic audience is unfortunate; that it continues to speak certainly commands the highest of commendation.

Therefore, the problem I want to discuss is not one which the unthinking person so often alleges, namely, that newspapers print too much pointless crime news, or that newspapers simply aid the criminal. It is rather one of distilling the wide and varied efforts of the many publishers into a purer and more clarified viewpoint and program by which the desires

of the forward-looking newspaperman may be accomplished for the good of all.

I have said that a criminal loves and hates publicity, and in this axiom lies, I believe, the explanation of some of the condemnation placed upon newspapers by those who believe that some newspapers aid crime. To understand this statement, one must understand the psychology of the criminal, which first of all demands a certain peculiar type of ego and love of self-aggrandizement, a desire to be in the forefront, to be admired, to be talked about, even though he must murder some honest citizen to obtain that position.

Practically every bandit-desperado of recent years, a type which I prefer to term "public rat," rather than "public enemy," fed his ego, and assembled his so-called courage for new depredations by what a person in other pursuits might call his press notices. Every time some unthinking writer referred to him as daring, or courageous, or romantic, or brave, or shrewd, or clever, it fed the flames of his ego, and burned him with new desires to rob more banks, plunder more citizens, and kill more people to keep the fires of publicity burning.

The best way to deflate ego-maniac individuals is to tell the whole truth about them. I have said that the criminal hates publicity, and indeed he does when it truthfully depicts his rat-like existence, his self-centered mind, his cowardice, his craven stealthiness. Had John Dillinger been depicted for the filthy type of vermin that he was, crawling through the holes of our law-enforcement, rather, than as one series of articles portrayed him, as a clever and adventurous individual given to a marked degree of chivalry of Robin Hood proportions, perhaps there would not be so many silly boys now in penitentiaries for having tried to emulate him. One of the bitterest complaints Alvin Karpis made to me after his capture at New Orleans was that I had publicly branded him a "rat." That hit home. He knew it was true.

I trust my next remarks will be received as those of a man who does not pretend to know anything about the newspaper publishing business, but, who, through grim circumstances, has had to learn something about crime and criminals. Reverting to my statement that a criminal loves publicity, I have only to think of the numerous unfortunate occasions when publicity has resulted in the continuation of criminal careers.

There was, for instance, in a Midwest city, the publicity-seeking police officer who could not refrain from supplying a newspaper with the confidential knowledge that plans were being made by Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation and local officers to apprehend John Dillinger upon his planned return the following day for medical aid. The information was printed and, of course, John Dillinger did not walk into the trap which had been laid for him by the authorities. Instead, he was able to continue his depredations for several months. Thousands of additional dollars were necessary for his pursuit and the plunder of armories and banking institutions multiplied from the continued activities of this "mad dog."

In the case of Alvin Karpis, who held the headlines for a brief time, one newspaper could not resist the temptation to "jump the gun" on a tip it had received that Karpis was about to be captured. Karpis was not captured at that time. In the case of "Machine Gun" Kelly, one of the kidnapers of Charles Urschel, plans had been laid to entrap him when, in a Northern city, he picked up a newspaper which emblazoned across the first page the information that "Machine Gun" Kelly was about to be arrested there. It was necessary to chase him several thousand miles farther before the Federal Bureau of Investigation and local officers captured him at Memphis, Tennessee.

I could continue with these examples throughout the cases of many public rats who have been sought by the Federal Bureau of Investigation within the last few years. However, I have no desire to appear as a critic of the press in general, because it has only been a small minority of the press which has thoughtlessly, I believe, been unwitting parties to these instances of obstruction of justice. No one appreciates the cooperation, the earnest assistance, the forthrightness, and honesty of the American free press better than we of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

I view this meeting rather as a clinic in which we have gathered as physicians looking to the cure of a malignant disease, namely crime, which has fastened itself upon America, viewing its symptoms and its possible remedies and seeking to correct any defects in a selected mode of treatment, through frank and sincere cooperation and consultation. Incidentally, the foregoing instances will indicate why the Federal Bureau of Investigation sometimes proceeds on cases without consulting local authorities. We cooperate always when circumstances otherwise permit, except when experience shows local agencies to be publicity-mad, crooked, or incompetent. Fortunately, the Federal Bureau of Investigation has received excellent cooperation from the police agencies of the nation and the departments with which we cannot work shoulder to shoulder are in the great minority. To those state and local agencies which have so efficiently and wholeheartedly cooperated with our Bureau, we owe a tremendous debt.

Since I have cited instances in which over-enthusiasm for news, or over-eagerness to supply the demands of subscribers have brought about unfortunate results, I desire at this time to pay my respects to all news-papermen, and especially those of the city of New York for what was to me the perfect example of newspaper cooperation in law-enforcement. This concerned the arrest of Bruno Richard Hauptmann, the kidnaper of Charles Lindbergh, Jr.

Here was a case in which the efforts of all law-enforcement throughout America had been bent to the utmost for months. This was especially true of the Federal Bureau of Investigation which was given the task, more than a year after the commission of the crime, of coordinating efforts for the pursuit of this criminal, and toward that end had worked night and day upon tedious, painstaking plans which were approaching their culmination.

Steadily and surely, through the aid of eager and efficient

local law-enforcement bodies, the net had been drawn about the offender; bank notes were being traced through purchases; it had been established that the wanted man was a carpenter; that he lived in a certain part of the Bronx; that he was spending ransom money more and more openly. Bank clerks were on the look-out for him; storekeepers everywhere were aiding us. All of this could have failed if one single newspaper, or one single newspaperman had been unable to keep the tremendous secret which had passed throughout law-enforcement; that the forces of law and order were about to close in upon this fiend; that his arrest was a matter only of days, perhaps hours.

