The Federal Bureau of Investigation, United States Department of Justice, is charged with the duty of investigating violations of the laws of the United States and collecting evidence in cases in which the United States is or may be a party in interest.

The following list indicates some of the major violations over which the Bureau has investigative jurisdiction:

National Motor Vehicle Theft Act

Interstate transportation of stolen property valued at \$5,000 or more National Bankruptcy Act

Interstate flight to avoid prosecution or testifying in certain cases

White Slave Traffic Act

Impersonation of Government Officials

Larceny of Goods in Interstate Commerce

Killing or Assaulting Federal Officer

Cases involving transportation in interstate or foreign commerce of any persons who have been kidnaped

Extortion cases in which interstate commerce or interstate communication is an element

Theft, Embezzlement or Illegal Possession of Government Property Antitrust Laws

Robbery of National Banks, insured banks of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation and Member Banks of Federal Reserve System

National Bank and Federal Reserve Act Violations, such as embezzlement, abstraction or misapplication of funds

Crimes on any kind of Government reservation, including Indian Reservations or in any Government building or other Government property

Neutrality violations, including the shipment of arms to friendly nations Frauds against the Government

Crimes in connection with the Federal Penal and Correctional Institutions Perjury, embezzlement, or bribery in connection with Federal Statutes or officials

Crimes on the high seas

Federal Anti-Racketeering Statute

The location of persons who are fugitives from justice by reason of violations of the Federal Laws over which the Bureau has jurisdiction, of escaped Federal prisoners, and parole and probation violators.

The Bureau does not have investigative jurisdiction over the violations of Counterfeiting, Narcotic, Customs, Immigration, or Postal Laws.

Law enforcement officials possessing information concerning violations over which the Bureau has investigative jurisdiction are requested to promptly forward the same to the Special Agent in Charge of the nearest field division of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, United States Department of Justice. The address of each field division of this Bureau appears on the inside back cover of this bulletin. Government Rate Collect telegrams or telephone calls will be accepted if information indicates that immediate action is necessary.

The solution of criminal cases is brought about as the result of persistent hard work on the part of the investigating officers. Law enforcement work is not easy. It requires strenuous labor, long hours and relentless attention to small details. We of the Federal Bureau of Investigation can go down the long list of solved cases which, at one time, appeared to be baffling, and find that the solution in each instance came about through these varied elements which have been named. The same could be said of those baffling cases which are presented from time to time to other law enforcement agencies. No doubt there are many cases of this type now pending in other organizations, but it is equally safe to say that their solution will be the result of the efforts of the men guided by these principles and it is only a question of time until each will be solved.

In the collection of fingerprints which is maintained by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, daily there comes to our attention the necessity of watching small details, of checking, rechecking, recording and reporting arrest after arrest until the criminal record of each person, whose fingerprints are on file, is complete.

In the FBI's Technical Laboratory, which is available to all law enforcement organizations in America without charge, we see this same attention to small details and persistent work. The investigating officer at the scene of the crime may find some fragment of cloth, some bit of dust, a single hair or a piece of lead from the death bullet. As a fragment it is valueless, but in the Technical Laboratory with the use of the microscope, the spectrograph, or in the hands of an expert technician this mere fragment, after long study and careful analysis, may mean the solution of the case.

All of this activity, whether it is investigative work, identification work or scientific analysis, is valuable in solving crimes. It assists men who have devoted their lives to the detection and apprehension of criminals, and whose success comes as the result of years of careful training. So we see that law enforcement calls for hard persistent work, but we who are in it receive our rewards in the building up of a complete case with all fragments tied together so that the law violator will inevitably be brought to justice.

Law enforcement officers are becoming known for their tenacity, for their alertness, for their loyalty to duty, and it is the recognition of this work by the citizen, whose protection we have undertaken to secure, that our reward is earned.

CONFIDENCE GAMES

On May 22, 1934, the President approved an Act of Congress entitled "National Stolen Property Act." The provisions of this law state that a person who transports or causes to be transported in interstate or foreign commerce any goods, wares, merchandise, securities or money, of the value of \$5,000.00 or more, which has been stolen or is known to be stolen, shall be subject to a fine of not more than \$10,000.00 or imprisonment of not more than ten years. This law falls within the investigative jurisdiction of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

The circumstances in many cases bring a confidence man's operations within the provisions of this statute, although those cases which show that property or money was secured by embezzlement are not covered. To assist in this work, the Federal Bureau of Investigation inaugurated in 1936 a confidence game file. The purpose of the file is to have photographs and descriptive data on all prominent confidence men operating throughout the United States. Only those "con men" whose activities are of a prominent nature are considered for inclusion in this file. Searches are made through this file at the request of law enforcement agencies.

A search is based upon the descriptions of the unknown individuals which have already been supplied. Based upon the cards secured, the photographs, together with the history of the possible suspects, are forwarded to the interested officers to assist in identifying those persons who operated the confidence game.

Confidence games assume varied forms and the amount of money involved likewise varies from time to time. It may be said that confidence games are schemes by which individuals gain the confidence of possible victims and then proceed to swindle or embezzle sums of money from the latter by trickery. Most victims believe that they are on the "inside" of some race, or "get rich quick" schemes and, in some way or another, will profit by these associations. Apparently, this is the reason that so few victims ever make a complaint after they have been swindled.

Quite a number of confidence men swindle or prey upon people in ill health by selling to the victims medicines and appliances which will enable them to regain their health. There are two reasons why a victim seldom makes a complaint. In complaining the victim would expose himself as having acquiesced in a gullible proposition and through resultant publicity would hold himself up to ridicule. In the second instance, the victim is usually defrauded of a large sum of money and fears that if this becomes known, his creditors will immediately close in on him and force him into bankruptcy.

It is interesting to note also that there is a law among "con men" known as "never take a man in his own city." There are several reasons for this rule. First, a local man will not be lonely and will not seek the companionship of strangers. Secondly, a local man will probably have many

friends and the "con men" would probably meet these friends who later might be able to identify the latter. Lastly, a local man will always have friends to whom he can go for advice when the crucial time comes for him to part with his funds.

