The Federal Bureau of Investigation, United States Department of Justice, is charged with the duty of investigating violations of the laws of the United States and collecting evidence in cases in which the United States is or may be a party in interest.

The following list indicates some of the major violations over which the Bureau has investigative jurisdiction:

National Motor Vehicle Theft Act

Interstate transportation of stolen property valued at \$5,000 or more National Bankruptcy Act

Interstate flight to avoid prosecution or testifying in certain cases White Slave Traffic Act

Impersonation of Government Officials

Larceny of Goods in Interstate Commerce

Killing or Assaulting Federal Officer

Cases involving transportation in interstate or foreign commerce of any persons who have been kidnaped

Extortion cases in which interstate commerce or interstate communication is an element

Theft, Embezzlement or Illegal Possession of Government Property Antitrust Laws

Robbery of National Banks, insured banks of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation and Member Banks of Federal Reserve System

National Bank and Federal Reserve Act Violations, such as embezzlement, abstraction or misapplication of funds

Crimes on any kind of Government reservation, including Indian Reservations or in any Government building or other Government property

Neutrality violations, including the shipment of arms to friendly nations Frauds against the Government

Crimes in connection with the Federal Penal and Correctional Institutions Perjury, embezzlement, or bribery in connection with Federal Statutes or officials

Crimes on the high seas

Federal Anti-Racketeering Statute

The location of persons who are fugitives from justice by reason of violations of the Federal Laws over which the Bureau has jurisdiction, of escaped Federal prisoners, and parole and probation violators.

The Bureau does not have investigative jurisdiction over the violations of Counterfeiting, Narcotic, Customs, Immigration, or Postal Laws.

Law enforcement officials possessing information concerning violations over which the Bureau has investigative jurisdiction are requested to promptly forward the same to the Special Agent in Charge of the nearest field division of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, United States Department of Justice. The address of each field division of this Bureau appears on the inside back cover of this bulletin. Government Rate Collect telegrams or telephone calls will be accepted if information indicates that immediate action is necessary.



ADDRESS OF HONORABLE HOMER S. CUMMINGS

Mr. Hoover, Senator McCarran, Mr. Kelly, and the ever-faithful Clegg, I am happy also to address this graduating class. I think first of all, however, I ought to express my very great appreciation for what the Director has just said. He is a man of zeal and enthusiasm and, perhaps, he has a little bit over-stated the case. I have only done here what I could and what has seemed to me to be the task immediately before me. one could have succeeded in achieving the results that you gentlemen see around you without the earnest help and cooperation, advice and stimulation of admirable associates, all fired with zeal for the same objectives. so it has naturally happened that things have improved because we here in the Department of Justice learned to cooperate with each other; we learned that we were stronger when we stood together and as we went on in these efforts to improve the general situation, so far as this Department had any contact with the national crime problem we not only learned to know each other better but there were developed some fine friendships, some affectionate friendships that I undertake to say will last as long as we shall live, no matter what our respective fates may be.

So what has come out of the work has not only been produced by planning and thought and study. It has been done by cooperative effort and by a fine spirit of mutual trust and friendship. No one on earth is entitled to higher credit for what has been done for the Federal Bureau of Investigation than its distinguished Director, no matter what he may say about it.

So now that is the way we have tried to move along, and that's why progress, as I say, has been made, and that is why this meeting that you are attending here with such intense interest has been made possible. As I said, we could not have even visualized four years ago, for instance, the existence of this Academy. And yet, here it is, in full bloom and blossom, a thing of which we are all proud, an institution which has become a permanent part, I believe, of the life of America. It is a new situation that has been developed to meet an old need. The very failure of our law enforcement groups has primarily been due to a lack of mutual understanding and a sad lack of cooperative effort. There have always been fine men in the law enforcement groups throughout the country. You couldn't go into a state or a community without finding fine men, giving all that they had to their work, but there was a diffusion of effort, loss of motion, failure to concentrate, failure to direct, and there were, therefore, those of discouragement which bring about criticism from the public. We had a period only a few years back when it was the custom in the movies, in plays, to glorify the criminal and to write down, as it were, the law enforcement officer. Now in some way, in some mysterious way, that psychology has been changed, and today, I think it is fair to state, the profession, for it is a profession of law enforcement, stands upon a higher plane in this country than it has ever stood before. There is much to be done. We have yet a

long way to go, but we are on our way. You gentlemen, you are going out into the various communities from which you came, carry back certain impressions, carry back certain advantages which may have come to you here, but you take with you great obligations, great duties. Why? Because if this movement in which we are all interested is to prevail, and if we are to go on moving up what someone has called the "slow slope of time," always to a higher grade and level, then those who go out from here have a duty to perform with respect to all of their associates.