If a single line of type had appeared anywhere saying that the Lindbergh kidnaper was known, that he was about to be arrested, there would have been immediate flight, and the solution of the Lindbergh case would perhaps have been as far away as ever. But through the great pulsating world of newspaperdom that secret remained a secret; the lips of newspapermen were closed; not once did the clatter of the linotype machine make known this most important knowledge. The result was that Bruno Richard Hauptmann remained unaware of the tremendous plans that were approaching consummation until at last he walked into the trap — a trap perfected through cooperation, through coordination, on a common ground of fidelity and zealousness. I cannot praise that spirit too highly; I cannot commend too greatly the newspapermen who made it possible.

It is with this status of perfection in mind that I have cited the other instances when publicity has defeated or detained the law. The fact that the Hauptmann case was handled so excellently shows that the spirit is there. If the flesh is sometimes weak, may I suggest that to a law-enforcement officer of integrity and earnestness every case is another Lindbergh case, whether it be a kidnaping, a bank robbery, or a crime of less importance. For we never know when the petty criminal of today is to become the madman of tomorrow.

But let us contrast the helpfulness of the press in the Lindbergh case with the situation which existed in a more recent major kidnaping case under the jurisdiction of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. A group of press representatives issued an ultimatum to the father of the kidnaped person to the effect that unless he would agree to permit them to interview the victim immediately upon his release by the kidnaper, they would continue to "picket" the home of this distraught parent throughout the twenty-four hours of the day and night and they would follow any relative who might leave the home to make contact with the kidnaper. I am sure that the editors of these papers did not realize the true significance and consequences of that action.

Crime news may sometimes not be news until it is published. The printing of information concerning the sudden activity of relatives of kidnaped persons, or of officers in cases of apprehension can be of ultimate interest only to one person -- that is the man whom those officers are endeavoring to apprehend. The temptation to "jump the gun" on news concerning the identity or apprehension of criminals is a temptation to the underworld which has been offered unconsciously by the press.

There have been instances when press representatives have attempted to make comparisons or contrasts between the effectiveness of lawenforcement agencies in dealing with certain types of situations. May I suggest that such action serves to confuse the public in erroneously creating the impression of a lack of cooperation between police agencies and tends to destroy confidence in organizations which are attempting to do their best to serve their communities. The common basis of all law-enforcement agencies is the public welfare and anything which tends to create doubt in the public mind concerning the cooperative endeavors of police agencies serves as an aid and comfort to the criminal.

I revert to my statement that a criminal loves and hates secrecy. What he hates most of all is his inability to find in any newspaper the details of law-enforcement activities which will allow him to know the names of the officers who are seeking him, or reveal their photographs, or tell of the plans by which he is to be apprehended. That secrecy chills the heart of a criminal, and by that secrecy newspapers can achieve a great accomplishment in the protection of the public and their readers through the more frequent capture of dangerous wanted men.

As for the secrecy which the criminal loves, it is the lack of publicity upon community or local matters having to do with the efficiency of law-enforcement or the stultifying influence of politics upon those who seek to enforce the law. Crime lives and thrives by this sort of secrecy. When an influential criminal is arrested in your community, he immediately assembles his powers of influence, his high-paid lawyers-criminal, his alibi witnesses, and all the rest of the machinery by which such an offender seeks to defeat the law. He hopes above all else that the newspapers will refrain from probing deeply into the activities by which he plans to remain free. He does not want you to demand a quick trial or to continue to demand that trial until it is brought about. He does not want you to delve into the political affiliations he may be employing to delay indictment or to influence witnesses. He does not want you to ask with some asperity where he got the money to hire the most expensive set of lawyers in your vicinity. He wants you to forget all these things.

It seems to me that in matters of this kind, every newspaper has an opportunity to demonstrate the finest type of journalism. Through you, your subscribers can ask why the big criminal gets away and the little fellow is sent to prison. Through you, they can demand to know why some lawenforcement agencies are lenient toward offenders of political affiliation but highly efficient when the unaffiliated, the poverty-stricken, the poor, come to the bar of justice. Through you, they expect that vicious offenders will be held to the sentence meted out to them in court and not be able to melt steel bars of prison into pliable putty through the use of underworld influence or underworld money. You are their voice and their protector, and to be their protector, both you and our group must be implacable; we must be unremitting. And you know, better than any less informed persons can know, just how true my statement is that crooked politicians aid and abet arson, robbery, and murder.

It is not enough to carry on sporadic campaigns against vice or lawlessness, ceasing these campaigns with the throwing of a few sacrificial bodies into the flames. A campaign against lawlessness can succeed only when the roots of that lawlessness are torn up one by one, and the forces behind the active criminals are exposed and brought to justice.

If I were a publisher, and I realize this is a most dangerous thing to say, I would apply the same principles to crime that newspapers have applied to medicine. Certainly the average American newspaper subscriber is better equipped to evaluate his health because of the campaigns of education which have been carried on by skilled men of science and medicine in the columns of their newspapers. I believe persons can be taught by the proper writers and proper specialists how better to protect their homes against robbery; how to recognize swindlers; how to stave off the racketeer and the chiseler and the petty embezzler; how to recognize a venal violator of public trust when he begins his nefarious activities; how to understand and demand a proper type of law-enforcement; how to understand the need for appropriations for proper police equipment, proper police personnel, and proper scientific development of law-enforcement. All these are subjects which are crying for consideration because the American newspaper subscriber today is asking in general terms how he can be protected and how crime can be reduced. You are the medium to supply the answer in words and pictures which everyone can understand.

Another important problem in connection with proper law-enforcement is one dealing with the administration of our parole systems in the various states. This problem is perhaps more complicated than ever, because of the efforts of interested persons to conceal the true severity of the situation and, by their twisting of apparent facts, to seek to muddle the public mind concerning it. I am a firm believer in the principle of parole but I have said before and I say now that the administration of parole systems in all too many of our States approaches a national scandal.