A "steerer" is the first member of the "con" mob; he is the first to make personal contact with the victim. The "steerer" usually takes the role of a stranger in the city, so invariably his first question is to ask for directions to some point in the city. The victim usually replies that he too is a stranger in the city, and thus they immediately have something in common. This is soon followed up by the "steerer" suggesting a drink or a meal and further associations follow. After the "steerer" has completely gained the confidence of the victim and after having learned the financial status of the victim, the time has arrived for the appearance of the "spieler." He is also known as the "inside man." Various methods are used to introduce the "spieler" to the victim. In some types of confidence games a third man is introduced and this man is known as the "banker."

SELECTION OF THE VICTIM

Victims are selected from tips received from underworld informants or petty racketeers who have found the victim an "easy mark" on smaller rackets.

Contractors furnish a good type of victim because of the fact that they generally have large assets and, by reason of their business, are usually in a position to liquidate their assets very readily. The names of these contractors can readily be found in trade journals. It may be noted that William Elmer Mead, when arrested at Northampton, Massachusetts on July 12, 1935, had in his possession a contractor's trade journal in which he had apparently marked the names of prospective victims. In other cases, victims are selected through advertisements in newspapers either for a business partner or the sale of a summer home.

CONTACTING THE VICTIM

The confidence gang usually numbering from three to six, gathers at some fair-sized city. From this point one of the number, commonly referred to as a "steerer," begins to make contacts with the victims. Usually three or four individuals are contacted at once. The "steerer" will approach the victim, presenting himself as the representative of some influential person and appearing to be mildly interested in doing business with the victim. In a recent case, arising in Cincinnati, Ohio, the victim was contacted by telephone from Portland, Maine. The "steerer" advised the victim over long distance telephone that he was a representative of Vickers, Ltd., of London, England, and that he was seeking an American citizen who could take charge of a new plant to be erected in this country by Vickers, Ltd. By reason of these representations, or similar ones, the victim is usually put into a very anxious mood because he expects some very good fortune to come his way.

DETAILS OF THE SWINDLE

The "steerer" after raising the victim's hopes of a big business proposition, then takes the victim to some other town where he is removed from friends and advisors. This is done on the pretext that the victim is to meet the principal of the transaction in that city. This is known in the language of "con" men as "lugging" and when they go this far with a victim, they generally intend to complete the swindle. Almost always, once the victim has been brought to a strange city and negotiations undertaken, he is from that time "tailed" by a member of the gang unknown to him. Having arrived in the strange city the "steerer" takes the victim to some expensive restaurant for luncheon where they continue to talk over the pending transaction. At some point in the conversation the "steerer", apparently by accident, finds a pocketbook under the table. This pocketbook contains a large amount of currency and papers which indicate the owner's name and address and also that he is a representative of a racing syndicate. The owner of the pocketbook always resides in a nearby hotel and the "steerer," pretending to be very honest, insists that he and the victim return the pocketbook to its rightful owner at once.

They return the pocketbook and the owner, who will be designated as Number Two, pretends to be most grateful to both of them. He states that he is the secret agent of a large racing syndicate, which deals in fixed races and that he is presently engaged in placing bets for his syndicate on these races. However, he says that he himself works on a salary and that his winnings all go to the syndicate. He further states that if his identity were ever known he would be discharged, and that is the reason he is so grateful that his pocketbook, which reveals his identity, was returned to him. In order to demonstrate his gratitude, he offers to let his two new friends in on a fixed race and when they acquiesce he orders the bets placed, claiming that he has credit at the track. The betting goes on for some time, even several days, when it is found that there has been won anywhere from \$100,000 to \$900,000. While the three men are sitting in the room contemplating their winnings a third confidence man, who will be designated as Number Three, comes into the room and represents himself as a betting manager from the race track.

The third man has a large bag which he opens and shows to be full of currency which totals the amount of the winnings. (This is genuine currency and usually borrowed from a local bondsman or money lender for the purpose of the swindle.) Number Three then says that he will be glad to turn over the winnings to Number Two, but there is a little difficulty. It seems that Number Two has not had his checks countersigned by his partner and that the race track cannot honor these checks without his countersignature. Number Two then states this to be a fact and says that he is now in heavy difficulties as the race track will not pay the money until it can be demonstrated that the original credit was good, and so it becomes necessary before these huge winnings can be paid that Number Two establish a credit at the track of a large amount, possibly \$200,000. Number Two then states that he has that much money but that it is all tied up and that the most he can get at this time is \$75,000. The "steerer" then states that he can raise \$40,000. (This amount has been determined beforehand when it is known how much the victim can possibly raise.) Then they turn to the victim and tell

him that he will share in the winnings and that this will depend upon the amount of money that he can raise to establish Number Two's credit. The victim generally falls for this, possibly because he has been completely fooled as to the character of the men with whom he is dealing. Also, at this point, he believes himself suddenly to be on the verge of becoming about \$75,000 richer. The victim then takes the first train to his home city and begins to raise the required amount of money. He is constantly being followed by a member of the gang to make sure that his suspicions are not aroused and that he does not contact the police. The gang keeps in constant touch with him by telegraph. After he has raised the money, he returns to the "steerer's" city and gives the money to Number Two for the purpose of the credit. Number Two then hands over all the money to a subordinate and instructs him to go to the track, place the money there on credit, and return with the winnings. A short time later the subordinate returns and after a short conversation it develops that either the subordinate has misunderstood or has deliberately disobeyed Number Two's orders and has bet all of the money on a new race and has lost. Number Two becomes violently angry, even committing an assault on the subordinate and promises the victim that he will repay him every cent that he has lost. Number Two says that he will immediately go home and mortgage a large piece of property and will wire the funds to the victim at once.