I speak the literal truth when I say you carry with you the honor, the integrity, and the reputation of the Department of Justice and the Federal Bureau of Investigation. You are a part of it; you are a part of this fine movement that has made such headway, and which has wrung such extraordinary support from the public now that they have grasped the fact that something real and constructive is being done.

I could not, for the needs of the speech I am attempting to make this morning, pass by without expressing appreciation for the presence here of Senator McCarran and for what he has so admirably said. I listened very intently to his address. It was sound, instructive, and stimulating. Director Hoover always carries in his words a vital message, and the address of my friend Kelly, from Rhode Island, was, I think, classic, well worthy of being reprinted, distributed, re-read and re-read by every member of this class until it is graven upon your minds and conscience.

Part of our lives, in fact all of our lives since we have been here, have been poured into this great project, so when you go away, carrying, as I say, the honor of the Department, carrying away also with you our affection, our respect, our confidence, and our faith, nothing would make Director Hoover happier, or any of the rest of us happier, than to see each and every one of you make a mark of distinguished success in your respective careers. I want you to remember this too. The Department of Justice and the Federal Bureau of Investigation, no matter where you may be, is your home. You are welcome here at any time; we are glad to have you come back and visit us and get fresh touches of the motive power that comes from revived friendships and social contacts.

How pleased we are at the prospects which have developed for the future of this Academy, and to feel that you, as the earlier members, for it is still in its early days, will, through all the stretches of the years to come, get an increasing impression of the value, the mutual value, of the associations that have here been fraught.

ADDRESS OF DIRECTOR JOHN EDGAR HOOVER

Ladies and gentlemen, it is a distinct pleasure to be here this morning to bid you members of the Academy Godspeed on your new mission and your new work, which we hope you will be able to take up in a more intensified manner.

a termination three months of very pleasant and personal associations. Men cannot have lived together, worked together, and studied together without having a certain wrenching of the heart when they leave each other and separate, to go to various parts of the country. However, I do feel that not-withstanding the fact that our daily associations will be terminated, there are certain bonds and certain contacts that will be continued through the months and years to come.

When we opened the National Police Academy, we stated that one of its purposes was to bridge over the great gap which exists between Federal and state authorities. Much talk has been heard in this country about the formation of a national police. There is no place in America today for any such organization. Law enforcement is essentially a local problem and all the Federal Government can or will be able to do is endeavor to aid or guide in such training through methods of scientific criminal detection and other law enforcement activities. The solving of crime, the actual prevention of those things which we try to give you here, rests in your hands. The only way that can be attained efficiently and satisfactorily, in my estimation, is the building of a bridge such as we have tried to do in the National Police Academy.

This class goes out today, and there is placed another stone in that bridge structure, or that great gap between Federal and local agencies, and I know in going back to your respective departments, you go with that humble attitude of recognizing and realizing you do not know all there is to know about your work. Just as soon as any man in any profession reaches the point where he knows it all, then he is riding on the down road; he is not advancing in that profession. I honestly believe each one of you will go back with a sincere understanding that you have a great deal more to learn and this instruction you have received here will serve to help you acquire additional knowledge and convey it, in turn, to the local officers with whom you come in contact.

I think it is particularly appropriate this morning that we have a graduation of a police academy class because it was exactly two years ago that under the leadership of Attorney General Cummings, the first National Police Academy class was formed. He had thought about such a program for a long period of time and with his capable planning he enabled the FBI to initiate such a course. In the two years that have elapsed, there have been 151 graduates in the National Police Academy, and their training has enabled them to go back and convey that knowledge to over 60,000 members of their respective departments, who protect the lives and property of over 70,000,000 persons. This is a great achievement, something of which you can justly be proud, in being one of the cogs in that missionary program. They have gone back to give to their own fellow officers the same training and instructions which you have received here during the last three months. There has been a great value come out of this training school, not only to the members attending individually, but due to the fact that it has been recognized internationally. Just recently, we have received requests from three foreign countries to send representatives of those countries to attend one of the Police Academy schools. We have been unable to grant these requests

because we are desirous of giving this training first to the law enforcement representatives in the United States. As always, this project has been a typical "We" project and not an "I" project. It has been with the cooperation of the members of the class and with the cooperation of the International Association of Chiefs of Police, and with the always constant guidance and sympathetic understanding and leadership of the Attorney General. We, therefore, have a just pride in this Academy, when we realize it is recognized in all parts of the world.

Now in law enforcement work, there are just three factors, I think, when we boil the problems down that have to be considered. First comes crime prevention, and you, gentlemen, I hope will go back to your communities with a renewed enthusiasm for doing something in the field of crime prevention. It is an integral part of law enforcement, an integral part of the police side of law enforcement. It should be left in the police hands of the country. They are the ones that come in contact with the boys and girls and we want them to respect the law enforcement officers. I believe that problem is an integral problem.