Parole today is becoming one of the major menaces of our country. Through its misapplication, convicts are being freed with little or no supervision, and often with no sound reason for release. In my opinion, there can only be one reason why thousands upon thousands of criminals who have repeatedly committed crimes are set free to commit other and often more dangerous offenses against the law. This is the failure of public officials to faithfully carry out their public trust. And this dangerous condition should be exposed. There is no power but yours to do it.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation maintains a list of 13,516 of the most desperate, vicious enemies of society. Of these, 3,948 have been recipients of either sob-sister or sentimental or monetary or politically-controlled pardon or parole, not once but, in many cases, time after time. Every Special Agent of the FBI who has died in gun battle with criminals has been sent to his death by a gun in the hands of a paroled convict. Not one was a first offender, they were all paroled convicts. I do not believe that prison doors should be opened by sentimental sob-sisters to such men as Alvin Karpis, John Dillinger, Harvey Bailey, Harry Brunette, "Baby

Face" Nelson or the rest of their recidivist, habitually and professionally criminal clan of plunderers, sex criminals, and murderers whose freedom can only place a stain upon the theory and practice of parole.

Such maladministration creates only enemies to society. It cheapens the dignity of law-enforcement. It lowers the majesty of the law in the estimation of persons who deliberately commit infractions. It is a problem to be weighed and attacked by every home-loving person. I ask that all of you give of your time, your thoughts, your efforts and your great power that this horrible tangle of misapplied clemency be stricken from the list of our problems.

Another barnacle which clogs law-enforcement - a monumental fake which has too long been perpetrated upon the American public - is the prison sentence which says one thing and means another. The newspaper subscriber must be taught that he should not be lulled to peaceful acquiescence when a judge sentences a man to prison for twenty years, knowing full well that he will be out in five. Prison sentences today are largely a matter of division and subtraction. The criminal knows it and takes advantage of it. There is no such thing as a life prisoner - the average man who receives a life sentence for murder serves less than ten years and the average sentence served by persons convicted of murder is only $43\frac{1}{2}$ months.

Many of our prisons are disorganized; they are ill-kept; they often are hot beds of vice and agitation. Punishment in many states has all but become a thing of the past. Some of our prisons may well be classed as country clubs, while others are mere temporary stopping places for persons who have violated our laws. Many of them are badly manned and are easily accessible to escape, like sieves through which the rats placed in them may depart almost at will. In many prisons, the inmates are granted the benefits of the radio, of the daily newspaper, selected magazines, the latest movies, orchestras, traveling bands, hand decorated cells, tennis, baseball, handball, basketball and football, and any other amusement which over-sympathetic and sob-sister wardens or prison boards may contrive so they may better enjoy their stay behind bars.

This is not punishment. It does not create respect for law. So long as such idiotic, disgraceful, sentimental convict-coddling persists, the majesty of the law cannot be looked upon with the seriousness necessary to bring about the respect which it should command.

The press has done more than any other public group to arouse and crystallize public attention upon the evils and abuses which exist in the administration of our parole and penal systems. Some improvement has been noted as a result but much remains to be done. I am indeed hopeful that the free press of our country will not relax in its crusade against these evils, because it is only by unceasing vigilance and persistence that effective and lasting results may be accomplished.

If every publisher would dedicate a column on the front page of his paper to a statement of the status of crime and criminals in his com-

munity, it would be informative not only to their readers but it would also tend to make more alert and diligent those public servants charged with the enforcement and administration of the laws.

I trust I have not been misinterpreted as one who merely criticizes. I hope the debt of law-enforcement to the press has been made clear and that you fully understand my personal feeling of that indebtedness. What I have said has been advanced only as the views of one seeking to bring about frank discussion of an important problem so that a good friend can be made into even a more able one. Only cooperation and mutual understanding can bring success to our endeavors. But the goal of that success is the eradication of concerted and professional criminality throughout the nation. May we all give our most earnest efforts toward its early attainment.

FBI NATIONAL POLICE ACADEMY

The fifth session of the FBI National Police Academy began May 3, 1937, and will continue for a period of twelve weeks. The selected representatives of thirty-six municipal, county, and state law enforcement organizations are in attendance.

It is significant to note that those who have completed the course in the FBI National Police Academy to date represent departments having a total law enforcement personnel of 55,227, to whom the benefits of this training are available through the officers who have already graduated from the Academy. The total population residing within the jurisdiction covered by the one hundred fifteen law enforcement organizations which have had representatives attend the school is 73,662,352.

Almost all the graduates of the FBI National Police Academy, following their graduation and since returning to their departments, have received promotions and have been placed in executive positions whereby they may give the benefits of this training to the other members of their respective departments who attend training schools in which the FBI National Police Academy graduate is an instructor.

There is no cost to the officers attending this school for the instruction, the equipment, or the facilities used in connection with this training. It is necessary, of course, for the officers attending this school to pay their own transportation as well as their living expenses while in Washington. However, it is believed that in most instances these expenses are paid by the organizations represented.

As has been pointed out, the course covers the Technical Laboratory, Fingerprint Identification, Statistical, Investigative and Training School Facilities and equipment of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. ACCOMPLISHMENTS OF THE IDENTIFICATION DIVISION OF THE FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION FOR APRIL, 1937.

Arriving at the rate of 6,443 per day, a new record total of 154,632 fingerprint cards was received and handled during the month of April, 1937, by the Identification Division of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. The total of fingerprints on file passed the mark of seven million during the month and on April 30, stood at 7,126,644.

A significant component of the total fingerprints received during the month were the 55,207 non-criminal personal identification prints received and retained in the Bureau. This figure exceeds the total of such prints received during any other one month.