Strangely enough, in most cases the victim is unaware that he has been swindled and returns confidently to his home expecting to receive the money, not realizing until several weeks have passed that he will not hear from his friends again. Sometimes the victim is sent to various places other than his home, and telegrams of encouragement are sent to him to keep him from reporting the offense to a law enforcement organization as long as possible.

Of course, the game has many variations. Sometimes the pocket-book is not used at all but the "steerer" will simply meet "a friend" or some other individual who is in the fixed race racket. The gang usually has several other members who assist with the plans and who are never seen by the victim.

LEASES AND ROYALTIES

In the oil lease or oil royalty confidence game, one confidence man generally goes to some person owning land in or near an oil field. The person approached has not leased or sold his oil royalties for his land. It is also necessary that this person be well off financially. The confidence man will have numerous papers, telegrams and other identifying data bearing a name similar to that of some well known oil company -- for instance, the name "Sunay" instead of "Sunray" or "Texco" instead of "Texaco." This person advises the victim that his company has requested that he obtain a lease for or purchase the oil royalties on the victim's land. He arranges to meet the victim at some well known hotel where he is registered, and obtains an option on the person's property at a very favorable price. This first confidence man then leaves for a few days. Later another confidence man will come to the person, and he also has numerous credentials, letterheads and correspondence purportedly from some other oil company. One of these letters

will give him authority to purchase a lease or the royalties of the oil on the man's property at a much higher price than the first one. When the victim advises that he has already given an option, this second man leads the victim to believe that he is very anxious to purchase and suggests the possibility that a higher price can be paid by his company to make it worth while for the victim to deal with the first person for a cancellation of the option. The second confidence man then leaves and the first man will telephone the victim in a day or so telling him that he has been authorized to take the option, and that he will meet the victim at a designated place to consummate the deal. The victim usually asks this man to see him right away. When they meet, the victim then asks the confidence man to release him from the option - whereupon the confidence man will show a letter from his company authorizing him to make the purchase and showing that money has been deposited in a certain bank to cover the purchase price. The victim generally tries to get the first confidence man to meet the second confidence man in order that a deal may be effected, but the first person always refuses. The victim then gets in touch with the second confidence man, who now has a wire from his company asking him why he has not purchased the lease and authorizing him to pay whatever amount is necessary. The second confidence man also has a letter from some bank authorizing him to draw a draft covering the necessary amount for the purchase. The victim will then get in touch with the first confidence man, and ask him if there is not some way to be released from the option. At this time the first confidence man makes an agreement to release the victim for a certain specified payment in cash. Generally the difference between the amount offered by the first confidence man and the second confidence man for the lease or royalty is determined by the amount they expect to get from the victim. On some occasions the second confidence man actually draws a draft and gives it to the victim, having the victim put the lease in escrow in the local bank pending payment of the draft. Of course, the draft is no good.

STOCK LIFTING

Stock lifting is just the trading of poor stock for good stock. The persons following this racket have various means of ascertaining who stockholders are in well-known companies, and usually utility stocks are favored. A confidence man will set up in a city or town, where a person holding considerable utility stock is known to live, and will spend some time in cultivating the acquaintance of this person. The confidence man poses as a large and prosperous dealer in stocks and bonds. Eventually the confidence man will have sold the victim on the idea that a certain stock is bound to increase in value and that it is a wonderful buy. This confidence man will have papers showing that he has purchased a great quantity of this stock, and offers to arrange for the victim to get some of it. He talks the victim into giving him some of his utility stock and he gives the victim a great deal of worthless stock, which in many instances is simply worthless paper that he has had printed.

Confidence men following this racket must have a broker nearby to whom they can quickly rush the good stock for its disposal. The stock must be disposed of by the confidence men before the victim learns that

he has obtained something worthless in exchange for his good stock and before he has had time to notify a law enforcement agency.

"EYEGLASSES"

The "eyeglass" racket is only used by confidence men when they wish to make a small amount of money. The victims in this racket are generally older people and \$1,000.00 is generally the limit. The sums usually obtained range from \$200.00 to \$250.00 per person. Two men are necessary to work this racket and small towns are chosen where no eye specialist is located. Usually there is a young man and an old man, and they make arrangements in the small town to have a display in a drug store window. One man sits in the drug store window and "barks" their wares, trying to get customers to have their eyes tested. A test will be made by the second man and the victim will be given what is known as the Number One clip and will be sold a pair of glasses for about \$20.00. Arrangements will be made at that time for the person examining the eyes to call on the victim and apply treatments. After they have been in the drug store for a short time, these men will obtain the confidence of the druggist and get the names of elderly people in the neighborhood most likely to feel that they need glasses. One of these men will contact these persons personally and get them to come in and have their eyes tested. After having prescribed glasses and obtained the addresses of these persons, the confidence man acting as the eye specialist will go to the homes of these persons. He will then apply packs to the eyes, put various kinds of fluids in them, even massage the eyes with some kind of salve and where the victim appears to have money, will go so far as to get a deposit for an operation. This deposit for an operation will be the last step and is never used except as a "clean up" when the confidence men expect to get out of town. The practice of this confidence game requires an outfit costing approximately \$300.00.

"PIGEON-DROPPING"

"Pigeon-Dropping" is a small confidence game practiced by negroes in the South and the manner in which this fraud is perpetrated does not usually indicate the violation of any law within the investigative jurisdiction of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Two negroes, who will be designated as Number One and Number Two, will appear in a small town or rural section and ascertain the identity of some elderly colored person, usually a woman who has a savings account of possibly more than \$100. The Number One man will then engage the victim in conversation on the street and during this conversation, the Number Two man will pick up a pocketbook quite near where the Number One man and the victim are conversing. As he does this, the Number One man will call him over and inform him that he had seen him pick up the pocketbook and that he would tell on him if he did not divide the contents of the pocketbook. After examining the pocketbook, the Number One man will inform the victim that it contains quite a large sum of money and that he, the Number One man, and the victim should be entitled to a part of it.