Next comes crime detection, with which you are fully familiar, and last of course comes crime prosecution. I sometimes feel that when criticisms come from various groups of the country they all shoulder upon the police organizations of the country for failure, when, as a matter of fact, that attention should be given sometimes to the courts and sometimes to the prosecuting attorneys because too often you know our cases fail in court because we do not have the enthusiasm, intelligence, or integrity of prosecuting attorneys. They are the problems that you are going to be faced with upon your return to your communities. Don't try to circumscribe yourselves into a narrow field. You are going back with a broad viewpoint and carry on that battle back there; carry on the teaching and expansion of those principles which involve every one of those elements of law enforcement. You have a right to speak out against the abuses of the parole, against the abuses that sometimes exist in our prisons. We hear the criticism sometimes that law enforcement agencies are not fully cognizant of the intricacies of the parole system. I would like to know what group of men in the country is better qualified than the law enforcement officers, many of whom have given their lives as a result of the sentimental weaknesses of those sob sisters who turn loose on the public men unfit again to circulate and associate with civilized society, and therefore it is your duty to speak upon those subjects, and in fighting that battle you will not be alone because the public will be with you. Those of us in the Department of Justice will be with you, and it is your duty to carry on that program locally. I do want to emphasize that you are going back to your communities as members of a great profession. Law enforcement today is a career.

Two of the outstanding virtues that have often been said of our law enforcement machinery are the fact that our police officers are courageous and loyal. The weaknesses of law enforcement have been the introduction of the slime of politics in the administration of law enforcement agencies, and, secondly, the lack of scientific training. With courage and loyalty, and the scientific training being made available, I believe the slime of

politics can be and will be corrected. Thinking people are beginning to realize that kind of thing. Taxpayers of America are interested in getting decent law enforcement for themselves. They are unconcerned with who catches the man; they are more concerned with the fact that the man is caught, and every element of scientific crime detection should be utilized to that extent. You are going out as crusaders in a great profession and of that you have just right to be proud.

In closing I want to give to you the motto of our Bureau because you go back to your respective cities really as integral parts of the Federal Bureau of Investigation -- Fidelity, Bravery, Integrity. There is no higher motto than that for any group or for any man to live up to. I want every man to feel, as you go back to your respective communities, that while we are terminating our associations, those who remain here in the Department of Justice are your friends. I think you learned the other night that the Attorney General of the United States is a human individual, a man who understands and can speak our language, and there will always be there a champion of law enforcement officers.

I want to wish every one of you the happiness and the success and the attainment of the goals which are in your hearts this morning.

ADDRESS OF MR. EDWARD J. KELLY

Mr. Attorney General, Senator McCarran, and Director; members of the graduating class, and friends: First I want to express my very deep and profound appreciation to the Director for inviting me here this morning, because I deem it a most unusual honor.

It is the custom or practice of the genial Director of the deservedly-famous FBI to invite the members of the Consulting Committee of the International Association of Chiefs of Police to attend the graduating exercises and deliver a brief address designed to impart advice and inspiration to the graduates. The custom may be a pleasant and a delightful one, but the task and the responsibility imposed upon the speaker, whoever he may be, cannot or should not be regarded lightly. A string of trifling platitudes may bring no inspiration to students in search of light and truth; moreover, an exaggerated word picture of the fine prospects awaiting each and every student may inspire hopes that are false and vain.

Perhaps the best way to word the message and tell the truth is to inform you that life's highway runs about the same for the policeman as for any other man. It runs along the valley of struggle and adversity, and sometimes reaches the hills of prosperity and success. It is not an easy nor a smooth road, for obstacles and temptations present themselves in unexpected places and ways. Much of the way you must travel alone, and that too with considerable risk to your reputation and your life. You will need real courage and other things. I mention other things because I know that the better you are equipped for the journey ahead of you the better prospects you have for a successful and honorable trip. Many a man in police work,

as in other walks of life, has failed because he was not properly equipped either by nature or training for the work and problems confronting him. Those candidates for police honors are fortunate who have been endowed by nature with high courage, good health, good common sense, rare judgment, and fine character, but such Abraham Lincoln types of humanity command a premium because of their scarcity.

Most men lack some of these valuable gifts, and their absence is overcome, if overcome it can be, by laborious study and special training. There is a theory that interest in one's work, coupled with the will to conquer, can overcome many natural defects. Land of no great natural richness can be cultivated in such a way that it becomes productive. May not the same principle be applied to men, and with better results? There is surely a need for education and training, and experience has justified the need and value of fine, modern, well-equipped, well-taught, special police schools.

