

Crimes in connection with Federal Penal and Correctional Institutions Perjury, embezzlement. or bribery in connection with Federal Statutes or officials

Crimes on the high seas

Federal Anti-Racketeering Statute

The location of persons who are fugitives from justice by reason of violations of the Federal Laws over which the Bureau has jurisdiction, of escaped Federal prisoners, and parole and probation violators.

The Bureau does not have investigative jurisdiction over the violations of Counterfeiting, Narcotic, Customs, Immigration, or Postal Laws.

Law enforcement officials possessing information concerning violations over which the Bureau has investigative jurisdiction are requested to promptly forward the same to the Special Agent in Charge of the nearest field office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, U. S. Department of Justice. The address of each field office of this Bureau appears on the inside back cover of this bulletin. Government Rate Collect telegrams or telephone calls will be accepted if information indicates that immediate action is necessary.

#### THE EVIDENCE OF FRACTURED GLASS IN CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS

Broken window-panes or bullet holes in glass may often furnish important evidence in connection with the commission of a crime. In the case of broken glass in windows, show cases and the like, it may be possible to determine on which side of the glass the blow was struck. In many cases the side on which a bullet entered a piece of glass, and sometimes the type of ammunition used can be determined from an examination of the resultant bullet hole.

#### **BROKEN WINDOW-PANES**

Uninformed persons are prone to believe that the side on which glass fragments fall following a fracture of the pane indicates the direction from which the blow was applied. This is not always true and the fallacy might lead to serious complications in certain instances; for example, where other forces than the breaking force cause the unusual distribution of glass, as when the glass is leaning forward at a slight angle from the perpendicular.

The problem of determining whether a window-pane was broken from the inside or outside was given considerable study by Dr. S. N. Matwejeff (1), Acting Director, Odessa Scientific Forensic Institute. As a result of his experiments, which were carried out in connection with a murder case, a method was developed for solving this problem.

When a window is struck, the glass being slightly flexible first bends in the direction of the blow and causes the glass on the opposite side to be stretched. (2) This tension on the rear surface of the glass causes it to break at this surface first, and the cracks so produced travel out from the point where the blow is struck, suggesting an appearance similar to the spokes of a wheel. These cracks extend out from the point of impact like the radii of a circle and are, therefore, called radial cracks.

Inasmuch as the front and back surfaces of the glass are under quite different conditions with regard to tension when the radial cracks occur, the cracked edges of the glass present different appearances near the front and back surfaces. If the piece of broken glass is viewed edgewise so that the light is reflected from the surface of the crack, a number of fracture lines will be seen which appear to run parallel and close to the front surface for a short distance, sometimes for several inches, and then curve across so that they seem to meet the back surface more or less perpendicularly. The appearance of these fracture lines is shown in the diagram and photograph. (3) The arrow shows the direction from which, but not the point at which, the blow was struck. Actually the point of impact is several inches to the right and does not appear in the photograph shown.

After the radial cracks have formed, the pieces of glass are broken out by the formation of cracks which extend from one radial crack to another around and some distance from the place the blow is struck. cracks known as concentric cracks are formed by the force of the blow pushing the glass back and causing it to bend at places some distance from the center of the blow depending on the size of the window. Proof that concentric follow radial is readily seen in that radial are continuous whereas concentric are stopped by the radial cracks. This bending of the glass places the front surface, which becomes the "outside" surface of the bend, under tension, a condition which is just the opposite to that which exists when the radial cracks were formed. This reversal of conditions produces a reversed appearance of the cracked edges so that these edges show fracture lines which are parallel to the back surface of the glass and which run more or less perpendicularly into the front surface. The result is that irregular triangular shaped pieces of glass are formed, two edges of which corresponding to radial cracks, have fracture lines in relief, parallel to the front surface while the third edge, constituting the concentric crack, shows fracture lines parallel to the back surface. By an examination of these triangular shaped pieces of glass, the side on which the glass was struck can thus be determined. Several pieces should be examined to confirm the conclusion.

The findings of Matwejeff as related above have been amply confirmed by experiments conducted in the technical laboratory of the FBI. Scrutiny of fractures in over two hundred panes of glass disclosed no instance in which the fracture lines could not be readily seen and the direction of breaking force readily ascertained. While this examination tells on which side of the piece of glass the blow was struck, the problem is by no means solved until it has been determined which side of the window corresponds to the front surfaces of the pieces examined. Of course if pieces remaining in the frame show one side is comparatively clean and the other dirty, there is no difficulty. If, on the other hand, both sides are equally clean or dirty, it may become necessary to remove the window, lay it on a suitable flat surface and fit the pieces in place in the manner of solving a jig-saw puzzle, a method which may be long and tedious. In experimental tests it is possible to mark one surface of the glass, permitting rapid recognition after the fracture. Attention is called to the necessity of being sure which edges are radial and which are concentric as one cannot always be certain by the shape alone. may be that this information can only be obtained by reconstructing the window.

If the window is so located that the broken pieces fall some distance onto a sidewalk, pavement, or similar hard surface and are broken again, it may not be possible to reach a conclusion. Suitable pieces may sometimes be found on the window-sills, however, but the reconstruction of the window will be much more difficult.

#### IDENTIFICATION OF GLASS FRAGMENTS

The need will occasionally arise for the examination of submitted fragments of fractured glass for the purpose of determining their particular source with reference to known pieces which may be available. A very typical problem of this kind is found in the attempted identification of

glass fragments left at the scene of crime in a hit-and-run case, with the glass in the broken headlight lens of a suspect car. This can often be accomplished in a relatively simple manner by a physical matching of the broken pieces into the whole, or enough of the whole to indicate a definite connection between the two. With regard to the possibility of otherwise identifying glass fragments of this nature Lucas (4) points out the value in attempting to indicate identification, of utilizing the refractive index, the characteristic appearance of various kinds of glass when exposed to ultra-violet, and the comparison of the specific gravity of the two samples under examination, and he cites three references as to the detailed technique involved. (5) The possibilities of chemical analysis should not be overlooked as an additional identifying factor.