The Number Two man will then say it is agreeable to him that they divide the contents of this pocketbook, but before any division is made, he, the Number Two man, will have to talk to his boss about the matter. The Number Two man then disappears for a short while, and upon his return, he would advise that his "boss-man" had stated it would be all right to divide the contents, but that the Number One man and the victim would have to put up a certain amount of cash to "show faith."

The Number One man will immediately reach into his pocket and give to the Number Two man a roll of bills, and state that it was perfectly all right with him to put up money to "show faith." By this time the victim will be completely sold on the proposition, and will proceed to obtain her life's savings and upon turning this money over to the Number Two man, the perpetrators of this fraud disappear.

Confidence men generally stop at one hotel but will receive mail from confederates at another hotel nearby under another name or, in many cities, one place, possibly a cigar store, will serve as a "post office."

When apprehended, the confidence men will usually "kick back." In an attempt to suppress prosecution they will offer the victim a part or all of his money back if he will fail to identify them.

PAPER EXAMINATION PROVES DOCUMENT FRAUDULENT

While analyzing a claim submitted to the American-Turkish Claims Commission, the Commissioner, Honorable Fred K. Nielsen became suspicious of the authenticity of certain documents. These documents were in the main affidavits in support of statements made by the American claimant, Garapet M. Avak, to the effect that a flour mill owned by him in Igdir, County of Surmaloo, Province of Erivan, Russia, had been destroyed by the Turkish Army on May 20, 1918.

As the claim amounted to \$442,000, and there were several suspicious circumstances surrounding the actions of the claimant, several of the affidavits were submitted to the Technical Laboratory of the Federal Bureau of Investigation by Mr. Nielsen with the request that they be examined for any features which would determine whether they were fraudulent.

Upon examination it was observed that the paper used for one of the affidavits contained an American watermark, although the affidavit was purported to have been prepared in Igdir. Correspondence with the paper manufacturer using this watermark disclosed that paper with this style of watermark had not been made prior to March 17, 1923. The date on the affidavit in question was 1919. This was prima facie evidence of an attempt to defraud.

This and other information of a similar type was transmitted to Mr. Nielsen who recommended that the claim be disallowed.

EXAMINATION OF FRAUDULENT CHECKS

A number of comparisons can be made with fraudulent or bogus checks. The usual comparison is that of known handwriting of suspects with the handwriting in the body of the check, the signature and the endorsement. This type of examination is made when suspects have been apprehended in the passing of bogus checks and known handwriting specimens have been secured for comparative purposes.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation has on file in its Technical Laboratory handwriting specimens of various forgers and impersonators which are available for comparison with fraudulent checks submitted to the Bureau. A large number of these individuals operate from state to state and extract thousands of dollars from unsuspecting persons. By means of handwriting comparisons it is possible to trace these swindlers from place to place until they are apprehended.

Many professional check passers use check protectors, typewriters, rubber stamps and specially printed blank check forms. A comparison of the check protector impressions on one check with those on another check may be the only apparent connection between two checks. This comparison may be enough to identify the check as the work of one swindler or a particular group of swindlers.

In many instances the typewriting on one check can be identified with the typewriting on another check. Rubber stamps are often used in numbering, certifying and dating checks and a comparison of the rubber stamp impressions may lead to an identification. The blank checks are usually made up in large numbers from the same printing form. A comparison of the printing on the check in the check form and the paper on which the blank checks are prepared may identify several checks as from the same source. When the check form is changed the handwriting, check protector, typewriting or rubber stamp impressions may identify the check with other checks previously prepared by this individual.

It is not the policy of the Bureau to attempt to develop latent fingerprints on checks unless a specific request is made for this action. It is desirable to treat checks of recent date for the development of latent fingerprints, especially checks issued within one month prior to submission to the Bureau. The latent prints developed are available for comparison with elimination prints and prints of suspects which may be submitted to the Bureau by the contributing officer. Naturally in the handling of a fraudulent check in the bank the fingerprints of numerous persons may be developed; however, one latent print may connect a suspect with a fraudulent check. A specific request should be made to the Bureau when latent fingerprint development is desired because the fingerprint development may alter the appearance of the original evidence to a slight extent.

The following are interesting cases which have been examined in the Bureau's Technical Laboratory:

A Private in the Sixth Corps Area, Selfridge Field, Michigan was suspected of having forged and uttered several checks in Mt. Clemens, Michigan. A complaint was filed against him by the local authorities but the suspect was discharged in the State case because the bank teller where the forged instruments in question were cashed, was unable to identify the suspect as the man who had received the money from the local bank. Not satisfied with this verdict the officers in charge submitted the questioned checks with known handwriting of the suspect and sample typewriting from two different typewriters to which the Private had access, to the Technical Laboratory for examination. After an examination in the Technical Laboratory the report was furnished that the handwriting appearing on the checks was that of the suspect and that the typewriting appearing thereon was from one of the two typewriters. The examiner making these identifications was requested to go to Michigan and testify as to his findings and it has since been ascertained that the suspect was court-martialed and sentenced to five years in prison.

On December 4, 1936 the Dallas Field Division of the Federal Bureau of Investigation forwarded to the Technical Laboratory in Washington a fraudulent check drawn in the amount of \$125.00, signed by J. C. Carroll and a handwritten postal card in an impersonation case.

The Charlotte Field Division of the Federal Bureau of Investigation under date of July 16, 1937 forwarded to headquarters in Washington a letter and photostatic copies of seven checks for examination. An examination in the Technical Laboratory resulted in the conclusion that the letter and six of the fraudulent checks were written by the same person who wrote the check and postal card submitted by the Dallas Field Division.

Subsequently the Chicago Field Division of the Federal Bureau of Investigation under date of August 23, 1937 forwarded several fraudulent checks to headquarters in Washington for examination. These checks had been passed in several southern States at various local stores of two Chicago firms by an individual impersonating a Federal Officer. A Laboratory examination resulted in the conclusion that most of the fraudulent checks were written by the writer of the J. C. Carroll checks.