Perhaps there is nowhere any class of men to whom knowledge, both general and specialized, is of more use or value than to you men going forth today to meet and solve the crime problems of this modern, complex, unstable world. More and more it becomes apparent that the skilled police operator should "know something of everything and everything of something." Were it not impossible in this day and age I would advise him to follow the example of Lord Bacon, who boasted that he took all knowledge for his province.

Although you may learn that you do not and can not know everything nevertheless your business demands courage and you have no reason to despair. You can soon learn to value and employ those ideas that are helpful instruments to you in the solution of your daily problems and in your own advancement. Each day a new contact, a new opportunity, a new problem may challenge your intelligence and your skill. These tests and contests in the field of experience will sharpen your mind, develop resourcefulness, and put you in a fair way to win the race which some of you are about to start.

While you are pursuing knowledge with a view to pursuing criminals, never neglect an opportunity, however great or small, to learn everything possible about human nature. It presents a great, inexhaustible, but worthwhile field for the police investigator who aspires to anything like a mastery of his chosen profession. It is the key that unlocks the door to the solution of many baffling crimes. A seemingly uncanny knowledge of human nature in its many aspects and phases, normal and abnormal, has enabled many an officer and detective to climb high upon the ladder of success and fame. If, as someone has said, "human nature is that part of nature nearest ourselves," why should any policeman neglect his nearest evidence? Studying one's self and others may profitably be practiced from the cradle to the grave by each and every member of our ancient and honorable profession.

It is not a pleasant task for me to play the part of a prophet before this apparently bright and promising class of students. I would like

to predict a brilliant career for each and every one here, but I am restrained from doing so partly by what I know and partly by what I don't know. I know, or have reason to believe, that you are strong men physically, and that mentally you are well trained in the art, science and technique of police work, but these qualifications alone, excellent and helpful as they may be, do not always guarantee permanent, life-long success. To prophesy your future success or failure accurately, it would be necessary to know definitely the nature and quality of your character and disposition, for therein reside the essential elements of success or failure. Someone has said that "Destiny is character and character is destiny." And so I say, "If you will don the armor of virtue, rectitude and moral integrity and follow the trail of duty uphill and down like a true soldier, your life and your acts will speak louder, last longer and mean more than any guest or speaker here can foresee."

It may be safe to say that there are few outside forces or external influences that can defeat your ambition or mar your career unless there is first some weakness or defect either in your character or judgment; some vulnerable point that is susceptible to influence or open to attack. The danger is often from within rather than from without. Unless there is a weakness or a weakening from within there are few difficulties, dangers or temptations that can completely undermine and destroy a well-trained officer's prospects for a long life of honorable and useful service. My advice to you is to stand guard over your own mind and character; keep your faculties in balance and under discipline; avoid extremes; keep busy; and have faith. The prizes of life come to the industrious and persistent as well as to the strong. The man who keeps his eyes in the right direction and gains ground foot by foot is superior to him who unfairly cuts corners to gain ground. Perhaps it would not stimulate or inspire you very much but it might put you on guard, increase your caution and help to save your position and reputation in years to come, if I enumerated a list of common failures in our professions and the causes thereof, and invited you to meditate upon these things. It may be contrary to custom on these auspicious occasions to paint any dark pictures, but I rely upon your ability to take the bitter with the sweet, and I invite you to walk with me, in imagination only, in the path of thorns that others less fortunate have trodden in reality and without the applause of their conscience.

Along this path, clearly marked "dangerous," we encounter several types of men deep in trouble. Over yonder stands an officer of very good ability; ambitious and aggressive, but lacking in cooperative spirit. Vanity, envy and jealousy make him about useless to his fellow officers, to his department, and to the community. If he can't get the credit for a capture or an arrest he is determined that no one else will. He will pull down and climb upon the prostrate body of a fellow officer to bring himself into prominence and to make himself more conspicuous. If he does not have his way and win his point he will bring down the curses of Hades upon all men. Even God must tremble. It is needless to say that such a man would be more useful on a wild goose chase.

unaided. Besides, it would take too long. Why wait to climb the ladder of success by the use of brain, character and skill? Why not rely upon pull and political influence? Why be averse to taking and giving some easy money to promote one's temporary interests? Graft, corruption and politics are the tools he tries to master. He plays with the "big shots" and hopes to become a "big shot." The truth is he is all shot before he begins.

And so we might continue to wander down this thorny path with its blind alleys and blind men, but it is better that we end our journey on the hilltop and in the sunshine. As we pause before parting let me congratulate you, one and all, students, principal, and faculty. You have worked together in a good cause and toward a great end - the protection of organized society and the security and preservation of our beloved people and their cherished institutions. United in spirit and effort, let us dedicate ourselves to the principles and ideas here taught.