A similar but more difficult problem presents itself in the attempt to obtain investigative leads in such hit-and-run cases where no suspect cars have yet been discovered and when the broken lens fragments from the scene of crime are available as a clue. Examination of the fragments in the technical laboratory with particular reference to physical properties such as the thickness of the lens, the curvature of the same, the manufacturer's surface design for diffusion purposes, the color, as well as the color under ultra-violet, refractive index and specific gravity index previously noted, may be helpful in identifying the particular make of lens. The Federal Bureau of Investigation is presently collecting the various automobile lenses more frequently used in this country in order to have these samples, together with such descriptive data concerning them as may be assembled, available for reference purposes in situations of this kind in its Technical Laboratory at Washington.

#### BULLET HOLES IN GLASS

The determination of the direction in which a bullet penetrates glass is usually much simpler than the problem of broken windows just described, for in most cases the hole is clean cut and has a characteristic appearance which definitely indicates the side of entrance.

When a bullet enters glass it makes a more or less clean cut hole in the front surface. As the bullet penetrates the back surface, however, it pulls out the glass all around the hole for a distance which may be greater than the diameter of the hole and leaves a saucer shaped depression on the exit side. A somewhat similar effect is produced when a nail is driven through a piece of wood. The nail makes a clean hole when it enters but where it comes through the other side it pulls out pieces of wood and leaves them sticking out. These splinters are sufficiently tough so that they bend out but do not break as in the case of glass which is quite brittle. In addition, the wood has a grain and the splinters are pulled out along

this grain, but only to a slight extent in the direction across the grain. Glass, on the other hand, is the same in all directions and the chipping is uniform in all directions. This characteristic appearance occurs in both ordinary window glass and plate glass. Both Gross (6) and Soderman (7) refer to the possibility of determining the approximate angle from which the shot was fired through the glass as a result of examining the amount of chipping occurring on one side or the other of the exit side of the bullet hole.

Safety glass which is now being placed in most automobiles consists of two pieces of plate glass between which is a sheet of tough trans—

The glass has been firmly cemented to this inner material by heat and high pressure so that if the glass is cracked during an accident, the pieces are held in place by the binding material which, because of its toughness, is ordinarily not damaged. The same characteristic appearance is shown by this type of glass when penetrated by a bullet. The problem is more difficult when several bullets enter this type of glass very close together because the last bullets enter a surface which already contains a number of cracks and as a result small pieces are knocked out around the hole in the entrance side as well as the exit side. It will be found, however, that the broken edges on the entrance side are approximately perpendicular to the surface of the glass whereas on the exit side these edges are at an angle to the surface.

The holes produced by various types of ammunition present characteristic appearances and it is frequently possible to identify this ammunition. This is particularly true of holes in safety glass because the fragments do not fall out as is frequently the case with window glass. In general it may be stated that the slower the speed of a bullet of a given size the larger the hole, within, of course, certain limits. A .22 long rifle bullet, for example, will make a larger hole than the high velocity 30'06 bullet. In addition, it will be found that the high speed bullets produce a large number of short, fine cracks around the hole which are not present or occur only to a limited extent in holes produced by low velocity bullets.

Upon first consideration it would seem natural to expect that a shot gun charge would more or less completely shatter out a pane of glass. This was established to be not the case in experiments conducted by the FBI Technical Laboratory utilizing a 12 gauge shot gun, fired from approximately three feet through automobile safety glass. Photographs #3 and #4 indicate the result, one being a close-up view, the hole from the shot gun charge being indicated by an arrow. In reaching a conclusion regarding the type of ammunition involved, tests should be made using the same type of glass as that under examination. (8)

In some instances it is possible to determine which of two bullet holes were made first. A crack in glass may travel for some distance but if it meets another crack which has been formed previously it will be stopped,



consequently if cracks from a certain bullet are stopped by cracks from another bullet hole it may be concluded that the latter bullet was fired first.

An example of the value of such evidence concerning glass fractures in court was demonstrated during the trial of John Paul Chase in the Federal District Court at Chicago, Illinois, charged with the murder on November 27, 1934, near Barrington, Illinois, of Inspector S. P. Cowley and Special Agent H. E. Hollis of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Chase, together with Lester M. Gillis, who was also killed in the battle, engaged in a gun duel with Cowley and Hollis. The abandoned automobile of Nelson and Chase was found to have five bullet holes close together through the right hand side of the windshield (9) and this windshield was studied by technicians of the Bureau, who determined that the shots causing the holes were all fired from within the automobile and that they were very probably made by 30'06 ammunition. This testimony given before the court indicated that this windshield was damaged in an earlier encounter with Federal Agents and, further, clearly precluded the defense from making any allegations that the bullet holes were caused by ammunition in the hands of the Federal Agents. Testimony was also given by the laboratory technician concerning a hole in the rear window of the Agents' automobile, which was caused by a 12 gauge shot gun fired from the inside.





Actual photograph of the edge of the glass along the radial crack, again showing the development and direction of the fracture lines, as in the previous diagram with the direction of the blow noted.



Effect of shotgun charge on automobile safety glass fired from 12 gauge shotgun at approximately 3 feet. Smaller holes caused by rifle bullets.



Close-up of results of shotgun charge.





Distance of muzzle of gun from glass 30 inches in all cases except #10.



Close-up of windshield test showing tests 9, 10 and 11.