Later the Louisville Field Division of the Federal Bureau of Investigation during the month of September, 1937 transmitted to the Technical Laboratory two fraudulent checks passed by an impersonator of a Federal Officer, together with several letters in the known handwriting of John C. Carroll. As a result of the Laboratory examination John C. Carroll was identified as the writer of the two questioned checks submitted by the Louisville Field Division and the checks previously identified with the original J. C. Carroll check. John C. Carroll was arrested January 6, 1937 by the local authorities of Moss Point, Mississippi and returned to Raleigh, North Carolina for incarceration in Central Prison on a State charge. Upon completion of this sentence Carroll was released to the Federal Authorities for prosecution on the impersonation charges. John C. Carroll was tried for impersonating a Federal Officer, was found guilty, fined \$100 and sentenced to serve three years in a Federal Penitentiary.

The Birmingham Field Division of the Federal Bureau of Investigation under date of May 14, 1935 forwarded to headquarters in Washington a fraudulent check signed by H. D. McDonald. Numerous other fraudulent checks were subsequently received in the Technical Laboratory from the Dallas, El Paso, Jacksonville, Kansas City, New Orleans, Oklahoma City, Omaha, San Antonio and San Francisco Field Divisions of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. These checks bore various signatures but were made out in a manner similar to the check submitted by the Birmingham Field Division. Laboratory examinations revealed the fact that all of these checks were written by the same person.

One of the checks forwarded to headquarters in Washington was passed at a hotel and the hotel clerk was able to identify the person who passed the check as one John Kenner Elliott. Handwriting specimens of Elliott were forwarded to the Laboratory and a handwriting comparison resulted in the conclusion that the checks received from the above-named Field Divisions of the Federal Bureau of Investigation were written by this individual. John Kenner Elliott is now serving a sentence in the United States Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas as Arthur Clay Claiborne, register #49574.

INTERNATIONAL EXCHANGE OF FINGERPRINTS DISCLOSES FUGITIVE STATUS OF SUBJECT FROM CANADA

An investigation being conducted by the Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation in connection with a violation of the National Motor Vehicle Theft Act brought to light an interesting international identification.

One Melvin Grainger was arrested at Decatur, Illinois, on September 30, 1937, and charged with investigation. It was ascertained that this individual was wanted by the Federal Bureau of Investigation for questioning in regard to the interstate transportation of a stolen car. His fingerprints were taken and sent to the Identification Division with the request that they be forwarded to the police authorities of Canada and England. Both of these countries furnished criminal records, Canada indicating that he had been wanted since 1933 on charges of breaking, entering and theft.

The English record of Grainger extended from 1917 when he was sentenced to imprisonment on November 23rd at Kingston Police Court for stealing watches. He was later arrested for unlawful possession and also for shooting to do grievous bodily harm. Upon his release from prison on the latter charge he was repatriated to Canada in 1919.

Grainger's Canadian criminal record reflects various charges of theft. He apparently did not discriminate in favor of any particular article as the subject of his kleptic tendencies, for charges of this character ranged from chickens to automobiles. Two charges of unlawfully possessing firearms were also reflected on his record. The Ontario Provincial Police at St. Thomas desired the apprehension of Grainger for breaking, entering and theft at Dutton, Ontario, Canada, and also for breaking and entering at West Loren, Ontario, Canada.

YOUTH AND CRIME

The prominent part played by youth in crime is indicated by the fact that 18 per cent (93,853) of the 520,153 fingerprint arrest records examined by the Federal Bureau of Investigation during the calendar year 1937 represented persons less than 21 years old. This is an increase over 1936, when 17.4 per cent (80,358) of the 461,589 arrest records were of youths under 21.

During 1937 there were 902 persons less than 21 years old charged with murder or manslaughter, 3,884 with robbery, 3,256 with assault, 13,661 with burglary, 19,632 with larceny and related crimes, and 6,872 with the specific offense of auto theft. Those persons number more than one-half of the 93,853 persons less than 21 years old arrested and fingerprinted during 1937. It should be noted that the preceding figures representing arrests of youthful persons are extremely conservative because in many jurisdictions juveniles are not fingerprinted, or copies of any fingerprints taken are not forwarded to the FBI.

From 1932 until the middle of 1935 age 19 predominated in the frequency of arrests. However, since 1935 ages 21 and 22 have been more frequently represented. During 1937 there were more arrests for age 22 than for any other single age group. Arrests for outstanding age groups were as follows:


The predominance of youthful persons among those charged with offenses against property is indicated by the fact that during 1937 there were 146,305 persons of all ages arrested for crimes against property (robbery, burglary, larceny, auto theft, embezzlement and fraud, forgery and counterfeiting, receiving stolen property, and arson), and that 45,303 (31.0 per cent) of them were less than 21 years old. During 1936, 28.5 per cent of the total crimes against property were committed by persons under 21 years of age. This indicates an increase in the proportion of such crimes committed by youths.

Further indication of the large part played by youthful persons in the commission of crimes against property is seen in the following figures. Considering all types of crimes, 34.8 per cent of all persons arrested were less than 25 years of age. However, persons less than 25 years old numbered 53.9 per cent of those charged with robbery, 61.6 per cent of those charged with burglary, 47.6 per cent of those charged with larceny and 73 per cent of those charged with auto theft. One-half of all persons arrested for crimes against property during 1937 were less than 25 years old.

In addition to the 93,853 persons less than 21 years old arrested during 1937, there were 87,309 (16.8 per cent) between the ages of 21 and 24,

making a total of 181,162 (34.8 per cent) less than 25 years old.

The large number of youths arrested for serious crimes and the great extent of recidivism (exceeding 50 per cent) indicate the extent to which juvenile delinquency has grown.



MAJOR CRIME INCREASED DURING 1937

Major crime in the United States increased 6.2 per cent in 1937 over 1936. This statement is based on monthly uniform crime reports received by the Federal Bureau of Investigation from Law Enforcement agencies in the United States. The following tabulation has been prepared to show the estimated total number of major crimes in the United States during 1936 and 1937.