ADDRESS OF HONORABLE PATRICK A. McCARRAN

Mr. Attorney General, Mr. Hoover, and my friends of the graduating class, and friends of those friends: It is a pleasure to be here and just for a moment look over the class that is to go out, to become a part of the life of this country. It is interesting to one who wants to study the faces of those who are being trained in the subject of law enforcement. Certainly this country can be proud today to see young men going out into this field and into this line of work with the integrity written into the countenances that we view this morning.

My friends, crime is a cancer eating at the heart of civiliza-As we reduce the frightful effects of that cancer, so we will, step by step, go forward in civilization. As that malignant growth attains a place on the body politic, just to that extent the body politic becomes weakened, and just to that extent the community in which that malignity exists, will be reduced in its own integrity and in the integrity of the community. My friends, the law is not the people; the people are not the law. The law is the spirit of justice, governing the people. You, going out today, must, of necessity, with the training that you have had, bear that spirit in mind. The spirit of justice that governs the people may, in a time of great crucial moment, rest upon your shoulders or in your hands. The police officer or the man who holds a place in the police service of his country must remember that he should draw to him the confidence of those who come in contact with him. The day for fear of a police officer is a day that should be waning. Today the children should regard him as their most loyal friend. Likewise the men and women of the country should draw the officer closer to them and he should know they are closer to him. Thus he may cite that "As a representative of the law in my community I propose that the law of justice shall be represented."

There never was a group of men going out into the active life of this country with a more serious nor more high vocation than what you have chosen because the welfare of your country, the welfare of America in the present day and in the days that are going, will and must rest upon a

clear, clean, courageous, impartial, and fair rendition and enforcement of the law. Courage is one great thing. Fidelity to duty is another, but a cordial, kindly, sympathetic spirit may be your greatest weapon in a trying moment.

My friends, coming from the far-west, coming from the Matterhorn state, I am proud that my state has two members in this class. Someone jokingly a moment ago said, "Why is it there are no more men from the West in these classes?" I said, "Perhaps because we don't need them; we don't have anything but law and order out there." That isn't all of it, my friends. These men going back to my state, and every one of you going back to your states, will take with you the training and knowledge you have gained here; and you take with you the knowledge that the Government stands for law and order and that civilization must go forward on the shoulders of law and order, and by going forward, facing problems of our humanity, a torn world abroad looking to us for guidance will find in us a faithful, courageous friend who will lead the world out of these troubled moments and troubled waters into a tranquil sea of civilization for generations to come.

ADDRESS OF MR. HOWARD M. TRAVIS

Mr. Attorney General, Senator McCarran, Mr. Hoover, distinguished guests, members of the class, and friends: There is really little that I can say now to convey to you the feelings which affect me at this termination of our course in the FBI National Police Academy. I would like, however, to express a few thoughts which are in my heart. I feel that each member of the Academy was honored at being selected to attend this school. I feel that during the school each member gained more information than he had ever hoped to acquire in years of actual experience.

I can state truthfully and sincerely that the course far exceeded my own expectations, and I expected much. I have gained much. I realized much. I have acquired, in addition to the actual information imparted to me, a circle of acquaintances and friends whom I shall remember and whose friendship I shall cherish always.

To you, Mr. Hoover, and Mr. Attorney General, and to your staff in the FBI I want to say in behalf of this session of the National Police Academy, that we feel most indebted and grateful, and shall endeavor to show our appreciation by better service in the years to come, by an increasingly enthusiastic spirit of cooperation with you and with all other police agencies, individually and collectively.

For you, I wish upon this occasion of our graduation, a repetition of at least ten decades more of the twenty years in the service of the FBI and America, which will mark your history on July 26, 1937.

We will not say goodbye to you now. I will merely say for this class, as its President, that it has adjourned for the time being but that I hope we can all convene here again in the not far distant future.

ORGANIZED BAND OF CHECK SWINDLERS

Within recent months there has come to the attention of the FBI instances where fraudulent checks have been negotiated in several of the states east of the Mississippi River. The Bureau maintains in its laboratory at Washington a file of fraudulent checks which, due to the special method of printing or preparing them, have the appearance of having been negotiated by professional check swindlers. It has been possible to identify a number of these checks recently submitted, as being the work of the same gang. This identification has been predicated on the general form of the check, which usually gives the appearance of having been especially printed for the fraudulent purpose to which it has been put, and also through means of typewriting identification, including the characteristic method of using the capital letter "I" in place of the figure "1;" in some instances they have been identified by similarities in the handwritten signature appended to the checks. Among some of the principal points of the modus operandi of this gang of swindlers are to indicate the supposed reason or account against which the check is drawn on the left-hand margin, as, for instance, for "expenses" or "bonus," etc.; more recently the use of a check protector for filling in the amount to be paid; the preparation of the checks to simulate a commercial business institution. Usually the name of the business organization chosen is such as would imply the frequent drawing of checks for small amounts, both in payment of salaries, expenses and bonuses, and in payment for the purchase of produce. Usually the checks bear a fraudulent certification. It will be further noted from some of the case histories cited below, that the most recent of these checks have been negotiated by two women, giving the appearance of prosperous tourists who are driving in a Buick sedan, which has been known to carry stolen 1937 Florida license plates #206-820.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation would appear to have no investigative jurisdiction in this matter, inasmuch as there is, as yet, no indication that there has been any impersonation of a federal officer or violation of federal statutes. The information has been published, however, as of interest and assistance to state and municipal law enforcement agencies, and any subsequent inquiries received from law enforcement agencies aware of additional victims of this gang will be filed together. There are set forth below reproductions of the face side of four of these fraudulent checks.