#### PALM-PRINTS OR HANDMARKS AS EVIDENCE

Many law enforcement officers have advised that they are retaining copies of the FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin in their libraries as reference collections. With the thought that some identification officers may find it helpful to have an authoritative case readily available upon the admissibility of palm-prints or handmarks, we are reproducing that portion of the court's opinion dealing with that subject matter in the case of State vs Kuhl 175 Pac. 190.

Although this case was decided in 1918 it is frequently cited authoritatively and seems to be the case of first impression upon the question whether evidence as to the identity of palm-print impressions is admissible, as tending to connect the accused with the commission of a crime. The case is of interest also because the use of a projectoscope was approved.

The court, deciding that circumstantial evidence derived from fingerprints and palm-prints are both equally reliable, in an excellent opinion makes a survey of the literature upon the subject of both finger-prints and palm-prints. The court's reason for such careful consideration was due to defendant's contention that the science of palm-prints had not yet developed sufficiently to bear out the conclusion of an expert on the subject. Because of the court's deliberation and able opinion, it is felt that the authoritative sources mentioned hereafter may be a helpful addition to an identification officer's reference library.

The defendant Kuhl was charged with killing a United States Mail driver in Nevada. One of the elements in the case was an envelope, secured from one of the rifled mail sacks on which was a bloody print or impression of a portion of the palm of a human hand. The trial resulted in a death verdict from which Kuhl appealed, contending that the trial court erred in admitting the testimony of the witnesses Stone and Botorff, offered in behalf of the state, as experts on palm-print identification. In offering the testimony of the experts, photographic enlargements and projectoscope views were used and presented to the jury. Objection was made to this method of presenting evidence and to the experts' testimony.

In affirming the trial court's action the appellate court stated: "Before testifying to their opinion as to the identity of the defendant's palm-print with the impression found upon the bloody envelope taken from the mail sack, each of the witnesses fully explained his qualifications. The witness Stone related in detail as to his study on the subject of finger-print identification and classification. It is disclosed that his investigation and research in this line had taken up his time almost continuously from the year 1908, or 1909, to the time of the trial; that during that time he had been engaged by at least two recognized identification bureaus, one under the state police department of the state of Nevada, the other under the police department of the city of Fresno in California. He testified to his having visited numerous identification bureaus and to having attended conventions held by those engaged in this science in the United States. The witness Botorff related an experience entailing research and investigation

in the line of fingerprint identification and classification, continuing from the year 1903 up to the time of the trial. Each of the witnesses was, as the record discloses, exhaustively and skilfully cross-examined on every phase of the subject that would bring forth to the jury their ability or lack of ability to give a correct or worthy conclusion as to the identity of fingerprint impressions.

"Were we dealing here with a fingerprint impression, or the question of the comparison or identity of fingerprint impressions, our course would be easy, for the courts of this country, and of England as well, have paved the way for the recognition of this science as an evidentiary element in criminal prosecutions. The main contention here is that the experts who testified were not qualified to give an opinion as to the identity of palmprint impressions; and, as we understand the contention of appellant, it is that science has not yet developed this question sufficiently to bear out the conclusion of an expert on the subject. Will the same rule which has led the courts to recognize experts on fingerprint identification permit such experts to testify as to their conclusion upon palm-print identification? This is the one vital question here.

"The origin of fingerprint identification may be traced back to a period some 100 years before the birth of Christ. Scientific American, April 1, 1916, p. 356. By a Japanese scholar, Mr. Kumagusu Minakata, in an article entitled, 'The Antiquity of the Fingerprint Method,' we are told that the discovery of this phenomenon of identity, as it may be termed, was made by the Chinese. In a most interesting article, entitled, 'History of the Fingerprint System' (Annual Report of the Board of Regents of the Smithsonian Institute for the year ending June 30, 1912, p. 631), Mr. Berthold Laufer traces the subject back to an era before the birth of Christ. He refers to the writings of Kai Kung-Yen, an author who wrote about the year 650 A. D., and who makes allusion to the employment of fingerprint impressions in his time, and earlier, for the purposes of identification.

"It may have come as a result of the diversified and extensive reading of the learned author that, in his famous novel, 'Pudd'n Head Wilson,' Mark Twain causes one of his characters to make the significant speech: 'Every human being carries with him from his cradle to his grave certain physical marks which do not change their character and by which he can always be identified—and that without shadow of doubt or question. These marks are his signature, his physiological autograph, so to speak; and this autograph cannot be counterfeited, nor can he disguise it or hide it away, nor can it become illegible by the wear of the mutations of time. This signature is each man's own—there is no duplicate of it among the swarming millions of the globe. Upon the haft of this dagger stands the assassin's natal autograph, written in the blood of that helpless and unoffending old man who loved you and whom you all loved. There is but one man in the whole earth whose hand can duplicate that crimson sign.'

"When these lines were written by the beloved author modern science and modern culture had as yet failed to grasp the full significance of his words. Indeed, it was not until recent years that the true force of the lines of the great Westerner could be fully appreciated. However ancient may be the origin of this means of identification, it remained for Sir Francis Galton to bring forth the principle in such a way as to gain the recognition of the world of science. In his book, published in 1892, we find the following significant paragraph: 'We read of the dead body of Jezebel being devoured by the dogs of Jezreel, so that no man might say, "This is Jezebel," and that the dogs left only her skull, the palms of her hands, and the soles of her feet; but the palms of the hands and the soles of the feet are the very remains by which a corpse might be most surely identified, if impressions of them, made during life, were available.'