PERSONAL DESCRIPTIONS (PORTRAIT PARLE OR SPEAKING LIKENESS) (1)

The Bertillon System of personal description, known as 'Portrait Parle', which may be translated as 'Speaking Likeness', is really rather a fascinating study and this is an attempt to give an outline of the subject, because it is certain that anyone who knows a little of what to look for in people's faces quite unconsciously develops his power of observation which is, of course, a matter of real importance to all police officers.

Some of the Continental Police Forces go in for a much more elaborate form of personal description than any that is attempted in the British Forces. This is to some extent a survival of the original Bertillon anthropometric system which involves a whole series of minute and elaborate measurements of various parts of the body. Whilst this anthropometric system is to all intents and purposes dead since the introduction of the science of identification by means of fingerprints, the system 'Portrait Parle' is very much alive. Almost anybody can describe a peculiarity. Hardly anybody can describe ordinary features in such a way as to enable others to distinguish the owner of those features from anybody else. The root idea of the Portrait Parle system is to make it possible for those who have studied it to give such descriptions themselves and to recognize individuals from such descriptions given by others.

At the International Criminal Police Commission held in Copenhagen last June, one of the subjects which was very much to the fore was this business of portrait parle. Some of our Continental colleagues aim at an international system of description which could be used for communicating between Forces of different countries either by letter or by cable, but before dealing with this question from an international point of view there is crying need in this country for serious efforts to be made with a view to improving our present way of describing wanted persons, etc. The average description that appears in the Police Gazette is confined to particulars of height, age, build, dress, colour of eyes and hair, plus any peculiarities that are easily noticeable. In the past, personal descriptions were fuller than they are nowadays, and there seems no reason why the present standard should not be made a great deal better than it is.

Here is a picture which gives a good idea of the standard of the descriptions in the police publications in the past. Actually this

and description of a warrant has been issued for forging and uttering the acceptances to bills of exchange—age 31 (looks much older), height 5ft. 7 to 8in., complexion sallow, hair very dark (streaked with grey, long, brushed back, and turns up slightly ove collar), bald at top of head, moustache full (long and black), chin and cheeks very black where abaved, long hairs on cheek bones, We lington nose, slight scar on left side, large protruding eyes with watery pimples on upper lids, thin body, very thin legs, upright carriage; dress, black rough Cheste field overcoat, brown cordutoy vest (of clerical cut), blue trousers with black b aid down sides, or grey trousers, tall linen collar, tie in sailor's knot with large bead pin or a sapphire pin. particular notice appeared in Informations in the year 1888, nearly fifty years ago. It is certainly better than the average description furnished to-day.

Real improvement in the descriptions in police publications will only be achieved by co-operation between officers in Metropolitan Police Divisions, the Criminal Record Office, Provincial Forces, and Prison Authorities.

No doubt quite rightly, emphasis is laid whenever possible in our present descriptions on peculiarities of face, carriage, speech, and manner, but it is not always possible to spot a peculiarity that marks one man out from among his fellows. It can be said that the average person has no easily remarkable characteristic which makes him stand out from among the herd. The real point of the 'Speaking Likeness' system is to enable those who understand it to describe a combination of ordinary features in words in such a way as to make the identification of the owners of those features easy for anyone capable of taking trouble. It is on the description of this ordinary type of person that we should try and concentrate, so that we can describe him in such a way that a police officer of average intelligence will be in a position to recognize him when he sees him.

It is quite uncommon in police descriptions for any intimation to be given as to how an individual wears his clothes, and yet people differ almost as much in the way in which they carry their clothes as in the kind of clothes they carry.

The description given of a wanted person in police publications is usually very meagre and often disgracefully inadequate. Here is one

picked out at random from the Police Gazette: --

Persons Wanted

"For escaping from a Certified Institution, subject to an Order under the Mental Deficiency Act, 1913.--...alias...C.R.O.No....b. (London), 1913, 5 ft. 4 in., c. fresh, h. brown, e. blue. Pre. con. of larceny. Is suspected of stealing from outside a public house, between 9:15 and 10:30 p.m. 30th ult., a gent's Raleigh roadster bicycle, enamelled black, 3-speed gear, oilbath gear-case, dent on top bar near saddle, brass top on bell, Palmer tyre on front, oil lamp."

In this case the description of the bicycle is very much better than that of the man who, as will have been noted, has a C.R.O. record and has been an inmate of a mental institution, so there have been ample opportunities of obtaining a full description of him. There is no description of clothes although presumably he was wearing something.

The police officer is hardly in a position to recognize an unknown individual thus inadequately described if he has to arrest him, say, at the exit of a railway station or the landing stage of a steamer. It is even more difficult to pick him up in a crowded street. The marvel is that so many arrests are made on such inadequate descriptions, but how often does a criminal escape arrest because it is impracticable to recognize the person wanted from the description given?

Even photographs are not always a reliable guide. A person's appearance may change considerably with the passage of years. Also, the photograph of one man may resemble strongly a quite different person. There was the case of the twin brothers, born in 1857, who were active together as poachers in Hertfordshire between 1875 and 1917. They were so much alike that the local police were unable to differentiate between them. If one was in custody he always stated that it was his brother who had committed the offense and vice versa. Fingerprints had to be taken to determine identity conclusively.

If to the present brief particulars that appear in police publications some few simple characteristics of parts of the face were added, the resulting description would be of much more use, provided terms are used which are easily recognized and known by all detective officers.

The following extract from Sir Howard Vincent's Police Code is of interest. (Sir H. Vincent was the first head of the C.I.D. when it was reconstituted on more or less its present basis in 1878):--

"An officer taking down a description should ascertain the minutest facts. The smallest thing may lead to detection. The essential is to give characteristics which cannot be changed, removed, or dyed, and note--everyone is proficient in something, physical or mental, or has a favourite habit, a weak side, a partiality in food, drink, smoke, conversation, companionship, amusement. The skilful officer will get it from

those acquainted with the person wanted, by plying them with questions, backwards and forwards. They will never communicate it voluntarily, for they will never think of the details. Former female companions may often be useful in filling up the blanks. Police should practise taking down descriptions of each other. It looks simple. It is very difficult."