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There follow summaries of five reports of persons victimized by this gang.

December 3, 1936 - Birmingham, Alabama. The Birmingham Field Division of the Federal Bureau of Investigation under date of December 3, 1936, reported to headquarters in Washington that a number of fraudulent checks had been passed in Birmingham, Alabama, and other cities in northern Alabama, and that these checks were usually drawn on the Capital Bank of Cleveland, Ohio, payable to C. D. Case, and in the amount of \$10.95. The fraudulent checks had been referred to the Birmingham Field Division by local police authorities to determine if they might have been passed by a Federal Government employee impersonator.

January 22, 1937 - West Memphis, Arkansas. A citizen of West Memphis, Arkansas, wrote directly to the Federal Bureau of Investigation at Washington, D. C., and he was advised to refer his complaint to the local police authorities. The check by which he was swindled was drawn on the First National Bank of Chicago and signed by one Norman Brock, the purported cashier of the Fruit and Vegetable Market, Incorporated, located at 335 East 58th Street, Chicago. The complainant relates, "This check was cashed at my service station January 16, 1937, by three ladies in a 1936 black Pontiac sedan, bearing either Illinois or New York license plates."

June 30, 1937 - Memphis, Tennessee. The Memphis Field Division of the Federal Bureau of Investigation under date of June 30, 1937, referred to the Washington headquarters a check drawn on the First National Bank at Cleveland, Ohio, dated June 11, 1937, payable to the order of one C. E. Ames in the amount of \$37.50, and signed by James Markey, represented cashier of the Majestic-Trailor Corporation, Inc., of 507 Marshall Building, Cleveland, Ohio. This check was received by the operator of a filling station at Fayetteville, Tennessee, in payment of tires, oil and gas, and purchased by one alleging himself to be James Markey.

July 8, 1937 - Atwood, Tennessee. A citizen of Atwood, Tennessee, under date of July 8, 1937, directed a letter to the Bureau at Washington complaining that a fraudulent check had been passed at his filling station at Atwood, and he further advised that two similar checks had been passed in that section of Tennessee. The complainant further indicated that two women past middle-age, driving an automobile negotiated the fraudulent checks at the filling station. In this instance the fraudulent check was drawn on the First National Bank of Cleveland, Ohio, dated June 11, 1937, payable to C. E. Ames, in the amount of \$12.75 and signed by James Markey, as cashier of the Majestic-Trailor Corporation, Inc. He also indicated that the automobile used bore, at that time, Florida tags for 1937 #206-820. The complainant also forwarded advice received from the Florida State Commissioner of Motor Vehicles, and from the Chief of Police at Tampa, to the effect that this license tag had been reported lost or stolen to the Florida Motor Vehicle Department; these two officials also advised the complainant in their letters to him that a large number of persons from Tennessee had written asking information as to the owner of such license tags, and all had stated that they had been victimized by a person or persons driving a Buick

automobile bearing the tag number. The Chief of Police at Tampa advised the complainant that the automobile tag was being used in violation of the law.

July 8, 1937 - Clarksville, Virginia. A citizen of Clarksville, Virginia, on the date of July 8, 1937, directed a letter to the Federal Bureau of Investigation at Washington complaining that he had been defrauded. He was referred by the Bureau to his local police authorities. The fraudulent check was not submitted with this complaint by the citizen, who reported that the swindlers were in a Buick five-passenger automobile, bearing 1937 Florida license #206-820. In perpetrating this swindle, according to the report of the complainant, two women drove up to the filling station in the car described and purchased five gallons of gasoline. One of the women was described by the complainant as being an elderly woman, and the other, thin and apparently between the ages of 40 and 45 years. The complainant advised that the check was in the amount of \$12.35, and purported to be a cashier's check drawn on the Bank of Detroit, Michigan, dated June 21, 1937, payable to C. D. Dean, and signed by P. W. West. The complainant also advised that he has learned these people negotiated similar fraudulent checks at nearly every service station along the highway from Danville, Virginia, through Chase City, Virginia, and he states that in every instance the checks were quite the same, for the same amount, dated and filled in in a similar manner.