An examination of the reports discloses that larcenies and autothefts comprise more than two-thirds of the major crimes reported. Burglaries and robberies represented one-fourth of all major offenses known to the police.

It will be noted that the foregoing crimes which are classed as offenses against property constitute over 95 per cent of all major offenses. The remaining crimes, murder, manslaughter, rape and aggravated assault are classed as offenses against the person. These crimes constitute less than 5 per cent of all major offenses.


Based on reports of 139 cities over 25,000 population, the automobiles stolen in those cities totaled 31,382 during 1937. Recoveries totaled 29,576 or 94.2 per cent. The same cities reported the value of property stolen (currency, jewelry, furs, clothing, automobiles and miscellaneous) at \$19,225,820.51, whereas the recoveries totaled \$12,426,895.00 or 64.6 per cent.

During 1937 the Federal Bureau of Investigation received uniform crime reports from 2,429 cities in the United States representing a population of 66,279,987. In addition, crime reports were received from 1,286 sheriffs and state police organizations and 8 agencies in the territories and possessions of the United States.

A QUESTIONABLE PATTERN

The fingerprint which is presented for discussion this month is of a type which is subject to varied interpretations. This impression contains a loop formation in the center of the pattern area with a separate loop appearing on the extreme border, the right delta, however, not showing even in this comprehensively rolled impression.



In the Bureau's Identification Division, such a finger impression is classified as a loop with a dual loop or whorl reference. This interpretation has been adopted because the appearance of the second loop is dependent upon the extent to which the finger is rolled when the print is made.

Since the outside loop is beyond the pattern area it frequently happens that the formation is disclosed only by rolling the finger to the farthest degree possible and impressions normally rolled do not show even a tendency toward the second loop.

Therefore, in order that practice may be uniform and that the pattern always may be classified in the same way to facilitate more rapid identification, the Bureau considers this type of impression to be preferentially a loop.

IDENTIFICATION BY MEANS OF THE DATA IN PAPILLARY RIDGE SYSTEMS ON THE PLANTAR SURFACES*

In civilized parts the term "footprint" normally conveys to the mind an impression made by a boot or shoe, for it is most unusual for a person to go barefooted. Consequently, although it is well known that the papillary ridges which appear on the plantar surfaces are no less persistent, and that the data in those systems are just as reliable for purposes of identification as those which occur on the palms, it is not possible to take advantage of this knowledge with a view to the detection of perpetrators of crime.

With few exceptions, natives of East Africa go unshod and, whilst there are many factors, such as dirt adhering to the soles of the feet and the unsuitable nature of surfaces trodden upon, which more often than not prevent the ridge characteristic data from appearing in their footprints, it occasionally happens that those details are to be observed, and recently, for the first time in Kenya Colony, advantage was taken of such an impression to bring an offender to justice.

A club-house in Nairobi was broken into during the night, and property stolen from the bar. When the premises were examined the following morning a number of footprints in dust were noticed upon the polished countertop and upon the tops of stools which were standing in front of the counter, which had been impressed by feet which had come into contact with dirt prior to being placed upon the stools and counter.

These impressions were evidently those of the thief, for they were most conspicuous, and must have been noticed if they had been present when the bar was locked up the previous night, for the lighting was quite good. Furthermore, they were of a most fragile nature and, even if not noticed, they would have been obliterated by persons using the bar up to the time when it was closed.

As it was, some of the most conspicuous of them appeared on the portion of the counter above the till and on stools in front of that part of the counter. Those impressions would have been the most likely to have been marred, had the bar been used after they were impressed, because by virtue of their position adjacent to the till, they were in those parts which one would expect to be most used in the course of transactions in the bar. These particular impressions pointed behind the counter, indicating that the person who made them had walked over the counter at that point to get behind the bar, having utilized the high stools to assist him to get on top of the counter.

One of the stools which was standing in front of that part of the counter under which the till was situated, and over which a light depended from the ceiling, was taken to the Criminal Investigation Department, and the impression of a right foot which appeared on its top surface was photographed.

The footprints of all natives employed in any capacity by the club were then taken, and the impression on the stool was found to be identical with that of the right foot of the head ground-boy, who had no occasion to enter the bar on the day of the offence except once, when he returned some tennis balls to the steward.

This boy was charged with the offence, pleading "Not Guilty," and evidence was given to the effect that he had walked upon the stools and counter, which he had no right or reason to do; and that since the bar and the stools were used by numerous people for a number of hours after he had returned the tennis balls, it would have been impossible for the delicate footprints to have survived.

Photographic exhibits were produced of the footprint on the stool and of the impression of the right foot of the accused, in two of which twenty-four ridge characteristics which were in identical sequence were marked. An expert testified that, during a number of years' experience, he had never known impressions of papillary ridges taken from different persons to agree in the sequence of the ridge characteristic data. He stated that these ridges occur only on the palmar and plantar surfaces and that, although for purposes of convenience and because systems of classifying them had been evolved, those ridge systems which appear on the inside surfaces of the end phalanges of the fingers and thumbs were ordinarily used for identification, the data which appear in the systems on the remainder of palmar surfaces and the soles of the feet are no less constant or reliable. In fact impressions from portions of palmar surfaces other than the end phalanges of digits were frequently used as a means of identification and he had, for that purpose, taken footprints of infants, whose finger or palm-prints it was impracticable to take, owing to clenching and the fragile nature of the hands.