"All of the writers upon the subject, to whose lines we have had access, agree that the palmar surface of the hands and the soles of the feet in men and monkeys are covered with minute ridges that bear a superficial resemblance to those made on the sand by wind or flowing water. Galton first gave expression to this fact; and Sir E. R. Henry, commissioner of police of the metropolis of London, corroborates with the statement that the inner part of the hand and the sole of the foot are traversed in all directions by lines of varying length. He says that the most conspicuous are the creases caused by the folding of the skin; but the least conspicuous, but much more numerous, lines, are the papillary ridges which exist over the whole palmar surface, giving it an appearance that may be likened to that of a newly plowed field with its ridges and furrows, or to sand, which the water, in receding from, has left ribbed. In Mr. Frederick A. Brayley's book, entitled, 'Fingerprints Identification,' we find the following significant language: '"God's fingerprint language," the voiceless speech, and the indelible writing imprinted on the fingers, hand palms, and foot soles of humanity by the all-wise Creator for some good and useful purpose in the structure, regulation, and well-being of the human body, has been utilized for ages before the civilization of Europe as a means of identification by the Chinese, and who shall say is not a part of the plan of the Creator for the ultimate elimination of crime by means of surrounding the evilly disposed by safeguards of prevention, and for the unquestionable evidence of identity in all cases where such is necessary, whether it be in wills, deeds, insurance, or commercial mediums of finance, as well as in the discovering and identification of lawbreakers.'

"Mr. Tighe Hopkins, in his work, 'Wards of the State,' makes extended reference to the papillary lines as covering the palms of the human hands and the soles of the human feet. In a work entitled, 'Criminal Investigation,' translated by John and J. Collyer Adam from the work entitled, 'System der Kriminalistik,' by Dr. Hans Gross, extended reference is made to the general subject. In a pamphlet published by Sir William J. Herschel, dealing with the subject of fingerprint identification, we find a most interesting history of experiments made by the learned author while acting in the British service in India. He interestingly relates of his experimentation with his own whole hand and with his right foot, which, he says, after an interval of fifty-seven years, remained irresistibly unchanged. 'The Origin of Fingerprinting,' by Sir William J. Herschel, Humphrey Milford, Oxford University Press, June, 1916, p. 11.

"In his work, 'Guide to Fingerpfint Identification,' by Henry Faulds, late surgeon superintendent of Tsukiji Hospital, Tokyo, Japan, reference is made to the papillary ridges found covering the face or palmar surface of the hands and feet of the human being. In a terse and graphic little work, entitled, 'Hints on Fingerprints,' written by Rai Sahib Hem Chandra Bose, fingerprint expert of Bengal, India, and a pupil of Sir Edward Henry, we find that, after dwelling on the possibility of error in fingerprint comparison, the author makes this most significant assertion: 'In fact, the indications on the inner surface of the hand are so numerous that, if half a square inch of any part of it were all that remained, that would be enough, in that it would prove identity by comparison.'

"In his work entitled, 'The Fingerprint Instructor,' Mr. Frederick Kuhne, of the bureau of criminal investigation of the police department of the city of New York, after dwelling at length on the basis of fingerprint identification and the methods of classifying fingerprint impressions, and especially upon the extent and usefulness of such identification, tells us that in some European cities impressions of the palms of the hands are utilized as an additional means of identification, especially because numerous patterns and characteristics appear in the palms as well as in the fingers, and in his work (page 96) he sets forth an illustration vividly portraying the truth of his assertion.

"The lines on the palms of the human hand and the soles of the feet, which form the basis of individual identification, are the papillary ridges. They serve the office of raising the mouths of the ducts, so as to facilitate the discharge of the sweat, and perhaps perform the additional functions of aiding the sense of touch and of giving elasticity to the skin of the hand, and, having a vacuumistic tendency, they assist in preventing against slipping. These papillary ridges form figures, patterns, or designs, which research, study, and science have divided into classes named after their particular form, to wit, arches, loops, whirls, and composites. These patterns, as they have been established and named by those who have become devotees to the science of fingerprint identification, while they have been discussed principally in connection with finger impressions, are not confined to the human finger alone, but are found with equal importance and equal persistency in the human palm and the sole of the human foot.

"Mr. Harold J. Shepstone, in an article entitled, 'The Finger-print System of Identification,' appearing in the Scientific American of date October 1,1910, at page 256, after dwelling upon the wonderful lineations in the form of ridges and patterns which adorn the palmar surface of the human hand, says: 'One of the most interesting facts about this system is that every member of the human race, irrespective of age or sex, carries in person certain delicate markings by which identity can be readily established.'

"The learned author illustrates his article by a whole-hand impression showing the systems and the identifying markings. In the issue of the Scientific American of date August 19, 1911, there appears an article entitled, 'No Two Fingerprints Alike,' and there reference is made to a communication addressed to the French Academy of Science by Mr. M. V. Balt-

hazard, a student of the fingerprint science. This learned authority declares his findings to the effect that, if any fingerprint be divided into 100 squares, each square will contain some distinctive mark. He says that two fingerprints will differ from each other, either in the arrangement of the marks in the different squares or in the character of the marks in a particular square. He says the total number of combinations of the two kinds of marks (branching or termination of ridges) in the 100 squares is the 100th power of 4. 'This,' says the author, 'is a number that no one can possibly imagine. It is equal approximately to a number that would be represented by the figure 1 followed by 60 zeros. This means that there are possible just so many different kinds of prints, and that no particular combination will occur more frequently than others. The chances, therefore, of any particular combination of marks occurring, may be represented by a fraction with 1 as the numerator and a denominator represented by 1, followed by 60 zeros, a very tiny fraction of a chance indeed.' To the suggestion as to how many points must agree in two fingerprints to make sure of identity, this author bases his reply on mathematical grounds, to theeffect that, when two fingerprints agree in 17 out of the 100 squares, it is practically certain that they were made by the same finger. His reasoning in establishing this basis is most interesting and instructive.