AGE GROUPING IN TECHNICAL FILES

Contributors of fingerprints to the Identification Division of the Federal Bureau of Investigation are requested to note the age of the subject on each fingerprint card submitted. It has been observed in examinations of various fingerprint cards of the same individual that in many instances there are striking variations in age. Because of the desirability of keeping the technical files of the Bureau's Identification Division in an active stage, and because it has been felt that it would expedite the search of current fingerprint cards against the records of the Identification Division, the Federal Bureau of Investigation has segregated in the main fingerprint files the fingerprints of individuals who are under sixty years of age. Those sixty and over are placed in a separate group, in anticipation of the time when they may be considered inactive. All fingerprints received, which reveal the subject's age as fifty to sixty are referenced to this group of prints representing the impressions of individuals who are over sixty, thus allowing a tolerance of ten years. For this reason, and because it is desired that the Bureau's files reflect the most accurate data possible, the cooperation of contributors in this respect will be greatly appreciated.

A QUESTIONABLE PATTERN

In the interpretation of finger impressions difficulties frequently arise in patterns which are on the borderline between tented arch and loop classifications. The accompanying reproduction is of this type.



It is noticed that in this impression ridge "X" not only runs from the delta at point "A" but also continues on to form the one recurving ridge in the pattern. Since the delta is thus joined to the recurving ridge and a line drawn from the delta to the core at point "B" would not cross that ridge, this impression would be classified as a tented arch in the Bureau's Identification Division. Appropriate reference searches are made in cases of this kind.

UNIFORM CRIME REPORTS CONSOLIDATED DAILY AND MONTHLY REPORTS

On the succeeding pages there are reproduced the forms entitled "Consolidated Daily Report" and "Consolidated Monthly Report." The forms are recommended by the Committee on Uniform Crime Records of the International Association of Chiefs of Police and are intended for local administrative purposes only. In other words, copies of the reports are not to be forwarded to the Federal Bureau of Investigation. The forms are already in use by many of the police departments throughout the United States and are used to furnish the chief and other administrative officials of the police department, as well as the Mayor or City Manager, with current information concerning the problems and activities of the department.

In accordance with the recommendation of the Committee on Uniform Crime Records of the International Association of Chiefs of Police, the Federal Bureau of Investigation has decided to undertake the free distribution of the report forms to local agencies.

It will be observed that the Consolidated Daily and Monthly forms were developed in connection with the uniform crime reporting project and that the classification of offenses should be the same as provided for in "A Handbook Containing Suggestions for the Preparation of Uniform Crime Reports."

Data concerning the number of offenses known should, of course, be compiled from a record of offenses and complaints of offenses, whereas information concerning the number of persons charged should be compiled from a record of persons arrested and those served with summonses or police notices. The standard offense and arrest records recommended by the International Association of Chiefs of Police were reproduced in the September, 1936, issue of the FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin.

In some of the smaller departments it will probably be found unnecessary to prepare each month all of the tabulations provided for in the consolidated monthly report, it being sufficient in the smaller departments to prepare such compilations less frequently. In this connection it may be pointed out that the monthly report includes many of the tabulations suggested for inclusion in the annual police report, as outlined in "A Guide for Preparing Annual Police Reports." Copies of the Guide will be furnished without charge upon request.

As mentioned above, copies of the Consolidated Daily Report and the Consolidated Monthly Report will be furnished upon request to local law enforcement agencies without charge. It is suggested that requests for copies of the forms be limited to the amount necessary during a reasonably short period of time.





SPECIAL ANNOUNCEMENT ORIGINAL EVIDENCE

In order to insure proper handling and to make it possible to show continuity of possession, it is desired that original evidence, submitted in connection with cases under investigation be forwarded to the Bureau in an inner envelope properly marked and that envelope be enclosed in a forwarding envelope. Such evidence frequently consists of small articles, lifts of latent prints and photographic negatives. The inner envelope containing evidence in latent fingerprint cases should be sealed and marked or stamped either "Evidence" or "Latent Fingerprint Evidence." This envelope together with the letter of transmittal, which should outline in general the basic facts of the crime, the name of the subject and victim as well as any information regarding the development of the latent prints, should be enclosed in an outer envelope for mailing. Large objects forwarded under separate cover should also have inner and outer wrappings, the inner wrapping must be properly stamped or marked either "Evidence" or "Latent Fingerprint Evidence." In the letters covering the transmittal of the original evidence in these packages, all articles should be listed.