It was explained to the Court that identification by means of data in papillary ridge systems was founded upon the theory of probability, which theory was based upon the fact that when events are independent of each other the probability of their occurrence together is the product of their respective possibilities. On applying that theory to the twenty-four coincident points of similarity marked in the footprints in question, as it was applied to finger and palm-prints by Sir Francis Galton, the chance of the footprint on the stool being that of any person other than the accused was 1 in 281,474,976,710,656, and there were other points of similarity which were not marked. According to one estimate the population of the world in 1932 was 1,400,000,000, and if that estimate were taken as being approximately correct, the chance of the footprint on the stool being that of a person other than the accused was 1 in a number some 200,000 times greater than the

estimated population of the world in 1932. In the application of this theory due and ample allowance had been made for the relative frequency with which some characteristics occur as compared with others, and a number of experts considered that Sir Francis Galton was somewhat conservative, and that the allowances he made were too great.

The expert had no doubt that the impression had been made by the right foot of the accused.

The native advanced as his defence that he had walked on the stool when he returned the tennis balls but, when he perceived the futility of such a defence, he suggested that his footprint had been placed upon it by the police. This, naturally, did not assist him to any extent.

The Court stated that there could be no doubt as to the identity of the footprint, and that there was a weight of evidence to show that the mark could not have been impressed before the closing of the bar.

A sentence of one year's hard labour was passed upon the accused, who had no previous convictions and who, but for the footprint, would have escaped detection. Indeed, as head ground-boy with seven years' service with the club, he would have been deputed to keep watch with a view to the apprehension of the offender should he have attempted to repeat his criminal activities in so far as the club property was concerned.

SPECIAL ANNOUNCEMENT

The Federal Bureau of Investigation in an effort to simplify the use of fingerprints transmitted in the cases of applicants for various positions recently has devised an "Applicant" fingerprint card. A sample of this card is reproduced immediately following this announcement. These cards will be available for the use of any and all law enforcement officials who desire to transmit the fingerprints of applicants for check against the Bureau's criminal fingerprint files. Appropriate supplies will be forwarded to any agencies desiring the same.

In particular, it is desired to indicate that the name of the contributor is to be submitted on every form mailed to the Bureau and also the position sought is to be entered in the proper column.

It is hoped that through the adoption of this practice the Bureau will be in a position to afford more effective service to interested agencies in handling applicant fingerprint cards. For the information of all contributors, it is desired to point out at this time that applicant cards after search will be retained in the Bureau's criminal files unless the contributing officials specifically request their return.

CHARLES BIRD and BARBARA BIRD





On July 29, 1937, Charles Bird, age 26, and James Widmer, age 31, held up and robbed the Coventry Road Branch of the Central National Bank, Cleveland, Ohio, of \$10,750. One of the employees pressed the burglar alarm during the robbery and police, responding to the alarm, were engaged in a gun battle by the fleeing bandits who abandoned the loot in the bank. Both Bird and Widmer were apprehended in the neighborhood after a chase by the police, and each was found to be in the possession of two guns, one gun in the possession of Charles Bird having jammed during the gun battle.

On the evening of the same day, Frank Bird, age 30, a brother of Charles, was apprehended by members of the Cleveland, Ohio Police Department as also was his wife, Sylvia Bird, age 21. Barbara Bird, age 19, the wife of Charles, was apprehended by Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation and members of the St. Louis Police Department at St. Louis, Missouri on the same day. Six revolvers, a rifle and a sawed-off shotgun were recovered from the members of this gang in connection with their apprehension. Charles and Frank Bird, James Widmer and Barbara Bird were taken into Federal custody charged with bank robbery, and committed to the Cuyahoga County Jail in Cleveland, Ohio in default of \$352,000 bail. Barbara, however, was later released on her own recognizance.

The investigation conducted by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, United States Department of Justice disclosed that on July 19, 1936

Charles Bird had escaped from the Missouri State Penitentiary at Jefferson City, Missouri to which he had been sentenced on December 29, 1932 to serve 10 years for the crime of first degree robbery. Frank Bird and James Widmer had been sentenced to the same penitentiary in 1926 each to serve life imprisonment for the crime of murder in the first degree, and each escaped from the same penitentiary, Frank Bird on January 13, 1937 and James Widmer on February 15, 1937.

Charles Bird, after his escape from the Missouri State Penitentiary, proceeded to Detroit, Michigan where it is indicated he perpetrated numerous robberies of truck drivers of department store trucks in that city. He then came to Cleveland, Ohio and subsequent to his arrival, there was an outbreak of department store delivery truck robberies and the bandit responsible for the perpetration of these robberies was referred to by the newspapers as the "blond bandit" and the "gentleman bandit." The latter name was apparently given to him because of his mode of operation. After robbing the truck drivers he would always ask the driver how much of the money taken from him was his personal money, and upon receiving an answer, would return the amount which the driver stated was his own. Charles Bird has been identified as having perpetrated 26 of these robberies.

This gang, consisting of Charles and Frank Bird and James Widmer, was also responsible for several bank robberies in Cleveland and Cleveland Heights, Ohio in which loot in excess of \$55,000 was obtained from January to July, 1937. On September 22, 1937, while incarcerated in the Cuyahoga County Jail awaiting the action of the Federal Grand Jury, Charles and Frank Bird, James Widmer and Theodore Slapak who was being held on a charge of murder, escaped with the use of two guns which had been smuggled to them, with which they held up a number of Deputy Sheriffs. During the escape several cars were commandeered by the fleeing men and while speeding in one of the stolen automobiles on a street in Cleveland, Ohio, they struck and seriously injured a Mrs. Paul Tober, who subsequently died of the injuries received. During the flight, the Birds and Widmer separated from Slapak who was shot in the finger and apprehended by members of the Cleveland, Ohio Police Department on the same day.

The investigation conducted by the Federal Bureau of Investigation developed the information that the escape had been planned by Barbara and Sylvia Bird, the wives of Charles and Frank, and George Bird, a brother of Charles and Frank Bird. The guns used in the escape were .32 caliber pistols obtained from mail-order houses by Sylvia and George Bird, and smuggled in to Charles by Barbara Bird during a visit to Charles at the jail, during which she was permitted to be alone with him in a room. After the escape Barbara and Sylvia joined the former convicts in an apartment rented by the two girls in Cleveland, Ohio where they changed their clothes and all five then proceeded to Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania using a rented automobile which Barbara Bird had obtained for the purpose. George Bird was located and apprehended at Highland Park, Michigan by Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation and members of the Highland Park Police Department on September 25, 1937.