"In the issue of 'Law Notes' of February, 1917, there appears an article entitled, 'Fingerprint Evidence,' in which the subject is treated at some length. In an issue of the same publication, of date January, 1918, and under the same caption, attention is directed to the learned discussion of the subject by Judge Wadhams, of the court of general sessions of the peace of New York, where, in the case of People v. Sallow, 100 Misc. 447, 165 N. Y. Supp. 915, the matter is historically dealt with in the consideration of the validity of an act requiring the taking of the finger-prints of persons arrested for crime.

"In a most exhaustive work that has just come to our attention, in the writing of which Mr. Harris Hawthorne Wilder, Ph. D., and professor of zoology in Smith College, and Mr. Bert Wentworth, former police commissioner of Dover, New Hampshire, collaborate, a system somewhat similar to that established by Galton is made the basis of sectional investigation by which palm-print identification may be carried out by means of the human hand. On page 138 of the work, illustrations are set forth in which the several sections of the hand are portrayed. By this work our attention is called to a term applied to the skin of the palmar surface of the hand and the sole of the foot, which we think most appropriate, to wit, 'friction skin.' After dwelling upon the nature and character of this, the authors reassert the statement found in the works of all the other writers to whom we have referred, to the effect that this friction skin is covered by breaking, forking, splitting ridges, which ridges form patterns and designs most irregular and individual, and, say those authors: 'As these features remain absolutely constant throughout the entire life, and are far too complicated to make a duplication of even a single ridge probable, it naturally follows that a small area of friction skin, no matter where taken, is sufficient for an absolute and positive identification, provided only that a record of it, in the form of a 'print,' or some other form of accurate reproduction,

has been previously made, and is available for comparison.'

"On page 126 of the work the authors refer to an instance where a small square area was cut out from the same place in the hand prints of two individuals, the place selected being one which has never occasioned any special interest among investigators, and where the ridges run monotonously in straight or slightly curved parallels. The area from which this patch of friction skin was taken lies above the proximal end of the metacarpal bone of the thumb, which would be approximately at the base of the first system of the hand under Galton's plan of subdivision. The authors refer to the fact that this region, or area, from which the experimental patch was taken, is the most featureless and monotonous of any of the parts of the human hand. Yet they say a careful scrutiny of the prints, especially when aided by a slight magnification, shows such marked differences that even a beginner in the work of identification would have no trouble in distinguishing them at once.

"In concluding a most interesting chapter on the subject of structure and development of friction ridges on the palmar surface of the human hand and the sole of the human foot, dealing with details of their course and arrangement, the authors conclude that these surfaces furnish a basis upon which to found a system of identification positive and absolute. Here we find the unequivocal declaration that the patterns of the friction skin are individual, and, taken together, impossible to duplicate in another individual. Further, they declare that the separate ridges, too, show numerous details, which are in themselves so individual that a small area of friction skin, taken even in the most featureless portion, cannot be matched by any other piece. 'Personal Identification,' by Wilder and Wentworth.

"All of the learned authors, experts, and scientists on the subject of fingerprint identification, and each of those to whom we have here-tofore referred, agree that these patterns, formed by the papillary ridges on the inner surface of the human hand and the sole of the foot, are persistent, continuous, and unchanging, from a period in the existence of the individual extending from some months before birth until disintegration after death. While most of the experts on fingerprint identification deal most extensively with impressions of the human fingers, we find that some, of whom Mr. Galton is first and foremost, have divided the palmar surface of the human hand into what they term well-marked systems of ridges. Mr. Galton in his work fixes these systems thus:

"First, that which runs over the ball of the thumb and adjacent parts of the palm, bounded by a line which starts from the middle of the palm, close to the wrist, and sweeps around the ball of the thumb to the edge of the palm on the side of the thumb, which it reaches about half an inch, more or less, below the base of the forefinger. The second system is bounded toward the thumb by the base line of the first system and toward the little finger by a line starting from about the middle of the little-finger side of the palm, and ending on the opposite side, just below the forefinger. The third system is bounded thumbwards by the base line of the second until that line arrives at a point immediately below the axis of the forefinger.

There the boundary of the third system leaves this base line and skirts the base of the forefinger, until it reaches the interval which separates the fore and middle fingers. The upper boundary of the third system consists of a line which leaves the middle-finger side of the palm a small distance below the base of the little finger, and terminates between the fore and middle fingers. Galton on Fingerprints, Macmillan & Co. London and New York, 1892, p. 53.

"Mr. Galton in his work draws comparison between the patterns that may occur in these individual systems of the palm and those which occur on the bulbs of the thumb and fingers. He refers to the latter as being more definite in position, more conspicuous in lineation, and more instructive to study. Moreover, he says they are more easy to classify. The palm print or impression involved in this case is made by that portion of the hand which falls principally in the third system, and perhaps partly in the second system, as these systems have been established by Galton in his arrangement of the human palm heretofore referred to.

"We have gone at length into the subject of palm-print and fingerprint identification, largely for the purpose of evolving the indisputable conclusion that there is but one physiological basis underlying this method of identification: that the phenomenon by which identity is thus established exists, not only on the bulbs of the finger tips, but is continuous and coexisting on all parts and in all sections and subdivisions of the palmar surface of the human hand. History of the Fingerprint System, by Berthold Laufer, supra. The rules and systems established by students of the subject, through which identification is made positive, apply no more to one section or system of this palmar surface than to another. A student of the subject may have confined his research and study largely to prints or impressions made only by the finger tips or by the bulbs on the ends of the fingers, but the knowledge and experience thus gained, and the methods of determining identity thus established and used, are applicable with equal significance and effect to any given surface of the palm of the hand. This is true, because of the truth of our former assertion as to a common physiological basis underlying this established method of identification.