SHOTGUN SHELL IDENTIFIED AS COMING FROM SUSPECTED WEAPON

On December 3, 1936, a representative of the Virginia Alcoholic Beverage Control Board, Richmond, Virginia, called at the Federal Bureau of Investigation and submitted a shotgun together with one exploded shell, requesting that an effort be made to determine whether the shell had been fired in the suspected gun. This evidence had been recovered by the officers in connection with their investigation of the shooting of one R. S. Durrette by the suspect, James Creasy.

As a result of the comparison of the evidence shotgun shell with test shells fired in the suspected weapon, it was definitely ascertained under the comparison microscope that similar markings appeared on each, and that the recovered shotgun shell had in fact been fired from the suspected weapon.

This information was communicated to the investigating agency, and upon the request of that board, preparations were made by the Bureau to furnish expert testimony relative to the findings of the Federal Bureau of Investigation Laboratory examiner. Upon being brought to trial at Harrison-burg, Virginia, on March 15, 1937, charged with menacing an officer and obstruction of justice, subject Creasy entered a plea of guilty and was sentenced for a term of three years.

BLOOD ANALYSIS ASSISTS IN CONVICTION OF MURDERER

On May 9, 1936, one Mary Ferry was found murdered in the cellar of her home in Erie, Pennsylvania. Investigation by local law enforcement officers indicated the husband of the victim, Paul Ferry, Senior, to be the most likely suspect, inasmuch as he has been reported several times to have threatened to kill his wife and children.

In an effort to more conclusively establish the guilt of the suspect, the District Attorney's Office for the County of Erie, submitted to the Laboratory of the Federal Bureau of Investigation certain of the evidence recovered in connection with the investigation, with the request that it be examined by technicians of the Bureau. Among the items submitted were various articles of apparel worn by the suspect at the time the murder was believed to have been committed, a laborer's pick, and other articles believed to have been used by the suspect in committing the murder, as well as a mop believed to have been used in cleaning up traces of the crime. Examination of this material in the Bureau's Laboratory disclosed the presence of blood of human origin on all of the articles mentioned and further disclosed the presence of a large number of human hairs tangled in the mop fibers. As an indication of the sensitiveness of the methods employed in such an examination it is to be noted that the evidence of human blood detected on the mop was not visible to the naked eye but indicated that an attempt had been made to remove the blood through the action of water. Examination of the mop further disclosed that the bulk of the hair appearing thereon was similar to known hair specimens taken from the victim.

This information was immediately furnished the District Attorney and testimony relative to the findings of the Bureau's Technical Laboratory was subsequently introduced at the trial by an expert from the Laboratory on September 16, 1936.

A few days later a letter was received from the District Attorney's Office advising that the jury had returned a verdict of guilty of murder in the first degree and that the death penalty had been fixed.



CRIMINAL RECORDS FURNISHED OVER INTERCITY RADIO NETWORK

At the request of the Associated Police Communication Officers, the Federal Bureau of Investigation has agreed to furnish a special service recommended by that organization for a period of three months beginning August 15, 1937. Messages originating in Washington, D. C., for police departments and other law enforcement agencies which are members of the Intercity Radio Network will be forwarded from the Federal Bureau of Investigation at Washington, D. C., over a teletype line connection to either the Police Department at New Orleans, Louisiana, or to the Police Department at Detroit, Michigan, and at those points will be relayed via radio to the organization for which the message is intended. As a result it will be possible during that trial period for those law enforcement agencies to obtain telegraphic replies to such of their fingerprint records as warrant service in this manner. Such agencies may in a like manner request reports on laboratory examinations being conducted for them in the Bureau's Technical Laboratory at Washington. It is only necessary for those organizations which are in this Intercity Radio Network to indicate prominently on the reverse of the fingerprint card those records sufficiently urgent to require telegraphic replies. There will be no message charge to the receiving department for the relay of the message over the teletype system from Washington to the relay point at New Orleans or Detroit, and the Associated Police Communication Officers have assured the Bureau that there will be no charge for the relay over the air.

At the expiration of the three months' experimental period an analysis of the resulting traffic is planned with a view to determining the future policy in this regard.

During the month of July, 1937, 111,743 fingerprint cards were received and handled in the Identification Division of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. There were 73,722 criminal fingerprint cards received and retained during the month just past. The finger impressions of 74,472 persons arrested for various criminal violations of law were received in the Bureau's Identification Division. Of the 73,722 criminal cards received and retained in the Federal Bureau of Investigation, 40,688 or 55.1 per cent were identified with prior records existing in the files of the Identification Division.

During the same period a total of 682 examinations were made in the Technical Laboratory of the FBI, assistance being rendered to government agencies other than the Bureau in 23 instances, and to state and municipal law enforcement agencies in 94 cases. During the same period last year there was a total of 324 laboratory examinations made, of which 16 were at the request of other government bureaus and 41 were conducted for state and municipal authorities.