It is interesting to note that the Assistant Commissioner of the C.I.D. was fully alive to the value of Portrait Parle, the Speaking Likeness, or the Facial Index as the system has variously been described. It is pathetic to think that his advice has been largely neglected for so long. It is quite time that interest in the subject was revived and it is quite time that people gave up refusing to consider it upon the ground that the full Bertillon System was unnecessarily elaborate and impracticable for everyday use. It is true that the full system is far too elaborate for practical police day to day work, but the underlying idea is fundamentally sound, and a modified form of the original system of inestimable value.

In a recent murder case a man robbed and battered to death a poor old woman, who with her daughter had befriended him and allowed him to live in their flat. The murderer disappeared and it took some days to find him. The officer in charge of the case obtained an excellent sketch of the murderer from a girl, who knew him well and who also happened to be something of an artist. Copies of this sketch were circulated. Later on in the inquiry a photograph was obtained and it will be seen from the illustration opposite how closely the photograph and the sketch agree.

Of course, it is unusual to be able to get a description from someone who can draw a good sketch, but this serves to emphasize the point made by Sir Howard Vincent, that a skilful officer will get information from those acquainted with the person wanted, by plying them with questions, backwards and forwards.

It is now proposed to describe the appearance of various parts of the body in a simple way and without going into the minute detail employed in the Bertillon System. In all cases it is presumed that the person being described holds his head in a normal way, looking straight to his front.


Peculiarities should be particularly noted as, of course, nothing is more easy to pick out.

The descriptive terms employed in relation to the personal features mentioned are in everyday use and as far as possible obvious in their

A. The Forehead

(1) The slope of the forehead is observed in profile and is described as --







PHOTOGRAPH OF A MURDERER

SKETCH OF MURDERER MADE FROM MEMORY BY AN ACQUAINTANCE.


(a) receding. If it is much inclined with reference to the vertical.




(d) prominent. If it is straight but in advance of the vertical.




(b) medium. If it is a little inclined.



(e) bulging. If it is curved and in advance of the vertical.




(c) vertical. If it coincides with the vertical.



(2) The Height of the forehead, observed in profile, is the vertical distance which separates the hair from the eyebrows. It is expressed as low, medium, or high, according as this distance is less, equal to, or greater than one-third of the profile from the root of the hair to the point of the chin.

- (3) The Width of the forehead, estimated from the front, is the distance separating the two temples. It is expressed as narrow, medium, broad.
 - (4) Peculiarities, such as the following may be noted:-Pronounced permanent frown.
 Deep horizontal wrinkles.



B. The Nose

The form of the nose is observed in profile; one examines separately--

- (1) The depth of the root,
- (2) The general form of the line of the nose,
- (3) The slope of its base.
- (1) Root.--This is the cavity more or less pronounced which is found on top of the nose between the two eyes. According as this cavity seen in profile is more or less pronounced, it may be described as small, medium, or large.
- (2) Line of the Nose.--This is the line which starts from the hollowest part of the root to join the point of the nose. The line can have one of the following forms:--
- (a) Concave.



The line of the nose inclines towards the base on leaving the root, rising again towards the tip, thus forming a concave curve.

(b) Straight.



The line of the nose forms a straight line from the root to the tip.

(c) Jewish, Convex, or Hooked.



The line of the nose curves in the shape of a crescent from the root to the tip. (Mention should be made of the aquiline or eagle nose, which is between a straight and a hooked nose.)

(d) Roman.




In this last case, the line of the nose takes the form of a broken line of which the two portions form an obtuse angle about a third of the way down from the root.

- (3) Base of Nose.--By the slope of the base of the nose is understood the slope of the line which, starting at the point of junction of the nostril with the cheek, follows the edge of the nostril to the tip of the nose.
- (a) Turned-up (retrousse or snub).




Turned up above the horizontal.

(b) Horizontal.



(c) Downward.



Turned downwards below the horizontal.

- (4) Dimensions.--From the point of view of the dimensions one examines--
 - (a) The Length,
 - (b) The Projection,
 - (c) The Width.
- (a) The Length of the nose observed in profile is judged vertically from the hollowest part of the root to the point of attachment of the nostril to the cheek. A medium nose is one which is about one-third of the height of the profile of the head from the root of the hair to the point of the chin. A long nose is more than and a short nose less than one-third of the profile.
- (b) The Projection is the distance observed in profile which separates the point of attachment of the nostril from the tip of the nose, and may be expressed as small, medium, or large.
- (c) The Width of the nose is the horizontal distance which separates the two sides of the nose at their greatest breadth. This is observed

from the front, and is expressed by one of the terms narrow, medium, wide.

(5) Peculiarities. -- The following peculiarities of the nose may be noted: --

Crushed Nose.--As the result of an accident.
Twisted Nose.--The tip is tilted to right or left.
Dilated Nostrils.
Pointed Nose.
Undulating Line.

C. The Ear


The ear is the most important factor of identification of the whole face, because it is the part of the body which suffers least variations of form. Besides, it is almost impossible to find two ears which are identical. But its characteristics are less easy to learn and observe than those of other parts of the face.

The ear is composed of a series of ridges and hollows of which it is only proposed to describe the ridges. These are named as follows:--

The Border or Helix. The Lobe.

The Tragus.

The Antitragus and the Folds.



The above sketch shows where the various parts of the ridges of the ear are situated.

(1) Border or Helix. -- The border of the ear starts at the cen-

tral depression (or shell) above the ear-hole and borders as with a gutter two-thirds of the circle of the ear.