"Progressive and scientific processes and appliances which belong to the various human endeavors belong equally to the machinery of the law. The principle underlying the Sussex Peerage Case, Il Clark & F. 85, 8 Eng. Reprint, 1034, 8 Jur. 793, and recognized by Greenleaf in his work on Evidence (Greenl. Ev. 516), has found sanction by the courts in modern American jurisprudence, and this principle it is which will allow evidence of those scientific processes, the work of trained, skilful men in their respective departments, to be applied by way of demonstration of a fact, leaving the weight and effect of such demonstration entirely to the consideration of the jury under proper instruction. State v. Cerciello, 86 N. J. L. 309, 52 L.R.A. (N.S.) 1010, 90 Atl. 1112.

"In the case of State v. Miller, 71 N. J. L. 528, 60 Atl. 202, the court held that it was not erroneous to admit evidence of the coincidence between the hand of the accused, and the bloody print of a hand upon

the wall of a house where a crime was committed. This case, as we understand it, did not turn upon fingerprint identification, such as is involved in the case at bar; but the principle there applied is worthy of note as supporting the position which we deem proper here. In the case of State v. Connors, 87 N. J. L. 419, 94 Atl. 812, the court recognized the propriety of admitting the testimony of fingerprint experts for the purpose of establishing identity.

"The courts of Great Britain have followed the principle that, inasmuch as the science of fingerprint identification was an established science, evidence proving identity by this means should be received; and in Castleton's Case, 3 Crim. App. (England) 74, a conviction was sustained where the only proof of identity in the lower court was the evidence of finger-prints.

"Two leading cases in this country have gone at length into this question. In People v. Jennings, 252 Ill. 534, 43 L.R.A.(N.S.) 1206, 96 N. E. 1077, the supreme court of Illinois, speaking through Mr. Chief Justice Carter, on an appeal from conviction of murder in the first degree, upheld the trial court. wherein it admitted the evidence of experts as to the comparison of photographs of the fingerprints found on a railing in the premises, with the enlarged fingerprints of the defendant. The opinion of the chief justice of the Illinois court is to our mind exhaustive of the subject. and we cite it here with approval.

"In the case of People v. Roach, 215 N. Y. 602, 109 N. E. 618, Ann. Cas. 1917A, 410, Mr. Justice Seabury went at length into the subject, and referred approvingly to the case of People v. Jennings, supra, and upheld the ruling of the admissibility of such evidence. In the Roach Case, as in the Jennings Case, the appeal was from a conviction of murder. The appellant assigned as error the testimony of an expert as to fingerprint impressions found upon the clapboards of a house where the homicide was committed. There the experts testified positively that the impressions on the clapboards were fingerprints of the left hand of the defendant. This testimony was rendered after the expert had opportunity to compare the fingerprints of the defendant with those markings found in the house. The supreme court of New York in that case held that the evidence was admissible, its weight being for the determination of the jury.

"These cases, and others to which we might properly refer (Young v. State, 68 Ala. 569; People v. Storrs, 207 N. Y. 147, 45 L.R.A. (N.S.) 860, 100 N. E. 730, Ann. Cas. 1914C, 196), establish the rule of the admissibility of this character of evidence, and in the light of progressive science, and inasmuch as the underlying principle of this science, as recognized in the cases cited, is directly applicable and is the underlying principle here, the foundation was sufficiently laid for the testimony of the witnesses Stone and Botorff. The evidence of these experts as to the identity of the palm-print of the defendant with that found upon the blood-smeared envelope taken from the rifled mail sack was a proper subject for the consideration of the jury. The weight to be given to this testimony was for the jury to determine.

"It is contended by appellant here that the court erred in admitting certain photographic enlargements, and in permitting the witnesses Stone and Botorff to illustrate their testimony by the use of a projectoscope, by means of which an enlarged photograph of the impressions was displayed to the jury. It might suffice to say that no question is raised as to the accuracy of the photographic exhibits, nor is any question raised as to the method of identifying the photographs, or as to the manner in which the palm-print impression of the defendant was taken, or as to the correctness of the enlargements. The appliances used and the methods resorted to, so far as we are able to determine, were those appliances and methods recognized by science. By these appliances, the jury was afforded an opportunity to follow the testimony of the experts in their direct and cross examination. By this means they were better able to judge of the correctness of the testimony as it was being given, and to estimate its weight and significance. This method of presenting proof has received the sanction of the highest authority. Whart. Crim. Ev. 8th ed. sec. 544; 1 Wigmore, Ev. sec. 795; - Rogers, Expert Testimony, 2d ed. sec. 140; Dederichs v. Salt Lake City R. Co. 35 L.R.A. 802, and note (14 Utah, 137, 46 Pac. 656); State v. Connors, 87 N. J. L. 419, 94 Atl. 812. That instruments may be photographed for the purpose of so enlarging as to make the proportions plainer, and such photographs, when already in evidence, may be projected to illustrate the testimony of witnesses, is a rule that has found general sanction. First Nat. Bank v. Wisdom, 111 Ky. 135, 63 S. W. 461; United States v. Ortiz, 176 U. S. 422, 44 L. ed. 529, 20 Sup. Ct. Rep. 466; Howard v. Illinois Trust & Sav. Bank, 189 Ill. 568, 59 N. E. 1106; Marcy v. Barnes, 16 Gray, 161. 77 Am. Dec. 405.

photographs of the palm impressions, when upon such photographs there were certain lines and markings, placed there by the witnesses Stone and Botorff before their testimony was given. These lines, as appears from what record there is before us, were placed on the photographs by the experts for the purpose of more clearly illustrating their testimony. They indicated the points of similarity and identity to which the experts testified. Their existence and significance were fully explained by the witnesses. These markings in no wise affected the photographs, and we are at a loss to discern any prejudice or injury that could have thus accrued to the appellant.