From Pittsburgh the Birds and Widmer proceeded to Philadelphia, Pennsylvania where James Widmer was apprehended by members of the Philadelphia Police Department on October 15, 1937 in possession of a stolen automobile. Both Widmer and George Bird were returned to Cleveland, Ohio and on October 29, 1937, Frank and Sylvia Bird were located and apprehended at Cleveland, Ohio by a Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation and a Deputy Sheriff of Cuyahoga County, upon their return to Cleveland on the evening of that day.

On October 21, 1937 James Widmer entered a plea of guilty to the robbery of two banks and was sentenced at Cleveland, Ohio to serve 65 years in a Federal Penitentiary. On November 1, 1937 Frank Bird entered a plea of guilty to a charge of bank robbery and was sentenced to serve 45 years in a Federal Penitentiary. The Judge, in sentencing Frank Bird and James Widmer, deferred sentence on one count of each indictment, which count involves a possible penalty of death. On December 3, 1937 Sylvia Bird and George Bird entered pleas of guilty to charges of violation of the Federal Escape Act and being accessories after the fact, to the bank robberies perpetrated by Frank Bird, Charles Bird and James Widmer. Each was sentenced to serve four years in a Federal Penitentiary.

The criminal record of Charles Bird reflects that he was first arrested in St. Louis, Missouri on March 7, 1923 charged with being implicated in a burglary and larceny. He was placed on probation and was next arrested on March 26, 1923 charged with burglary and larceny, was again placed on probation and discharged with a warning. On April 13, 1923 he was again arrested charged with violation of parole and sentenced to two years at Bellefontaine Farms, Missouri. On June 15, 1923 he was again arrested as a delinguent. The record reflects he was next arrested on September 30, 1924 charged with burglary and larceny, and parole violation, and was committed to the Board of Children's Guardians for two years. On March 2, 1926 he was arrested as a runaway from the Bellefontaine Farms charged with incorrigibility and committed to the St. Louis Training School (institution for the feeble-minded). On May 1, 1926 Charles Bird was sentenced to serve two years in the Missouri State Reformatory on a charge of burglary and larceny, was received there May 14, 1926, was paroled on April 12, 1927 and returned on April 6, 1928 and finally discharged on November 8, 1928. On August 11, 1931 he was again arrested by the St. Louis, Missouri Police Department charged with larceny of an automobile, was again sentenced to the Missouri State Reformatory and again paroled. On January 21, 1932 he was arrested by the Police Department at Michigan City, Indiana charged with carrying concealed weapons and was fined \$100 and \$10 costs. On August 13, 1932 he was again arrested by the St. Louis, Missouri Police Department on a charge of robbery and larceny of an automobile, and sentenced to serve ten years in the Missouri State Penitentiary from which he escaped on July 19, 1936. Charles Bird. was also arrested by the Police Department at St. Louis, Missouri on twentyfive other occasions from March 26, 1923 to August 1, 1932, making a total of forty-one times this individual has been taken into custody by law enforcement agencies.

Charles Bird, subsequent to his arrival in Cleveland, after his escape from the Missouri State Penitentiary, met Barbara Elizabeth Sieber during the latter part of August, 1936 and on September 13, 1936 they drove to Ripley, New York and were married by a Justice of the Peace. They returned to Cleveland to live and in January, 1937, after the escape of Frank Bird from the Missouri State Penitentiary, he joined Charles at Cleveland and was introduced to Barbara's sister, Sylvia, as Frank Murray. On March 1, 1937 Frank Bird and Sylvia followed in the footsteps of Charles and Barbara and were married at Ripley, New York. James Widmer, after his escape from the Missouri State Penitentiary, joined the Bird brothers in Cleveland and on March 12, 1937 Frank Bird and James Widmer purchased a restaurant in Cleveland which was operated by them until May, at which time Frank and Sylvia Bird purchased Widmer's share and continued to operate the restaurant until they were apprehended on July 29, 1937. It was sold by Sylvia shortly thereafter. A baby was born to Barbara Bird at Cleveland, Ohio on June 24, 1937, which was left with her mother at the time she fled with her husband.

When their husbands were apprehended, Barbara and Sylvia Bird who are graduates of the Mayfield Central High School, Cleveland, Ohio began planning to effect their escape which was effected on September 22, 1937 as previously indicated. From Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania the four Birds proceeded to Philadelphia and after the apprehension of James Widmer they fled to New York where they were traced by Special Agents, and the automobile which they had rented in Cleveland and subsequently stolen was located in a garage. The two couples separated in New York and Frank and Sylvia Bird returned to Cleveland where they were apprehended.

On September 23, 1937 indictments were returned by a Federal Grand Jury at Cleveland, Ohio charging Charles Bird with (1) robbery of the Lorain Street Bank, West 130th Street Branch, Cleveland, Ohio on February 27, 1937; (2) robbery of the Central National Bank, Coventry Road Branch, Cleveland, Ohio on July 29, 1937; (3) robbery of the Central National Bank, Buckeye Road Branch, Cleveland, Ohio on June 29, 1937.

On November 30, 1937 an indictment was returned by a Federal Grand Jury at Cleveland, Ohio charging Barbara Bird and others with aiding in the escape of Charles Bird, James Widmer and Frank Bird, Federal prisoners, from the Cuyahoga County Jail, Cleveland, Ohio on September 22, 1937 and with being accessories after the fact to the bank robberies for which Charles Bird was indicted.

During January, 1938 a total of 545 examinations were made in the Laboratory of the Federal Bureau of Investigation involving 2,469 pieces of evidence, assistance being rendered to other government agencies in 21 instances, and to state and municipal law enforcement agencies in 117 cases. Each month it is possible for this laboratory to make examinations for the assistance of other law enforcement organizations, aiding in their investigations.