The Border or Helix is divided into four parts: --


- (a) The Original Border rises in the shell; it is examined from the point of view of its length or of its degree of penetration into the shell. It may be totally lacking, when it is termed nil. According to whether it rises more or less forward in the shell, it is termed short, medium, long.
- (b) The Forward Border has no importance as it is more or less the same in all forms of ears, and is therefore not considered here.
- (c) The Upper Border is examined not according to its length but from the point of view of its width. If it is totally absent it is termed flat. If it exists, the border is qualified as narrow, medium, or wide.
- (d) The Rear Border is examined like the upper border and may also be termed flat, narrow, medium, or wide.

One also examines its "degree of opening," that is to say, the distance which separates it from the lower fold of the ear; this may be termed open, medium, close.


- (2) The Lobe. -- The lobe is the soft part of the ear which begins at the point where the border ends and is attached to the cheek. The lobe is here considered under two forms, the length and the contour.
- (a) The Length of the lobe is taken from the bottom of the antitragus to the lowest point of the lobe. It is expressed by means of the terms short, medium, long.
- (b) The Contour of the lobe is the manner in which the line, that ends the lobe at its lower part, is attached to the cheek.

The contour of the lobe may be one of the following: --


(i) descending.

(ii) square.
(The lobe ending in a line horizontal to the cheek.)



(iii) medium. (The lobe joining the cheek so as to form with it a reentrant angle.)




(iv) gulfed. (The lobe being entirely isolated from the cheek.)




- (3) The Antitragus is only considered here under two headings, the Slope and the Size.
- (a) The Slope of the antitragus is indicated by the angle it makes with a horizontal imaginary line at the base of the antitragus.

It may be (i) horizontal or level, (ii) oblique or sloping.

(i) Horizontal.--If the line of direction is the same as the horizontal, when the person is looking straight to his front.



(ii) Oblique.--If the line of direction makes with the horizon-tal an angle approaching 45 degrees.



(b) The Size of the antitragus may be: --







(4) General Shape of the Ear.--Oval is the most general shape of the ear, therefore the shape is not shown unless the ear is triangular, rectangular, or round.

- (5) Separation from Head. -- The ear may be close to, or protruding from the head.
 - (6) Size of Ear. -- The ear may be large, medium, or small.
 - (7) Peculiarities.--A few are:-Rumpled Border, Cut Border,
 Pierced Lobe, Lobeless,

Low Setting of Ear i.e. if the upper border is in a line with or below the level of the eye.

General Note on the Ear. -- From the above it will be seen that the peculiarities and description that may be applied to the ear are somewhat complicated. Whilst the formation of the ear is easy enough to describe in theory, it is by no means easy to supply details in individual cases, because the boundaries between the various classifications are small.

It is not to be expected that any very detailed descriptions of ears can be supplied in the ordinary way, but it is well that police officers should know the various terms that are used in connection with the ear in the Portrait Parle system.

It is true that a woman's hair very often conceals her ears, so that this feature is of little use in describing a female but on the other hand the vast majority of criminals are male.

In the Gazette and other police publications photographs in profile as well as full-face are printed. By concentrating on and memorizing the shape, etc., of an ear it will often be possible to pick out a wanted person whose identification might otherwise not have been possible. A profile can also be studied deliberately, when to look intently at a man's full-face would draw undue attention.

The main items to note as regards the ear for descriptive purposes are those shown under (4), (5), (6), and (7) above, that is, the general shape, separation from head, size, and peculiarities.

D. The Lips

The lips are examined under two headings, the length of upper lip and the thickness of lips.

- (1) The Length of the upper lip is the distance between the base of the nose and the line of the mouth. It may be long or short.
 - (2) The Thickness of the lips may vary from thin to thick.
 - (3) Peculiarities which may be noted are:--

Overhanging upper lip, Pendant lower lip, Harelip, Pouting

lips.

E. The Mouth

- (1) Size.--The mouth seen from the front is judged by its size. It may be noted as large, medium, or small.
 - (2) Teeth may be noted as: --

Prominent upper incisives.
False (stating if upper or lower).
Missing upper incisives.
Missing lower incisives.
Discoloured (if out of the ordinary).
White (if out of the ordinary).

F. The Chin

The chin is considered from the point of view of: --

- (1) The General Slope of the line of its profile, which may in extreme cases be termed jutting out, or receding.
- (2) The Size of the chin, which is estimated from the front and is expressed by the terms: small or pointed; large or square.
- (3) The Length is estimated vertically from the mouth to the point of the chin by the terms long or short.
 - (4) Peculiarities may be: -- Double Chin; Dimpled Chin.

G. The Face and Head

(1) The Shape of the face, seen from the front, is the result of the apparent relation between its height and its breadth.

It may be described as square, broad, round, long, or oval (which is the usual form).

- (2) Shape of Head may be described as (a) round, (b) high in crown, flat at back, (c) long, bulging at back, (d) egg or keel shape.
- (3) Complexion may be shown as fair, fresh, dark, sunburnt, brick red, sallow, yellow, black, brown.
 - (4) Peculiarities of the Face that may be noted are:--

Prominent cheek bones; flabby cheeks; full (or fat); bony (or thin); smiling, scowling (where these expressions are habitual).

H. The Eyes

The eyes are examined from the front and are noted as follows: --

(1) Size, whether large or small.

(2) Colour, either black, blue, grey, brown.

(3) Peculiarities such as: --

Squint.

Cast.

Glass eye.

Protruding; Sunken; Long lashes; Short sighted; Wears glasses (or pince-nez, or eye-glass); Blinks.

I. The Eyebrows

The eyebrows can be classified under five headings: --

- (1) Shape.--This may be noted as arched, straight, or oblique. (Slightly curved is the ordinary shape and need not be noted.)
 - (2) Length.--Long, short, nearly united, united.
 - (3) Breadth.--Thin, thick, or plucked (pencilled).
- (4) Colour. -- Sandy, red, black, grey, white (if different from colour of hair of head).
 - (5) Peculiarities. -- e.g. elevated, beetling.