"Error is assigned to the ruling of the trial court in permitting the witness Stone to make a positive statement as to the identity of the palm impressions. In this respect he testified positively that these palm-prints were made by one and the same hand. We might with propriety pass this assignment without comment, for the reason that the only ground of objection assigned in the trial court was that the question had already been answered. Aside from this, it may with propriety be said that, while it is the usual practice for expert witnesses to testify as to their belief in a given conclusion, or as to their best judgment, no rule of law prevents them from testifying positively on such subjects. Whether they give their best judgment or belief, or testify positively as to their conclusion, the fact remains that it is for the jury to determine the weight to be given to their testimony. People v. Jennings, supra."

#### A QUESTIONABLE PATTERN

In the preceding issue of this Bulletin there was presented for discussion a finger impression in which a scar so completely obliterated the pattern that the print was necessarily given the classification of the corresponding finger of the other hand.

At this time a scarred pattern of a different type is presented. In this case the pattern is partially obliterated so that the general type cannot be determined with definite accuracy, but the ridges allow reasonably accurate sub-classification, by ridge tracing or counting. Such a pattern is reproduced below.



The scarred area so obliterates a portion of the pattern that it is impossible to determine definitely whether preference should be given to a whorl or loop classification. The solution is to give prints of this type the primary value of the corresponding finger. However, once the general type is determined, it is possible to obtain a sub-classification by counting or tracing the ridges. In case the opposite finger is a loop the scarred pattern likewise would be given a loop. Since a ridge count of the

above print is 10 and the ridge slope is toward the right, the impression would be classified as a 10 count ulnar loop, if in the right hand, and a 10 count radial loop, if in the left, regardless of whether the corresponding finger is radial or ulnar.

In the event the opposite finger is a whorl the above pattern would be classified similarly. Since the tendency of the lower ridges is downward the print would be traced as an "outer" and referenced a "meeting" whorl, regardless of whether the tracing of the corresponding impression is "inner," "outer" or "meeting."

The question arises as to what the classification should be if the corresponding finger is an arch or a tented arch. In view of the fact that the scarred pattern reproduced above could not be either an arch or a tented arch, it is not felt that for filing purposes it should be classified in either of these groups. The Federal Bureau of Investigation, in filing this print under this circumstance or condition, would term it preferentially a 10 count loop, (ulnar or radial, depending on the hand in which it appeared) because of the fact that arches and tents as well as loops fall within the nonnumerical group, but would, before filing the print, search it in the various whorl combinations mentioned.

#### SPECIAL ANNOUNCEMENT

At this time the Federal Bureau of Investigation desires to announce that it will be necessary for the Bureau in the preparation of copies of criminal records to transmit the so-called "follow-up" copies only to the arresting officials who have submitted fingerprints during the five-year period immediately preceding the receipt of the current fingerprint record in the Identification Division. Copies of those current criminal records will, of course, be transmitted to every law enforcement official desiring the apprehension of a fugitive and to the last penitentiary in which the person currently arrested was incarcerated as a prisoner.

It is appreciated that in some instances an arresting agency will desire information concerning the whereabouts of a person after the elapse of this five-year period. The suggestion is made that in these instances such agencies make inquiry of the Bureau concerning the possible whereabouts of these persons. Advice as to the whereabouts will be submitted forthwith in these individual cases, as requested.

#### FINGERPRINT CONTRIBUTORS

On September 15, 1936, there were 10,048 Law Enforcement Agencies contributing fingerprints to the Identification Division of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

On June 29, 1936, the Federal Bureau of Investigation received the above photographic copies of fingerprints taken from the fingers of an unknown deceased man found in Eaton Canyon, Altadena district, California, on June 4, 1936. These prints were forwarded by the Sheriff of Los Angeles, California. Exhaustive searches through preferred and reference classifications have been conducted through the Bureau's main fingerprint files as well as the Single Fingerprint File without establishing an identification. The fingerprints were also searched through the files of the several branches of the military service of the Government but it has not been possible to identify this person.

Accordingly, it has been deemed desirable to reproduce these fingerprints in this Bulletin so that they may be searched through the files of the identification bureaus of the various local law enforcement agencies throughout the country.

Aside from the possibility of identifying this man through the reproduction of his fingerprints in the FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin, it is particularly interesting to note the possibilities of obtaining finger-prints from fingers of a person whose body is badly decomposed. In this case, the body when found was in a badly decomposed state and the estimate of the time from death to the discovery of the body varied from a matter of several weeks to five months. The fingers were treated and resulted in obtaining the fingerprints reproduced above.


When this body was found it was extremely desiccated and hard-The fingers were found to be so hardened that it was necessary to use a hacksaw to cut them off. In distending the fingers, they were soaked in a 3% aqueous solution (Potassium Hydroxide KOH). The fingers were then placed in an incubator for two or three hours at 56 degrees centigrade to hasten the process of absorption, this being a mechanical rather than a chemical action as there is no chemical change, the fingers merely absorb in the solution. The fingers were removed from the incubator and placed in distilled water to further hasten the process of absorption, the distilled water removing the potassium hydroxide and replacing it with distilled water. In the case of some of the fingers it was found that even after this method of distention it was necessary to remove flesh and skin from the bone in order to obtain satisfactory impressions. This process was continued until the fingers were distended as shown in the photographs reproduced below. The photographs below are photographs taken of the fingers before and after the bulbs had been distended.

If in using the above process of distention it is found that the fingers become too soft, they may be placed in a 1% solution of formaldehyde, being careful not to leave them too long as it has a tendency to harden them too much.