J. The Neck

The neck is noted according to --

- (1) Length. -- Long or short.
- (2) Thickness. -- Thin or thick.
- (3) Peculiarities. -- i.e. pronounced Adam's Apple; Goitre.

K. The Shoulders

- (1) The Slope of the shoulders may vary from the horizontal to a pronounced obliqueness, hence the terms:-Horizontal; medium; oblique.
 - (2) The Breadth may be narrow or broad.
 - (3) Peculiarities may be:-Dropped right shoulder; dropped left shoulder.

L. The Build

Under this heading the following points may be considered: --

- (1) Carriage. -- The usual way of holding the head, back, and shoulders may be shown as erect, stooping, hunch-back.
 - (2) Chest.--May be shown as narrow, broad, bulging.
 - (3) Waist. -- May be slim, medium, stout.

M. The Hair

This is to be noted under: --

(1) Head; (2) Moustache; (3) Beard.

In each case should be shown--

- (a) The Colour of the hair: black, grey, brown, red, sandy, white, golden, flaxen.
 - (b) The Style. -- Long, short, thin, thick, curly.

Peculiarities may be shown against each type of hair thus: --

- (1) Head.--Bald, bald at temples, bald on top, tonsure.
- (2) Moustache.--Waxed-ends, tooth-brush, heavy.
- (3) Beard. -- Square, goatee, pointed, imperial.

N. Peculiarities of Manner

Any noticeably apparent peculiarities of manner or habit are useful for identification purposes, as they are not easily disguised unless a person is continually on his guard. Some that may be remarked are:--

- (a) Walk.--Long, short, slow, or quick strides; limp, pigeon toed, splay feet, club foot.
- (b) Appearance or Look of eyes.--Straight, oblique, piercing, dull, fixed, mobile, frank, fugitive.
- (c) Voice.--Accent (cockney, foreign, Scotch, cultivated, Irish, etc.).

Nasal.

Feminine (as regards a man).
Male (as regards a woman).

Stutter.

(d) Physical or Mental.--Favourite habit, weak side, partiality food, drink, smoke, conversation, companionship, amusement.

O. Marks

Under this heading may be included such obvious marks as scars, abscesses, birth-marks, tattoo marks, moles, pimples. Whatever the mark, it is important to show where exactly it is situated, the colour and the size. In the case of tattoos the actual design is naturally important.

All forms for use in connection with items to appear in the Police Gazette, Information, etc., have been very recently amended to include most of the headings "A" to "O" mentioned above. This means that officers are expected, in future, to provide many more particulars of wanted persons' personal characteristics than was the case in the past.

CONCLUSION

In conclusion it may be added that what has been said above has been with the intention of giving officers help in completing forms for police publications, so that in time these publications and the Criminal Record Office will give fuller particulars of persons to whom they relate.

When a person is in custody there is no excuse for failure to give full details. Where the time for observation is short, in the absence of any outstanding feature the most useful points to concentrate on are (1) the Ear, (2) the Nose. It is, of course, assumed that in every description reference will be made to the apparent age and height before anything else is considered.

Finally, as a word of warning to show that sometimes the best descriptions may be nullified by the action of the wanted person concerned, here is an extract from a report recently written:--

"....is a troublesome prisoner and does all he can to disguise himself, in order that witnesses cannot definitely identify him. At the West London Police Court on 9th October, 1935, he looked more like a made-up comedian than his actual self. He had a tooth-brush moustache with two or three days' growth of beard and side whiskers. He was also wearing horn-rimmed spectacles. His hair, instead of being brushed back from the side, was parted in the middle and plastered down over his forehead in the Dan Leno style."

It is said that his own mother failed to recognize him when she went to visit him at Pentonville Prison.

SPECIAL ANNOUNCEMENT REGARDING SUBMISSION OF PHOTOGRAPHS

For the assistance of the Bureau in placing photographs in the appropriate files in those cases where photographs are sent in either singly or in groups subsequent to the submission of fingerprint cards, it is requested that contributors indicate on each photograph the name and address of the contributing agency. The name and arrest number of the subject represented as well as the primary fingerprint classification and the FBI number, when available, should also be included to facilitate the location of the Identification Division records.

A QUESTIONABLE PATTERN

The vast majority of fingerprint patterns fall readily into the standard divisions of arches, tented arches, loops, or whorls. Occasionally an impression arises which cannot be classified into any of the standard groups due to the absence of certain characteristics, or the presence of other elements foreign to the accepted types.

In the Bureau's Identification Division, such impressions are classified as "accidental" whorls, and subclassified according to the most logical ridge tracing. The accompanying illustration is a reproduction of such a pattern.



It is apparent that this impression will not permit accurate classification as an arch, tented arch, loop, or whorl. As interpreted by the Identification Division of the Bureau, an "accidental" is an impression which contains a combination of two or more different types of patterns within the same pattern area, or any pattern which cannot be classified into the standard groups because of the unusual design.

The latter part of the definition cited above includes such patterns as this reproduction, which is classified as an "accidental" whorl. In the subclassification, points A and B are considered as the deltas. Tracing between these two focal points would result in a subclassification of "M" or "Meeting Whorl."

Cashin, Superintendent, Bureau of Criminal Identification, Records and Statistics, Department of Correction, Albany, New York; Inspector Emmett A. Evans, Commanding Identification Bureau, Police Department, Chicago, Illinois; Mr. John A. Doyle, Commissioner of Police, Brighton, New York; Mr. L. M. Rubens, European Representative, Commissioner of Police, Joliet, Illinois.

The International Association for Identification is the outstanding organization of its type in the world. It is composed of several hundred experts, representing principally identification bureaus, connected primarily with law enforcement organizations in the United States, Canada, Cuba, Mexico and several foreign countries. Its annual convention always attracts a distinguished gathering of outstanding experts in the police profession who have specialized in identification methods, including dactyloscopy, firearms and document identification, toxicology, moulage and plaster reproduction, microscopy, spectrography, and the related sciences.

It is expected that this year's meeting of this group, which has held conventions during more recent years at Miami, Florida, Rochester, New York, New Orleans, Louisiana, Chicago, Illinois, Long Beach, California, Montreal, Canada, and Dallas, Texas, will be one of the most outstanding gatherings. Mr. Hoover, as Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, which comprises in its headquarters organization its Identification Division, Technical Laboratory, and the FBI National Police Academy—all projects of vital interest to the police profession, and in which the International Association for Identification has taken a leading part—will announce further details of this meeting from time to time and in particular will indicate the nature of the program being formulated.

ESCAPED BURGLAR RETURNED TO SERVE TWENTY-FIVE YEAR SENTENCE AFTER IDENTIFICATION THROUGH FINGERPRINTS.

A new name and a new locale of operation did not save a man recently arrested by the Sheriff's Office at Paola, Kansas, charged with burglary and larceny from being returned to serve a Penitentiary sentence of twenty-five years. The fingerprints of this individual indicating his name as Floyd Brown were received in the Federal Bureau of Investigation on April 1, 1937. In the Bureau's records he was not known as Floyd Brown. His fingerprints were identified with those of the Reuben McGhee who was taken into custody by the Police Department at Little Rock, Arkansas, in July, 1925, and of Walter Edwards who had received four sentences ranging from one year to twenty-five years.

In April, 1927, Edwards was received at the United States Disciplinary Barracks at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, to serve one year for desertion. In April, 1930, he was received at the State Penitentiary, Little Rock, Arkansas, upon conviction of receiving stolen property and another crime, in this instance his sentence being five years. He served two years and four months and was paroled. Following an arrest by the Sheriff's Office at Pine Bluff, Arkansas, in November, 1933, charged with burglary, he was received during the same month at the State Penitentiary, Tucker, Arkansas, to serve a sentence of two years upon conviction of the crime named. This sentence, however, did not deter him from further burglary violations. He was received at the same institution in January, 1936, to commence serving a sentence of twenty-five years for burglary. In October of the same year he escaped, according to information received from the State Penitentiary at Gould, Arkansas. The Bureau thereupon noted his fingerprint record to provide that information subsequently received should be communicated to the State Penitentiary at Gould, Arkansas. In the December, 1936, issue of the FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin, Edwards was publicized as a fugitive from justice.

Upon making the identification of the fingerprints of Floyd Brown with the record of Edwards the Bureau immediately telegraphed the Warden of the State Penitentiary at Gould, Arkansas, of the apprehension of Edwards under the name of Brown by the Sheriff at Paola, Kansas. On April 27, 1937, another fingerprint card bearing impressions identical with those of Brown but showing the name of Walter Edwards was received by the Bureau indicating that the Walter Edwards who escaped in October, 1936, had been returned to the Arkansas State Penitentiary to resume the serving of his twenty-five years for burglary which had been interrupted by his escape.

During the month of April, 1937, six hundred and one fugitives were identified by means of these wanted notices in the Bureau's files, this number constituting a new high record of such identifications for a single month.

FINGERPRINTS OF AMNESIA VICTIM DISCLOSE EXTENSIVE IDENTIFYING DATA IN BUREAU'S RECORDS

A young man thought to be one Mike Ravew, a victim of amnesia, was fingerprinted by the Police Department at Baltimore, Maryland, and his finger impressions submitted to the Federal Bureau of Investigation with the request for data of possible assistance in the establishment of his true identity, relatives and friends. On January 2, 1937, the date that the fingerprint card was received, the finger impressions were identified with others in the Bureau's files and the Police Department at Baltimore, Maryland, immediately advised by telegram of the information recorded. In this instance it was perhaps fortunate for Ravew that he had a criminal record, inasmuch as the information about his antecedents was filed in conjunction with records of arrest. Mike Ravew, however, was not a name by which this individual had previously been known, in connection with his known criminal career. On the first fingerprint card received by the Bureau, submitted by the Central Identification Bureau, Union County, Elizabeth, New Jersey, in 1933 this man's name was recorded as Benjamin Iram, alias Ben Iram. He had been taken into custody as incorrigible and delivered to his father. In May, 1934, in New York City, he was fingerprinted as Frank Michaels on a charge of vagrancy, and received a suspended sentence. In July of the same year his fingerprints were received from the Police Department at Milwaukee, Wisconsin, this time bearing the name of Frank Mankers and showing an arrest for investigation. In January, 1935, identical fingerprints were received from the State Hospital for the Insane at Waupun, Wisconsin, indicating that Frank Mankus, alias Frank Marto, alias Benjamin Iron, alias Frank Makus, had been received as an insane patient.

Again using another name, this time Joseph Ambrose, this man was received at the State House of Correction at Jessups, Maryland, in August, 1935, to commence serving a sentence of three years for assault and striking. The names of Joseph Murphy, Frank Markwell and Louis Lombardi were recorded for him when he was arrested by the Police Department at Lake Charles, Louisiana, for investigation, in January, 1936. From the State Bureau, Boston, Massachusetts, were received the fingerprints of one George Miles, arrested in September, 1936, for vagrancy, these fingerprints being identical with those of the above many-named individual.

Included among the data supplied by the Bureau to the agency contributing the fingerprints of the amnesia victim were the residences of this victim, as recorded on the various fingerprint cards in the Bureau's files. Such data is frequently of valuable assistance to local law enforcement and other official agencies in returning an amnesia victim to his family and friends or obtaining proper medical treatment for him.