In connection with this case, there is quoted below, in part, a report on the finding of the body:

"Upon arrival found the nude body of a man badly decomposed, the limbs mostly eaten away by animals and the body badly shrunken. body was lying on its back in a clump of bushes completely nude. Approximately 3 ft. from the right hand was an empty 1/2 pint whiskey bottle. The clothes of the victim were about 20 feet from the body under a tree and consisted of a dark gray mixture suit of 3 pieces, shirt of a blue print pattern, underwear, necktie and shoes. The clothes were neatly folded and in the pockets were two handkerchiefs, 76 cents in change and some toothpicks. The shoe laces were missing from the shoes, the left shoe having part of the laces in the eyelets, indicating they had been torn out. The right shoe had no shoe lace whatever and the right shoe was cut out on the outer side near the position of the small toe and cut out on the right side of the heel. These shoes are black, high top, both having plugs in them. There were a few laundry marks and cleaner's marks on the clothes. The necktie was purchased at the Broadway Department store and the shirt at the National Shirt Shop. There were no other identifying marks. There was no hat. The man was gray and partly bald. The condition of the clothes would indicate that they had not lain all thru the winter rains; however, the condition of the body would ordinarily indicate that it had been there for several months."

It will be observed that the method usually followed in the fingerprinting of unidentified deceased persons is incorporated in the book-

let entitled "Fingerprints" which has been issued to law enforcement organizations by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Specific reference also is made to the article entitled "Dactyloscopic Identification of Cadavers" by Dr. Israel Castellanos, Director of the Bureau of Identification, Havana, Cuba, which appeared in the October 1, 1935, issue of the said bulletin, which outlines a procedure for the fingerprinting of deceased persons in extreme and unusual cases.

#### FREDERICK E. FAIR

### MURDERER IDENTIFIED BY FINGERPRINTS EIGHT YEARS AFTER HE HAD COMMITTED THE CRIME

An individual sought for eight years in connection with the murder of a police officer in Atlanta, Georgia, was recently located through the assistance of the Identification Division of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Information was received in the Bureau on August 21, 1928, from the Sheriff of Fulton County, Atlanta, Georgia, advising that one Frederick E. Fair, who had been arrested on August 16, 1928, by the Police Department at Atlanta, Georgia, for the murder of a police officer, had succeeded in effecting his escape from the County Jail.

The fingerprints of Fair, received from the Police Department at Atlanta, Georgia, were identified with those of Frank Pharr, who, on February 20, 1919, had been received at the State Reformatory, Mansfield, Ohio, for the offense of assault to kill. The fingerprint card submitted at that time reflected that this subject, while working in a store-room, had gotten into an argument with a fellow employee and had struck him over the head with an iron bolt in the heat of the argument. A wanted notice was promptly posted against this subject's record providing that the Sheriff of Fulton County, Atlanta, Georgia, was to be informed of any information received in the Bureau relative to his whereabouts. Wanted notices were also published in certain police bulletins, all to no avail.

Eight years elapsed and then on July 30, 1936, the fingerprints of Roy B. Wallis were received in the Identification Division from the Sheriff at Enid, Oklahoma, reflecting that this subject had been arrested on July 23, 1936, on a charge of violating the Revenue Act. When searched through the files of the Identification Division they were found to be identical with those of Frederick E. Fair, the escaped murderer wanted in Atlanta, Georgia.

A wire was immediately directed to the Sheriff at Atlanta, Georgia, informing him of the apprehension of this subject. The Sheriff at Enid, Oklahoma, was also notified by wire of the fugitive status of Roy B. Wallis, whom he had arrested for a violation of the Revenue Act.

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#### HARRY THOMPSON

### FINGERPRINTS ESTABLISH IDENTITY OF SUBJECT KILLED IN ATTEMPTED HOLDUP AT GREENSBORO, NORTH CAROLINA

On August 1, 1936, the fingerprints of an unknown dead man were received in the Bureau from the Police Department at Greensboro, North Carolina. The card reflected that the deceased had been killed during an attempted holdup of a shoe shop in Greensboro on the morning of July 31, 1936.

These prints were searched through the files of the Identification Division and found to correspond with those of Harry Thompson, who had been arrested by the Police Department at Charlotte, North Carolina, on March 24, 1933, for investigation. On August 29, 1934, he had been received as William Maesley at the North Carolina State Prison Camp #203 to serve a sentence of thirty days for illegal train riding. He also received a fine of \$10.00 and a sentence of ten days to be served in the District of Columbia Asylum and Jail on August 12, 1935, for violation of police regulations. The Police Department at Washington, D. C., arrested him a second time on the 25th of this same month for investigation in connection with a murder case. On September 3, 1935, he was again sent to the District of Columbia Asylum and Jail to serve 60 days for the offense of vagrancy.

The fingerprint card, which was received from the Metropolitan Police Department of Washington, D. C., reflecting the arrest of Thompson, who at that time was using the name of William Massey, for investigation in connection with a murder case, disclosed that his address at that time was 1252 New Jersey Avenue, N. W., Washington, D. C.

Information of the deceased's identity, together with the information as to his last known residence address, was promptly forwarded to the Chief of Police at Greensboro, North Carolina, by wire.

#### OFFENSES KNOWN TO THE POLICE, JULY AND AUGUST, 1936

Every three months the Bureau publishes in the bulletin "Uniform Crime Reports" data concerning the amount of crime in the United States, based on reports received from local law enforcement agencies throughout the country. However, in order to expedite the presentation of current information concerning the monthly fluctuation in the amount of crime there is presented below the number of major offenses reported for the months of July and August, 1936, by the police departments of 63 cities with a total of 19,036,228 inhabitants.

The figures disclose an increase in the number of offenses reported during August for all types of crimes shown in the compilation except rape, a slight decrease being shown for that offense.
